We have received and reviewed this claim. For the following reasons we recommend that this claim be paid from the Remission of Taxes Fund in the

As a result of a decision of the Board of Review on August 28, 2007, claimant was entitled to a refund of \$113,251.81. Under Wis. Stat. § 70.511(2)(b), claimant was entitled to file a claim for this amount by November 1, 2007, in order to receive the refund by January 31, 2008. Because the Remission of Taxes Fund was exhausted for that year, the Assessor's Office requested claimant to delay its claim for a refund so that the refund would not be paid until January 31, 2009. Plaintiff did so and now seeks interest for the one-year delay in payment.

In the absence of an express agreement to pay interest when a party forbears from collecting an amount that is otherwise due, Wis. Stat. § 138.04 governs. De Toro v. DI-LA-CH, Inc., 31 Wis. 2d 34, 1142 N.W.2d 192, 195 (1966). It provides for an annual interest rate of 5% in this case, 5% of \$113,251.85 for one year is \$5,662.59. We recommend payment of this amount from the 2009 Remission of Taxes Fund.

That Police Officer Jeffrey Thiele, when dealing with Sammie Glass on one or more occasion in 2006, violated MPD Rule 4, Section 2/060.00 by failing to be appropriately courteous and civil

and/or exercise patience and discretion as required.

SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS

At the hearing on September 26, 2008 testimony was received from Complainant Sammie Glass, Police Officer Jeffrey Thiele, City of Milwaukee DNS Inspector Angela Ferrill and Police Officer Michael Wawrzyniakowski. A copy of the transcript of the hearing will be made available to the parties and the Commissioners who will ultimately decide this matter. A summary of testimony from each witness will not be provided.

PROPOSED

FINDINGS OF FACT

- 1. Police Officer Jeffrey Thiele was, at all times pertinent hereto, a member of the Milwaukee Police Department and bound by the rules and procedures thereof.
- 2. Complainant Sammie Glass, at all times pertinent hereto, resided in a home in the City of Milwaukee located within the assigned squad area of Officer Thiele.
- 3. Officer Thiele and Mr. Glass were, prior to September 2, 2006, familiar with each other, having met and spoken on several occasions prior to that date.
- 4. Officer Thiele was aware that Mr. Glass frequently used his two story garage as a workshop, and that it had a wood-burning stove on the upper floor.
- 5. On September 2, 2006, Officer Thiele received a report of black smoke coming from Mr. Glass's garage, and that the odd smell led the caller to suspect that insulation was being burned off of copper wire.
- 6. Upon arriving at the location Officer Thiele noted that thick black smoke with a "burnt rubberish" smell was emanating from the garage's chimney.
- 7. Officer Thiele pounded on the garage door but did not receive an immediate response. Officer Thiele called the Milwaukee Fire Department. Mr. Glass exited the garage at about the same time that the Fire Department arrived.
- 8. Members of the Milwaukee Fire Department entered and inspected the garage and determined that there was no current need for fire and/or rescue services.
- 9. Before leaving the scene, the Fire Captain informed Officer Thiele that evidence in the garage led him to believe that copper wire was being burned in the stove.
- 10. Officer Thiele believed that the activity taking place in the garage was in violation of laws and/or ordinances. He took control of the garage area as a possible crime scene and placed Mr. Glass in the squad car but not in handcuffs.
- 11. Officer Thiele Then contacted his supervisor and had an identification technician take photographs of the scene. He also contacted the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and requested that someone be sent to investigate possible violations of environmental regulations.

- 12. A DNR warden appeared on the scene more than 2 hours later. During this period Mr. Glass was continuously detained in the rear seat area of the squad car.
- 13. Upon arrival the DNR warden inspected the interior of the garage and interviewed Mr. Glass. No charges or citations were ever issued by the DNR.
- 14. The City of Milwaukee Department of Neighborhood Services (DNS) subsequently became aware of the allegations and launched its own investigation.
- On November 14, 2006, Angela Ferrill of the DNS went to Mr. Glass's premises because of the complaint alleging illegal use of the garage. Upon arrival she met Officer Thiele and his partner, Officer Wawrzyniakowski.
- 16. Ms. Ferrill requested permission to enter and inspect the garage in order to address the complaint and Mr. Glass refused. Ms. Ferrill did not gain entry and left within a few minutes of arriving.
- 17. Neither Officer Thiele nor Officer Wawrzyniakowski spoke to Mr. Glass or had any direct interaction with him on November 14, 2006.
- 18. Mr. Glass was subsequently cited by DNS, appealed the alleged code violations, and requested copies of all reports concerning the September 2, 2006 incident from the Police Department.
- 19. The Police Department provided Mr. Glass with copies of all of the photographs taken by the MPD Identification Technician on September 2, 2006, and informed him that there were no additional reports.
- 20. Mr. Glass continued to make requests for additional reports and was repeatedly told there were none.
- 21. In mid-December 2006, after yet another request to the Police Department by Mr. Glass, Officer Thiele informed him that if he continued to demand reports that he had been told did not exist he (Glass) would be cited for disorderly conduct.
- 22. No narrative reports regarding the September 2, 2006 incident were drafted or on file with the Milwaukee Police Department until January 2007
- 23. Neither Officer Thiele nor Officer Wawrzyniakowski issued citations to Mr. Glass, testified at the DNS proceedings or had any formal role in the prosecution of Mr. Glass by DNS for the alleged code violations.

APPLICABLE LEGAL STANDARDS & CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

- 1. In order to prevail, a complainant must show by a preponderance of the evidence that the accused Department member acted inappropriately and in violation of Milwaukee Police Department rules and procedures.
- 2. The Board of Fire and Police Commissioners, in order to sustain a complaint, must find that the member violated Department rules and/or standard operating procedures as alleged in the complaint and that a preponderance of the evidence supports a finding just cause as defined in section 62.50 (17)(b).
- 3. The complaint in this case alleges that Police Officer Jeffrey Thiele failed to utilize appropriate courtesy, civility, patience and discretion in dealing with Mr. Sammie Glass. Such actions, if proven, would constitute one or more violations of MPD Rule 4, Section 2/060.00.
- 4. The record in this case does not contain sufficient evidence to support a finding that Police Officer Jeffrey Thiele failed to utilize appropriate courtesy, civility, patience and discretion in dealing with Mr. Sammie Glass.

RECOMMENDATION OF HEARING EXAMINER

It is obvious from the record in this case that Police Officer Jeffrey Thiele is a hard-working and conscientious officer who takes an active interest in his assigned squad area, and that he was familiar with Mr. Glass prior to September 2, 2006. Under such circumstances the appropriateness of an officer's conduct should not be viewed in a vacuum. The preponderance of credible evidence leads me to believe that Mr. Glass, prior to September 2, 2006, may have been engaged in various activities that were, at the very least, inappropriate in an urban setting and quite possibly illegal. When confronted by Officer Thiele and others regarding the appropriateness of his activities, Mr. Glass denied access to his premises and/or made efforts to avoid detection. Good faith attempts by Officer Thiele to get Mr. Glass to comply with the law failed to resolve the problems, and this led to a degree of understandable frustration on the part of Officer Thiele.

It is this examiner's opinion that the only truly questionable action taken by Officer Thiele was to detain Mr. Glass in the squad car for more than two hours while awaiting the arrival of a DNR warden. In hindsight the same goal could have been accomplished by ordering Mr. Glass to remain in his home and/or away from the garage until after the DNR warden had conducted the necessary investigation, but I do not believe that the action taken by Officer Thiele in having Mr. Glass remain in the squad was malicious or in violation of Milwaukee Police Department rules and procedures.

I would respectfully recommend that the Board of Fire and Police Commissioners determine that just cause does <u>not</u> exist to find a violation of Milwaukee Police Department Rule 4, Section 2/060.00 by Police Officer Jeffrey Thiele in this instance, and that this complaint be dismissed.



Dear Chief Hegerty:

On January 20, 2007, citizen Adam Quinonez (d.o.b. 06-18-1987) was shot and killed by police in the area of 2077 S. 12th St., Milwaukee.

I personally investigated the shooting scene with Milwaukee County investigators, and attended the autopsy and reviewed the autopsy protocol. In addition, I have had the opportunity to speak on several occasions to the decedent's mother and have reviewed the reports related to this investigation.

It is the finding of the medical examiner that Adam Quinonez died from a gunshot wound caused by a shotgun. There was no evidence that Quinonez was struck by .40 caliber rounds or any other caliber of ammunition. It is therefore my conclusion that officers Lopez and Hainzl did not contribute to the death of Adam Quinonez. My review of the facts indicate that Officer Lopez and Officer Hainzl's actions were privileged, and that an appropriate level of force was used given the circumstances they were facing on this occasion.

The investigation also reveals that Officer Francisco Cartegena was armed with his duty shotgun, and that his round or rounds resulted in the death of Mr. Quinonez. I find that Officer Cartegena's actions were privileged and that he used the appropriate force given the circumstances he confronted in the situation.

By this letter, I respectfully request that Officers Francisco Cartegena, Jose Lopez, and Steven Hainzl be allowed to return to full duty.

DECISION OF THE BOARD

FPC Complaint No. 03-43

Board members Earl Buford, Woody Welch and Ernesto Baca met on January 10, 2007 for the purpose of conducting deliberations and reaching a Decision regarding the complaint of Shani Turner against Police Officers Thomas Multhauf, Patrick McDermott and Trent Little. Prior to such meeting each of the Board members had been provided with and reviewed copies of the transcript of proceedings conducted on July 19, 2006 before Hearing Examiner Steven Fronk as well as copies of exhibits received on such date, the Recommendation and Proposed Findings of the Hearing Examiner, and the responses to such Recommendation as filed by the parties:

As to Police Officer Thomas Multhauf, the Board does hereby adopt the Findings of the Hearing Examiner, specifically finding that Complainant Turner has failed to show by a preponderance of the evidence that Officer Multhauf violated MPD Rule 4, Section 2/060.00 in any respect whatsoever. The complaint and any/all charges against Officer Multhauf are hereby dismissed.

As to Police Officer Patrick McDermott, the Board does hereby adopt the Findings of the Hearing Examiner, specifically finding that Complainant Turner has failed to show by a preponderance of the evidence that Officer McDermott violated MPD Rule 4, Section 2/060.00 in any respect whatsoever. The complaint and any/all charges against Officer McDermott are hereby dismissed.

As to Police Officer Trent Little, the Board does hereby adopt the Findings of the Hearing Examiner, <u>specifically excluding the Hearing Examiner's Finding 10</u>.

Following are our Findings of Fact as to Officer Little, as modified, and our Decision:

Findings of Fact of the Board as to Police Officer Trent Little Regarding an Alleged Violation of MPD Rule 4, Section 2/060.00

- 1. Police Officer Trent Little, at all times pertinent hereto, was a member of the Milwaukee Police Department and bound by the rules and regulations thereof.
- 2. On July 7, 2003, Officer Little made a traffic stop of Shani Turner after observing Turner make lane changes without utilizing her vehicle's turn signals.
- 3. Ms. Turner was aware that her turn signals were inoperable and testified that she signaled her intention(s) using her left arm. Officer Little testified that he did not see her arm, quite possibly because of the time of night.
- 4. The greater weight of the evidence in this case would indicate that the traffic stop was legitimately based on a perceived traffic violation. There is insufficient evidence in the record to support Ms. Turner's claim of racial profiling.
- 5. Officer Little detained Ms. Turner and her passenger and called for assistance due to the fact that neither Ms. Turner nor her passenger had proper identification.
- 6. Officer Little determined that the passenger had an outstanding warrant. Little advised Officers McDermott and Multhauf of this fact upon their arrival and Officer Multhauf conducted a search of the auto incident to the arrest.
- 7. There is insufficient evidence in the record to show that Officer Little was aware that Ms. Turner's son was in the car prior to being advised by Officer Multhauf.
- 8. The entire traffic stop, according to computer aided dispatch records, took less than 35 minutes from start to finish. Ms. Turner was released without a citation.
- 9. There is insufficient evidence in this record to support a finding that Police Officer Trent Little was discourteous, uncivil or disrespectful, or that he intentionally subjected Ms. Turner or anyone else at the scene to any greater indignity than was necessary to perform his duties on the day in question.
- 10. Complainant <u>has</u> shown by a preponderance of the evidence that Officer Little failed to be attentive in the discharge of his duties as is required by Milwaukee Police Department Rule 4, Section 2/060.00. We do so find.

Decision

Police Officer Trent Little made a traffic stop and, upon determining that neither of the adult occupants had proper identification, removed those two adults from the vehicle and placed them in his squad. There is nothing in the record that would indicate that these actions were inappropriate or that Officer Little was discourteous or uncivil in violation of Milwaukee Police Department Rule 4, Section 2/060.00. It is clear however, that Officer Little failed in a significant way to be attentive in the discharge of his duties as is also required by Milwaukee Police Department Rule 4, Section 2/060.00. His explanation that he "missed" the child in the backseat of the vehicle is proof of this fact.

Milwaukee Police Department Rule 4, Section 2/060.00 mandates not only that officers be courteous and civil toward the public, but also that they "shall at all times be attentive and zealous in the discharge of their duties." The need for attentiveness serves multiple purposes related to officer safety, citizen safety and basic job performance. As a result of Officer Little's inattentiveness in this instance a small child was left in the backseat of a vehicle in the dark; alone, frightened and unattended. This is unacceptable. Even the most basic visual sweep of the backseat should have revealed the presence of the boy. It is obvious that Officer Little was not adequately attentive in this instance.

We have reviewed the transcript and exhibits in this case as well as Officer Little's record of service with this Department. We would note that Officer Little has repeatedly acknowledged his mistake in this instance and that he was otherwise courteous and professional at the scene, at the district station the following day, and, from what we can gather, throughout these proceedings. He was a relatively new officer in a one person squad and still learning at the time of this incident. We would also note that we are aware of Officer Little's military service in Iraq subsequent to this incident, that he has learned from this incident and his military service, and that he is far more attentive today than he was in July 2003. This is important and it leads us to conclude that, despite our finding that Officer Little violated MPD Rule 4, Section 2/060.00 by failing to be attentive, no discipline or other remedial action is required. We do order, however, that a copy of this Decision be forwarded to the Milwaukee Police Department with a

recommendation that our finding of a failure to be attentive in violation of MPD Rule 4, Section 2/060.00 should be noted in Officer Little's personnel record.

We are also concerned that the record appears to indicate that the Milwaukee Police Department may lack standard operating procedures addressing what an officer is to do with children in a vehicle when the supervising adult is removed from that vehicle. Should children ever be left in a vehicle? What are an officer's options? What factors (weather, location, time of day, traffic volume, etc) should an officer consider when deciding how to handle the situation? If there is no standard operating procedure we would hereby recommend that one be drafted immediately. If this issue is not specifically covered in academy and in-service training we would also hereby recommend that an appropriate training component be inserted in the curriculum as soon as possible.

We intend to inquire of Chief Hegerty as to specific training protocols and standard operating procedures regarding safeguarding children while an investigation is taking place. Given what we believe to be our shared concern for the wellbeing of all persons who come into contact with members of the Police Department, we are confident that the situation will be addressed and, if necessary, rectified in the very near future.

SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS, FINDINGS OF FACT AND DECISION

FPC Complaint No. 03-67

SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS

This complaint proceeded to hearing on December 13, 2006 before

Commissioners Leonard Sobczak, Ernesto Baca and Richard Cox with Steven Fronk acting as Hearing Examiner on behalf of the Board. Complainant Nicole Griffin appeared in person, pro se. Police Officers Richard Schellhammer and Mark Harms appeared in person and by Attorney Laurie Eggert. The complaint (Exhibit 1) alleged that on September 7, 2003, Officer Schellhammer and/or Officer Harms violated Milwaukee Police Department Rule 4, Section 2/060.00 (Exhibit 2) by failing to be courteous and civil and/or failing to exercise appropriate patience and discretion.

Testimony of Nicole Griffin: Shortly after 10:00 p.m. on September 7, 2003, Nicole Griffin was operating a vehicle near the intersection of Capitol Drive and Atkinson Avenue when she was pulled over by a marked squad car. Officer Harms approached Griffin and asked her questions concerning the vehicle and where she was coming from and going to. Griffin answered the questions and Harms asked more questions. At a certain point Griffin felt she was being harassed, pressed the OnStar button in the car, and asked the OnStar operator to call for a police supervisor. Officer Harms had her get out of the car and stand on a nearby corner, effectively denying her the ability to speak further to the OnStar operator. After standing on the corner as directed for several minutes, Ms. Griffin used a cell phone and called 911 to request that a supervisor be sent to the scene. Officer Schellhammer approached her and asked who she had called. When Ms. Griffin said she had called 911, Officer Schellhammer told her to hang up and further advised her that she was being issued a municipal citation for

misuse of the 911 system. Griffin offered to post whatever forfeiture was required in order to be released, but she was placed in the squad and transported to District 7 where she was left in the locked squad for several minutes and then to District 1 where, after a lengthy wait, she was issued a municipal citation for misuse of the emergency phone system. At District 1 Griffin had a verbal disagreement with another woman who was in custody and later had a verbal disagreement with Officer Schellhammer. During this brief exchange Schellhammer made disparaging comments about Griffin's educational achievements. Despite the fact that Griffin had immediately produced valid identification at the scene and more than once offered to pay whatever bond was necessary for her release during the process, she was not released until after 3:00 A.M., five hours after her initial contact with Officers Harms and Schellhammer. The ticket which Griffin received was dismissed by Municipal Court Judge James Gramling several months later.

Testimony of Police Sergeant Craig Henry: Sergeant Henry teaches new recruits at the training academy and had no contact with or involvement in the incident concerning Nicole Griffin. When questioned regarding proper protocol to be utilized when an out-of-state resident is to be issued a citation, Henry said that there was no hard and fast standard operating procedure that he was aware as to where this process was to take place. If a supervisor advises an officer to do it at a district station that is acceptable. If a higher ranking department member thereafter indicates that it should be done downtown at the central Prisoner Processing Section (PPS), then that is where it should be done. Henry also testified that there is no specific policy regarding citizen cell phone use during an investigation. It depends on the circumstances. An officer can prohibit cell phone use by a citizen if it interferes with an investigation.

Testimony of Police Officer Mark Harms: Officer Harms testified that he and Schellhammer stopped the Griffin vehicle because it was similar to a vehicle that a citizen had indicated was "suspicious." Harms approached the driver's side; Schellhammer the passenger side. Nicole Griffin spoke very fast in response to their questions, asking several questions of her own about why she was stopped. Officer Harms then heard another woman's voice and realized that Griffin had somehow initiated a call to someone else. Harms asked her to get out of the car and she complied. Griffin seemed very excited, which from past experience led Harms to question whether or not

something was amiss, or that something was being covered up. While standing outside the car Nicole Griffin made a telephone call to 911 to request a supervisor and was told to put the phone away. Sergeant Corbett called Officer Harms and advised that he was on his way. Schellhammer told Griffin that she would be issued a citation for misuse of the emergency phone system, and Sergeant Corbett advised Harms and Schellhammer to process and release her at the District 7 station. At District 7 Sergeant Corbett apparently spoke to the Lieutenant (and possibly Assistant Chief Whiten) before returning and advising the officers that Griffin had to be taken downtown and processed at PPS. Once downtown Griffin was told to sit on a bench with others who were being booked. Griffin made a negative comment about another female in the booking area and this started an argument with that woman. Harms and another officer separated the women to prevent a possible physical altercation.

Testimony of Police Officer Richard Schellhammer: Officer Schellhammer corroborated much of what Officer Harms had said about the reason for Nicole Griffin being stopped. At the scene, while Griffin was standing on the sidewalk near her car, Schellhammer determined that she was on the phone with the 911 operator and he told her to hang up. Such calls, in the opinion of Officer Schellhammer, were inappropriate because they bogged down the 911 system unnecessarily and sometimes interfered with on-scene investigations. Schellhammer told Griffin that she would be receiving a citation and that she would have to be conveyed to a district station, booked and released because she was an out-of-state resident. At District 7 the officers were advised to take Griffin downtown for processing. While downtown Griffin and Schellhammer got into a brief verbal altercation when Schellhammer denigrated Griffin's educational accomplishments. Griffin was eventually processed and released approximately 5 hours after being stopped.

Testimony of Sergeant John Corbett: Corbett was called to the scene at the request of Ms. Griffin. He tried to speak to Ms. Griffin upon his arrival but Griffin, according to Corbett "didn't want to hear what I had to say." Corbett agreed that the citation was warranted and told her she would be booked and released at District 7. When at District 7 Corbett was advised by the Lieutenant as well as Assistant Chief Whiten that the processing would have to take place downtown at PPS. Corbett advised Griffin of this fact while she sat in the squad at the district, and did not see her thereafter.

Findings of Fact as to Police Officer Mark Harms

- 1. Commissioners Sobczak and Baca believe that Complainant Griffin has failed to introduce sufficient evidence that Police Officer Mark Harms violated Milwaukee Police Department Rule 4, Section 2/060.00 in any respect and therefore have voted <u>not</u> to sustain the charges against Officer Harms.
- 2. Commissioner Cox believes that there is sufficient evidence in this record to show that Police Officer Mark Harms violated MPD Rule 4, Section 2/060.00 and he has, for the reasons specifically outlined in the Decision portion of this document, voted to sustain the charges against Officer Harms.
- 3. By a vote of 2-1, it is the finding of this Board panel that the charges against Officer Mark Harms are not sustained. All charges against Police Officer Mark Harms are accordingly dismissed.

Findings of Fact as to Police Officer Richard Schellhammer

- 1. Police Officer Richard Schellhammer, as a veteran member of the Milwaukee Police Department, could reasonably have been expected to have knowledge of MPD Rule 4, Section 2/060.00, which requires courtesy, civility, patience and discretion of all department members when performing their duties. Officer Schellhammer could reasonably have been expected to know that discourteous or derogatory comments directed at a citizen, or a failure to exercise appropriate patience and discretion, could result in discipline.
- 2. Milwaukee Police Department Rule 4, Section 2/060.00 is reasonable. Law enforcement officers are, first and foremost, peacemakers. They must not participate in unnecessary confrontations, physical or verbal, but must instead seek to be as calm and professional as circumstances permit at all times, and avoid the use of inflammatory language or demeaning comments. They must

exercise an appropriate amount of patience and discretion when the situation allows for it, and must not subject individuals to any greater indignity than circumstances require. These are common sense, minimum standards if law enforcement officers are to maintain the respect of those whom they are sworn to serve and protect.

- 3. The process utilized in investigating and deciding this matter has been reasonable, fair and objective. The record in this case includes testimony from Nicole Griffin, Officer Schellhammer, Officer Harms and Sergeant Corbett. Officer Schellhammer has had access to the complaint and police reports related to the incident, and has been represented by legal counsel and given a full opportunity to present evidence, call and cross examine witnesses, and testify in his own defense at time of hearing. The process has been reasonable, fair and objective.
- Substantial evidence has been discovered to show that Police Officer Richard Schellhammer failed to utilize appropriate courtesy and civility when dealing with Nicole Griffin and that he failed to exercise the utmost patience and discretion as required by MPD Rule 4, Section 2/060.00. There were several points during this matter when patience and discretion could have, and should have, been exercised. Once it became apparent that Griffin was not involved in any discernable illegal activity and was an out-of-state resident, she could have been cautioned and released at the scene with a warning. Subsequently, after the decision had been made and Griffin was in custody, there was absolutely no need to have her held for several hours or for Officer Schellhammer to make negative comments about her education or anything else. Officer Schellhammer exhibited less professionalism, less patience and less discretion than circumstances required.
- 5. This Board panel unanimously finds that the preponderance of the evidence presented in this case supports Complainant Griffin's contention that Officer Richard Schellhammer engaged in an unnecessarily confrontational verbal exchange and failed to exercise an appropriate level of courtesy, patience and discretion in this case, and we therefore him in violation of Milwaukee Police Department Rule 4, section 2/060.00.

DECISION

On September 7, 2003, Nicole Griffin's vehicle was pulled over not because she had committed a traffic violation, but because that vehicle, in some respects, fit the description of a different vehicle that an unnamed individual said was parked in an alley for a period of time. The officers did not articulate what, if any, specific inappropriate activity that other vehicle may have engaged in, and in fact there may not be an answer to this question. There was then (and is now) no indication that Nicole Griffin had violated any law or ordinance or that she was engaged in any illegal activity whatsoever. She immediately supplied proper identification and vehicle registration upon request, and answered questions well beyond the scope of what was legally required of her. When she began to feel that she was being harassed she used the OnStar feature in her vehicle in an attempt to have a police supervisor called to the scene. She was ordered out of her vehicle and told to stand on the curb, which she did. After standing there for several more minutes, Griffin again tried to call for a supervisor by using her cell phone to call 911. This may not have been the most appropriate thing to do, but it was certainly not the type of action that required taking her into custody for the next several hours.

Milwaukee Police Department Rule 4, Section 2/060.00 requires that officers exercise the utmost patience and discretion. We see very little evidence of patience, and no exercise of discretion. Given the fact that there was no evidence of wrongdoing on her part other than the call to 911, Ms. Griffin could have been cautioned and released at the scene with a warning. Instead we had two police officers and a citizen tied up for several hours regarding a very minor offense committed by an otherwise cooperative and law abiding citizen. This was neither an efficient use of time and resources nor an appropriate exercise of patience and discretion.

As to Officer Harms, Commissioners Sobczak and Baca have voted not to sustain the charges. Majority rules, and by a 2-1 margin all charges against Officer Harms are hereby dismissed. It should be noted, however, that it is the opinion of Commissioner Cox that there is sufficient evidence in this record to show that Police Officer Mark Harms violated MPD Rule 4, Section 2/060.00 by failing to exercise "the utmost patience and discretion" as required by the rule and that Officer Harms was as much a part of the

"prisoner shuffling" as was Officer Schellhammer. This process resulted in Ms. Griffin being held for several hours and processed through the jail for a municipal citation, and this subjected her to "greater indignity than necessary" which is prohibited by the rule. Commissioner Cox would like it understood that he is of the opinion that an officer cannot sit idly by while another officer takes inappropriate action which will, in all likelihood, lead to an individual being unnecessarily inconvenienced, embarrassed or humiliated, and that any officer who knowingly fails to intercede at this point is guilty of violating the rule by failing to prevent the violation and should be held accountable.

As to Officer Schellhammer, we are unanimous in finding a rule violation. We have reviewed his record of service with the Department, and with 22 years of experience on the force he can and should make better decisions and act more professionally.

We do hereby find that Police Officer Richard Schellhammer was unnecessarily discourteous and uncivil, that he failed to exercise appropriate patience and discretion, and that his actions subjected Nicole Griffin to greater indignity than was necessary. This is in violation of MPD Rule 4, Section 2/060.00. After reviewing Officer Schellhammer's record with the Department we believe that what is most appropriate in this case is a disposition which will specifically address what we see as a failure on the part of Officer Schellhammer to exercise patience and discretion and to maintain a professional attitude at all times. We do not believe that it would be effective to suspend him from the force, but we do believe that it is appropriate that Officer Schellhammer be required to examine the need for improving his interpersonal skills when dealing with citizens who pose no threat and are, for the most part, cooperative. To this end we do hereby Order that this matter be remanded to Chief Hegerty and that Police Officer Richard Schellhammer be required to participate in re-training regarding Professional Communications and Conflict Resolution to be conducted by the Professional Performance Division within 30 days of the date of this Decision. Upon completion of the re-training of Officer Schellhammer, the Professional Performance Division shall submit a letter to the Board of Fire and Police Commissioners indicating that such retraining has been completed.

A copy of the aforementioned letter and this Decision shall also be made a part of Officer Richard Schellhammer's permanent personnel file.

We return the enclosed document which has been filed with the City Clerk and ask that it be introduced and referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Legislation with the following recommendation.

Claimant, Ronald Sherrill, 6446 West Fond Du Lac Avenue, Milwaukee, WI 53218 alleges that on February 3, 2009 he sustained damages when a City water main broke and the water, debris and mud damaged his parking lot. He claims damages in the amount of \$6,300.00.

Our investigation reveals that the Milwaukee Water Works records indicate that on February 3, 2009 at 4:02 a.m. they received a report of a leak in the street at 6430 West Fond Du Lac Avenue. A field investigator dispatched to the location confirmed a break in an 8 inch water main and immediately shut off the water. The Water Works notified the Department of Public Works-Sewers to open the catch basins, contacted digger's hotline to mark the underground facilities and requested a salt truck to decrease the accumulation of snow and ice in the area. A Water Works crew also responded and made the necessary repairs. The main was placed back in service. The crew back-filled and

Damages to Property Parking Lot - Tuesday, February 3, 2009 from Re:

Water Main Break(s), February 3, 2009 and March 12, 2009

This letter is written for the sole intent of filing a Claim with the City of Milwaukee for monetary relief to make repairs to my property parking lot, damaged on Tuesday, February 3, 2009 from a City of Milwaukee water main break. The damages were caused by one of two underground water main breaks that occurred at 6430 W. Fond du lac Ave. in Milwaukee on 2/3/09 and 6414 W. Fond du lac Ave. in Milwaukee on 3/12/09. My property is located at 6446 W. Fond du lac Ave.

On the morning of Tuesday, February 3, 2009, I received a phone call from my son, Ronal Sherrill. Jr. at approximately 5:00 a.m. He informed me that a water main broke at 6430 W. Fond du lac Ave. hours before daylight. He stated that Officers from District 7 -Milwaukee Police Department had responded. (Please see Police write-up attached.)

I arrived at approximately 5:40 a.m. to observe a blast of water shooting up from beneath the ground in front of 6430 W. Fond du lac Ave. I also observed that the flooding was so extensive. it covered my parking lot located at 6446 W. Fond du lac Ave., (one door north of where the main brake occurred) the sidewalk adjoining the lots and Fond du lac Ave. All were immersed and flooded with water. I telephoned District 7 - Milwaukee Police Department again. to ascertain whether the owner of the property had been notified. A worker from DPW arrived at approximately 5:50 a.m. and "marked" the area. A crew from the City of Milwaukee arrived at approximately 8:00 a.m. I observed the crew digging up the concrete in front of 6430 W. Fond du lac Ave. Much of the excess water, mud and debris that was pumped from beneath the ground level filled my parking structure and flowed east down into the alley way, and eventually into the streets onto Fond du lac Ave. (traveling north). See photos.

A DPW worker referred me to Bernice Flemming, a Water Claims Specialist for the City of Milwaukee Waterworks. After listening to my report of the incident, she offered to mail me "Instructions for Filing A Claim." Ms. Fleming advised me to contact my local Alderman to request assistance with clean-up of my lot. From February 3, 2009 through February 6. 2009, I observed freezing water settling on my parking lot, in front of my business, and behind my

property where the lot adjoins to the alley. Sub-zero temperatures and the time that lapsed before crews arrived created more critical problems. Tightening of the ground (due to cold weather and water pressure) caused a noticeable shift of the pavement. The water main erupted hours before DPW crews arrived, and water flowed through cracks in the street causing icy, hazardous road conditions and bubbling and buckling of the surface of my parking lot area.

On February 6, 2009, I spoke to Sherman Morton. Assistant to Alderman Joe Davis, Sr. I explained the reason for my call. The next week. I hand delivered photos of the damages and debris to Alderman Davis' office. Mr. Morton received the photos, and assured me that he would arrange to have the mud, debris and water (now mounds of ice and extremely dangerous) removed. To date, no one has reported to my business for the purpose of cleaning up the ice and debris, nor have I received a follow-up phone call about the matter from the City of Milwaukee or Mr. Morton. See photos attached.

Per "Instructions for Filing A Claim" received from Bernice Flemming, Water Claims Specialist, I have indicated two Proposals, i.e., estimates for repairs necessary to correct the damages to my property. Written Proposals are also enclosed with this document.

We return the enclosed document which has been filed with the City Clerk and ask that it be introduced and referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Legislation with the following recommendation.

Claimant, Silvestre Villarreal, 1510 South 37th Street, Milwaukee, WI 53215 alleges that on May 16, 2009 he sustained damages when a City tree branch broke off and landed on his vehicle which was parked at 2562 South 9th Place. He claims damages in the amount of \$11,816.52.

Our investigation reveals that the Forestry Division reviewed their records from the previous four years and found no notice of potential hazardous conditions or service requests for this location. They also note that, in keeping with the programmed pruning schedule, the tree was last pruned in March 2005 and it appeared sound and healthy. The tree was inspected the time of the loss and the branch removed. The division also began procedures which eventually lead to the removal of the tree. The inspection also found that no outward signs of decay were evident. Prior to this incident, the tree was alive. Finally, at the time of the loss the City was experiencing conditions which caused high

Ott, Jorgensen, Spanbauer, Steinbrink, Dexter, Kaufert, Murtha, Ripp and Bies, cosponsored by Senators Lehman, Olsen, Harsdorf, Leibham, Schultz, Darling and A. Lasee. Referred to Committee on Transportation.

AN ACT *to amend* 343.237 (2); *to repeal and recreate* 343.237 (2); and *to create*165.8287 of the statutes; **relating to:** electronic access by law enforcement
agencies to photographs on motor vehicle operators licenses and identification

Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau

With limited exceptions, current law requires the Department of Transportation (DOT) to take a photograph of all applicants for an operator's license or identification card. DOT may keep copies of the photographs for its own use but generally must keep the photographs confidential. However, DOT may release a photograph to the individual whose photograph was taken. In addition, DOT may release a copy of a photograph taken on or after September 1, 1997, to a Wisconsin law enforcement agency, a federal law enforcement agency, or a law enforcement agency of another state upon written request of the agency if certain conditions are satisfied. These conditions generally require that the photograph be requested for specified law enforcement purposes and that certain measures be taken to guard against further disclosure of the photograph.

Also under current law, the Department of Justice (DOJ) administers a transaction information for the management of enforcement (TIME) system that provides law enforcement agencies with access to certain information.

This bill requires DOT to make available to DOJ, in a digital format, any photograph taken of an operator's license or identification card applicant that is maintained by DOT. The bill requires DOJ to provide for electronic access by

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Wisconsin law enforcement agencies, federal law enforcement agencies, and law enforcement agencies of other states operator's license and identification card photographs for the administration of criminal justice and for traffic enforcement. Access to these photographs must be available electronically through the TIME system if the law enforcement agency submits an electronic request satisfying certain conditions. Provisions of current law establishing measures that must be taken to guard against further disclosure of photographs provided to law enforcement agencies also apply to photographs obtained electronically through the TIME system. DOJ and DOT must ensure that, upon submission by law enforcement agencies of electronic requests meeting the requirements under the bill, electronic access to photographs is promptly available to these requesting agencies.

For further information see the *state and local* fiscal estimate, which will be printed as an appendix to this bill.

(2) Upon electronic request, the department of transportation shall make

available to the department of justice, in a digital format, any photograph taken of

an applicant under s. 343.14 (3) or 343.50 (4) that is maintained by the department

of transportation. Updated photographs shall be available to the department of justice within 30 days of photograph capture.

- (3) (a) The department of justice shall, through the transaction information for the management of enforcement system or another similar system operated by the department of justice, provide Wisconsin law enforcement agencies, federal law enforcement agencies, and law enforcement agencies of other states with electronic access to any photograph specified in sub. (2) for the administration of criminal justice and for traffic enforcement. Access to these photographs shall be available electronically if the law enforcement agency submits an electronic request bearing an electronic certification or other indicator of authenticity. For an electronic request made by a law enforcement agency of another state, the electronic certification or other indicator of authenticity shall include an electronic signature or verification of the agency making the request and a certification that the request is made for the purpose of administration of criminal justice or traffic enforcement.
- (b) Any photograph electronically available under this subsection shall contain the notation: "This photograph is subject to the requirements and restrictions of section 165.8287 of the Wisconsin Statutes. The photograph shall not be used for any purpose other than the administration of criminal justice or traffic enforcement. Secondary dissemination is prohibited and the photograph shall be destroyed when no longer necessary for the purpose requested. The photograph shall not be used as part of a photo lineup or photo array."
- (c) The provisions of s. 343.237 (5), (8), (9), and (10) shall apply to any photograph obtained electronically by a law enforcement agency under this subsection. Any photograph obtained electronically by a law enforcement agency under this subsection may not be used for a photo linear or photo array. For purposes

- of this paragraph, any photograph obtained electronically by a law enforcement agency under this subsection shall be considered a copy of a photograph obtained under s. 343.237 (3) or (4) with respect to s. 343.237 (5), (8), (9), and (10).
- (d) The department of justice shall maintain a record, which may be electronic, of each request by a law enforcement agency for a photograph under this subsection and of the response to the request. Except as provided in s. 343.237 (9), the department of justice may not disclose any record or other information concerning or relating to the request to any person other than a court, district attorney, county corporation counsel, city, village, or town attorney, law enforcement agency, the applicant under s. 343.14 (3) or 343.50 (4), or, if the applicant is under 18 years of age, his or her parent or guardian. Records maintained under this paragraph shall be maintained for at least 12 months.
- (e) The department of justice and the department of transportation shall ensure that, upon submission by law enforcement agencies of electronic requests meeting the requirements under this subsection, access to photographs under this subsection is promptly available to these requesting agencies.
 - **Section 2.** 343.237 (2) of the statutes is amended to read:
- 343.237 **(2)** Any photograph taken of an applicant under s. 343.14 (3) or 343.50 (4), and any fingerprint taken of an applicant under s. 343.12 (6) (b), may be maintained by the department and, except as provided in this section <u>and s. 165.8287</u>, shall be kept confidential. Except as provided in this section <u>and s. 165.8287</u>, the department may release a photograph or fingerprint only to the person whose photograph or fingerprint was taken.
- **SECTION 3.** 343.237 (2) of the statutes, as affected by 2007 Wisconsin Act 20 and 2009 Wisconsin Act (this act), is repealed and recreated to read:

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343.237 (2) Any photograph taken of an applicant under s. 343.14 (3) or 343.50

AN ACT *to renumber and amend* 343.52 (1m); *to amend* 343.52 (1) (a) and (b); and *to create* 343.52 (1m) (a), (b) and (c) of the statutes; **relating to:** special identification cards issued by the Department of Transportation providing parking privileges for persons with physical disabilities and providing a penalty.

Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau

Under current law, a person with a disability that limits or impairs the ability to walk may apply for and obtain from the Department of Transportation (DOT) a special identification card (disabled parking card). With limited exceptions, a disabled parking card entitles any motor vehicle parked by or under the direction of the card holder, or any motor vehicle operated by or on behalf of an organization and used to transport a person eligible for a card, to parking privileges. A person or organization may be required to forfeit not less than \$50 nor more than \$300 if the person or organization sells or lends a disabled parking card knowing that the person purchasing or borrowing the card is not authorized by law to use it or displays a disabled parking card on a vehicle knowing that the vehicle is not authorized to have the card displayed on it. In addition, any person or organization that fraudulently procures, makes, alters, reproduces, or duplicates a disabled parking card must forfeit not less than \$200 nor more than \$500.

This bill increases the penalty for selling a disabled parking card to an unauthorized user from a potential forfeiture of not less than \$50 nor more than \$300

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to a mandatory forfeiture of not less than \$200 nor more than \$500. The bill also prohibits fraudulent use of a disabled parking card, which is subject to a potential forfeiture of not less than \$50 nor more than \$300 if the violator was issued the disabled parking card by DOT and a mandatory forfeiture of not less than \$200 nor more than \$500 if the violator was not issued the disabled parking card by DOT. The bill also eliminates the requirement that, to constitute a violation for displaying a disabled parking card on a vehicle not authorized to have the card displayed on it, the violator must know that the vehicle is not authorized to have the card displayed on it.

SECTION 1. 343.52 (1) (a) and (b) of the statutes are amended to read:

343.52 **(1)** (a) Sells or lends Lends to another a special identification card issued under s. 343.51, knowing that the person purchasing or borrowing the card is not authorized by law to use it.

- (b) Displays a special identification card issued under s. 343.51 upon a vehicle knowing that the vehicle is not authorized by law to have the card displayed thereon or otherwise fraudulently uses a special identification card issued under s. 343.51 to the person or organization.

- 343.52 **(1m)** (intro.) Any person or organization that fraudulently procures, makes, alters, reproduces, or duplicates a special identification card issued under s. 343.51, except as authorized by the department, does any of the following shall forfeit not less than \$200 nor more than \$500.:

343.52 (1m) (a) Fraudulently procures, makes, alters, reproduces, or
duplicates a special identification card issued under s. 343.51, except as authorized
by the department.
(b) Fraudulently uses a special identification card issued under s. 343.51 that
was not issued to the person or organization by the department.
(c) Sells to another a special identification card issued under s. 343.51, knowing
that the person purchasing the card is not authorized by law to use it.

SE RTA Timeline

Governor's Budget Proposal – SE RTA would be created if the governing body of Milwaukee County, or Kenosha County, or any municipality located within Racine County East of I-94 adopt a resolution authorizing the county or municipality to become a member. If Milwaukee or Kenosha County joined, then all municipalities would be part of the SE RTA. Racine County could join after the creation of the SE RTA. Allowed Waukesha, Washington and Ozaukee Counties to join upon approval of the SE RTA board of directors. Lastly, allowed the SE RTA to levy up to a 0.5 sales tax for transit.

<u>Joint Committee on Finance</u> – Deletes the Governor's provision, and replaced it with the following:

Milwaukee County Transit Authority

- The RTA board would be made up of the following members: 2 members appointed by the Milwaukee County Board Chair, 2 members appointed by the Mayor of Milwaukee, and 1 appointed by the Governor.
- RTA would have the same powers and authorities that would be provided under the Governor's recommendation for the SE RTA.
- Authority to impose up to 1.0% sales and use tax
- Revenues could be used to fund transit, parks, cultural and emergency services throughout Milwaukee County.
- 0.15% of revenues would be paid to the City of Milwaukee for public safety.
- Milwaukee County would be the fiscal agent for the RTA.
- The Milwaukee Downtown Connector study was enumerated as a major transit capital project.

KRM Authority

- Powers of the authority would be limited to the creation, construction and management of the KRM commuter rail line.
- KRM Board Membership
 - o 2 members from Milwaukee County appointed by the Milwaukee County Board Chair
 - 2 members from the City of Milwaukee appointed by the Mayor of Milwaukee
 - o 1 member from the City of Racine appointed by the Mayor of Racine
 - 1 member from Racine County appointed by the Racine County Board Chair
 - o 1 member from the City of Kenosha appointed by the Mayor of Kenosha
 - o 1 member from Kenosha County appointed by the Kenosha County Executive.
 - o 1 member, who resides within the geographic area of the Authority, appointed by the Governor.
- Specify that the KRM would have to include a stop where the line intersects W. National Avenue in the City of Milwaukee.
- Provide that the KRM board impose up to a \$16/transaction vehicle rental fee within the jurisdictional area of the Authority, and be indexed annually to the CPI.

<u>Assembly</u> – Modified Joint Committee on Finance actions with the following: *Milwaukee Transit Authority*

- Delete the proposed Milwaukee County Regional Transit Authority, and instead create a Milwaukee Transit Authority, with the same governing body specified under the JCF version.
- Milwaukee County Board would have the authority to adopt a resolution imposing a 0.5% sales and use tax for transit services.
- Provide the Milwaukee County Board with the authority to levy a 0.15% sales and use tax to the underlying municipalities, using the proportion of police and fire employees within each municipality.
- The board could take action upon a majority vote of the members present, unless bylaws require a larger number.

Southeastern Regional Transit Authority

- Rename the KRM Authority, in the JCF substitute amendment, the Southeastern Regional Transit Authority (SERTA).
- Increase the vehicle rental fee from \$16 to \$18 per rental transaction, continued to be indexed annually.
- \$1 derived from the rental fee would be provided both to the City of Kenosha and the City of Racine for their respective transit systems if they provide matching funds.
- SERTA board of directors would remain the same as proposed by JCF, except that the Kenosha County member would be appointed by the Kenosha County Board Chair.
- Require the KRM have a stop in the City of Milwaukee at the intersection of Lincoln Avenue and Bay Street.

<u>Senate</u> – Modified Joint Committee on Finance actions with the following: *Milwaukee County Sales Tax*

- Delete the Milwaukee County Regional Transit Authority proposed by JCF.
- Provide Milwaukee County the authority to impose sales and use taxes at a rate of 1.0%, in addition to its current authority to impose such taxes at a rate of 0.5%.
- Require the county to use 85% of the revenues it receives from the new taxes for transit, parks, culture and emergency medical services, and that county cannot raise property taxes for such purposes.
- Require Milwaukee County to distribute the other 15% of the sales and use taxes to municipalities for police and fire on a per capita basis.

Southeastern Regional Transit Authority

- Rename the KRM Authority the Southeastern Regional Transit Authority.
- Modify the Kenosha County appointment to be made by the County Board chair.
- Require the KRM have a stop in the City of Milwaukee at the intersection of Lincoln Avenue and Bay Street.

Conference Committee

<u>Milwaukee Transit Authority</u> – Adopt the Assembly version, with some modifications:

- If the 0.5% sales and use taxes are imposed, require Milwaukee County to indicate on each taxpayer's property tax bill the amount of the reduction in property taxes associated with the requirement to remove transit expenditures from the property tax levy.
- 0.15% sales and use taxes for municipal public safety can be imposed only if the 0.5% sales tax is imposed. Distribution for the 0.15% would be based on the number of sworn police and fire officers in each municipality.
- Governance: 3 members appointed by the Milwaukee County Board Chair, 2 members appointed by the Mayor of Milwaukee, 2 members appointed by the Governor. Appointees of the County Board Chair and the Mayor have to be elected officials representing the County and City respectively.

<u>Southeastern Regional Transit Authority</u> – Adopt the Assembly version, with modifications:

- Specify that SERTA is the only entity that can apply to the FTA for federal new starts funding for the KRM rail project.
- Powers of the SERTA would be vested in its board of directors
 - o A majority of the board constitutes a quorum.
 - Any action can be taken with a simple majority, unless the bylaws of SERTA require a larger number.

Governor's Vetoes

Milwaukee Transit Authority

- Vetoed the entire provision from the Conference Committee. Asked the legislature to start over.
- Milwaukee County would be unable to levy an additional sales tax.

Southeastern Regional Transit Authority

- Partial veto removing the transfer of \$1 from the \$18 car rental tax to the City of Racine and City of Kenosha for funding local transit (using City matching funds).
- Partial veto of the requirements of certain stops along the KRM line, because it jeopardizes the application to the FTA's New Starts grant program this would violate FTA regulations.
- Although opposed to the use of the car rental tax, the Governor will not veto it because the SERTA needs to have a local funding source to move forward on the federal application process.
- Recommendation to the board of SERTA not to impose the full \$18/transaction tax until New Starts plans are approved by the FTA.
