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2	PROCEEDINGS
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4	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Our last licensing
5	matter for this morning is for Habib Manjee,
6	agent for Ladybug Club, LLC, Class B Tavern,
7	Tavern Amusement, Cabaret-Nightclub renewal
8	application, as agent for Ladybug Club, 618 Live
9	On Water at 622 North Water Street.
10	MR. MANJEE: Good morning.
11	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Good morning. Mr.
12	Manjee, do you have legal representation here?
13	MR. MANJEE: Yes.
14	MR. MAISTELMAN: I'll stay up here
15	until Mr. Halbrooks shows up. I'll be like a
16	place holder.
17	CHAIRMAN BOHL: We'll swear you in at
18	this time here.
19	MR. MAISTELMAN: Don't answer any
20	questions until your lawyer gets here.
21	He's not answering any questions until
22	Mr. Halbrooks gets here.
23	UNIDENTIFIED: I'll go get him.
24	CHAIRMAN BOHL: We're going to swear
25	you in.

1 THE CLERK: Do you solemnly affirm 2 under the pains and penalty of perjury in the 3 State of Wisconsin that the testimony you are about to give is the truth, the whole truth and 4 5 nothing but the truth? MR. MANJEE: Yes. I do. 6 7 HABIB MANJEE, having first affirmed to 8 testify the truth, the whole truth and nothing 9 but the truth, testified as follows: 10 11 EXAMINATION 12 BY CHAIRMAN BOHL: I'll need your name 13 and a mailing address  $\mathbf{K}$ or the record, please. My name is Habib Manjee. 14 MR. MANNEE 15 My address is North Water Street, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, 53202. 16 17 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you. Mr. Manjee, do you acknowledge receiving notice of today's 18 meeting with the possibility that your 19 20 application could be denied? An attached police 21 report should have been part of the notice as 22 well as written correspondence received from the 23 licensing division regarding the application as 24 well as an outline of possible neighborhood 25 objections which could serve as a means for

1	denial?
2	MR. MANJEE: Yes, I do.
3	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you. These are
4	all existing applications so we should have no
5	holds, correct?
6	MS. GRILL: That's correct.
7	CHAIRMAN BOHL: We have no sergeant for
8	the police report here. So and Mr. Manjee has
9	no attorney. Maybe they're having a smoke here
10	out in the hallway. So we're going to be in
11	recess here for just a moment.
12	(There was a brief recess.)
13	CHAIRMAN BONK: This is resumption of
14	Common Council Dicenses Committee.
15	Mr. Mallrooks, do you want to just
16	state your appearance here for the record?
17	MR. HALBROOKS: I am Attorney David
18	Halbrooks here on behalf of Mr. Manjee and
19	Club 618 Live, known as the Ladybug Club. You
20	already asked him if he had notice and
21	everything?
22	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Correct. Just for the
23	record, because I know there have been times
24	where you've stated some objections, do you wish
25	to do so, in terms of the notice?

MR. HALBROOKS: If I may, this would be 1 2 This would be a great time to do it. great. 3 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Halbrooks, did you want to allow the police report or do you wish to 4 5 include that as part of the objection? MR. HALBROOKS: I do have a couple of 6 7 things that are kind of new-fangled in terms of 8 the police report. 9 CHAIRMAN BOHL: What I wanted to state and make certain that you are aware of here: 10 11 am calling this a contest of hearing; and, in doing so here, we will 30 minutes for each 12 13 side. That particular portion here will include 14 opening -- up to and Include your raising Just want to make it known for objection. 15 Sò the record here, I will allow you to do that and 16 allow you the liberty of choosing to balance your 17 own time allotment here; but, in this being a 18 19 contested hearing, I want you to be aware. 20 MR. HALBROOKS: I appreciate that and I 21 remember that from the last time. If I just may, 22 though, one of the things that's difficult for me 23 in that posture is I can regulate my time and the 24 time from the club, but the citizens I don't. 25 For instance, the last time one person talked for

1	six minutes and very little of it was about the
2	issue.
3	So, if the Chair could help with that
4	or please just acknowledge that the citizens
5	aren't necessarily as cognizant.
6	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Sure.
7	MR. HALBROOKS: I will try to go with
8	all due speed so maybe it will give them some
9	discretion.
10	I'll go as quick as I can. I saw the
11	line on the police report (starting at 41. What I
12	would like to add is that item 41 was discussed
13	somewhat extensively last year. It wasn't on the
14	PA-33; but both Alderman Bauman and
15	representatives here, the aldermen asked
16	questions. I brought the transcript. I'm hoping
17	we can put that particular issue to rest based on
18	the fact that it not only was argued here,
19	Alderman Bauman specifically mentioned it went
20	from 18 to 19 violations and talked about it on
21	the floor of the Council so I would ask you for a
22	ruling to leave that one out this year.
23	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Mr. Chair, I don't
24	recall that being the case.
25	MR. HALBROOKS: That's why I brought

1	the transcript.
2	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Adjourn the hearing
3	and read the transcript.
4	MR. HALBROOKS: I have the transcript
5	where the security guards talked about the shots
6	going off, questions from Mr. Schrimpf,
7	questions from Alderman Kovac, Alderman Bauman
8	talked about it, the incidents, so I have I
9	can pass you up the transcript if you wanted to
10	take a quick look at it, but
11	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Neah, why don't you do
12	that?
13	The question's going to be, though,
14	Mr. Halbrooks whether or not whether or
15	not it was utilized by the Committee in its
16	finding.
17	MR. HALBROOKS: It was it was
18	definitely discussed. It was discussed by
19	Alderman Bauman. It was asked questions were
20	asked about shots fired from Alderman Kovac and,
21	again, it was used on the Council floor. So I
22	don't have that transcript, but it was brought
23	up; the security guards talked about it, and then
24	Alderman Bauman pounced on it.
25	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: It's not part of the
	1

1	findings that I'm aware of.
2	CHAIRMAN BOHL: That's not at issue,
3	whether or not it's part of the findings.
4	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Mr. Unora, City
5	Attorney, has something to add.
6	Mr. Unora: Jay Unora, Assistant City
7	Attorney.
8	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Unora, you're going
9	to have to hold on here.
10	MR. UNORA: Okay.
11	MR. HALBROOKS: (Plus, I believe,
12	Mr. Arenson talked about hearing shots fired on
13	Halloween.
14	MR. MELLER! I don't think we should
15	focus too much on the hearing testimony from the
16	transcript. I don't have a copy of the findings
17	of the fact finding of fact; but, if it wasn't
18	in the MPD synopsis, which would have been what
19	the Committee adopted, I don't think the hearing
20	testimony is, you know, determinative.
21	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Miller, the key
22	would be more whether or not it was part of the
23	findings
24	MR. MILLER: Right.
25	CHAIRMAN BOHL: whether or not it

1	was included in terms of their overall decision.
2	MR. MILLER: And I don't have that.
3	CHAIRMAN BOHL: And I don't either.
4	But what I will do at this point Is this an
5	additional copy?
6	MR. HALBROOKS: Yes.
7	CHAIRMAN BOHL: I will have Alderman
8	Kovac move to make the portions of the transcript
9	provided by Mr. Halbrooks part of the official
10	record. Hearing no objections, that's so
11	ordered.
12	I do not have a determination here as
13	to whether or not it was part of the findings. I
14	do not recall folly. I don't have any evidence
15	to say that it was and so I will I will
16	provide a ruling that Item No. 41 can be included
17	as part of this year's report and I will just
18	note your objection
19	MR. HALBROOKS: Thank you.
20	CHAIRMAN BOHL: for the record.
21	MR. HALBROOKS: Secondly, I would pass
22	up a public records request we made to the police
23	department.
24	CHAIRMAN BOHL: And we'll have
25	Alderman Hamilton move to make this part of our

official record of this proceeding; and, hearing no objection, that's so ordered.

MR. HALBROOKS: The request filed on September 22nd requires all PA-33 tavern reports for 622 Water Street. We've got a stack of PA-33's which are referenced in the notice, but there are three items in the notice: Item 43, 44, 46, which do not, were not provided and, yet, somehow I'm here having to defend against them and I would ask that those three be stricken based on the lack of disclosure by the City that somehow they don't turn them over but then write them up in the synopsis.

CHAIRMAN BOML: Mr. Halbrooks, I will rule that those particular items can be utilized for this individual hearing and I will note your objection to that.

The reason for my ruling is that, albeit your concern would appear to me to be one over whether or not the police department adequately responded to an open records request. The police synopsis that you would have received would have been sent to you, was acknowledged by you and included those items, and that is the statutory provision and required by law, is that

those items be provided to you with due time and 1 due notice and with your -- the -- the applicant 2 3 here did knowledge that. 4 So albeit I understand that you were looking for additional information here in 5 advance, I would argue that that is a moot point 6 7 here given the fact that you were given adequate 8 notice of this police report based on statutory 9 requirements. MR. HALBROOKS: The last thing is along 10 11 that same line, Item No. 49, the PA-33 was provided to us but redacted all but the first 12 13 sentence, and so J (d object to that Item 49) being used as well erything except the first 14 15 sentence. CHAIRMAN BOHL: And I will rule, again, 16 given what we have before us here, I will rule 17 18 that that be included but that your objection is duly noted. 19 20 MR. HALBROOKS: Now, the notice itself 21 I have some issues with, with regard to the 22 neighborhood objections. Do you want to do that 23 later or do that now? 24 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Why don't you go ahead 25 and do that now?

1 MR. HALBROOKS: Okay. All right. 2 We're back to the boilerplate after a break of several months, and I notice that the -- I'm on 3 the meeting notice dated October 27th, 2010; and 4 5 just reading neighborhood objections, also written correspondence, one to four, received by 6 7 license division regarding this application: 8 Neighborhood objections to loitering, 9 littering; objections, loitering, littering, loud 10 music and noise, parking and traffic problems, music and noise, parking and traffic problems, 11 drug and criminal activity prostitution, 12 13 trespass, public univation, criminal activity, 14 prostitution, trespassing, public urination, fights, shootings 15 vandalism, thefts, shootings, vandalism, thefts, past history of --16 So I'm not certain if the attempted --17 18 the repetitiveness proves anything. So I would 19 suggest that all the repetitive be stricken, but 20 I've gone through the neighborhood objections which were provided and now, since we're within 21 22 45 days of the expiration of the license, the 23 neighborhood objections are locked. And all I find on Mr. Arenson's five E-mails are traffic 24 25 problems, public urination and vandalism. There

are literally no complaints for any of the other things. I know, in the past, you checked with Mr. Pap (phonetic); but I would ask that we check with the City Clerk because we have no notice of any of those neighborhood objections. And I think, based on our past procedure, they should be limited to those three actual neighborhood objections.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Notwithstanding the repetitive nature of some of the language that's in the notice, if it's mentioned once or twice, it's mentioned. So, in addition to that, I'm going to indicate that — that my ruling will be that the objection will stand as written; and, notwithstanding the letter that you've provided here, any items that are in the objection must be testified to; otherwise, they are a moot point.

So I — I will note your objection to that.

And I -- just for you -- the benefit here, when I'm making my ruling here, I'm turning the clock off. Just so you're aware, I'm not counting that against your time here, Mr.

Halbrooks. I want to state that for the record.

Go ahead if you wish to respond.

MR. HALBROOKS: Mr. Chair, I just want

1	to put on here, this is in in opposite of what
2	your previous rulings have been over the past
3	several months; but I also want to point out that
4	the ordinance allows testimony for what's in the
5	notice; and, by allowing things that are in the
6	notice that weren't objected to, you're taking us
7	way off course here; and so there is no ordinance
8	that allows for this decision; and I just want to
9	point that out, that there are only three
10	neighborhood objections in Mr. Arenson's E-mails:
11	traffic, public urination (and vandalism.
12	Anything beyond that that stestified to is not
13	fair game for this bearing.
14	CHAIRMAN BOAL: I appreciate that,
15	Mr. Halbrooks. Dve had consultation with the
16	City Attorney's office; and it is due to that
17	consultation and the interpretation of the City
18	Attorney's office as relayed to me, and that's
19	where my ruling will come from.
20	Okay. Is there anything else that you
21	wish to add at this point in terms of the notice?
22	MR. HALBROOKS: No. No, but I just saw
23	you giving your ruling and leaving the green
24	light on.
25	CHAIRMAN BOHL: I also gave you 45

to testify the truth, the whole truth and nothing	
but the truth testified as follows:

16 DIRECT TESTIMONIAL STATEMENT	
BY SERGEANT MAC GILLIS:	
18 I'll start with 41. On 11-1-2009 at	
2:11 a.m., Milwaukee police were dispatched to	
20 618 North Water for a subject-with-a-gun	
21 complaint.	
Upon arrival, officers observed several	
subjects in handcuffs next to an auto, along with	
the Wisconsin State Patrol officers and security	
from 618 Club standing in the middle of the	

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street in front of the tavern. Officers also observed several patrons entering and exiting the club, screaming and causing disturbance. Due to large crowd and lack of additional squad cars, the scene was slow in being controlled.

Officers began to speak with the State Patrol who advised them that they received a call regarding shots being fired and a description of an auto involved. Upon the arrival, they observed the car and recovered a 9-millimeter pistol which was located Ander the front passenger seat and placed all occupants in custody. While the State Patrol was attempting to investigate security from the club interfered with the troopers who were attempting to conduct a high-risk traffic stop. The troopers repeatedly asked security to stay back and were unable to identify where all the occupants were seated, except for the driver, hindering the investigation.

Milwaukee officers spoke to

Habib Manjee, along with security guards for the
club to determine what occurred. Manjee was not
able to give any accurate details of the incident
nor was he able to describe the individuals who

were fighting or where the shots came from.

Nowledge of the gun being in the car. The driver stated he was at the club to pick up women and that all of sudden a large fight erupted and then he ran from the club because he was scared due to being shot in the past. The driver further stated he ran to his car when three males asked for a ride to their auto and got in. The driver stated he began to accelerate when he was stopped and pulled out of the car by security and cops.

The other oxcupants were interviewed and denied having any knowledge of the pistol in the auto. No one on the scene appeared to be injured or shot, and no reports of any gunshot wound victims came in from area hospitals. The gun was placed on inventory.

Item 42. On 11-28-2009 at 1:25 a.m.,
Milwaukee Police were flagged down by Ladybug
security for trouble-with-subject complaint.

Security Guard Jonathan Howard stated a patron in
the club had just been removed for causing a
disturbance and that he was threatening to beat
up Howard and to come back with a gun and shoot

1 up the club. Howard stated he feared for his 2 safety. 3 Officers spoke to the actor, who stated 4 he was kicked out of club but denied making any 5 threats. A citation was issued to the subject for disorderly conduct. 6 7 Item 43. On 2-5-2010, at 11:43 AM, 8 Milwaukee Police were dispatched to 622 North 9 Water Street for a fight complaint. Officers observed a fight on the sidewalk. An 10 11 investigation found that one of the subjects was 12 a patron inside the close prior to the fight. (2-6-2010 at 1:43 AM,13 Item 44 Milwaukee Police observed a Club 618 security 14 trying to break up a fight in front of the 15 Ladybug Club. The crowd began to gather, and 16 other fights began to break out. Additional 17 officers were called to the scene to help restore 18 order. A total of six patrons were cited for 19 20 disorderly conduct and fighting. One other 21 subject was arrested on warrants. 22 Item 45. On 2-7-2010, at 1:00 a.m. 23 until 2:30 a.m., Milwaukee Police monitored club 24 activity, during this time, with one minor 25 The incident was videotaped and altercation.

placed on inventory.

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Item 46. On 2-21-2010, at 11:30 p.m., Milwaukee Police Officer -- a Milwaukee police officer, while on patrol, observed a large amount of vehicular traffic clogging the intersection of Michigan and Broadway. The officer also observed several subjects hanging out of vehicles and heard an unnecessary number of horns being honked for no apparent reason. The officer also heard the unnecessary revving of engines -correction -- unnecessary (revving of vehicles' engines and observed arga amount of people standing in the street Shortly after, the officer then observed several people fighting while other subjects gathered and cheered on. The incident was captured on video by a citizen and it was placed on police inventory. More squads were called to help and -- with crowd control and several citations were issued for assault and battery.

As patrons were observed leaving
618 Live, they would enter cars and generally
drive around in circles around the block.
Officers conducted a follow-up at 618 Live and
spoke to Manjee. Manjee was irate when

questioned by officers regarding the activity
that was occurring in and around the club. A
citation was issued to Manjee for disorderly
conduct by patrons. The citation was not found
in the Municipal Court system.

On 2-27-2010, while on patrol,
Milwaukee police officers were flagged down by
the owner of 618 Live, Habib Manjee, regarding
two patrons who were asked to leave the bar
because they were causing trouble. The subjects
threatened to come back and shoot up the place.

Habib stated the subjects left in an auto with temporary plates. A ckeck of the area was done and officers could not locate the auto. Pardon me.

Item 48. On 3-14-2010, at 8:15 P.M., Milwaukee Police were dispatched to 2356 North 47th Street for a battery complaint.

Investigation found the victim was a patron at 618 Live and got into an argument with a known subject and that it became physical. The subject hit the victim over the head with a glass causing a laceration to the top of the head. The victim sought treatment at a nearby hospital and received six stitches and six staples to close

the wound. She then reported the incident to police.

On Friday, March 19th, 2010, officers conducted followup at 618 Live and spoke to Manjee regarding the incident. Manjee stated he was unaware of any incident that occurred that day, and there was no video surveillance of the incident.

Milwaukee Police were flagged down by the manager at 618 Live regarding an auto that was driving around pepper spraying — correction — driving around spraying peoper spray at patrons who were leaving the clab. Officers were provided a description of the auto, which they located and stopped, when they were approached by another auto with a female driver who had an unconscious female in the back seat. Medical personnel were called to the scene and the unconscious female was taken to the hospital.

Officers spoke to the driver who stated she and her friend were at the 618 Club when a fight broke out inside the club. Security began pushing people out of the club, when an unknown male punched her friend in the face, causing her

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friend to fall into some bushes. An unknown female then began hitting her friend in the head with the heel of a shoe until she was unconscious. Police also spoke to the victim who relayed similar events of what occurred only adding she believed she knew who the female was who was hitting her with the shoe. The victim was treated for a fractured nose. Officers reviewed video of the interior of the tavern, which shows security removing the victim and a group of friends she was with. No physical altercation was observed on the video.

(9-25-2010, at 12:04, Item 50 Milwaukee Police dispatched to 622 North Water Street for battery complaint. Upon arrival, officers were met by Habib Manjee and his security staff who had a subject in handcuffs laying on the ground in front of the club. Manjee stated the subject had been involved in an altercation inside the club and was removed. Once outside, the subject made threats of returning with a weapon to do the tavern harm. citation was issued for disorderly conduct to the subject. Several calls were received regarding this incident while police were on the scene.

While officers attempted to investigate the complaint, another fight involving patrons who were leaving the club occurred down the street.

Police were dispatched to the District 5 to investigate a battery complaint. The victim stated she was -- correction. The victim stated he was at the Ladybug Club with his brother and a friend when a fight broke out. The victim stated security then began beating him with an unknown object, possibly, a flashlight or baton, in the head. The victim stated he blacked out; and, when he woke up, he tound himself at St. Mary's Hospital. He prother stated he did not know how he got there.

Police spoke to the victim's friend who stated she was exiting the bathroom and someone told her that her friend got jumped. She then walked to her vehicle where she saw her friend, the victim, stumbling around holding his face which had blood all over it. Officers conducted a follow-up and spoke to Habib Manjee.

Manjee stated that he was informed of a fight taking place between two customers with security breaking it up. Manjee provided

1		officers with video surveillance which showed the
2		victim in a fight with another patron and that
3		security did not hit the victim. The victim
4		received numerous stitches under his left and
5		right eyes. And that concludes the report.
6		CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you. Questions
7		or comments? Mr. Halbrooks.

12		of gun powder. The subjects from the vehicle
13		were released from the scene. Why was that left
14		out?

23		City Attorney, will address and get recognition
24		from the Chair, please; and then, when I call
25		upon you then

1	CHAIRMAN BOHL: I mean I want to just
2	go with an orderly procession of nobody just
3	deciding they want to interrupt. Okay?
4	MR. MILLER: I apologize, Mr. Chair.
5	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Miller, go ahead.
6	Thank you.
7	MR. MILLER: You know, I think Sergeant
8	MacGillis's testimony is he's got the synopsis in
9	front of him, that officers under his supervision
10	typed up the summaries. The counsel is reading
11	from what may be PA-33's. \( \) They're not before the
12	committee and they're not before the witness as
13	well. So I don't know how valuable that
14	information is made a part
15	of the record tor the Committee's review.
16	CHAIRMAN BOHL: And I just want to see
17	if he's desiring to do that here but I'm going to
18	allow him to proceed forward here, Mr. Halbrooks.
19	MR. HALBROOKS: Thank you. Because I
20	didn't hear any questions from you, I presumed
21	there was no issue from the Committee. So I just
22	wanted to make this part of the record.
23	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Mr. Chair, I will
24	object because as the representative of the
25	citizens and stakeholders of the Fourth

1	Aldermanic District, I have no idea what
2	Mr. Halbrooks is talking about.
3	CHAIRMAN BOHL: What is it you are here
4	attempting to make part of the record because we
5	have to vote on it, Mr. Halbrooks?
6	MR. HALBROOKS: The PA-33, who is
7	not didn't provide a full the person who
8	was identified was not listed in the synopsis.
9	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Were you relating that
10	to Item 42?
11	MR. HALBROOKS: NItem 42.
12	ALDERMAN BALMAN: May I suggest, Mr.
13	Chair, if I may? If he has all these PA-33's,
14	these incidents be an give them to us. Make
15	them part of the ecord. I'm fine with that.
16	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman, I will allow
17	him to be able to address I think that you
18	well know what we have are summaries and that, as
19	part of the rebuttal to the police report that is
20	before us and is read into the record and under
21	consideration, he has a bit of additional
22	information. I will allow him the ability to
23	raise those individual questions and to provide
24	an additional basis for that.
25	MR. MILLER: Mr. Chair

1 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Miller. 2 MR. MILLER: He needs to provide the documents to the witness and then he can make it 3 an exhibit. We've got to have a process here. 4 5 We can't have the witness guessing about what is or is not in the PA-33. 6 7 CHAIRMAN BOHL: I, actually, disagree 8 with that because I believe it is the police 9 department's role to have an understanding of what is before us. It is, actually, this 10 individual's property right, vested property 11 right in which those items some under 12 13 consideration, Mr,  $\chi$ er, and are being utilized 14 and subjected to the ability to provide a suspension and or a -- a nonrenewal of a license. 15 The police department is vouching for this. 16 Now, what I'm going to do is I'm going 17 to allow him to proceed forward here at this 18 19 point. Is it your desire and I just will ask: 20 Do you have actual PA-33's that you're wishing to 21 make a part of the record here? 22 MR. HALBROOKS: Not at this time. 23 have the PA-33's that they turned over. So it 24 would be difficult to say. Why do I have to turn 25 in PA-33's on my questions and they get to put in

a synopsis and not provide me the PA-33's? 1 2 CHAIRMAN BOHL: The only question I'm 3 going to raise, Mr. Halbrooks, is the Committee 4 knows no better -- at least, what we have is a 5 report that the police report will state and went in notice to you, that I assume, if I asked him 6 7 as a sworn witness here, Sergeant MacGillis will 8 say that this was the indeed actual license 9 investigation report that went to you that was prepared by his office. 10 11 On the other hand, you're citing 12 supposed a document that we don't have any 13 indication are actual (A-33's but could be a mere figment that you kneed 14 15 ALDROOKS: I understand. this all started with the City Attorney 16 advocating a position, and I'm just trying to do 17 18 my case. MR. MILLER: Mr. Chair, I do need to 19 20 respond to that; but I don't -- I'm trying to 21 protect the record, and what I'm concerned is 22 happening here is counsel has every right to make 23 his case that the synopsis itself is unreliable 24 and, therefore, can't come under the hearsay 25 exception. But, in doing so, he needs to stand

on those documents. We can't play a game of guess what's in each particular item on -- you know -- the several items that are in the record.

If -- those documents, the PA-33's, will speak for themselves. He can introduce the document. I don't want to put on Mr. Halbrooks's case; but, if he would like to show a document to the Sergeant and ask him if he sees a particular name that isn't in Item 42, he can do that; but we can't just have this game of forcing a witness who's already testified that he doesn't have the PA-33 in front of him he did not draft the document, but can be sees what is in the PA-33 that Mr. Halbrooks is reading from?

ALDIAMAN BAUMAN: Mr. Chairman, if I could clear this up -- the magic word, Mr. Chair, with all due respect, the magic word is the applicant needs a foundation for their question; and the foundation is the alleged factual record which they're referring to. Put that foundation into evidence and then cross-examine the police. I think that's perfectly legitimate to say the summary leaves out relevant information from the actual document. That's a very relevant line of inquiry. We don't know what the document says.

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He could ask him anything. That's not in the report. Did they say the sun rose? No, that's not in there. He has to have a foundation for his questions.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Halbrooks.

MR. HALBROOKS: I appreciate all the help from practicing and non-practicing attorneys; but I think that the way it works in putting in evidence is you lay a foundation for an exhibit and then you put in the exhibit.

So when I -- I don't understand the City Attorney. He says he's protecting the record. Protecting record from what? I'm just asking questions There is no record to protect. And Alderman Bauman saying I could ask him if the sun come up. I could ask him if the sun come out. But I haven't had a reason to do that, but I could ask him whatever I want regarding his police reports; and, if I want to move in the PA-33's or if the Committee asks for them, we'll get to that. But to suggest to tell me that I must proceed in a certain way, when the committee's not -- doesn't seem bothered and plus I'd be done by now.

ALDERMAN COGGS:

Mr. Chair, I am

1	bothered. Please introduce them.
2	ALDERMAN KOVAC: Mr. Chair, I want to
3	make sure we don't get too far afield from Item
4	41 because Mr. Halbrooks read in, in his
5	question, were statements from the PA-33, which
6	made it implied that the gun at the police
7	department was not the gun involved in the
8	shooting. That's relevant information, but I
9	want it in evidence and I want to see what report
10	he's got.
11	MR. HALBROOKS: $\bigwedge$ And, see, there's the
12	trouble right thee. See, there is no shooting,
13	actually. There is no evidence of any shooting.
14	So, if you want the
15	ALDERMAN COGGS: Mr. Chair, I made a
16	request.
17	MR. HALBROOKS: That's all right.
18	Fine, let's mark it.
19	CHAIRMAN BOHL: What we will need,
20	though, we'll need additional copies. I don't
21	know how many copies he has.
22	MR. HALBROOKS: I have one for me, and
23	we have an additional I'll give you a copy.
24	But, again, then I think they need to produce the
25	ones they didn't turn over. I shouldn't have to

1	be suffering from them not giving me the PA-33's
2	on a valid public records request. All right.
3	So, I will
4	CHAIRMAN BOHL: We'll have
5	Alderman Coggs first make the Municipal Court
6	case information on Daisman Price provided by Mr.
7	Halbrooks part of our official record in this
8	proceeding. Hearing no objection, so ordered.
9	Mr. Halbrooks, are you providing items
10	here for which you are raising questions?
11	MR. HALBROOKS: The two that, this
12	would be 11-1 and this would be 11-29.
13	CHAIRMAN BONK: So Items No. 41 and 42
14	in our in our police synopsis.
15	MR. MALAROOKS: There are two pages in
16	each one. I don't know if we should staple them
17	or what.
18	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Coggs will
19	move to make the two PA-33 documents provided by
20	Mr. Halbrooks part of our official record in this
21	proceeding; and, hearing no objection to that, so
22	ordered.
23	MR. HALBROOKS: All right. And, if I
24	may, I don't know what happens to the evidence,
25	when we get to texture, the court in texture, the

1		flyers disappeared. I don't know where they get
2		kept, but I just want to make sure that the
3		Committee keeps custody of those things. All
4		right.
5		BY MR. HALBROOKS:
6	Q	I wanted to ask you about Item 45. You don't
7		have the video here, I presume, correct?
8	А	No, sir, I do not.
9	Q	For Item 46, on when you say citation was not
10		found in Municipal Court system, that's not part
11		of the the PA-33; that \s something your office
12		checked on?
13	A	That is correct. Yes sir.
14	Q	All right. And what does PA-33 not or I'm
15		sorry citation not found in the system mean to
16		you?
17	A	That means that we cross-referenced the name and
18		the citation number that was on the PA-33 and
19		somehow, some way that actual ticket was lost or
20		it's misplaced or it's not filed.
21	Q	It was lost or misplaced or not filed?
22	A	Yes.
23	Q	And you have no way of checking any of that?
24	A	Well, a hand search was probably done by the
25		people in traffic records. However, I still I

1		have no answer for you.
2	Q	Okay. And on the it indicates that Mr. Manjee
3		was given a citation for disorderly conduct by
4		patrons?
5	A	Yes.
6	Q	What and what day was he given that citation?
7	A	That I do not, sir, know. I'd have to look at
8		the PA-33 to see if there's a cross-reference to
9		that and/or the citation. The citation that
10		cannot be found would address that.
11		MR. HALBROOKS: \All right,
12		Mr. Chairman.
13		CHAIRMAN BONK: This is relating to, I
14		believe, Item 46?
15		MR. MALDROOKS: Yes, I have two pages I
16		would present to the Chair.
17		CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Kovac will
18		move to make these documents provided by
19		Attorney Halbrooks. I'm going to assume, two
20		items that were faxed on the date on the top left
21		of March 10th, 4:13 PM, 4:14 PM. Hearing no
22		objection, that's so ordered for this proceeding.
23		MR. HALBROOKS: And the documents
24		are oh, I'm sorry. I thought you were going
25		to identify the documents. The documents are the
	l	

1		refusal by the City Attorney and a letter
2		indicating that he wasn't the person to be
3		prosecuted for an incident several blocks away.
4		CHAIRMAN BOHL: Correct.
5		MR. HALBROOKS: Item 47. I apologize.
6		I have the PA-33, sent
7		BY MR. HALBROOKS:
8	Q	Sergeant, I want to talk to you about Item 47
9		47 you have not reviewed the PA-33 for this
10		one?
11	A	I may have seen it, but my best recollection of
12		this incident is on the symposis.
13	Q	All right. So we have the synopsis, and the
14		synopsis indicates that the 2-27, police
15		officers were flagged down by the owner, Habib,
16		regarding two patrons who were asked to leave the
17		bar because they were causing trouble. All
18		right. So I'm going to read you the PA-33
19		written by the person you supervised:
20		Narrative section. This report is
21		being typed by Police Officer Jitiki
22		THE REPORTER: I'm sorry. Can you
23		repeat the name?
24		MR. HALBROOKS: Jitiki, J-i-t, as in
25		Tom, i-k-i, last name X, the letter X.

On Saturday, February 27th, I was on 1 2 patrol in the 600 block of North Water Street and 3 I was flagged down by the owner of Club 618 Live, Ladybug Club, Habib Manjee. 4 Manjee stated that a subject who was 5 standing on the curb was jumping out in traffic 6 7 as the cars came by. Manjee stated he thought 8 the subject was drunk. I finished speaking to 9 Manjee and I spoke to Robert Hayes (phonetic) -and his address. 10 11 Hayes stated he  $\hat{h}$  was waiting for a bus and was standing in the street to see if the bus 12 was coming. Hayes was (intoxicated and smelled of 13 Hayes wasn't a patron of Club 618 and 14 alcohol. was just waiting in the area for the bus. 15 informed Hayes to stay out of the street and wait 16 on the curb until the bus comes. Hayes walked 17 18 away from the area and went to the bus stop on the corner of Water and Wisconsin and waited for 19 20 the bus. None of that was included in Item -- I 21 22 didn't hear that in the summary. 23 SERGEANT MAC GILLIS: All right. 24 MR. HALBROOKS: Correct? 25 SERGEANT MAC GILLIS: You are correct.

1	BY M	R. HALBROOKS:
2	Q	Why would that information be left out of the
3		summary?
4	A	That I don't know. What else is on the PA-33?
5	Q	Well, I'll ask the
6		ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Well
7		MR. HALBROOKS: The question is
8		SERGEANT MAC GILLIS: I don't know why
9		it was left out, sir.
10		BY MR. HALBROOKS:
11	Q	So the good stuff that they do was left out. Is
12		that possible?
13	А	Items are left out looking at the
14		synopsis, the fact that Mr. Manjee flagged down
15		the police was a good thing. So.
16	Q	So the incident So, when the police officer
17		drove around the block to see if the person was
18		staying out of the street and then came around
19		and talked to Mr. Manjee about the two people
20		leaving the bar, if Mr. Manjee wouldn't have done
21		this good samaritan activity, there wouldn't even
22		be the PA-33, correct?
23	А	That's a fair assumption. Yes.
24		CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Hamilton would
25		move to make the PA-33 provided by Mr. Halbrooks

1		for the date of 2-27-2010 part of the official
2		record in this proceeding. Hearing no objection,
3		so ordered.
4		BY MR. HALBROOKS:
5	Q	Item 48. You may recall that, on the incident
6		on the incident talked about a woman needing
7		six stitches and six staples?
8	А	Yes.
9	Q	On Item 48?
10	А	Yes.
11	Q	And did you review the PA (33 on that one?
12	A	I possibly did, yes.
13	Q	And are you aware of what was turned over to me
14		when we requested that?
15	A	No, I am not.
16	Q	So the now, when the indication is that there
17		was no video surveillance let me get the words
18		for that.
19		There was no video surveillance of the
20		incident. When you write that, do you mean there
21		was no video recording or the surveillance didn't
22		show the activity?
23	A	What's written is on the PA-33, and I need to
24		know who wrote the PA-33 that this synopsis was
25		generated from. And we're going to have to

1		address that with that person.
2	Q	And the PA-33 does not indicate that the video
3		surveillance showed that there was no person
4		leaving with a cut head?
5	A	That I can't answer, sir, because we wrote the
6		synopsis. My office did that. However, the
7		synopsis again is generated from the PA-33; and
8		the author of the PA-33 is probably an officer
9		who put in there there was no video surveillance
10		of the incident. So that's what I have here.
11	Q	So the PA-33, when you talk about no video
12		surveillance, that so the PA-33 also
13		indicates that the person, that when the police
14		officers were there looking at the video, that
15		the person that complained, this Map (phonetic),
16		this woman with the last name Map, that she was
17		never actually in the club that night. That's
18		what's in the PA-33?
19	A	Well, I don't know what's in the PA-33.
20	Q	I don't either because you redacted the entire
21		PA-33.
22	A	Is this possibly, is this victim a juvenile?
23		If this victim was a juvenile, it would not it
24		would have been redacted, I don't know. That's
25		something open records did. That's unknown to

1		me. Sir, after you put in your request for the
2		PA-33's, I do not see them. The copies go to
3		open records, and then what open records does
4		with them is what open records does with them.
5		If there is juvenile information in there that is
6		not to be made public, I could see a good cause
7		for that being redacted or if there is pending
8		The date of this is last March. If
9		there's some pending investigation still, where
10		other attorneys might want the information
11		redacted, that's a possibility, also.
12	Q	I realize you're thinking on the fly, but you're
13		not suggesting that there was an underage
14		individual in the club and the officer doing the
15		investigating tide t check on that such that they
16		would have Octavia Map's (phonetic) birth date of
17		11-23-1985?
18	A	I don't know. I don't know why there would be
19		something redacted there. You're going to have
20		to consult with open records.
21	Q	So the hours and hours that the police spent
22		there, going over the video surveillance, in
23		verifying that the person was not in the club and
24		there was no fight, that we don't know why that
25		isn't in the summary.

1	A	Well, I don't know if there was video
2		surveillance because the last line says there
3		wasn't video surveillance of the incident.
4	Q	Right, but you neither of us have the PA-33.
5	А	Oh, I'm sorry. I thought you did.
6	Q	It's been redacted.
7	А	My mistake. My mistake.
8	Q	Item 49. I noticed that that particular item
9		indicates that that there was no no
10		physical altercation was observed on the video,
11		which seems to put the certainly, the rest of
12		the complainant's story inci with some
13		credibility; but what I want to ask you is about
14		the the item that says the person an
15		unknown male punched her friend in the face
16		causing her friend to fall into some bushes. Are
17		there since you your office prepared this,
18		or are you aware of any bushes downtown in the
19		area of 618?
20	A	Possibly, a little bit north of there, there's a
21		vacant lot where I think was it
22		Potato Brothers (phonetic) that was there? Or
23		there's some bushes by a bus stop just south of
24		Wisconsin. I thought. It's been a couple of
25		years, so.

1		ALDERMAN BAUMAN: I can provide that
2		information.
3		MR. HALBROOKS: All right.
4		BY MR. HALBROOKS:
5	Q	On Item 50, I notice that this summary doesn't
6		indicate that it was the representatives of
7		Ladybug Club that were the ones that called the
8		police. Any reason why that was left out?
9	A	No, sir, I do not. I know they were dispatched;
10		but, insofar as who made the call, that I don't
11		know.
12	Q	Just one last question Item 46, near the bottom
13		it says: As patrons were observed leaving
14		618 Live, they would enter the cars and generally
15		drive around the block. Is
16		that part of your synopsis?
17	А	Yes. Just one minor thing here. Let me find
18		okay. I see. About the fourth sentence from the
19		bottom.
20	Q	Correct.
21	А	Got you, yes.
22	Q	But at the very beginning, right next to Item 46,
23		it says: On 2-21-10 at 11:30 p.m.?
24	А	Yes.
25	Q	There's no there's no You didn't

1		investigate or that's not a mistake in the PA-33.
2		You're actually suggesting in the summary the
3		customers were leaving at 11:30 at night?
4	А	I don't know if they're leaving, but what the
5		synopsis
6	Q	I'm sorry. Here's what it says: As patrons were
7		observed leaving 618 Live What part don't you
8		know?
9	А	Okay. I'm sorry. I thought you were referring
10		to the first sentence where it says 11:30 p.m.
11		I would have to look at the
12		computer-aided dispatch record for that night to
13		get you clarification because there's a very good
14		possibility that officers were on scene there for
15		two and a half hours. Does that answer your
16		question or make sense?
17	Q	But there's no
18	А	Time language?
19	Q	I don't know. You didn't turn over the PA-33. I
20		can't I have to ask you.
21	А	Did you get the PA-33, regarding this?
22	Q	No, you didn't give it to us. I mean we're blind
23		here.
24	A	Oh.
25	Q	We have to defend ourselves from what you say,

1		and I want to ask you a question about: it says
2		they were leaving at 11:30.
3		MR. MILLER: Well, that's not that's
4		not what it says. Let's make the record clear.
5		It does not say that people were leaving at
6		11:30.
7		SERGEANT MAC GILLIS: I know in the
8		first sentence it states, at 11:30 p.m.,
9		Milwaukee police officer, while on patrol,
10		observed a large amount of vehicular traffic
11		clogging the intersection of Michigan and
12		Broadway.
13		There's at least ten sentences and
14		halfway through the fifth sentence from the
15		bottom, it says: as patrons were observed leaving
16		618 Live.
17		BY MR. HALBROOKS:
18	Q	Well, I notice in the middle it says shortly
19		after.
20	А	Okay. Maybe the verbiage isn't the greatest; to
21		further investigate, sir, I could get CAD
22		information that, as I said earlier, might
23		indicate that there were officers on scene for
24		two and a half hours.
25	Q	You're speculating; you don't have any idea?

1	А	Well, not at this time, but put the meeting on
2		hold, and I could get the information.
3		CHAIRMAN BOHL: Well, Sergeant, but
4		here's what's at issue. I mean, if police
5		officers were there as part of this investigation
6		two and a half hours and that was in the PA-33,
7		that should be in this report. I mean it
8		shouldn't be left as a guessing game and,
9		additionally, it shouldn't be left here for us to
10		go back and put the pieces of the puzzle back
11		together afterward.
12		Anybody who watching this, it doesn't
13		look good. It just doesn't.
14		MR. HALEROOKS: Okay. I have a few
15		questions now for Mr. Merado, now that I've gone
16		through the basis. Do you want he's already
17		on the record.
18		CHAIRMAN BOHL: I'm going to I mean,
19		if this is part of your questioning of a witness
20		here
21		MR. HALBROOKS: No, no, this is the
22		police report.
23		CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Halbrooks, you have
24		the ability to raise questions here of the police
25		report. If you're going to bring a witness in,

I'm going to count that against your time. Okay.

Just to let you know that.

MR. HALBROOKS: Every single time we've been here, we're absent a person. Mr. Merado was absent with Mr. Lerner; now we've got Mr. Lerner not here. I think I asked good questions to clarify the summary. But now I think that the Ladybug gets to respond to the police report.

It's a prepared thing --

what -- you can question Mim later and telling us, as a statement here what your concerns are relating to the police report; and, if you want to later on, as far as him being one of the witnesses, you can actually have him provide that additional testimony.

MR. HALBROOKS: Mr. Chair, what I'm asking to do is what in the past you have ruled is appropriate and shouldn't count against our time; and it's very difficult to plan for these meetings when you -- every single time it changes. I got rid of the extra person so it would go faster. I think you can see it doesn't go faster with me doing it. But I didn't ask silly questions. I asked questions that led to

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answers that were probative, but I needed that foundation for Mr. Merado's explanation to make sense. And I think that, for me to sit here and testify as opposed to have a person who was there give firsthand knowledge, I think that's the appropriate thing to do. I think in the past, you said we need firsthand explanations and the attorneys couldn't do it. And so I think there's only these few items so it should go pretty fast. CHAIRMAN BOHL: My ruling's going to be my ruling here, Mr. Halbropks. If the Committee wants to overrule that the Committee can overrule that. Bu **L**eed a motion by the Committee. HAMILTON: Mr. Chair, just as a -- the presentation, as the format we're going in, I think it's a time-saving measure and I think we're going to end up getting the same information except it will be in chopped-up format as opposed to just getting it in a nice wrapped-up package.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: I actually don't object, Alderman Hamilton, to doing that; however, what I will state is that is a witness providing testimony. That is a witness and, as

1	such, it should count toward the time of
2	witnesses.
3	The witness has the ability, and they
4	will bring witnesses that will rebuff any measure
5	of potential informational before us, but that is
6	witness testimony. So I wanted to count it as
7	time. It's not as though I'm saying no to them
8	doing it. I'm saying, if you choose to do that,
9	it counts against the 26 minutes you have left.
10	ALDERMAN COGGS: Mr. Chair.
11	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Coggs.
12	ALDERMAN COCCS: Would it also have to
13	come after objection?
14	CHAIRMAN BOAL: After what objection?
15	ALDERMAN COGGS: If it counts as
16	witness testimony, would it also have to come
17	after objection? Usually, witnesses for
18	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Yes.
19	ALDERMAN COGGS: come after
20	objection.
21	CHAIRMAN BOHL: I would make an
22	exception, just as Alderman Hamilton indicated,
23	if it is part of dealing with this to avoid the
24	break-up. Yes.
25	MR. HALBROOKS: Mr. Chairman, I would

1	just add
2	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Let me add: Is there a
3	desire to make a motion and say let's take this
4	testimony and not count it against the clock?
5	That's what my ruling is, if he wants to do it,
6	it counts against the clock.
7	ALDERMAN HAMILTON: That would be my
8	motion. I think it's in direct response to the
9	police report. So, just in order to keep
10	things I mean I don't think the police report
11	counted against objector's side; maybe the
12	response to the police report should not as well.
13	That would be my motion.
14	ALDERMAN COCGS: On the time thing?
15	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Yes. Alderman Hamilton
16	is making a motion, notwithstanding the Chair's
17	ruling, that the additional questions that
18	Mr. Halbrooks wishes to ask of this witness would
19	not count against the time.
20	Are there objections to that motion?
21	ALDERMAN COGGS: Objection.
22	CHAIRMAN BOHL: I will object as well,
23	too. It fails on a 2-2 vote.
24	MR. HALBROOKS: Mr. Chair.
25	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Halbrooks.

1	MR. HALBROOKS: I would remind the
2	Chair that last time I was here
3	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Halbrooks,
4	notwithstanding that, I'm going to ask you to
5	move on or I'm hitting the clock. Okay.
6	MR. HALBROOKS: I would like
7	CHAIRMAN BOHL: You know what? You
8	know what? You can take that to court,
9	Mr. Halbrooks.
10	MR. HALBROOKS: Does the Chair realize
11	that last time that was exactly what I did and
12	you yelled at me and said, no, you want response
13	to police report
14	CHAIRMAN BOML: Mr. Halbrooks, my
15	ruling is my ruling. I'm going to ask you to
16	move on at this point or I will hit the clock.
17	MR. HALBROOKS: Move on to what? I
18	want it
19	CHAIRMAN BOHL: The clock is starting
20	right now on you. Are you finished with your
21	raising of questions? Do you desire to actually
22	put him on and put it on the clock? There's a
23	2-2 ruling. The Committee has not overruled the
24	Chair. The Chair's ruling stands, period. I'm
25	not going to debate this any more with you.

1	Now, I'm asking you, sir, if it is your
2	desire, if you have any other questions to raise
3	regarding the police report.
4	MR. HALBROOKS: I do and I and I
5	would request discretion to ask him to respond to
6	the police report. I don't
7	CHAIRMAN BOHL: I would provide you
8	discretion. I will provide you discretion and I
9	will state that it is individual witness
10	testimony.
11	MR. HALBROOKS: $\bigvee$ I have you yelling at
12	me in the past, saying it desn't count; I should
13	have done it at the beginning. And now you're
14	telling me
15	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Halbrooks, I will
16	again ask you: Do you have any other questions
17	that you wish to raise regarding the police
18	report?
19	MR. HALBROOKS: Okay. I need to ask a
20	different question. I want to respond to the
21	police report now. You're saying that now has to
22	count against my time?
23	CHAIRMAN BOHL: No, I'm saying that you
24	can raise additional questions of the police
25	report. If you want to start to go into

1	probative questions of a witness, it will count
2	as witness testimony.
3	MR. HALBROOKS: Okay. So my argue
4	so the statement of the lawyer, even though I'm
5	not a witness and I'm not sworn, you want that?
6	Okay.
7	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Yes.
8	MR. HALBROOKS: Okay.
9	ALDERMAN HAMILTON: Mr. Chair, just so
10	I'm clear. That part wouldn't be counted against
11	the time?
12	CHAIRMAN BOHD: No. no.
13	ALDERMAN HAMILTON: It's the witness
14	portion.
15	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Everything that if
16	he literally what he wants to ask this
17	witness, if he provides that as a statement,
18	additional statements of our concern is because
19	this gentleman is the manager who will rebut and
20	says that he was here A, B and C and this wasn't
21	the case. We also will make a claim that that
22	occurred and that didn't occur based on
23	ALDERMAN HAMILTON: Okay. That's
24	clear. And I think you just proceed.
25	CHAIRMAN BOHL: You know what?

1	Everyone can question every little nuance here.
2	I mean one thing is very clear. The Chair makes
3	a ruling. There is the ability of the Committee
4	to make a motion to overrule the Chair.
5	ALDERMAN HAMILTON: And that was done.
6	CHAIRMAN BOHL: The Committee didn't do
7	it so we stand where we're at.
8	MR. MILLER: Mr. Chair, just so that
9	everybody's clear that the statements provided by
10	counsel are not testimony that can be relied on.
11	CHAIRMAN BOHL: (We understand that.
12	I've been on this committee for ten and a half
13	years. I fully understand that.
14	MR. MELLER! I know. Just putting it
15	on the record.
16	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Halbrooks.
17	MR. HALBROOKS: I also have
18	Mr. Merado's notes that I'm going to be reading
19	from. I'm going to ask your patience. When you
20	ask me to read from something, it's going to take
21	a lot longer. I cannot get around it, and I'm
22	going to have to translate his notes into
23	something I would say
24	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: And I would object on
25	hearsay grounds to that happening.

1 MR. HALBROOKS: See what I mean? 2 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Well, he's not -- I'm 3 going to allow you. That's okay. His objection will be duly noted. 4 5 MR. HALBROOKS: On Halloween night, four individuals were exiting the club and were 6 7 observed entering a parked vehicle located in 8 front of the Club Bari. At that point, there was 9 a sound that may or may not have been a gunshot. They could not be certain because it was 10 11 Halloween and guns were part of the costumes. Upon further information, Men the car -- they 12 (make a U-turn and begin to 13 saw the car pull away 14 travel south or Water Street. thing that you'll find in the 15 16 transcript from last year was that there was testimony that it was a State trooper and you --17 the Chair made a comment about what are they 18 19 there to eat or whatever? Upon investigation, it 20 turns out the State trooper was there because of the construction on the interstate and the State 21 22 was taking responsibility for that. So that's 23 why the State trooper was, at least, in the 24 vicinity of Water Street. He then called other 25 State troopers; and, when the police got there,

there was a debate about who was in charge and got into the problems that occurred there.

Finally, ten minutes later, MPD arrived and MPD was the one that found a nine-millimeter gun under the passenger's front seat. The -- the club doesn't believe there was a gunshot because there was no -- the magazine was full and there was no smell of gun powder from the weapon.

The other subjects in the vehicle that denied any knowledge were -- the testimony -- the PA-33 indicates that they were all there getting a ride from the driver and they didn't know him, but they were just all getting a ride and they denied any knowledge of pistol. So there was not only no proof that there was a gunshot, there was no proof that that gun was fired. So whatever happened nobody knows at this point.

On Item 42, an individual was asked to leave the club due to being a disruption to the patron and staff. The individual was reluctant to comply and left in a -- in an abusive and hostile manner. As he continued to argue with 618 Live on Water Street security staff as to why he was asked to leave, he made threats of harming the security personnel. The individual claimed

he would come back and shoot up the club. They determined that this crossed the line and that it would be appropriate to call the Milwaukee Police Department.

So that is the first of the 11 items, that is the first one in which 618 called the police. Of the -- well, who called? So, also, I'm -- I'm now provided information that it was actually 618 Live that went and got the State trooper. So they were both -- so for both items were brought on by the -- 1618 calling it in.

Item 43, again, 618 Live On Water staff called MPD for assistance with two disorderly individuals energed in a fight. When the police arrived, the individuals calmed down and the fighting stopped.

So that was, again, of the three that I've gone through, three were caused by 618 notifying the police. Items 43 and 44 were the items that I indicated we don't have PA-33's for. We have literally no other information other than what is in those seven sentences there. Again, those were the first 43 was -- was dispatched from a call from 618 Live and it appears that they observed the incident on 44. So the first

1 one may have been observed by the police officers 2 without being flagged down. But, because I don't -- I wasn't provided any information by the 3 4 police department, I don't have anything further. 5 Item 46. I'm sorry. Oh. is -- appears to be a self-initiated item from 6 7 the Milwaukee Police Department in -- I don't --I guess I would ask for the video. I don't know 8 9 what a minor altercation is, appears to be something along the line of an argument. 10 11 somebody's here from the police to flesh that particular one out; otherwise, I don't believe 12 there's anything there that can really be used 13 against the clab singe it was itself initiated by 14 the police and they, apparently, didn't even feel 15 the need to talk to anybody and it certainly 16 doesn't indicate that the altercation had 17 anything to do with 618 Live. 18 19 On 2-21, on the Item No. 46, you know, 20 obviously, the club would respond by indicating that the club closes at 1:30, between 1:30 and 21 22 2:00 a.m., and doesn't believe that whatever was going on there at 11:30 had anything to do with 23 24 618 Live. 25 I would indicate that the -- that it

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certainly seems to me that there was a problem with this particular police officer. I hope he would come and explain himself based on my reading of the PA-33. I'm not going to get into it if they're not going to but, simply, to suggest that -- that all of the patrons in the parking lot and I think what the Committee should realize is that there -- after the lengthy discussions about the parking lot last year, there aren't those discussions except for this particular one; and the suggestions, if you read the summary, I don't agree with Sergeant MacGillis **XX**alysis; it appears to be an incident in which something happened shortly thereafter and move squads were called. whoever the people were, they clearly at 11:30 were not customers. Item 47. You have the PA-33. Again, I provided that so you could show that it was Mr. Manjee who flagged down the police and that Mr. Manjee then -- when the police, only with the police coming back around to check on the safety of the individual who was drunk and without a

shirt on and probably homeless that, if he had

not started that particular concern and raised

that with the police, this item wouldn't be there either.

Item 48 indicates that this -- the statement from 618 Live is unequivocal that this incident did not happen at 618 Live. There was no process from the DA after a lengthy investigation, it appears, from the blurb at the end of the report from the DA, even though the person showed up, the DA didn't believe it and didn't file a case. There is no evidence, and what this says in there, there's no video surveillance. There is every inch of the club is covered by video.

So there was not any video evidence of a fight, of a erron getting their head cut open, of any blood. Every single exit is under video surveillance at every moment. The police viewed all of the exiting for the entire night and none -- no exit showed any kind of person leaving with any concern; and, upon checking the surveillance and the ID machine, no information indicated this individual. She didn't show up in the entrance and her ID didn't show up.

So, unless the police have something further to add to that, we believe we've

significantly challenged that particular item, the credibility of that particular item.

Now, I would indicate that that item took place on took place on the -- that that item took place on March 14th, 2010. After that time, there was a -- the suspension was served, the 60-day suspension that was imposed over your ruling at the Common Council. And there are only three items after that particular incident, and one occurred on July 16th at 1:10, Item 49. And the explanation -- I'm going to read Mr. Merado's explanation:

Thursday might, slash, ladies night, while On 618 Live was in the process of closing for the night security staff observed a vehicle driving around and arbitrarily spraying what seemed to be pepper spray at our patrons and Club Bari patrons.

At this point, also, Club Bari has opened, and I hope you will take into consideration from this point on that Club Bari was there; and we will have a chance to talk about later about their pattern and practice and what they've told this committee.

But it seems to me to be a valid reason

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to call the police at that point. The security
escorted a group of females from the facility
earlier that evening for arguing. They're not
sure whether this is the same group of females.
They noticed an MPD vehicle coming in their
direction and flagged the officer down to inform
him of the incident. They provided the officer
with a description of the vehicle and that would
be the vehicle with pepper spray. The officer
subsequently found the vehicle and stopped it in
front of the Riverside Theater. Upon speaking to
the officers, the person in the vehicle claimed
to be at 618 where a tight broke out. 618
security pushed her out of the club where a male
then punched her in the face, causing her to fall
into some bushes. There are no bushes, trees,
shrubs, grass or any type of vegetation on Water
Street anywhere around the club. Officers
ALDERMAN BAUMAN: That is blatant
hearsay, and false I might add.
MR. HALBROOKS: I'm sorry. Why is he
interrupting?
ALDERMAN BAUMAN: He's offering
out-of-court testimony for the truth of the
matter asserted. That's just false and hearsay.

1 MR. MILLER: Well, I assume, Mr. Chair, 2 he's -- you're reading a statement that you're attributing to your witness who's sitting right 3 beside you. 4 5 MR. HALBROOKS: Within the past he's been able to testify, yes. 6 7 MR. MILLER: With all due respect, it's not a hearsay problem we have here but it is not 8 9 testimony that the Committee can consider. 10 it's a curious exercise. It's an opening 11 statement the Committee  $w\phi_n$ 't be relying on --12 (Unintelligible I'm not disputing that, 13 CHAIRMAN stating that he has the 14 Mr. Miller. I/ 15 ability to rake questions or make comments related to the police report. This would be the 16 17 comments. MR. HALBROOKS: Officers viewed video 18 of the interior and exterior of the facility 19 20 which shows 618 Live security moving the victim 21 and a group of females that they escorted out 22 earlier that night. No -- absolutely no physical 23 altercation was observed on the video. And, 24 again, if I had the PA-33, it's probably on 25 there.

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Now, on item 50. Again, this is another incident in which the club called the police and the synopsis does not provide that 911 was called a number of times. An individual was asked to leave the facility due to his erratic and abusive behavior. Individual became very animated and violent and refused to leave. At this point, 618 Live staff assisted the gentleman out of the club at 11:30. The patron kept acting out of control, threatening to fight the security guards, jumping in and out of traffic as he walked down Water Street. At this point, he threatened to come back and shoot up the club. the individual and called MPD We then handcutted PD arrived and the individual for assistance was uncuffed and cited for disorderly conduct. Subsequently, while MPD was on site, an altercation occurred at the club next door, at Club Bari, between two of their patrons. Now, there's one item left, which is kind of interesting. Two individuals who were involved in a physical altercation that was addressed by 618 Live security. Both parties were separated and were escorted from the

facility through different exits at approximately

1	1:00 a.m.
2	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Now, which item?
3	MR. HALBROOKS: Item 51. I was just
4	going to go back to it.
5	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay.
6	MR. HALBROOKS: Item 51 starts out
7	talking about police being dispatched to No. 5 to
8	investigate a battery complaint where the victim
9	stated he was at Ladybug with his brother and a
10	friend when a fight broke out. Security then
11	began beating him with an unknown object, a
12	flashlight or baton, the head. Victim stated
13	he blacked out; and when he woke up, he found
14	himself at St. Mary's Hospital.
15	So, keeping that in mind, MPD came in,
16	viewed all the surveillance videos and determined
17	that 618 Live security broke up a fight between
18	the individual and another individual. They
19	concluded from the video surveillance that
20	security did not hit the victim.
21	Now, I have an exhibit to go along with
22	this, which is Incident 51, a DVD.
23	MR. MILLER: Let's put evidence in
24	through a witness.
25	MR. HALBROOKS: You know, in the past

1	the attorneys have waited until you asked them
2	for I'm not sure who I'm appearing before. I
3	know, when we get to court, I'll be with the City
4	attorney
5	MR. MILLER: Mr. Chair, we have to lay
6	a foundation.
7	CHAIRMAN BOHL: No, no, no.
8	Mr. Miller, you're jumping the gun. You are
9	jumping the gun, sir. I am going to ask you,
10	despite the fact that you are an Assistant City
11	Attorney, to direct yourself through the Chair
12	and the Chair will acknowledge you. That is the
13	second time I've asked to do that, sir, please.
14	At this point gather the amount of
15	foundation. Impllowing him to continue at this
16	point, and we will have to do that.
17	Right now it is not even evidence.
18	Because there has to be a motion before this
19	committee, we have to lay a foundation for that.
20	I'm going to allow him to establish that. Please
21	do not interrupt, sir. Thank you.
22	Please go ahead, sir.
23	MR. HALBROOKS: Thank you. This is a
24	video surveillance from outside the club on
25	October 17th at 2 o'clock in the morning, an hour

after the individual who indicated blacked out 1 2 after being beaten by security, woke up at St. Mary's and didn't know how he got there. 3 So there is video of the individual on 4 5 the videotape, taken and kept in a chain of command by individuals at 618 Live. Mr. Merado 6 7 provided -- brought it here himself, provided it. 8 And it clearly shows the individual talking to 9 police officers and walking around an hour after he was escorted from the club. 10 11 CHAIRMAN BOHL: (Is that something, if view it right now, that 12 we put it in and were 13 we would see it instantly at the very beginning  $\mathcal{I}$ s this something we'd have 14 here with a timer or to fish through for half an hour or an hour or 15 whatever else? 16 MR. HALBROOKS: No, having been a 17 veteran of these, I think it's very short. But I 18 can't -- I don't know if I can tell what you can 19 20 see. I know what I can see up close, but I think 21 you'll be able to see very clearly. 22 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Is there a desire to 23 play this here, briefly? And then we'll have a 24 motion by Alderman Kovac. 25 Mr. Chair, before the ALDERMAN COGGS:

1	motion?
2	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Before the motion,
3	Alderman Coggs.
4	ALDERMAN COGGS: I know now that, you
5	know, Mr. Halbrooks' response wasn't timed
6	because it was considered his response to police.
7	So, if we show this video, will this be counted
8	against time or will it not?
9	CHAIRMAN BOHL: I'm going to
10	allow it usually, we provide a minute or two.
11	If we allow the minute or two to go here, it
12	would be faster than our depating the issue for
13	five minutes. I just -
14	ALDERMAN COCGS: I think there's some
15	inconsistency there. I don't know another case
16	where we let the video play and didn't use the
17	time.
18	MR. HALBROOKS: This is in direct
19	response to the police report. And, you're
20	right, it would have been done.
21	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Kovac, is
22	there a motion to make this video provided here
23	part of our official record of the proceeding?
24	ALDERMAN KOVAC: Yes.
25	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Are there any

1	objections to that motion?
2	(No response.)
3	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Hearing none, so
4	ordered. We'll see a minute or two here. I
5	mean, if it starts at the point where we don't
6	have to stop and we're dragging and looking for
7	it here, we're going to pull the plug on that
8	one. It will be part of the evidence for
9	whatever is not witnessed here.
10	(The video was played.)
11	Mr. Halbrooks, is there any sound?
12	MR. HALBROOKS: No. This is just the
13	outside surveillance and the individual will come
14	walking. Here be comes, the guy with his pants
15	down closer to his knees.
16	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Who comes?
17	MR. HALBROOKS: This is at 2 o'clock.
18	This was an hour after he was escorted for the
19	fight where he says he was beaten inside the
20	club.
21	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Mr. Chair, who says
22	so? Who's
23	CHAIRMAN BOHL: If I may one moment,
24	Alderman Bauman. How do we know that this is,
25	first off, the witness? And, two, how do we know

1 the time? Because -- it's just going to be your 2 contention that it's the witness in question here and that this is the appropriate time? 3 4 MR. HALBROOKS: If you -- that's the 5 difficulty of asking me those questions. want, I could do that during a later part, I 6 7 could certainly ask; but here comes the 8 individual again. And, again, this is at two --9 this is at closing time because you can see all the people come walking out and here he still 10 11 comes -- and there he is. ( While the club is letting out, he's still hanging around there. 12 13 ALDERMAN BANKAN: Is this some kind of 14 Could heat last use a pointer who he claims this person is on this video, which is 15 16 almost comical? What person? 17 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Bauman, he 18 stated initially, one -- there were just two individuals, that he was one individual with the 19 20 pants down. Mr. Halbrooks. 21 22 Thank you. MR. HALBROOKS: Just one 23 statement on that. That video was shown to the 24 police and that's why -- nothing -- That's why, 25 when the police indicated that, when they did

1	their investigation, that's why nothing happened
2	to the club because the person clearly did not
3	get his eye cut open and bleeding inside the club
4	given that this was taken an hour later.
5	Again, if you want further information
6	on that, firsthand testimony is available.
7	So most except for a couple were
8	self-initiated by the Ladybug Club, and we would
9	hope that the Committee would take that into
10	consideration down the line. We stand ready to
11	hear from the objectors. $\bigcap$
12	CHAIRMAN BOHT: Nx. Matado (phonetic).
13	MR. HALBROOKS: Merado.
14	CHAIRMAN BOML: Mr. Merado, have you
15	been previous worn?
16	MR. MERADO: In conjunction with
17	everyone else here, yes.
18	NICHOLAS MERADO, having first affirmed
19	to testify to the truth, the whole truth and
20	nothing but the truth, testified as follows:
21	* * * *
22	EXAMINATION
23	BY CHAIRMAN BOHL:
24	Q State your name and address for the record.
25	A Nicholas Merado, 2747 South 74th Street.

1	Q	Just in response to the video portion here, how
2		is it that the determination or at least the
3		allegation being made here, that this was the
4		gentleman that was in question? How is it that
5		you may know that this was the gentleman in
6		question?
7	A	I do know. I do know. The police department
8		identified him. Once they were done with their
9		investigation outside, they came in and said:
10		Oh, there he is. That's why we saved this little
11		excerpt just in case this came up later on in
12		testimony.
13		So the victim wa or the person who
14		was complaining about us who woke up at
15		St. Mary's, was brought to our attention by the
16		police department and they identified him on the
17		video. We have 24 surveillance cameras. We've
18		got a clear picture of him with the police
19		assistance from that angle. So they identified
20		him for us and we happened to save it just in
21		case it came up today.
22	Q	Just as a follow-up to that, how is it that your
23		determination is that this was at 2 o'clock?
24	А	Because on our computer it didn't relay in
25		taping it to the DVD player it is synchronized

1	in time. We have a state-of-the-art surveillance
1	In time. We have a state-of-the-art surveillance
2	system, as you'll probably see later. We knew it
3	was exactly at 2:08.
4	ALDERMAN COGGS: Mr. Chair.
5	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Coggs.
6	ALDERMAN COGGS: Just a point of
7	clarity. So that was shown to rebut what?
8	Because, as I read 51, 8, the police concede that
9	they were showed the video and it was shown in
10	the video security did not hit him. So we saw
11	that video for to rebut what.
12	MR. HALBROOKS: The victim's story.
13	ALDERMAN COCCS: Oh.
14	MR. HALBROOKS: Someone says I was at
15	618 and it get into a police report which then
16	gets into a PA-33 which then gets into this and
17	so there's this whole graphic story of this guy
18	getting beaten with a baton; and then you get to
19	the end, and then it says it didn't happen. And
20	then we thought we'd prove it to you.
21	So I don't think you should consider
22	Item 51 for anything other than, you know, what
23	it's worth at this point, which is that a guy
24	claimed he was beaten up. If you want those
25	claims, go to the club next door where they don't

1	have video surveillance because you're not going
2	to get away with it at Club 618.
3	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Any other questions by
4	the Committee at this time?
5	(No response.)
6	CHAIRMAN BOHL: We're going to hear
7	from individuals who are here to testify. Raise
8	your hands to be sworn to testify in this matter,
9	either in favor or opposed, any way, shape or
10	form.
11	Swear them in. $\mathcal{M}$ Hands raised, please.
12	THE CLERK: you solemnly affirm
13	under the pains and panalty of perjury in the
14	State of Wisconsin that the testimony you are
15	about to give is the truth, the whole truth and
16	nothing but the truth?
17	THE WITNESSES IN UNISON: I do. Yes.
18	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Committee's procedure
19	is to hear from individuals who are here who are
20	opposed to the license first. What I would ask
21	is that individuals who are here to testify who
22	are opposed are in the front row, so that we can
23	take you in order. Otherwise, if you are here in
24	support, we would ask that the front row be
25	relinquished here at this point and that

individuals here in opposition would begin to 1 2 line up. 3 I believe that the police commander for the First District has limitations on time so 4 we'll hear from him first here, so we will hear 5 from him first here, so Captain Basting, you've 6 7 already been sworn in. If you could please, 8 acknowledge yourself into the record. 9 STEVE BASTING, having first affirmed to testify the truth, the whole truth and nothing 10 but the truth, testified as follows: 11 12 L STATEMENT 13 DIRECT TESTIMON BY CART BASTING: 14 Good morning, 15 everyone. Π'ħ ve Basting. I'm captain of the First District which includes the North Water 16 Street area and Club 618 Live. 17 The police department is taking a 18 position of nonrenewal in this matter. 19 20 MR. HALBROOKS: Objection. There is 21 no -- The objections are -- time is over with. 22 The police issued their report, and I would 23 object to their coming to the table now without 24 notice to the applicant and objecting. If he 25 wants to state things based on the notice, but

that is not proper, given that Sgt. McGillis did not file his proper objection that he does when the police department objects.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: That will be -- your objection to that will be duly noted. The police department -- if the captain through his testimony indicates that he is here on behalf of the police department through the chief of police, to fully state that, so be that.

CAPTAIN BASTING: Thank you, Mr. Chair. While the department is taking a position of nonrenewal, I would like to acknowledge all the work that Mr. Manier has done while I've been the commander of First District since back on May 16th.

The gentleman is on scene every night that the establishment is open. He's got an extensive internal and now external video system. He has a database of all of his customers and has assisted us with that database when we're looking for suspects. He has a security group of individuals that actually have a roll call prior to the beginning of their shift every night. He has on occasion even closed early when he sees things that he doesn't like and knows from his

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experience they're going to turn into trouble, he will close early, which assists us. He has on many occasions, and I've got my night shift commander here, actually stood side-by-side with my night shift commander and to work in disbursing his customer base and the acts of disorder that are going on.

Couple things do disturb me. He has armed security. It's the only nightclub downtown that does have armed security. Mr. Manjee also now is licensed to carry of firearm as a security officer and has on occasion carried firearm down I'll be on Club 618. **x**eal honest with everybody, guns downtown. Bad things I just don't even wear happen when we have security officers that don't have the level of training in law enforcement carry guns in a nightclub setting, and we've seen and you have all seen on your committee what has happened in the past with that.

I am tasked with supplying a safe environment downtown to where the VFW convention wants to come back again, the 20,000 conventioneers that come into our city, the 10,000 members of Northwestern Mutual Life that come to our city and spend a lot of money and

1 create jobs for us. 2 We all know that whatever goes on, even 3 if it's limited to a nightclub, what we have coming out in the newspaper the next day is man 4 5 gets shot downtown, another shooting downtown. MR. HALBROOKS: Objection. 6 7 nothing in the record to talk about shooting. 8 That is so inappropriate. 9 ALDERMAN BAUMAN: I hope I can object to his witnesses. 10 11 CHAIRMAN BOHL: (That objection, I will indicate, I'm hoping that you stick to the record 12 of Club 618 rather 13 **K** get into general platitudes. 14 BASTING: Yes, sir. 15 I will. That certainly is a concern of mine. As a 16 commander now since May, I've identified a couple 17 of issues and Club 618 has been an issue. 18 will be honest that the club next door is also 19 20 becoming an issue. So much to the point where I 21 have four officers on overtime assigned to that 22 block; and, while we have seen a dramatic 23 decrease as we've all been talking about here 24 this morning and I think a lot of that has to do 25 with the partnership that we both have, that

disorder continues. 1 I've spent upwards of \$15,000 since 2 3 June 3rd in trying to keep a lid on what's going on down in the 600 block of North Water Street. 4 5 My night shift commander has also taken some steps. We have gone and cut back on our staffing 6 7 at the jail for half of a shift so he can bring extra officers out on the street to help manage 8 9 what's going on with these general acts of disorder. 10 11 I guess in -- in closing, again, the police department's position is that of 12 nonrenewal, although we do knowledge all the work 13 that Mr. Manjeethas done. 14 It has been extensive, and I thank has for that. 15 CHAIRMAN BOHL: 16 Thank you, Captain. Questions by the Committee. 17 ALDERMAN HAMILTON: Mr. Chair. 18 19 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Hamilton. \* \* \* \* \* 20 21 EXAMINATION 22 BY ALDERMAN HAMILTON: 23 I have to ask this because I think we have to 24 just be clear on the basis of -- of the decision 25 of -- you know, if you -- if you can be?

1	A	Sure.
2	Q	Because your discussion of the operator in the
3		club was I mean that was actually a
4		compliment?
5	А	And that's the truth. He really has. He's
6		stepped up to the plate.
7	Q	And one of the things that we at this committee
8		tries to encourage, just to try to make sure that
9		the operator of the facility is not contributing
10		to the disorder that's that's coming from the
11		operation.
12		And it seems through your testimony,
13		that that the way that they operate, they're
14		not contributing to the disorder.
15	А	That's correct to, they are not contributing.
16	Q	And so the basis of the objection would be
17		would you it would be patrons outside of the
18		club?
19	А	Yes.
20	Q	Or and and I guess from the from the
21		testimony, is there anything else that the
22		operator can do to address the issues that are
23		occurring outside of the establishment, or are
24		they of the manner that it's beyond the control
25		of the operator?

You know, I think, Alderman, you've hit it right on the head. Mr. Manjee has at certain points even gone probably a lot further than I would like him. We understand that the cruising issue and we've all seen plenty of video on cruising. He has taken steps to go out and he will actually have his security officers go out and start directing traffic. He's very proactive.

As you know, we've got a very large police district now downtown. And my officers are spread throughout, and we also have policing that we need to do throughout the district. So he does. He goes my His security officers actually go down block or two, where most securities at averns will push everybody out and close the door and say, you know what, it didn't happen in my establishment. Mr. Manjee's security will go down the street and around the corner to assist any people to go home.

To be honest with everybody here, at this stage of my life, I'm at home on Saturday night and I'm praying it's going to rain. That's the point I have now, that I'm so afraid that something's going to happen and it's going to affect the perception of downtown during the day

1		that people will not want to come to our city and
2		spend money.
3		CHAIRMAN BOHL: Other questions by the
4		Committee?
5		(No response.)
6		CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Halbrooks, do you
7		have questions of the captain?
8		MR. HALBROOKS: Yeah, thank you. Thank
9		you, Captain, for your kind words. I know it
10		means a lot to Mr. Manjee and Mr. Merado.
11		* * * * * 1
12		CROSS-EXAMENATION
13		BY MR. HALBROOKS:
14	Q	I realize your bands are tied with respect to
15		nonrenewal statement, and I presume that does
16		come from the chief, correct?
17	А	I represent the chief; that's correct.
18		ALDERMAN BAUMAN: But you reached that,
19		also, independently.
20		CAPTAIN BASTING: It's true; but,
21		Mr. Halbrooks, I also came to that conclusion
22		myself.
23		BY MR. HALBROOKS:
24	Q	You did?
25	A	Yes. I represent the chief of police here, but

1		it's also my position for nonrenewal.
2	Q	What incidents, what activities caused you to
3		recommend nonrenewal?
4	А	The general disorder that
5	Q	No, no, specifically, what what When you
6		say I'm here personally asking for nonrenewal,
7		what specific thing causes you to request
8		nonrenewal?
9	A	The continued history and the synopsis that you
10		have there from the police reports and the
11		PA-33's.
12	Q	So about nine of the eteven where 618 contacted
13		your district, we could cut down on the synopsis
14		by not contacting you that would be better?
15	A	No, and what impeeing going on, on the street
16		and what I'm being reported to by my officers on
17		the street.
18	Q	Have you filed any police reports based on what
19		you've seen on the street?
20	A	I have not, no.
21	Q	You want the club to nonrenewed, but you haven't
22		seen fit to make a report on anything that you've
23		seen asking for nonrenewal?
24	A	No, sir, I have not.
25	Q	You have been in 618 when it's been operating in

1		the evening?
2	A	I've been in once when it's operating.
3	Q	And have you been inside Club Bari?
4	А	Once.
5	Q	Now, what can you tell me about the security
6		inside Club Bari?
7	А	Much less than what goes on at 618.
8	Q	Is there any?
9	А	I'm sorry?
10	Q	Is there any security?
11	А	I think they would call some of their I think
12		they have bouncers for security in there.
13	Q	But not out on the street?
14	A	Not on the street no.
15	Q	Now, I understand from their application process,
16		Club Bari, that they play Frank Sinatra music,
17		things like that for married couples to go in
18		there. That's what you heard when you were in
19		there?
20	A	That's not what I heard when I was in there.
21	Q	Can you tell the Committee what you heard?
22		CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Halbrooks
23		MR. HALBROOKS: I'm getting to a point.
24		CHAIRMAN BOHL: No, and I understand;
25		but, you know, you raised a point about general

1	platitudes and trying to stay focused to the club
2	at hand.
3	MR. HALBROOKS: Oh, these are not
4	platitudes.
5	CHAIRMAN BOHL: I understand where
6	you're going, but you're asking the captain to
7	address a club other than what is before us here.
8	MR. HALBROOKS: No, I'm only addressing
9	it with regard to the hearing last year and the
10	captain's testimony last year that this was an
11	isolated club. So I have (now Alderman Kovac's
12	testimony about how
13	CHAIRMAN BONK: The testimony last year
14	is not what is before us and is not under
15	consideration whis body at this time.
16	MR. HALBROOKS: Mr. Chairman, last
17	year
18	CHAIRMAN BOHL: I don't want to focus
19	on last year. I don't think that you want us to
20	open up and reconsider all the items from last
21	year either.
22	MR. HALBROOKS: I don't. I want to
23	talk about this year. And I want to talk about
24	why
25	CHAIRMAN BOHL: And that's what I'm

1		asking you to do, is focus on this year. And
2		focus on the testimony that he's provided and
3		your rebuttal of the testimony that he's provided
4		strictly here today.
5		BY MR. HALBROOKS:
6	Q	When the customers from first of all, does
7		Club Bari and 618 let out at the same time?
8	A	On many occasions, yes.
9	Q	And are the customers easily distinguishable,
10		this Frank Sinatra, older married couples and the
11		customers at 618?
12	A	They're not distinguishable
13	Q	They are not distinguishable?
14	A	Mr. Halbrooks if I may at this point, I have
15		also started the evocation process for Club Bari
16		as well.
17	Q	Need any help?
18		ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Sure.
19		BY MR. HALBROOKS:
20	Q	So you you are you're suggesting that when
21		an individual leaves Club Bari and leaves
22		618 Live, walks down to the corner of Michigan,
23		turns east and goes towards that parking lot,
24		that someone on the corner of Broadway and
25		Michigan, is there any way to identify whether

they're coming from 618 or Club Bari? 1 2 I believe, no. 3 And why -- when you say they're not 4 distinguishable, what do you mean? 5 (No response.) What's the non -- what's the -- what are we 6 7 talking about here? They -- they look like a nightclub group. They 8 Α 9 don't carry signs: I'm from 618 or I just went to Club Bari. No, they -- they look the same. 10 11 If the customers from 618 (and Club Bari went to 12 their cars on North Water Street bars, would you 13 be able to identify the m there? Possibly, no. We have a good mix up on North 14 Water Street and 15 possibly, no. 16 So, when you say we have a good mix on Water Street, we have a good mix at Club Bari and 17 618 Live? 18 On most nights, no. 19 Α 20 Q All right. This for me is a behavior issue, strictly 21 22 behavior. The behaviors that are going on --23 I didn't ask a question. 24 THE REPORTER: I'm sorry; I didn't 25 hear.

1		MR. HALBROOKS: I said I didn't ask a
2		question.
3		ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Well, finish your
4		answer.
5		CAPTAIN BASTING: For me, it's a
6		behavior issue; it's not a race issue.
7	BY M	R. HALBROOKS:
8	Q	How many individuals at 618 are armed?
9	А	How many individuals at 618 are armed?
10	Q	You testified that your problem was that they're
11		armed. How many are armed?
12	А	I have an issue tat they are armed. How many
13		guns
14	Q	How many are armed
15	A	I'd have to refer to my licensed premise officer
16		here. I know they have armed security that drive
17		around and Mr. Manjee's armed as well, on some
18		occasions.
19	Q	So the only individuals that you're aware of are
20		those two? I'm asking you.
21	A	Yes.
22	Q	That's fine. I'll stop there. And were they
23		armed before Club Bari opened, or did that just
24		start when they opened?
25	A	I believe that started when they shortly after

1		they opened again back in June or July.
2	Q	And Club Bari was open at that point?
3	A	Yes.
4	Q	When you go look around at Club Bari, you're
5		armed, right?
6	A	Yes, sir. I am.
7	Q	Would you be willing to join me there unarmed
8		some night?
9	A	(No response).
10	Q	Yes?
11	A	Sure.
12	Q	Okay. Are you aware of a Rolice Detective
13		Carmen Rogers (phonetic)?
14	A	I know the name
15		MR. MALDROOKS: May I show the witness
16		a
17		CHAIRMAN BOHL: Is this something
18		relating to either the Captain's testimony or
19		something that came out of the First District
20		because I don't want to rely on Captain Basting
21		to guess as to some detective's investigation
22		that was independent of something that he has
23		full knowledge of.
24		MR. HALBROOKS: No, it dovetails into
25		the testimony that he gave, actually.

1	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. Could you
2	identify what you are speaking of?
3	MR. HALBROOKS: I'll pass it up.
4	CHAIRMAN BOHL: And then why don't you
5	lay a foundation here for the Committee as to
6	what you're addressing here.
7	MR. HALBROOKS: Okay. As soon as he
8	finishes his reading.
9	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Well, I don't know that
10	I'm going to want you to start going into
11	questioning him if I don't $\!$
12	doing it for.
13	MR. HALBROOKS: The captain testified
14	regarding the assistance of other matters in the
15	district that provided by Club 618 Live, and
16	I just wanted to ask him if this is the type of
17	assistance that he was referring to.
18	CAPTAIN BASTING: Yes, it is.
19	BY MR. HALBROOKS:
20	Q And are you familiar with this incident?
21	A No, I'm not.
22	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Could you lay a
23	foundation for this body here?
24	MR. HALBROOKS: That's what I'm trying
25	to do.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: What is -- first off, 1 2 why don't you tell us what this is that you're referring to, that you handed the captain? 3 MR. HALBROOKS: All right. This is an 4 5 E-mail from Police Detective Carmen Rogers from the sensitive crimes division, late power shift, 6 7 expressing to Mr. Merado, who's seated here: 8 For appreciation for your security 9 officer helping me out with my traffic stop on the morning of September 23rd, 2010. This was 10 11 when the male in the van was driving the wrong 12 direction and then attempted to flee the scene after I activated 13 emergency lights and sirens. 14 That was very brave 15 such a compromising position. As I'm sure you are aware, we police officers are stretched 16 fairly thin with all the calls for service, 17 especially on the weekends. If I hadn't received 18 the assistance from your employee, I would have 19 20 been there alone. 21 That was the second time this year that 22 I received help during a stop from your 23 employees. The gentleman stated that he was 24 coming from the south side and was driving around 25 looking for girls. He was also a wanted subject

1		which is why he was attempting to leave the area.
2		You and your security officers really put in
3		extra work to help in keeping the downtown as
4		safe as possible. I just wanted to extend my
5		appreciation to you and your employees once
6		again. You are appreciated despite the negative
7		stigma that surrounds you and your business.
8		CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Kovac will
9		move to make that part of the official record in
10		this proceeding.
11		Hearing no objection, that's so
12		ordered.
13		BY MR. HATBROOKS:
14	Q	Captain, that still bind of activity you were
15		referring to, correct?
16	A	That's correct.
17	Q	And the other clubs in that South Water Street
18		don't provide you that kind of assistance, do
19		they?
20	A	No, they don't.
21	Q	And so I also wanted to ask about an
22		Officer Klein (phonetic). Is that person in your
23		shop?
24	A	Yes.
25	Q	And Lalinski (phonetic), I believe, is a female?

1	A	Yes.
2	Q	Did you dispatch them recently to come and meet
3		with the with Mr. Manjee, Mr. Merado of
4		618 Live regarding an investigation where they
5		were being set up by the neighboring club,
6		Club Bari?
7	A	I I dispatch officers to clubs for
8		investigations all the time. Not that they
9		particularly were being set up. I'm not familiar
10		with that.
11	Q	You're not familiar with the officers coming and
12		talking to to the two gentlemen in between us?
13	A	I send officers all the time to different clubs
14		regarding many different issues.
15	Q	What I'm asking is: you don't either don't
16		recall or you don't remember, or this one was
17		something that was happening at a lower level?
18	A	When you say being set up by Club Bari, that does
19		not remind me of anything.
20	Q	Okay. All right. Now, you were here when the
21		synopsis was read?
22	A	Correct.
23	Q	Are there other police officers who are going to
24		testify today?
25	A	Not unless you require them to.

1	Q	Which one of the eleven can you testify about of
2		your own personal knowledge either regarding
3		Sergeant MacGillis's comments or my comments
4		regarding the police report?
5	А	The only one I could testify regarding my
6		personal knowledge would the pepper spray
7		incident. I was on my way home working late and
8		I responded to the final scene over in front of
9		Riverside on Wisconsin Avenue and did hear the
10		people say, the victims of this, that they were
11		at Club Bari prior to this. That's the only
12		thing I can testify to Ox excuse me. I mean
13		Club 618. I'm sorry
14	Q	No, you were doing fine.
15	А	I know, you - 610.
16	Q	Seriously, I but you didn't investigate
17		whether they were at the club?
18	А	No. No, I did not.
19	Q	You did have officers go and check?
20	А	Yes.
21	Q	And you don't have any reason to dispute the
22		follow-up that the officers did?
23	А	No, I do not.
24	Q	So, with regard to all the challenges that you
25		heard me make, understanding that the

1		Alderman Bauman is talking about hearsay, and
2		we're going to turn in a second to hearsay.
3		But everything's been hearsay. There
4		is nobody here that can provide, from the police
5		or the City side, any firsthand knowledge for any
6		of the items that we challenged here today.
7	А	I could supply two officers a lieutenant and
8		an officer excuse me regarding the general
9		disorder that goes on
10	Q	No, no
11	А	but not the specific. $\bigcap$
12		CHAIRMAN BOHT: one at a time.
13		MR. HALB <b>ROOKS:</b> I apologize.
14		BY ME HALBROOKS:
15	Q	I'm only asking about the 11 hearsay items. Is
16		there anybody here that, if challenged, each and
17		every one, is there anybody here that can testify
18		firsthand other than what you've just provided
19		us?
20	A	No, sir.
21	Q	So, with regard to the Riverside one, is that
22		where the person was in the bushes over by the
23		Riverside?
24	А	No, they weren't. They were in vehicles, when I
25		responded to the scene.

1	Q	So you didn't see anybody get pushed in the
2		bushes or any bushes at all?
3	A	No, sir.
4		MR. HALBROOKS: Nothing further.
5		CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you. Thank you,
6		Captain. Next witness, please.
7		DONALD ARENSON, having first affirmed
8		to testify the truth, the whole truth and nothing
9		but the truth, testified as follows:
10		* * * *
11		DIRECT TESTIMONIAL STATEMENT
12		BY MR. ARENSON: My name is Donald
13		Arenson, A-r-e-n-sorn. I live at 608 North
14		Broadway.
15		I'm avor of nonrenewal for this
16		bar, 618. I have personally witnessed numerous
17		issues that have all been brought to bear here
18		with respect to loitering, loud noise, swearing,
19		urination by both male and female, excessive
20		traffic and police on duty almost every night
21		they are open with very few exceptions.
22		Since the revocation in March, shortly
23		thereafter, in 60-day period
24		MR. HALBROOKS: Objection.
25		CHAIRMAN BOHL: I don't even know what

1 you're objecting to here, Mr. Halbrooks. 2 continue here. 3 MR. HALBROOKS: I'm objecting to the 4 revocation in March. There was no revocation in 5 March. MR. ARENSON: Suspension, pardon me; I 6 7 stand corrected. With respect to both 8 Mr. Manjee's efforts and the highly-skilled 9 efforts of Mr. Halbrooks, the fact of the matter is that nothing has changed down here. 10 11 Has it increased because of this other I can't answer that. To me, it's all the 12 13 same, all run togethe I don't even know when the other bar peried 14 I do go over there and see yn front of 618 late at night. 15 excessive people We have provided a videotape to the police 16 department relative to these various issues we 17 have. 18 But the most alarming thing for me, as 19 20 a substantial taxpayer and a citizen, resident and businessman of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, is the 21 22 fact that there's armed quards at this place, 23 people carrying open firearms and, also, in the 24 parking lot, the attendants have to have guns. 25 have seen them. They carry guns to protect

1	themselves. This is totally insane.
2	I have no other thing to say. It's
3	pretty evident by the other issues that we've got
4	in place here, with both the videotape and the
5	police report. Be happy to answer any questions.
6	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you. Any
7	questions by committee?
8	(No response.)
9	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Halbrooks.
10	MR. HALBROOKS: Thank you.
11	* * * * * 1
12	CROSS-EXAMEDATION
13	BY MR. HALRROOKS:
14	Q I read your E-mails which were attached to the
15	notice and Hold on one second, please.
16	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Halbrooks, I just
17	want to remind you, however, that may be that
18	may, in some way, shape or form, serve as a basis
19	for triggering a neighborhood objection. That
20	was not made an official part of the record and
21	that in and of itself is not considered by the
22	Committee as long as anything is not specifically
23	testified to by Mr. Arenson. So, in some way,
24	shape or form, what I'm indicating is you're
25	entering into the record by bringing this forward

1		something that isn't into the record.
2		MR. HALBROOKS: Oh, I'm sorry. I
3		thought they were attached to the notice.
4		CHAIRMAN BOHL: Individually, those
5		items either have to be read into the record or
6		made part of the record. They're not.
7		BY MR. HALBROOKS:
8	Q	Mr. Arenson, you sent a number of E-mails to
9		Alderman Bauman in the fall of 2010?
10	А	I don't remember the specific dates. Yes, I send
11		Alderman Bauman E-mails f <b>f</b> equently.
12	Q	And you indicated that on that and so your
13		problems were traffic and you your concern is
14		that the police are using deciding to use
15		their resources to block the traffic and to
16		manage the traffic over there, correct?
17	A	Yes, some of it, yes.
18	Q	Now, when you say that the you don't
19		You're under oath so I'll take your word that you
20		don't know anything about Club Bari?
21	А	No.
22	Q	You, obviously, must have guessed that the
23		testimony that I elicited from the Captain was
24		with regard to your statements about individuals
25		coming from Club 618 Live?

Well, I just -- yes. I don't know anything about 1 Α 2 Club Bari. 3 So you heard the -- So you don't know whether the individuals that you're seeing are coming 4 from Club Bari or Club 618 Live? 5 6 No, I do not. 7 So the individuals that you've testified about, you see them -- You can't see either Club Bari 8 9 or 618 Live from your apartment? No, from my building, no. 10 11 You just see them coming open, coming east on 12 Michigan to Broadway? 13 Α Yes. quite a discussion about 14 Now, last year we o you remember that? 15 the parking lati 16 Of course. Α And the result was that those armed guards you 17 18 talked about are not anyone related to 618 Live, 19 are they? 20 Α I have no idea. They work for the -- I talked to 21 the manager of CPS Parking and asked him about 22 the armed quards. 23 Right. But what I'm asking you is those guards 24 are not 618 guards, are they? 25 Α No.

1	Q	So your complaints are about the parking lot
2		people?
3	A	Not necessarily. I'm concerned about the armed
4		guards at the bar.
5	Q	Who are the armed guards at the bar?
6	A	Well, I've been told that Mr. Merado carries a
7		gun.
8	Q	No, no, no. I'm asking you: Who carries a gun
9		in your own personal knowledge?
10	A	Personal knowledge, I've seen only the people at
11		the parking lot. $\bigcap$
12	Q	So you don't have any personal knowledge of
13		anybody carrying a gun!
14	A	That's not true Linst said I saw the people in
15		the parking l
16	Q	Now, you aren't you aren't necessarily against
17		these young people having fun downtown?
18	A	Absolutely not. I love it.
19	Q	And you are not what you don't want is you
20		don't want traffic on Broadway?
21	A	It's not true.
22	Q	What do you mean it's not true?
23	A	I don't want chaos and uncontrolled behavior.
24		The patrons of these of this bar or whoever
25		else is on Water that you said; it's out of

1		control.
2	Q	What's out of control?
3	A	The conduct of the people.
4	Q	I thought you indicated that it was the police
5		were there and there were lots of police?
6	A	There are police there. Without the police, it
7		would be more chaotic.
8	Q	I see. And so isn't it isn't it your
9		testimony that you have previously stated that if
10		the police just blocked off Broadway, that you
11		would be fine with that? \( \)
12	A	No, I never said that If did, I retract it.
13	Q	And, when you talk about the young people that
14		are coming from Water Street or wherever, moving
15		down east, what is your impression of those
16		people?
17	A	Be more specific, please.
18		CHAIRMAN BOHL: I don't
19		Mr. Halbrooks, I don't believe that that was part
20		of his testimony here today.
21		BY MR. HALBROOKS:
22	Q	Well, who's causing the chaos?
23	A	Bar patrons that come off of Water Street.
24	Q	And, when you say they're causing chaos, how are
25		they acting? What are they doing?

1	А	Loud, vandalism. I saw people climb and break
2		trees, urination in the street by both male and
3		female. I've witnessed it myself. And fights,
4		arguments, and traffic, it's horrible.
5		Commercial traffic, if you want to get by late at
6		night, you can't get through there.
7	Q	But you heard testimony earlier about State
8		troopers down there, right?
9	А	Yes.
10	Q	And there was a lot of construction going on.
11		For instance, I think ClyMourn's shut down now
12		for construction right nows
13	A	I don't think so.
14	Q	But the police were diverting traffic just
15		because of the just the police were deciding
16		where to divert traffic and how they were doing
17		it, weren't they?
18	A	Not always. There were some other people that
19		appeared to be security people that would put the
20		barricades up, park their cars until the police
21		would come.
22	Q	So but what I'm trying to understand is: is your
23		objection to how the police are barricading the
24		traffic and where they're directing it?
25	A	No, I have no problem with the police.

1	Q	You have no problem with the police. What
2		they're doing is fine. You don't want them to
3		alter what they're doing at all?
4	A	Why should the police have to monitor the bar?
5	Q	What I'm asking is: Are the police there to
6		monitor traffic for just general downtown traffic
7		or are they there because of the bar?
8	A	Because of the bar.
9	Q	And not because of the construction?
10	A	I don't know where you're referring to
11		construction. I lived there for 25 years. I
12		don't know what construction is you're talking
13		about. Can you explain that to me?
14		CHAIRMAN BOAL: Mr. Halbrooks, what are
15		we introducing here?
16		MR. HALBROOKS: A DVD.
17		CHAIRMAN BOHL: For what purpose?
18		MR. HALBROOKS: This is a DVD that is a
19		conversation between Mr. Manjee and Mr. Arenson,
20		which was recorded recently, in which Mr. Arenson
21		makes statements directly contradictory to what
22		he just testified to.
23		CHAIRMAN BOHL: In and the
24		foundation is: Who was taping this here?
25		MR. HALBROOKS: Mr. Manjee.

1	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Was Mr. Arenson aware
2	of this taping?
3	MR. ARENSON: No.
4	CHAIRMAN BOHL: And how long ago and
5	when?
6	MR. HALBROOKS: No, but there's
7	that's not illegal.
8	CHAIRMAN BOHL: I just
9	MR. HALBROOKS: I presume, given what
10	he says, he wasn't aware he was being taped and I
11	guess you'll guess that, to, when you hear it.
12	CHAIRMAN BOHT: And when was this
13	taking place and what was the nature of the
14	meeting
15	MR. HALDROOKS: Okay.
16	CHAIRMAN BOHL: and that's the
17	foundation.
18	MR. HALBROOKS: Sure. And
19	understanding that in in terms of moving
20	evidence, that I wouldn't necessarily be moving
21	it until I finished all of that and that would
22	obviously have to take Mr. Manjee's testimony to
23	dovetail with it. I don't think you could
24	receive it necessarily until he testified and
25	provided all those details.

1	So I think that would have to come
2	later. But I think I can ask Mr. Arenson about
3	his part of the tape right now. So whether or
4	not based on the statements, I'm sure he'll
5	agree it was him and and then we can finish
6	the foundation later. But the foundation is it's
7	a taped conversation between Mr. Manjee and
8	Mr. Arenson.
9	CHAIRMAN BOHL: And that doesn't help
10	me. Was it two years ago? Was it one month ago?
11	MR. HALBROOKS: (It was on September
12	4th, 2010, at approximately 9:30.
13	CHAIRMAN BONK: In the morning, at
14	night?
15	MR. HALDROOKS: P.M.
16	CHAIRMAN BOHL: And the nature was
17	Mr. Arenson approached Mr. Manjee?
18	MR. HALBROOKS: Yes.
19	CHAIRMAN BOHL: And is there desire to
20	take this in as evidence here by the Committee?
21	ALDERMAN KOVAC: Is this a phone call?

12	Alderman Hamilton will move to make the disk
13	is this the correct date on which it occurred?

15	MR. HALBROOKS: Yes.
16	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Are there any
17	objections to proceeding?
18	(No response.)
19	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Hearing none, so
20	ordered.
21	MR. HALBROOKS: We attempted to put the
22	transcript with the video.
23	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Do you have a copy of
24	the transcript here?
25	MR. HALBROOKS: Yeah.

1	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Mr. Chair this is

3		here, Mr. Halbrooks.

5		she does before he does.

Something happened, from one of the persons got 15 beat up down in the alley and we were showing all 16 the videos, the footage, you know, from the 17 civilian. 18 Now, we'll get into that later. But your video 19 Q 20 surveillance camera --21 Which is this one that I wear nightly on my Α 22 uniform always on my shirt. 23 No, I'm talking about the camera at the parking 24 lot. That's what the police wanted to look at? 25 Α Yes.

13		and break trees, those are issues that I have a
14		great problem with My dog wouldn't do what
15		they're doing.
16	Q	But you called them animals, and then you used
17		your dog as an example. But you're indicating
18		that
19		But the examples you gave, you don't
20		have any idea whether they came from whether
21		they came what club they came from or whether
22		they came from a club at all?
23	A	No, I do not.
24	Q	And, in fact, all of the calls that you've made
25		have been in the fall after Club Bari opened,

1		correct?
2	A	No.
3	Q	No? You made other calls before that?
4	A	To the best of my knowledge, whenever there was a
5		problem, I call in or send an E-mail.
6		CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Halbrooks, here's
7		what I have issue with:
8		What Mr. Arenson states to the
9		Committee here today is what this Committee has
10		under consideration. The fact that you start
11		introducing evidence abov€ and beyond, outside
12		whatever other conversations, is not what's
13		before the Committee in which case, that is a
14		waste of the Committee's time.

21	Improvement District. My address is 600 East

23	I'm here today to share with you the
24	mission of the Business Improvement District,
25	No. 21, is to revitalize downtown Milwaukee, to

be focused on providing a secure, safe
environment that is conducive to economic
development. I do want to also indicate that
we're strong proponents of building a strong
nighttime economy. We think it's critically
important for downtown to be an attractive
destination and we are working on initiatives to
help enhance downtown Milwaukee as an attractive
destination and hope that we become a magnet for
successful club and restaurant operators.

I do want to indicate that our board, who represents businesses in downtown Milwaukee, has asked today that you consider not renewing this license.

not, our market research shows us that negative perceptions create negative economic development. This problem location, whether it's Club Bari or Ladybug Club, 618 Live, is becoming a nuisance and has become a nuisance destination. It's a problem area.

I have personally witnessed it in the evening. We have property owners who have witnessed it, unfortunately, who can't leave their businesses for four hours for a public

1		hearing. I know that one manager is here to
2		speak specifically regarding this. But,
3		unfortunately, even with meetings with Mr.
4		Manjee, on numerous occasions where we have said
5		to him, we want this to be successful. It's
6		important for us. The unfortunate situation is,
7		with all the effort and initiatives that Mr.
8		Manjee and the money and the investment he has
9		put into his security, into his identification of
10		his patrons, we are still experiencing problems
11		that are, unfortunately, and nuisance in downtown
12		and have an adverse impact.
13		CHAIRMAN BONK: Thank you. Questions
14		by the Committee?
15		(No response.)
16		CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Halbrooks.

18		CROSS-EXAMINATION
19		BY MR. HALBROOKS:
20	Q	Do you have any specific responses to any of the
21		items in the synopsis that was read?
22	A	No, I do not.
23	Q	When you talked in You gave a lot of vague
24		statements. Are there any specific incidences
25		that you can refer to regarding your statements?

5		conversations about Ladybug Club.
6	Q	And you did have conversations with
7		Alderman Bauman?
8	A	Generally, one conversation about the hearing
9		this morning; and that was it.
10	Q	Why didn't you invite Ladybug to your meeting?
11		UNIDENTIFIED: You don't have to answer
12		that.
13		MS. NICHOLS It's a publically noticed
14		meeting. Tom paytin a reporter from the
15		Journal-Senting was there.
16		MR. HALBROOKS: How did he vote?
17		Withdrawn. I have nothing further.
18		CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you. Next
19		witness, please.
20		JOHN HALVORSON, having first affirmed
21		to testify the truth, the whole truth and nothing
22		but the truth, testified as follows:

24		DIRECT TESTIMONIAL STATEMENT
25		BY MR. HALVORSON:

1	Good morning. My name is
2	John Halvorson. I'm the operations manager for
3	Bartolotta Catering at the Grain Exchange.
4	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Is there an address
5	that you can provide us for that place, please?
6	MR. HALVORSON: I'm sorry.
7	CHAIRMAN BOHL: The address?
8	MR. HALVORSON: Oh, I'm sorry. The
9	address is 225 East Michigan Street.
10	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you.
11	MR. HALVORSON: $\prod$ I'm here today with
12	three areas of concern
13	There's parking lot that is directly
14	located behind the Grain Exchange, the Mackie
15	Building property that is rented to our brides
16	and grooms and our clients; and the parking lot
17	starts to fill at around 10 o'clock at night with
18	patrons from the Ladybug Club. We've had
19	papering of windshields in our parking lot.
20	We've actually had clients who've observed
21	parking in our lot without paying for it and have
22	gotten refunds from CPS for that, directly
23	related to that.
24	I've observed urinating in back of our
25	property as well, and we've had lewd frivolous

1 exchange with patrons and staff regarding these 2 people. 3 Another area of concern is the front 4 door of our property that's located directly on 5 Broadway. I've had to have the doors locked at nine o'clock to prevent people from coming in. 6 7 Our clients actually leave the reception hall to 8 go out and smoke, and they've had interaction 9 with clients up and down the street. About two 10 weeks ago someone was asking for money. 11 And then, final  $\mathbf{N}_{\mathbf{V}}$ , the two o'clock 12 closing, streets are closed police are around 13 regularly and I have sues with my staff leaving afraid. Broken bottles of 14 the property. They'r booze all over out 15 parking lot. I've actually resorted now to having staff leave in pairs, and 16 last weekend someone wouldn't even take the trash 17 18 out. CHAIRMAN BOHL: Questions by committee. 19 20 (No response.) 21 22 EXAMINATION 23 BY CHAIRMAN BOHL: 24 The -- the -- where your parking lot is situated, 25 you said that there was papering. I assume that

	you mean flyers; is that correct?
A	Flyers. Club flyers left underneath the
	windshield wiper.
Q	Was there any specific club or clubs that were
	identified in those flyers?
A	Probably. I don't have physical evidence of it
	today.
Q	Do you have a recollection as to whether any of
	it was 618 or
A	I don't at this time.
Q	And, in terms of the individuals that you've had
	interactions with or witnessed urinating, do you
	have a timeframe as to when that occurred? How
	long ago? Do you recall?
A	Oh, it it's an ongoing occurrence. My my
	shifts at the Grain Exchange are from 2 o'clock
	in the afternoon to 2 o'clock in the morning.

	parking lot at around 10 o'clock at night, and
	I've observed things from between 10 to 2 a.m.

A	We've been on the premise at Grain Exchange for
	two and a half years now, and it's been occurring
	since since our inception there.

1	Q	But the Committee can only consider items in the
2		last year?

4	Q	I just wanted to make certain that items you are
5		detailing are not from two years ago; they're
6		from the last year?
7	А	It's been within the last year.
8	Q	You've personally witnessed them?
9	A	Yes.
10	Q	Now, it's going to be the more difficult
11		question: Given that there are multiple clubs on
12		this street, can you differentiate patrons from
13		one location to another?
14	A	No.
15		CHAIRMAN BOHL: All right. Thank you.
16		Mr. Halbrooks.
17		MR. HALBROOKS: Maybe I can do this
18		short.
19		* * * *
20		CROSS-EXAMINATION
21		BY MR. HALBROOKS:
22	Q	In your entire testimony, do you have any proof
23		that any one of the individuals that you
24		testified about had anything to do with Club 618
25		Live?

1	A	I do not.
2	Q	Who asked you to be here today?
3	А	I came of my own.
4	Q	How did you find out about the meeting?
5	А	Through this notice.
6		MR. HALBROOKS: Nothing further. Thank
7		you.
8		CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you for your
9		testimony, sir. Are there others who are here in
10		opposition? Any others in opposition?
11		(No response.)
12		CHAIRMAN BOHT: All right. We're going
13		to hear from individuals who are here in support
14		of the item.
15		MR. NALDROOKS: Wait. Hold on. Okay.
16		Where are we at in time?
17		CHAIRMAN BOHL: 26 minutes.
18		MR. HALBROOKS: 26 minutes.
19		CHAIRMAN BOHL: And that includes a
20		closing, Mr. Halbrooks.
21		MR. HALBROOKS: What I want to do is
22		have Mr. Merado make a presentation. We'll take
23		a couple of minutes with that. He has a number
24		of things he would like to tell you about.
25		NICHOLAS MERADO, having previously

affirmed to testify the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth testified as follows:

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## DIRECT TESTIMONIAL STATEMENT

## BY MR. MERADO:

I just want to go over a couple of operational things that we've implicated -- or implemented since the last time we met.

As far as our staffing goes and security, as Captain Basting so kindly complimented us on, the walv we operate and the way we train our people and the way we try to identify individuate and assist. hired quite a few security personnel. eliminated some of the people that maybe were not as great. And they've all successfully passed our instructions manuals. We have bi-weekly refresher classes. We have roll call like Captain Basting mentioned. We have about twenty people that we employ every night, and I can certainly provide you with a schedule of their duties whether it be during the night or at the end of the night. Everyone has a specific place to be at a specific time and knows how to react to specific situations and incidents. So I'm

very proud of those guys.

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In addition to that, we have equipment that has been paying dividends since the last time we were here. The last time we were here, we introduced this identification reader to you and we showed you a demonstration. We can do it If you remember, we won't have to. This again. is what every single person coming into the facility must provide us with their ID. put into the reader. A picture of the person is taken simultaneously and Intered into a database. When people who are deemed problematic, we then retrieve their information, make a notation: Person's banned persons did this, person -- we note when some is undesirable to us. So, over the past year, year and a half, this has paid dividends in gathering the database of undesirables, which has minimized the amount of risk factor we have from people coming back and repeating situations or they maybe have done in the past. So that's a pretty cool thing we have there.

In addition to that, we also have a failsafe. We have a secondary identification system. When people come into the club, they

will also give us their ID for a second time. I do have some photos I can give to you to show you how things work. We do have a second photo identification where their ID is downloaded into another database so we have a cross-referencing just in case this goes down.

We have also leased what you've heard before, a mobile surveillance unit that we put in the parking lot on the corner of Wiscon -- excuse me, the corner of Michigan and Broadway. It's called ClearCom. We have photos of that as well. It's a mobile surveillance unit that covers an area that our 24 surveillance units in an around our club cannot get.

We are ery interested in knowing what's going on, on Michigan and Broadway. That seems to be the crux -- one of the cruxes of contention with us. So we've taken to great expense to put this mobile unit on the corner to videotape things that have been going on. So we can identify people that may have caused troubles, whether they're in our club or not, whether their vehicle is a nuisance vehicle so we can identify them, hopefully, and avoid them from coming into our establishment.

This has proven invaluable not only to us but to the Milwaukee Police Department on other situations that have happened in and around that area because we've provided them with videotape of other problems that have happened even -- that has nothing to do with us.

So I have a few pictures of our mobile unit that we put there every night that we're open. It's there before we open, half hour to 45 minutes. And it's there half hour to 45 minutes after everyone has left the parking lot.

MR. HALBROOKS: If I may just quickly, it's a small trailer and a pole goes up and you can see all the way down the street.

MR. MERADO: Right. It's a trailer we tow over there. And the camera goes up 20 to 30 feet. The vantage point is incredible. This is the computer just to show you that we download all of our information in and we save it. So we have that.

We've also purchased a -- Before I get to that, we also have a SBT, Security Building Technologies, video surveillance system, which consists of 24 video cameras, 19 inside and 5 outside, which theoretically reviews or tapes

every inch of the club. As was noted many times in the report read to you, when the police come, we show them these 24 camera angles that Mr. Halbrooks is going to show you now.

MR. HALBROOKS: And this is how you knew that Octavia Map was not on the premises that night.

MR. MERADO: Octavia Map, the young lady who claims to have gotten the six staples and six stitches. Someone had gotten hit that violently, there would have been blood everywhere. We would not have been notified about it six days later. We reviewed the videotape inside and out. We cross-referenced her name in our incoming database, and there was no evidence or no proof of Octavia Map being there that night or an incident.

In addition to the identification reader and the secondary backup reader, we also check the ID's because the ID has to be right.

This will tell you if it's good or not. It won't tell you if the person handing it to you is the same person that's in the picture. We have over a hundred forty-eight ID's right here -- I'm going to pass a little bit -- to show you that

1 these people were identified by our diligent crew 2 and were not allowed to come into our facility. Now, I'm pretty sure these 148 people 3 will have to go out and get another ID, the real 4 5 people. So I just want to show you that we're doing our due diligence to provide --6 7 We purchased a Chevy Impala. This is a 8 mobile vehicle that we have equipped with three 9 cameras that gives a 360-degree view of the car 10 which we just drive around the perimeter of our 11 facility and the perimeter  $\uparrow$  of the neighborhood. 12 We just want to know, if someone's driving a white var 13 **X**d our guy videotapes this white van with people hanging out of the windows, 14 and they happed to notice that those people got 15 out of the white van and are coming into our 16 facility, we want to know that ahead of time so 17 that we can avoid that problem. That's why we 18 have this. 19 20 This is the vehicle, also, that 21 assisted Detective Rogers in detaining that one 22 individual who tried to flee, in addition to 23 another one that wasn't mentioned most recently. 24 So, as you can see, this -- as you can 25 see from the photos, if you have them, it is

equipped with the cameras. We also have a mobile DVR system and everything that we videotape in here we save. We also have a log book that we refer to and jot everything down just in case something was to go out of whack.

We have 11 barricades, and

Mr. Halbrooks will show you an example of how we
stage our customers coming in so that there's not
chaos on our block. That's an example right
there of the sidewalk being clear and everybody
being tight up against the building so
pedestrians can come and go freely, whether they
come to our club or another club on the block or
anywhere else. So that's barricades that we put
out on a nightly asis.

We also have signage. I know signage in the past has been important to everyone. And we have a very, very stringent dress code, which I'm going to show you. We have the gentleman standing next to that sample of the dress code is about six foot six. So we have a seven-foot sign right on the outside of our facility so you can't miss it. In addition to that, we're identifying people in or out of the dress code as they walk up and we have two others, 24-by-36 posted on the

building.

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Another thing we implemented since the last time we were here because it was brought up, is that: Are you telling people or have you told them about the noise and all of that? It's our practice that towards the end of the night, throughout the course of the night, that we remind people: Please, please, be respectful of our neighbors. Please keep it down. Please, you know, do the right thing. And that will show you a secure -- a noise code ordinance on our exit door, which is the one in the middle of the two stainless steel doors Khat everyone will see as they leave, and we put another one on the facing mother 6-to-7-foot sign as of our building. they're heading towards Michigan.

We also -- I didn't bring you the actual sign, but I'm also providing you with a -- with a sign that we have in our foyer that every single person is checked for illegal substances or anything of that nature, every person, regardless. That's posted right inside of the foyer as you're coming in. Everyone, bar none, gets checked.

Those are some of the things that we've

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	been doing. As you see, we we spend a lot of
	our resources on the 25 cameras, the mobile unit,
	the two sets of identification systems, the
	vehicle.
	MR. HALBROOKS: Okay. I just have a
	couple questions for you, if I may.

1		routinely at 1:30, 1:35, depending on how many
2		people are there.
3	Q	So your statement as to the credibility of the
4		police report that people were leaving 618 at
5		that time is what?
6	A	False. Or
7	Q	That's good.
8	A	Yeah.
9	Q	47, the person going out into the street to the
10		bus stop, that was initiated by you guys?
11	A	Yes.
12	Q	And 49, it says 7-16, a.m., the police were
13		flagged down, that was initiated by you?
14	А	Yes.
15	Q	Item 50 was initiated by you?
16	А	Yes.
17	Q	And Item 51, do you have anything further to add
18		to the video that we saw earlier?
19	A	Like I stated earlier, we were we were
20		notified that the person who was supposedly at
21		St. Mary's Hospital unconscious, we were we
22		were told by the police department, as they
23		viewed the video with us, that that definitely
24		was the person and, during their investigation
25		identifying that person, they were able to

1		identify that that same person did not get hit by
2		us with a baton or a flashlight or some hard
3		object.
4		MR. HALBROOKS: Okay. Just a couple of
5		quick questions for Mr. Manjee.
6		* * * *
7		HABIB MANJEE, having previously
8		affirmed to testify the truth, the whole truth
9		and nothing but the truth, testified as follows:
10		* * * *
11		FURTHER DIRECT EXAMINATION
12		BY MR. HALBROOKS
13	Q	Mr. Manjee, on a Saturday afternoon recently, you
14		were at the club and saw an incident outside your
15		door?
16	А	Yes.
17	Q	Could you tell the Committee about that, please?
18	А	Well, the person that owned the I think owned
19		the store at the Luci shop and I don't know his
20		name's Kevin or and he happened to be walking
21		in front of my door and dumped all the trash and,
22		in the past, we used to find a lot of trash in
23		front of my door. So I was wondering who was the
24		guy, you know. So it happened to be I opened the
25		door; he had two dogs and he had trashes over

1		there. And, as soon as I opened the door, he had
2		my two dogs start barking at me and he said:
3		Man, I'm going to shut you N down, you know. And
4		I'm tired of take you N people in, you know, the
5		hood, you know, drag down here. He was going on
6		and on. So I just called nine you know,
7		calling the police. I saw the police car and so
8		I flagged the officer and they gave him a ticket
9		for that.
10	Q	I'm sorry. I didn't catch that. Did you say the
11		name of the person?
12	A	His name's Kevin or Clax. Slay. Last name is
13		Clay or first name is clay.
14	Q	That seems kind of an incredible story. Do you
15		have any proof for us here?
16	A	Yes, I do. I have a video and, also, my daughter
17		was sitting in the van, and she heard it and
18		she's here to testify.
19		MR. HALBROOKS: And, Mr. Merado, do you
20		have anything to add to that story?
21		* * * *
22		FURTHER DIRECT TESTIMONIAL STATEMENT
23		BY MR. MERADO: Yes. The gentleman's
24		name is Clay Green, who we have a history with
25		who is a neighbor in our area, who routinely

1	walks his two big dogs in-between our customers
2	as they're leaving and calling my staff the N
3	word, calling my customers the N word, and we
4	just caught him on videotape I believe that
5	afternoon, which I viewed of him, dumping trash
6	in our foyer area, which goes to show you that
7	it's very possible that this venomous gentleman
8	could have done it at other locations and blamed
9	it on us.
10	MR. HALBROOKS: Thank you. I move the
11	DVD. It's very short.
12	CHAIRMAN BOWN bet me just first off,
13	before we go to that are there questions by the
14	Committee regarding the testimony thus far?
15	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman.
16	ALDERMAN COGGS: This is being
17	introduced to show us?
18	MR. HALBROOKS: This is being
19	introduced to show you the kinds of difficulties
20	that Ladybug has in the neighborhood with the
21	neighbors who do not want the club there. It's
22	pretty self-evident when you see it. It's
23	surprising. It's surprising he didn't know he
24	was on video.
25	ALDERMAN COGGS: The Clay Green person,

1	though, is not here today?
2	MR. HALBROOKS: No, he is not. But it
3	is a video, video and audio that is kept by Club
4	618.
5	ALDERMAN COGGS: Thank you.
6	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Is there going to be
7	to first off, we'll have Alderman Kovac move
8	to make the large quantity of photos and
9	accompanying I guess these we'd call summaries
10	of some of your signage as part of the official
11	record in this proceeding \( \bigcap \text{ Hearing no objection} \)
12	to that, so ordered.
13	Is there envlobjection to watching the
14	footage, for what it is worth? It's not
15	rebutting anything. So if you want to do it on
16	your time.
17	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: This is on their
18	time?
19	CHAIRMAN BOHL: On their time.
20	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Very good.
21	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Kovac will
22	move to make the video provided part of the
23	official record in the proceeding. Hearing no
24	objection, that's so ordered.
25	(The DVD was played.)

1	MR. HALBROOKS: That's Mr. Green with
2	his two dogs walking up to our front door and
3	throwing glass and bottles at 3:30 in the
4	afternoon on a Saturday, October 9th. That's
5	Habib going outside confronting him about it,
6	saying: What are you doing?
7	At this point, Habib will have a
8	witness that was standing in the foyer with us,
9	as Clay Green was swearing up and down and there
10	was another one in the car coming up right here,
11	saying
12	This is what he said: I'm going to
13	close you N's down You got to get out of my
14	neighborhood. And shortly, you will hear
15	Mr. Clay Green soice and the tone and the type
16	of a person that we need to deal with that we
17	feel is sabotaging or possibly putting our
18	facility in jeopardy with his obvious actions.
19	You've seen it. It's not hearsay. There it is.
20	There are the two dogs we mentioned. And you saw
21	the trash on our driveway. As you see, the
22	street is crystal clear and clean right in front
23	of our facility.
24	All right. There's more.
25	MR. HALBROOKS: Did you stop it? It

1	wasn't done.
2	MR. MERADO: It's real quick. Now,
3	it's our practice and I train my guys to pick up
4	trash.
5	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. If you want to
6	hold on. I'm counting against you here until we
7	get to that point.
8	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: How much time is
9	left, by the way, Mr. Chairman?
10	CHAIRMAN BOHL: 10 minutes and 42
11	seconds.
12	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: And we're counting
13	all these citizen testimonies in that ten
14	minutes?
15	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Yup.
16	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Very good.
17	CHAIRMAN BOHL: And his closing. It's
18	shutting off on its own.
19	MR. MERADO: All right. Well, we have
20	a very, very nasty voicemail which you can't hear
21	now obviously, but it's telling.
22	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Mr. Chair, I'm going
23	to have to object and ask you to strike this
24	testimony. We've heard nothing verbally other
25	than his testimony as to what the conversation

1	was in that video.
2	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Bauman, short
3	of there being any evidence, I think I would
4	concur; but what I will say is just this much:
5	The Committee considers and has full knowledge of
6	what we need to accept and not accept as well,
7	too, and we're supposed to make a record at the
8	end of saying what we include or don't include in
9	terms of a decision.
10	So I would concur, what was provided
11	here, there's no evidence to substantiate that.
12	So, for witnesses, go akead We'll need your
13	name and address for the record, please.
14	HENNA MANJEZ, having first affirmed to
15	testify the truth the whole truth and nothing
16	but the truth, testified as follows:
17	* * * *
18	DIRECT TESTIMONIAL STATEMENT
19	BY MS. MANJEE:
20	Henna Manjee, 1926 West Wisconsin
21	Avenue.
22	THE REPORTER: Will you spell your
23	first name, please?
24	MS. MANJEE: H-e-n-n-a.
25	THE REPORTER: Thank you.

MS. MANJEE: M-a-n-j-e-e.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Go ahead, please.

MS. MANJEE: On October 9th, in the early afternoon, I was sitting in our family van outside of the 618 establishment, waiting for Mr. Manjee. Heading north on Water Street, I saw a middle-aged Caucasian man walking down the street. He had about a half dozen or so bottles of beer and cans, and he was also walking two very large dogs. When he approached the front of the 618 establishment, he dropped the bottles and cans in front and kept walking as if nothing had happened.

I was it shock as to why someone would do such a thin and I had no prior knowledge of this man. Mr. Manjee, though, was right inside the front entrance about to leave the establishment when he saw the man committing this act. He quickly ran outside and yelled at the man outside, asking: What are you doing? You've been the one who's been doing this for a while in the alleys, too, haven't you? Which indicated they had a prior relationship.

The Caucasian man was obviously angry he'd gotten caught this time, and yelled back at

1	Mr. Manjee, saying: I'm going to shut you, using
2	the F word, down and don't bring your F'ing trash
3	from the hood downtown, and other profanities and
4	racial slurs. He also mentioned that him and his
5	neighbors are going to shut you down for good
6	this time. While making the statements, he held
7	the dogs in front of him in a threatening
8	fashion threat.
9	MR. MILLER: Mr. Chair, just
10	interrupt
11	CHAIRMAN BOHL: (Mr. Miller.
12	MR. MILLER: You should strike the
13	reference to the men walking down the street,
14	making the statements. You don't have any of
15	that before you This is an out-of-courtroom
16	declarant, a hearsay statement.
17	CHAIRMAN BOHL: I'm going to allow her
18	to proceed here forward with what she claims she
19	saw, personally, for what it's worth. Go ahead.
20	MS. MANJEE: Mr. Manjee then rebuttaled
21	and said he was going to call the police as the
22	man was walking away.
23	After he had left, my father noticed a
24	squad car at the intersection heading south on
25	Water Street. He flagged them down and told the

1	police what had happened. The police then went
2	and found the Caucasian man and he stated that he
3	had apologized for what had happened, that he
4	knew it was wrong, yet he was still doing all
5	this alley trashing. Then they proceeded to ask
6	Mr. Manjee if he wanted them to issue a ticket to
7	the man or let him go. My dad stated he wanted
8	to issue him a ticket and shortly thereafter he
9	left the scene.
10	Personally, I was offended at the
11	racial slurs were going on in downtown Milwaukee,
12	since it's a culturally diverse neighborhood.
13	And it's kind of sed to know that racism still
14	does exist in Milwaukee even though it is such a
15	culturally diverse neighborhood. That's all I
16	have to say.
17	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Questions by Committee?
18	(No response.)
19	CHAIRMAN BOHL: All right. Thank you
20	for your testimony. Next witness, please.

22	CLYDE DANGERFIELD (phonetic), having
23	first affirmed to testify the truth, the whole
24	truth and nothing but the truth, testified as

## DIRECT TESTIMONIAL STATEMENT

BY MR. DANGERFIELD: My name is Clyde Dangerfield. I live at 231 West Wisconsin Avenue.

Just quickly, the parking lot over by the Grain Exchange, I go to Club 720, I go and I watch UFC fights at Star Bar, which are over on Broadway behind there; and a lot of the club, they have like valet services, a lot of those places. If they don't see the valet service at any of those other laws, the patrons from all of those clubs in that area walk over to those parking lots wer in that area.

Also, the club -- the violence and all that stuff, I don't see it, personally, for the simple fact, I live downtown, number one. Number two, I spoke last time about my annual event that I have, Sincere Day, which is an anti-domestic violence and is a time to basically help our community.

This club, in conjunction with me this year alone, raised over \$6,000 to give to the Battered Women's Shelter, Sojourn Truth and The

1 Hunger Task Force this year. We also collected over 400 coats and hats and scarves for our less 2 fortunate kids this year. This club has been 3 doing everything they can behind the last year's 4 5 hearing to try to make a different situation. I, actually, can go into any club in 6 7 the city, because of the respect level I have and 8 I can wear whatever attire I want, baseball caps, 9 whatever I want to. This club has actually, you 10 know, slowed that down with me. And so there's no white T-shirts, no bag v clothes. You have to 11 come with a certain attire to be in this 12 They 13 establishment. exen changed the music up. otanve bands into the situation 14 We started bringing to get different music, basically, so -- it's --15 I just think that is a good establishment and 16 it's, basically, you know, neighborhood. 17 traffic coming from all over, basically, and I 18 don't think that it's just from, you know, this 19 20 area. 21 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you. Questions 22 of this witness? 23 MR. HALBROOKS: Mr. Chairman, I'm going 24 to ask the Chair's discretion on citizen 25 testimony. People come here at 9:45. We do our

1	best to move through, but or the Committee to
2	acknowledge that these people should get a couple
3	of minutes to say their piece.
4	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: It's mainly him who's
5	causing these delays.
6	CHAIRMAN BOHL: No. The testimony's
7	going to be the testimony here.

15	disburse the diverse, they direct the traffic, they
16	make sure that, you know, they have a security
17	officer that's on the corner that's, you know,
18	directing the traffic, blocking off traffic where
19	it can't come down to back in front of the place.
20	So that's all I have to say.
21	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you. Are there
22	questions by Committee?
23	ALDERMAN HAMILTON: Mr. Chair.
24	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Hamilton.

6		evening, do you feel as if the security that's
7		out there and the way that they manage the club,

14		of the business being there are a hindrance to
15		the neighborhood?
16	A	No, I think that their security's doing a fine
17		job and I don't have any problems, because I have
18		to do outside patrols as well; and, no, I don't
19		have any problems with any of the patrons that
20		come downtown.
21		CHAIRMAN BOHL: Any other questions by
22		Committee?
23		ALDERMAN HAMILTON: No, that's it.
24		MR. HALBROOKS: Time, please.
25		CHAIRMAN BOHL: 4, 45. Again, name and

1	address.

3	BRENDA HARTWIG, having first affirmed
4	to testify the truth, the whole truth and nothing
5	but the truth, testified as follows:
6	DIRECT TESTIMONIAL STATEMENT
7	BY MS. HARTWIG: My name is Brenda
8	Hartwig. I live at 5616 West Notre Dame Court.
9	I am a Milwaukee city homeowner. And I had the
10	opportunity to go to the 618 Club with my son and
11	his group of friends from Marquette University
12	High School for a little reunion that they had.
13	And I was really reluxtant to go because, you
14	know, as you can tell, I'm not really in the
15	hip-hop age. But I got down and I had a good
16	time. And security was fantastic inside and out.
17	Every aspect of the club was great. And I wasn't
18	intimidated. I didn't fear anything. We didn't
19	fear when we walked outside. But you guys should
20	look at your other area on Water Street because
21	I've had to walk into the PAC with vomit on my
22	feet from the other clubs.
23	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Could you spell your
24	last name, please?
25	MS. HARTWIG: Sure. H-a-r-t-w-i-g.

1		CHAIRMAN BOHL: Questions from the
2		Committee, please? If you could hold on.
3		Questions from the Committee, please.
4		ALDERMAN HAMILTON: Mr. Chair?
5		CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Hamilton.

7		EXAMINATION
8		BY ALDERMAN HAMILTON:
9	Q	You mentioned Water Street?

12		to 618 and you're familiar with the activity

21		and we have driven by there a lot and I was,
22		actually, there a couple of New Year's Eves ago,
23		also. We've driven by there several times, and
24		everybody's always very orderly and behind a
25		gate; and, when we walked on the other Water

1	Street down by the PAC, actually, my husband and
2	son have had the girls go down their pants and
3	steal their underwear tags for a bachelorette
4	party. And I don't know where you guys come
5	from, but that's assault. To me, I don't know
6	whether she was a bachelorette or what, I don't
7	think that's right. But there's that kind of
8	activity all the time, and there's always bottles
9	on the street there.
10	This bar, in front, is completely
11	clean. So I would and having a 28-year-old
12	son who loves hip-hop music and his friends, I'd
13	rather have him go to a bar where there's 24
14	video cameras and surveillance outside than just
15	any old random club, to be honest with you, and
16	that's from a mom who's quite protective.
17	ALDERMAN HAMILTON: All right. Thank
18	you.
19	MS. HARTWIG: Anything else?
20	MR. HALBROOKS: Well, I have a
21	question.
22	* * * *
23	CROSS-EXAMINATION
24	BY MR. HALBROOKS:
25	Q Did you contribute your thoughts to the Committee

1		members and to Alderman Bauman?
2	A	I did. I sent an E-mail because I heard they
3		were up for renewal and there was maybe some
4		opposition. And I decided to send that because
5		we went on August 27th, and it was a very nice
6		time.

22		BY MR. BROWN: Hello. My name is
23		Reggie Brown. V100 WKKV.
24		CHAIRMAN BOHL: We'll need an address,
25		even for that business.

1	MR. BROWN: 12100 West Howard Avenue,
2	Greenfield. All right.
3	Thank you, Ashanti Hamilton,
4	Alderman Hamilton, for bringing up a good point.
5	I believe that people will calm down and relax if
6	they see police presence. On the north side of
7	Water Street, you can see horses, police horses,
8	cars, trucks, motorcycles, everything; but, on
9	our side, we only have police cars that are
10	present. And every time that 618 calls the
11	police, it's a strike against him; and I just
12	want to say that they do a great job with
13	security and I appreciate that. I work there as
14	well, so. Thank you very much.
15	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Just one second, Mr.
16	Brown. Any questions by Committee?
17	MR. BROWN: And, Alderman Bauman, stop
18	hating on V100. Any questions for me,
19	Mr. Bauman?
20	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Sir, no comments.
21	Let's not make this personal, please.
22	MR. BROWN: He's a hater. I'm sorry.
23	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you for your
24	testimony here. Thank you.
25	MR. MAISTELMAN: How much is remaining?

1	CHAIRMAN BOHL: I have 2 minutes 37
2	seconds here. That would include your closing
3	here so.
4	MR. HALBROOKS: Can you stop to tell me

Some of these other 21 establishments, when the police are brought up, 22 they come up with what they think are quick fix, 23 a little bit of makeup here, little makeup there. 24 Then it's business as usual. 25 618, again. They have shown that

they're dedicated to this. They want to be a part. They're doing everything I think that you can do when somebody says that they have an issue.

They want to work with the downtown district. They want to work with the alderman. They want to work with the neighbors. But sometimes people have objectives and that is what it is. But I think, unfortunately, if business is downtown that happened to cater to not afraid to say we play hip-hop. It's such a bad stigma, so that when some things do happen that do play hip-hop, they put thanket statement on it overall; but I think from the dress code to security, to the security cameras, just trying to do all that you can do.

You see this happening anywhere, you know, the police are trying to govern the city.

But I mean, again, even with all the presence, crime still happens. So we've got to say, at least, the chief is doing something. The chief is trying to address it. Is it going to solve everything? Not exactly. But do you have to give credit for them trying to take the steps that are necessary to make things better?

1		Absolutely, in my opinion.
2	Q	Is there a problem with behavioral issues with
3		patrons coming out of the club?
4	A	No, the security addresses issues before they
5		become an issue. So they're very proactive. And
6		anybody who knows anything about Homer Blow, I'm
7		also proactive instead of reactive.
8		And one of the things again that will
9		continue me to be involved with the establishment
10		is to see that they are being proactive about
11		situations from making sufe that the fake ID's
12		don't get in and any trouble makers that we see.
13		Me as DJ and host at the establishment, I also
14		work with security as well as other staff. So,
15		if I see anything we can address it before it
16		can turn into this big problem or, you know, a
17		situation to where we have to come in front of,
18		you know, the license committee. I love to see
19		more establishments be able to get their licenses
20		in the mill.

17	BY MR. COSTELLO: My name is Justin
18	Costello. My office branch is at 229 East
19	Wisconsin Avenue. I am the CEO of VIP Limousine
20	here in Milwaukee, Chicago, Minneapolis and
21	Madison, Wisconsin. I just want to say that Mr.
22	Manjee and Nick, they do a very good job at
23	running the club. I deal with hundreds of clubs
24	a year, nightclubs. We take care of politicians.
25	We take care of a lot of people in the

1	entertainment, a lot of VIP's; and whenever I
2	have a VIP in town or someone who's an athlete in
3	town and I need special security from them, I
4	call them and they're very accommodating.
5	They're very proactive and they follow protocol
6	to a T.
7	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you. All right.
8	Any questions by the Committee?
9	(No response.)
10	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Bauman.
11	ALDERMAN BAUMAN∫ Thank you, Mr. Chair.
12	First of all regarding Club Bari,
13	there's been an obvious effort to divert
14	responsibility to that establishment. And, as
15	indicated by Captain Basting, there's some
16	factual basis for that. But, just so the facts
17	are clear, Club Bari was granted their license
18	for the first time on April 13th, 2009. And, by
19	my count, 8 of the 11 police incidents in the
20	police report predates the date they received
21	their license.
22	So, while some of the disorder that has
23	been testified to on the streets may be a result
24	of that club and the police are aware of
25	that it does not account for the entirety of

the evidence that has been presented here.

And I might add this just leads us into a trick bag situation where, when we do proceed with the revocation complaint against Club Bari, you'll have Club Bari coming in and testifying:

It's all 618 people causing the trouble. And so then the argument, the more clubs we grant the less accountable any club actually has.

What does appear to be clear here and beyond dispute are several things, despite all the controversial testimony and confusion over the process:

No. 1, there continues to be a significant amount of disorder on the streets at closing time at this establishment. That has been testified to historically. It appears to not have abated in any significant degree.

Whether it's contributed to by other club members or other clubs -- clearly, it wasn't before April 13th when there was no other clubs -- bottom line is it is undisputed that a significant level of disorder continues.

MR. HALBROOKS: Objection. There is nothing in the record --

ALDERMAN BAUMAN: The police have

1	testified to that.
2	MR. HALBROOKS: (Unintelligible).
3	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Halbrooks
4	(unintelligible).
5	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: The police have
6	testified to that.
7	(Unintelligible discussion.)
8	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: The police have
9	testified to that. Mr. Arenson has testified to
10	that.
11	THE REPORTER: ¶'m sorry. I can't
12	CHAIRMAN BOHT: One second. One
13	second. Your objection is on the record.
14	MR. HALEROOKS: Thank you.
15	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: The police have
16	testified to that. Mr. Arenson has testified to
17	that, eye witness. The gentleman from the Grain
18	Exchange has testified to that, eye witness
19	testimony. Fine.
20	Secondly, is what is undisputed is that
21	there were at least five incidents inside the
22	club. They may dispute what took place; but so
23	far we only heard the testimony of really
24	Mr. Halbrooks regarding what took place on these
25	inside incidents. These are incidents inside the
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bar, that either originated inside the bar or represented acts of violence inside the bar.

That they can't divert responsibility to another operator for.

In addition, does seem to be undisputed that the owner goes to Herculean lengths to provide security. And we've been through this before. That appears clear. They have the They have the most sophisticated highest. technology. They have huge stacks of false ID's. They have dress codes. They have security. have armed guards. owner is armed. parking lot attendents (at the parking lot where many patrons park are armed. It is clear they go It does not seem it is enough to great lengths. to control, A, the disorder that has been established, that does take place at closing time; and, B, the incidents that do take place inside the club.

It's a large club, 400 capacity,
they're -- You heard testimony that -- well,
basically, what we have -- the task of this
council is to determine the license that this
business is going to be entitled to operate
under. It seems to me that the question we have

to face, ultimately, is: Does a business have the 1 2 right to create what amounts to an economic dead 3 zone, multi-block economic dead zone around their 4 establishment on weekend nights because it is 5 very clear that the other businesses that do business at night that are not in the bar 6 7 business --8 MR. HALBROOKS: Objection. There's 9 nothing in the record to this. There's no record about this. 10 11 **(**You know what? You had CHAIRMAN BOHL: 12 that case. You were able to make it and rebut it; and, if you hadn't used up all your time, you 13 would have had a clos 14 NALDROOKS: 15 I have to object. CHAIRMAN BOHL: Notwithstanding -- you 16 know what? Let the committee make its own 17 18 record, Mr. Halbrooks. I'm going to ask you 19 please don't interrupt. 20 ALDERMAN BAUMAN: There is no question that this business has external costs to other 21 22 property owners and external costs to the City of 23 Milwaukee. The captain testified he assigns four 24 officers on overtime every Saturday night just 25 for them, private security, basically, that are

being funded by the taxpayers of the City of Milwaukee.

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So how far are we going to allow these external costs to go and how high are we going to allow them to become? As they testified, they do everything in their power to mitigate these external costs; yet it appears they clearly continue to exist.

The negative impacts are real. They're going to become all the more real. We have a hotel proposed for the corper of Broadway and Michigan, going in the Loyalty Building. Mackie Building is go kg to be a part of that around the corner from the project. Is a bottel intersection were every Friday and Saturday night, as testified to, there's near chaos, there's a need for private security to be directing traffic, there's a need for streets to be blocked off, there's a need for armed security guards and armed parking lot attendants kitty-corner from this hotel? Is that going to be a positive for economic development at this location?

I like him, personally. We were friends, originally. I helped him get into the business, provided advice on how to structure his operation and not hire a certain manager that would have been very adverse for their business based on my background in the bar -- representing nightclubs and bars.

But the issue here is external costs.

We are charged with protecting the public interests, and the public does have an interest in fostering economic development. The public does have an interest in having guns in the hands of owners, security agents and parking lot attendants because of these nightclubs.

So all f everything that they say is true about all the efforts that they go through.

And I agree. The captain acknowledged that. I thought it was very forthright and honest testimony. He said, notwithstanding all that, the external costs that are being absorbed by the City and other stakeholders in the area are just too high. And that's ultimately what we're here to decide.

I'm going to support my downtown business association and I'm going to support

1	the police department in asking for nonrenewal of

3	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you.
4	ALDERMAN HAMILTON: Say that again.
5	I'm sorry.
6	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Nonrenewal of the
7	cabaret license.
8	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Halbrooks, I'll
9	give you 30 seconds.
10	MR. HALBROOKS: There's no evidence for
11	virtually everything that Alderman Bauman said.
12	I noticed his time wasn't clocked.
13	CHAIRMAN BONK: His side, if you want
14	to count those in opposition, there was a total
15	of 13 minutes was provided in direct
16	testimony, probably, about an hour in questions
17	that I allowed and didn't count to give you full
18	luxury to rain questions on those who would be
19	testifying against your individual client.
20	MR. HALBROOKS: Thank you.
21	CHAIRMAN BOHL: So.
22	MR. HALBROOKS: I don't agree with
23	Alderman Bauman. There's no proof to anything he
24	says. And, if there was, it would have been a
25	very different hearing.

Mr. Arenson didn't testify to anything 1 2 about Ladybug. Ms. Nichols and gentleman from Grain Exchange, nothing. There is no evidence. 3 The police captain did not have any specific 4 5 evidence except for one item. Not one single item in the summary that we challenged as hearsay 6 7 cannot be used by this Committee under the law. 8 And the law is pretty clear. 9 When we get to court that is the --10 judges don't disagree with that. When we 11 challenge them, they have (to be put to their 12 proof and they didn't prove anything, not a 13 single item that **N**e used legally against the club; and I would suggest that the myriad of 14 positive things the club -- that the Committee 15 heard about the club, and from the people, I 16 think that the club should be renewed. 17 18 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you, 19 Mr. Halbrooks. Were there any other questions by the Committee at this time? 20 21 (No response.) 22 CHAIRMAN BOHL: With that, we're in 23 Committee before I entertain a motion. 24 would ask maker of a motion in particular, if 25 there are items that are going to be cited in

terms of individuals, specifically, who's testimony helps to elicit a decision and/or if there's a sanction, also, if there are specific items in the police report that are part of that, per our previous discussion with the City Attorney's office, Mr. Adam Stephens, I would ask that members also specifically cite those as part of creating a foundation for a record, if that is something that is believed merited. ALDERMAN KOVAC: Let me just start by establishing some of what the motion I make or somebody else makes should be based on, I guess, looking through the police report items.

Item 41. It's very clear that there was a car amidst the people leaving the club and there was definitely a gun in that car. It is less clear what -- it was clear from the report that Mr. Halbrooks provided that that particular gun was not fired that night. There may have been another gun fired that night. That's why officers were present, although that is not clear. But there certainly was a gun, a loaded

1	gun in a car near the club, and it was pretty
2	well established from they couldn't establish
3	whose gun it was, but clearly people from the
4	club were in the car with the gun.
5	Item 42. There was
6	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Is that a specific,
7	yes, that you'll ask to include that as part of
8	your motion?
9	ALDERMAN KOVAC: I'm making
10	observations.
11	CHAIRMAN BOHL: $\prod$ I'm trying to decipher
12	that.
13	ALDERMAN KOVAC: Yes, I'm sorry if I'm
14	not being clear L'm going to make a motion for
15	a suspension at this license based on these items
16	so I want to be clear that's what I'm basing on.
17	I'll mention some of the testimony, too.
18	Item 42. They were being proactive
19	like we asked them to be. So, actually, Item 42,
20	I think, probably should not count against them.
21	Item 43. There was a fight right
22	outside the club so I'm basing it partially on
23	that.
24	Item 44. Same thing: Fight, disorderly
25	conduct occurred outside the club, clearly

1 related to the club. 2 Item 45. We don't have a lot of 3 details on them, but there was a -- you know, 4 there was a minor altercation. So, for whatever that's worth, it should be included. 5 Item 46. We have direct police 6 7 evidence of quite a bit of noise and traffic and 8 there was also quite a bit of neighborhood 9 testimony that relates to that, as we had in 10 previous years, that there is consideration of 11 disruption of public right of-ways, behaviors not condusive to business environment in the evening. 12 13 Item 47 This one again I think they were pretty proactive 14 here. So I think item 47 my motion. They did what we 15 is not a part of asked them to do. 16 Item 48. This one we had quite a bit 17 of discussion on and there seems to be pretty 18 strong evidence provided by the attorney here 19 20 that this was not -- and their security staff 21 that these six staples were most likely not 22 coming from the club. So Item 48 probably 23 shouldn't be included.

The security was proactive, but there

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was an incident and a bit of chaos and some fights going on near the club. So, even though they were being proactive in contacting the police. Item 50 same thing I said for 49. So 49 and 50 should be included.

Item 51, I believe there was also quite a bit of discussion about whether or not this was accurately attributed to the club. So let's leave Item 51 out. Because I think there was pretty strong evidence.

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of Martini Mike's, where we kind of had similar circumstantial evidence, issued suspensions some, you know, and then we have tragedy.

So I think, frankly, a large part of why I'm recommending a suspension rather than something more drastic relates to the question that Alderman Hamilton asked of Homer Blow. we going to have a tragedy here? Clearly, is a potential where there's more than one. Clearly, we have a certain amount of chaos. definitely guns. So there are people with guns in the area not just the security. certainly hope that doesn't lead to anything; although, frankly the main reason I'm not going to ask for a larger suspension than last year is the proactive nature of their security and the ability of their security both in their proffered testimony and, anecdotally, what you've heard from the witnesses and from the police themselves. They've been cooperating about as well as can be imagined.

And I certainly feel that downtown

Milwaukee -- Milwaukee in general has an interest
in a downtown that has this sort of venue.

Clearly it's an economically successful venue. I

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mean they're able to afford state-of-the-art security. Clearly, people are going. There's lines. Part of the reason there is chaos, there's a lot of people are waiting to get in. And, frankly, part of the reason there's chaos is there's a lot of people who don't go to the club but just come and hang out with the people who are going to the club. It was talked about a little less this year than other years. Clearly, this is a scene and people come down to hang out. In fact, didn't (∩-- on the one incident with the gun, didn't the witness say that he came down to -- because be Knew there were so many pretty girls around?  $^\prime$ I'm not even sure if the driver had been in the club or not. But, in any event, there's a -- there's certainly a value to the City of having a place for people to go and for major acts to go and for our local DJ's to promote shows. 22	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Hamilton.
23	ALDERMAN HAMILTON: On the motion, I'm
24	going to support the motion. I'm supporting it
25	reluctantly only because I think there has to be

a recognition of balance, especially -especially, in downtown and -- and there's an
uneasiness that I have about -- about looking at
this picture of, I guess, this was the last
Halloween party at 618 and the orderliness of it
and previous pictures and videotapes that we've
seen of the establishment of --

You know, there's -- there's an expectation of being downtown and an expectation of going out that exudes some sense of rowdiness, I would say. And we should have a realistic expectation of what it is that can be controlled and what can't be controlled and the types of environments that they're operating in, but I do not see in this picture any animals and I don't see in this picture anybody that is acting like an animal or anything of the sort.

And we have had situations where establishments have come before this committee and there was a clear sense of uncontrolled chaos and -- and behavior that -- that offended even this committee. From the police report and from testimony of other businesses and even with the testimony of the police department, there's not -- just simply just not that kind of

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uncontrolled, over-the-top chaos that's kind of
existing in this location and then when it's
parallel with other types of activity that's
happening downtown some would even say it's
milder, that is more controlled than activity
that's happening in other places of downtown, and
I don't want to continue to put establishments in
a position where what they have to prove, the
benchmark that we're putting up is actually
unattainable and it would be unattainable for any
business owner that's trying to operate in such
an environment, and so in this balancing act, we
just have to be realistic that, if this
establishment is soing what is necessary, is not
imposing on the pace and quiet to the level
where the business needs to be shut down so that
you're taking away jobs, you're taking away the
vibrancy of downtown, you're taking away the
friendliness of being able to open and have the
type of relationship with police departments and
elected officials that's necessary in order to
make sure that these establishments are operating
in a respectful and responsible manner. We can't
put the type of expectations on businesses that
would actually hinder that, and I want to make

sure that we don't do that.

At the same time, there is a police report, there are some issues that probably need to be dealt with and, you know, quite honestly, with the testimony that was here today and some of the recommendations that are floating around, I think 30 days is probably right in that nitch of being -- being -- being a balance.

But, if we come here next year and then there are two fights and then there is, you know, somebody that gets stopped somewhere and they have a gun in the car I mean let's just be realistic, especially with the number of businesses and allow that are operating downtown and the type devironment that we want to create. Let's be realistic with what it is that can be controlled and the responsibility of operators to make sure that they're participating in that as opposed to adding fuel to the negativity. That could happen.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Coggs on the motion.

ALDERMAN COGGS: One thing that sticks out to me, hearing this case this year and last, is the issue of the amount of police services. I

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share the concern of Alderman Bauman about the thousands of taxpayers' dollars being spent on helping to patrol the area, but I don't direct it at the owners of the club. I direct it at the police department and I do that because, on the weekends, I drive past Water Street and I see the amount of squads and officers there are on the northern side of Wisconsin; but, yet, as a member of this committee, I've yet to see any of those clubs come before our committee and those police services be calculated and put into the record as a strike against them

This counci Capproved through ordinance the Chief of Police at his the opportunity for discretion to llw for businesses to hire off-duty police officers if they so chose to which would alleviate that expense on the The tool is in the tool box for the citizens. chief to be able to use. This council approved it prior to myself even being here, and I think just like the Bradley Center, just like Miller Park and just like a whole lot of other larger places, because this is a really large club, larger than most of the one we see, the opportunity should be there to be able to help to offset that expense from citizens.

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Because I agree with Alderman Bauman. Citizens shouldn't have to be paying for all those extra services, and the tool is right there in the tool box for the police department to be able to use. And I just think that has to be pushed with the police department and I know that discussions are being had about maybe not to directly with businesses, maybe with business improvement districts or associations, maybe deals can be struck that way to ensure that there's still a level of pakity with the police department and individual business owners and whatever way ithas be creatively put has/to be done. together. It' Because Alderman Bauman's right. Citizens shouldn't have to be paying for what in the eyes of many amounts to private security for the establishments. like I said, I don't put that on the owners; I put that onto the police department because the tool is there. And I just hope that Chief Flynn hears the message.

Having said that I won't be supporting the 30 days. I applaud the efforts of the owners to attempt to deal with the security issues and I
