


OVP MISSION

To prevent and reduce violence through partnerships that strengthen youth, families, and neighborhoods.



THE BLUEPRINT





- The Blueprint was created after a spike of homicides and NFS in 2015 approximately a 150% increase. The spike was seen around the country.
- There was a call to revamp the OVP in early 2016 with a charge to really engage the community in developing a comprehensive plan around this issue.
- The Blueprint was shaped by more than 1,500 individuals, elevating the voices of youth, community residents, and key stakeholders to call for strategic, aligned, and sustained investments and action to prevent violence, build resilience, and create a safer, healthier city.
- 6 goals and 30 evidence-informed strategies.
- OVP employs a public health approach and focuses on the prevention of violence before it occurs, as well as intervention efforts after violence has occurred to reduce its impact and prevent future perpetration and victimization.

UNDERSTANDING PREVENTION



Universal/ Environmental Strategies

*Impacts everyone regardless of risk factors (e.g. billboard campaign promoting peace)



Primary

*Aims to prevent violence before it occurs

(e.g. youth education, engagement & support)



Secondary

*Aims to prevent the reoccurrence of violence

(e.g. Community Outreach, Violence Interruption and hospital response)



Tertiary


*Aims to reduce the impact of violence

(e.g. Credible Clinicians and Healers, Healing Hubs)


GUIDING PRINCIPLES IN ACTION

- This model is responsive to the community's desire for increased communication, guidance, and collaboration in their desire to change their environments
- This model keeps the work in the community not at a city agency, increasing ownership and sustainability
- Allows for a more-nimble department, focusing on guiding many efforts rather than leading a few



MESSAGING

- Coordinated efforts with the HOP to promote access to national and local suicide prevention resources
- Recommended by the FTA (Federal Transit Authority) for suicide prevention messaging on all RTA's
- Community partners included:

 - Milwaukee County Behavioral Health Services

SUICIDE AND RECKLESS DRIVING

- Partnership established with community partners to understand the correlation between suicide and reckless driving
- Research includes 3 aims:
 - 1. Examining and detailing evidence of suicide risk in the medical histories of decedents of single MVC
 - 2. Conducting psychological autopsy interviews with next of kin of a sample of decedents and conducting surveys with survivors of non-fatal SVMVCs
 - 3. Define a taxonomy of factors that can be used in SVMVC deaths or injuries
- Community partners include:
 - Medical College of Wisconsin
 - Sherman Park Neighborhood Association



OVP FAITH COMMUNITY COLLABORATIVE PARTNERSHIP

- Coordinate bi-monthly meetings with faith and community partners
 - Discuss strategies and actions steps to engage the faith community on violence prevention matters
 - Serve as a system of support to members of the faith community for violence prevention events and functions
- Conduct numerous pieces of training
 - Stop the Bleed (Froedtert Hospital / Medical College of Wisconsin)
 - Conflict De-escalation (414LIFE)
 - Psychological First Aid (The Salvation Army)
 - Trauma, Resilience, and Faith 101 (Advocate Aurora Health)

SAFE SUMMER INITIATIVE MILWAUKEE PROMISE KEEPERS

- 13 Outreach Teams
- Focus on Street Outreach to strategize, organize and mobilize block by block
- Operates off the understanding that residents have autonomy when provided resources
- Engages the community to drive and lead their vision for their neighborhood







SAFE SUMMER INITIATIVE

CHANGE MAKERS YOUTH COHORT

- Works to design programs based on contemporary interpretations of restorative justice
- Engages youth in the schools and within their communities to implement programs that address school push-out, youth violence, policing & juvenile justice
- Focus on dismantling the school-to-prison pipeline through social activism by children, families, & community



- 4 designated areas: Garden Homes Park, Harambee, Washington Park, and Near South Side Neighborhoods







<pre># of families engaged</pre>	212	182	272	89	194	203

Of the 272 referrals, 134 referrals were from District 5, 113 referrals were from District 7, and 25 referrals were from community partners such as the District Attorney's Office, the Crisis Mobile Team, and the Office of Violence Prevention.
