1. MILAWA Picnic.

MILAWA members and well as Bomet representatives were present to volunteer and offer support and to showcase different countries and cultures. They interacted with other members of Milwaukee-Sister cities at the November 2022 International Folk Fair held in Milwaukee.







3. Educating and Keeping Girls in School. Past and Future Collaboration

a. Empower her Periods: Sanitary Pads Distribution

Studies have shown that distribution of sanitary pads not only improve reproductive health knowledge and education but also attitudes and therefore improve attendance by keeping girls from missing school due to periods. MILAWA has been instrumental in improving the education of girls in both primary (elementary) and secondary school students by donating and distributing sanitary pads in Bomet. MILAWA continues to collaborate and promote healthcare and personal hygiene. So far MILAWA has donated sanitary hygiene products worth \$3,800 to over 800 students in Bomet, Kenya.

4. Import Avocado and Agricultural Produce

Avocado growing in Bomet is gaining fame after the newly introduced profitable crop that is quickly overtaking tea and corn (maize) farming proved to be profitable for farmers. In 2021 (between January and March), Kenya exported 26 tons worth 4.6 billion shillings (\$400 Million)

We have a membership of women from diverse backgrounds, involved in a vast continuum of professional and personal endeavors.

Our objectives to date have been to create an awareness of the attributes we bring to the Milwaukee community as women of African descent; to create and promote understanding among different cultures and societies within societies; to assist the integration of African immigrant/refugee women and their families as they transition in a new environment. In addition, helping them access resources to maintain healthy families and actively participate in building a strong community.
