SUBJECT: Update on Lead Service Line Replacements conducted per Milwaukee Code of Ordinances sec. 225-22.5

To the Honorable Members of the Common Council:

Milwaukee Code of Ordinances (MCO) sec. 225-22.5, Lead Line Service Replacement, effective January 1, 2017, mandates the replacement of certain lead water service lines on private property, and established a special assessment for replacement of lead water service lines on private property.

Pursuant to MCO sec. 225-22.5-11, semi-annual reporting is required on the financial impacts of this ordinance on property owners who have had their service lines replaced. As of December 31, 2022, the Milwaukee Water Works had performed a total of 5,420 lead service line replacements on projects with confirmed leaks, due to a planned infrastructure project, at child care facilities and schools, or as an owner-initiated project, since January 1, 2017.

Of these 5,420 projects:

- 3,349 were a result of a leak or failure on the service line
- 663 were replacements at child care facilities
- 1,242 were a result of a planned infrastructure project
- 154 were a result of an owner initiating the project
- 12 were replacements at schools

Additional information related to these projects:

- 4,339 of the leaks and planned infrastructure replacements occurred on service lines to residential buildings with one to four units. The property cost share was limited to \$1,600 for properties identified between January 1, 2017 and February 29, 2020, was adjusted to \$1,754 on March 1, 2020, was adjusted to \$1,843 on March 1, 2021, and was adjusted again on March 1, 2022 to \$1,723.
- As of December 31, 2022, the average cost of replacing a public-side lead service line was \$4,827, and the
 average cost of replacing the private-side lead service line was \$4,776. The public-side costs include
 pavement restoration.
- 235 of the leaks and planned infrastructure replacements occurred on service lines to commercial properties
 or residential properties with more than four units, and therefore, did not qualify for a portion of the cost of
 the private-side replacement to be covered by the city. Property owners who are having a city contractor
 perform the work are eligible for the full cost of the replacement to be paid through the special assessment
 process.



• In addition to the 5,420 completed lead service line replacements, 606 services were either in investigation or had been scheduled for replacement, as of December 31, 2022.

The process wherein any replacement cost falls to the property owner on their tax bill is as follows:

- 1. The Milwaukee Water Works will collect, verify, and recommend payment of the contractor's invoice for private-side and public-side costs. For one to four family units mandated to replace the lead service line who elect to use the city's contractor, the cost share will be adjusted on March 1, 2023 to \$1,592, which is one-third of the private-side costs.
- 2. The Milwaukee Water Works will submit this information to the Department of Public Works Special Assessment Section. The Special Assessment Section will keep track of the invoice and averages throughout the year and will verify their lists to be sure they have accounted for each payment.
- 3. All invoices received by August 15th/September 1st of any given year will be included in the Special Assessment Section's October billing to the affected property owners. Property owners have 45 days to pay in full (for example November 15th), or the amount will be equally distributed over the next 10 tax bills. Per MCO, interest will be charged on the balance of the Prime Rate + 1% at the end of June of the previous calendar year. For 2022 and 2023 interest rates were 4.25%, and 5.75% respectively. The City of Milwaukee Treasure's Office is responsible for adding the lead service line assessments to the property tax bill. Invoices for 224 lead service line projects were received in time for the October 2017 billing, 448 were received for the October 2018 billing, 726 were received for the October 2019 billing, 481 were received for October 2020, 853 were received for the October 2021, and 825 were received for the 2022 billing.
