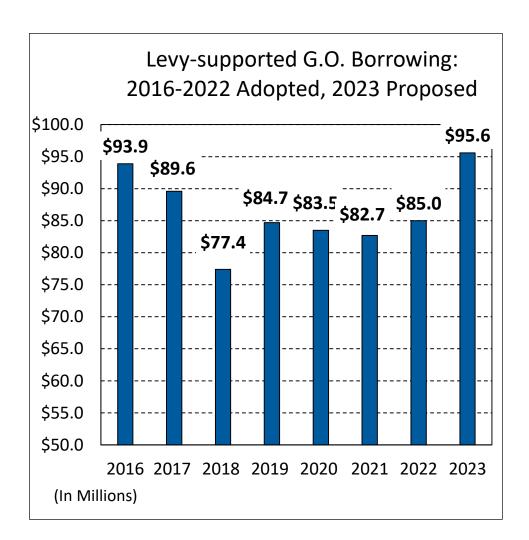

2023 Proposed Capital Budget Overview: Levy-supported Capital

- 2022 proposed levy-supported borrowing: \$95.6 million
- Increase of \$1.7 million from 2016
- Non-discretionary projects, deferred capital maintenance, and opportunities to leverage outside funding make increasing levy-supported borrowing necessary in 2023

Highlights of General City 2023 Proposed Capital Budget

Infrastructure Projects

- Major Streets Program- \$57.5m
 - \$20.3m of City Funding (+\$8.5m or +72%)
 - Includes design or construction funding for:
 - 15 paving projects
 - 5 bridge projects (paving-related portion)
 - □ 11 intersection improvement projects
 - 3 bicycle and pedestrian improvement projects
 - Includes projects funded from Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (federal funds and city match)

Infrastructure Projects

- Street Lighting Program (\$11.6m)
 - \$11.1m of City borrowing, \$500k of cash revenue from Street Lighting Charge
 - □ Increase of \$700k from 2022
 - \$3.8m for paving-related improvements
 - \$2.3m for Series Circuit Conversion
 - \$2m for LED Lamp Conversion
- Increases in city funding for Alleys (+\$250k) and Sidewalks (+\$500k)
- Port Milwaukee: \$2m for Cruise Ship Terminal

Facility Projects

- Includes remaining \$1.6m for fire suppression system at Central Library
- \$1.5m for structural improvements to Municipal Services Building (Electrical Services shop)
- Increased funding for Facilities Systems/Exterior Programs (+\$500k combined)

Equipment

- \$7.8m for DPW Fleet Equipment (+\$1.1m)
- \$100k for Brine Equipment
- \$2.5m for Fire Capital Equipment (+\$1.1m)
- \$4m for Police Vehicles (+\$380k)

Other Capital Budget Highlights

- \$1.25m for first year of Enterprise Resource Program (ERP) System replacement
- \$11.5m for year 1 of Public Safety Radio Upgrade
 - \$5.5m city funding, \$6m federal grant
- \$500k for Strategic Facilities Plan
- Use previously authorized funding for Lead Service Line Property Owner subsidy- no new capital funding

2023 Proposed Capital Budget Overview: Enterprise Funds

- Transportation Fund (\$2.4m)
 - \$1.1m for structure repairs; \$700k for Green Lots
- Sewer Maintenance Fund (\$28.4m)
 - \$20m for Sewer Relay & Relining; \$1m for Flood Mitigation
- Water Works (\$43.1m)
 - \$32.6m for Main Replacement; \$12m for Treatment Plant Improvements

Outlook for 2023-2028 Capital Improvements Plan

- Limit levy-supported borrowing to limit growth in future debt service without forgoing critical/non-discretionary projects
- Continue to invest in underfunded city assets
 - Major Capital Equipment (MFD, DPW, MPD)
 - Facilities
 - □ Remodeling & upgrading existing facilities
 - Future facility needs and opportunities
- Identify opportunities to reduce the city's facilities footprint
