Richard E. Artison, Sr.

Richard E. Artison, Sr. ran unopposed for Milwaukee County Sheriff five times. During his tenure, he initiated a number of crime prevention programs including Community Against Pushers (CAP), 278-GUNS, Drug Abatement Program, Project D.A.R.E., and the first K-9 drug and bomb dog teams in Wisconsin. In addition, Artison regularly hosted a television program called "Sheriff's Role Call", frequently making public appearances in public, private and parochial schools throughout the county.

While serving as Sheriff, Artison was responsible for more than 800 authorized personnel and a budget in excess of \$60 million. He was also intricately involved in the planning, construction and opening of the \$106 Million Milwaukee County Criminal Justice Facility. He was also elected President of the Badger State Sheriffs' Association. Artison developed and taught a graduate-level course in the Criminal Justice Department at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee and donated his salary to establish a scholarship for disadvantaged students through the Wisconsin Chapter of the National Organization of Black Law Enforcement Executives (NOBLE).

Prior to becoming Sheriff, Artison had extensive law enforcement experience. He was Special Agent in Charge, Milwaukee Field Office, United States Secretary Service; Assistant Inspector, United States Secret Service, Washington, D.C.; and Staff Assistant to Assistant Director (Administration), U. S. Secret Service, Washington, D.C. He was also a Criminal Investigator with the U.S. Treasury Department, Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms, Kansas City and Milwaukee Field Offices, and he served as a Patrol Officer / Detective (Homicide and Robbery), with the Omaha Police Department, in Omaha, NE. He was also Special Agent, U.S. Army Counter Intelligence Corps., Detroit Regional Office, Detroit, MI.

Artison earned a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Sociology/Psychology from Drake University in Des Moines, IA. He also earned certificates from the United States Secret Service Management Institute in Washington, D.C., the Federal Executive Institute

(FBI), in Quantico, VA, and an M.A. equivalent degree in Education for Public Management Program, from Cornell University in Ithaca, NY.
