2012 Capital Improvements Goals:

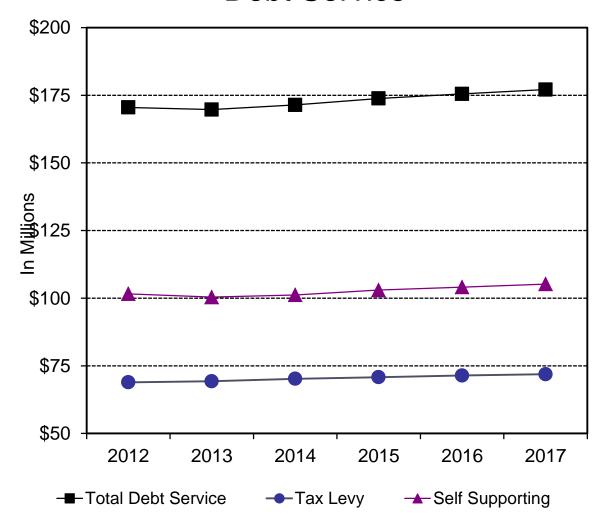
- 1. Identify 6-year capital improvement needs and prioritize within available funding levels.
- Develop investment strategies to ensure favorable results from city capital investments and avoid accelerated depreciation.
- Match capital borrowing to debt retirements in order to manage the debt levy and enhance the city's financial flexibility.

2012 Capital Improvements Financing Goals:

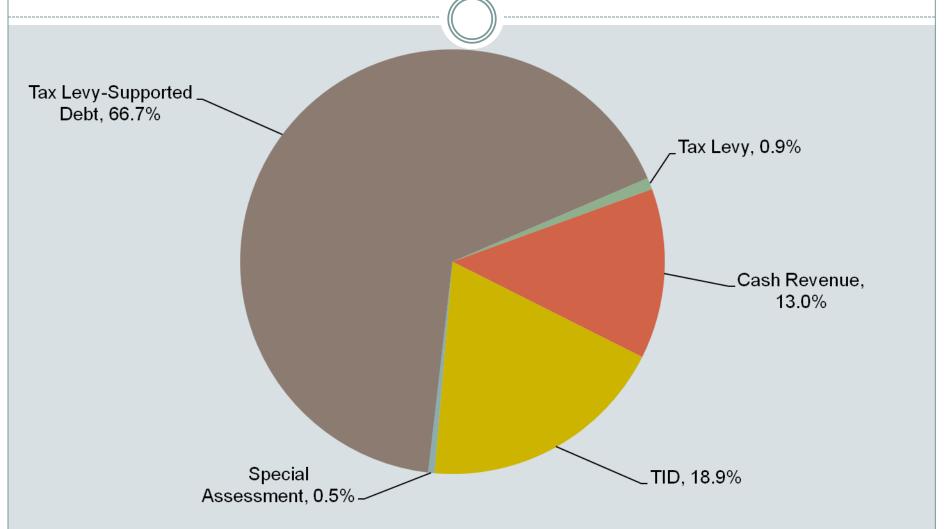
1. 3-Year levysupported average= \$75 million.

2. Use service linked revenues for Capital investments where feasible (Fleet equipment, Port projects).

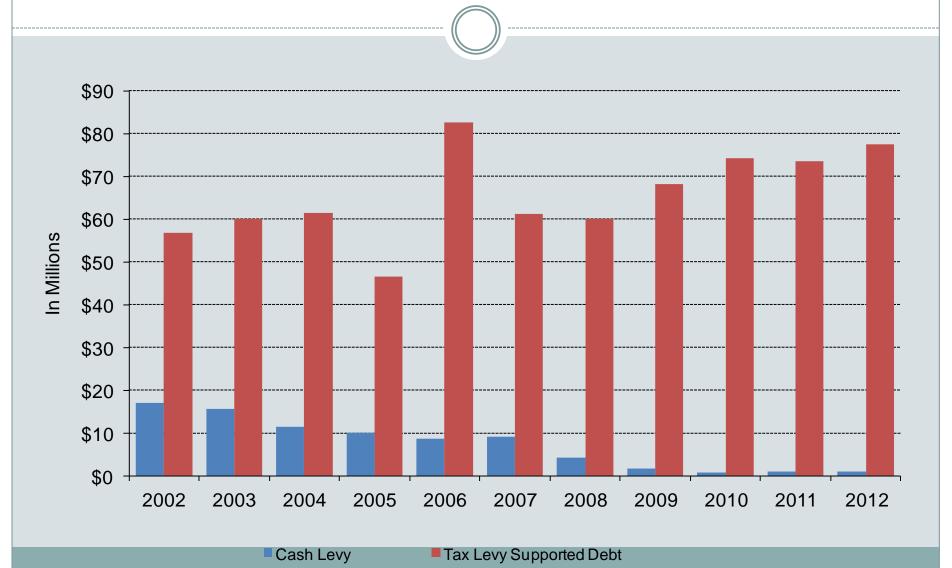
Debt Service

Enterprise Project Financing

- 1. Forestry from the Sewer Maintenance Fund Transfer to general fund
 - Allocates portion of storm water charge to tree production/planting & EAB preventive measures (cash finance): \$2,807,000

TID Finance

- Self-sustaining GO debt \$22,000,000
- Developer financed \$4,251,000

3. Enterprise funds

- Sewer Maintenance Program: ~ 9% cash-financed
- Milwaukee Water Works: traditionally cash, will rely on debt in 2012 & 2013
- Parking: debt financed

2012 Proposed Capital Improvements

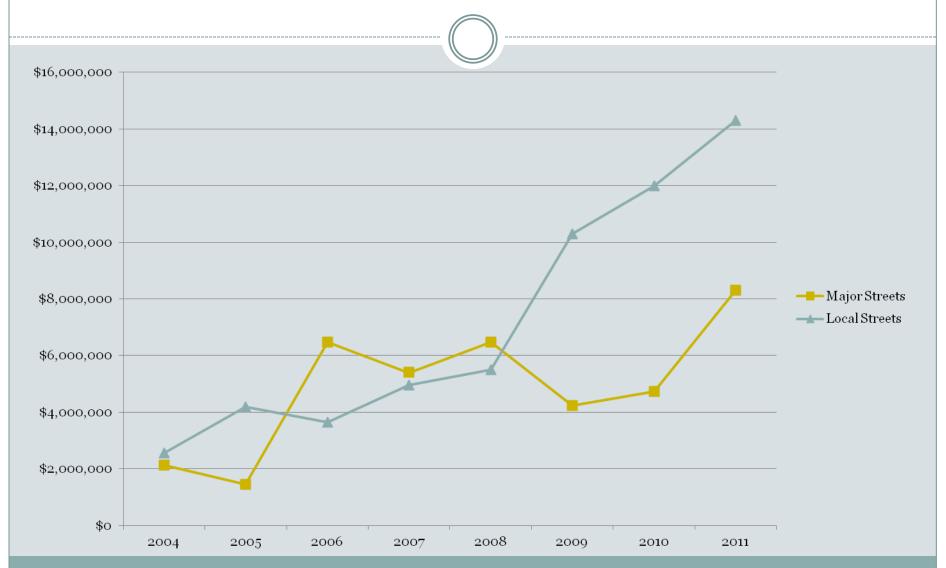
Financial Concerns:

- 1. City fiscal constraints
 - > \$80 m decline in CPIU-U-adjusted value of Shared Revenue since 2003
 - 70% of 2013 levy projected for non-discretionary items
- 2. Decline in State funding for Bridge Program
 - \$15 m average 2000-'11; \$3.5 m projected for '12-'17
- Milwaukee Water Works rate issues
- Sewer Maintenance Fund private property impacts on system operations
- 5. Future of City Hall project

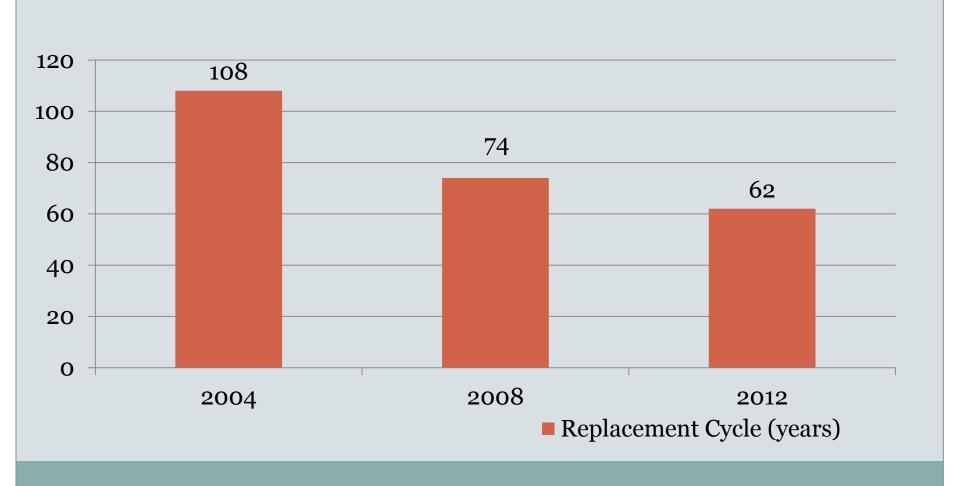
Core Infrastructure Programs (City funding amounts)

- 1. Major Streets: \$9,776,200
 - Federal stimulus supported major progress
 - Current replacement cycle of 46 years
- 2. Local Streets: \$13,000,000
 - ~ 16 miles (with LRIP) in 2012
 - 62-year replacement cycle
 - 50-year replacement cycle by 2016
- 3. Bridge Program: \$8,282,000
 - \$7.0 million for Pleasant Street
 - Revised 6-year plan includes 3 moveable bridge projects

Core Infrastructure Programs

- 4. Street Lighting: \$8,220,000
 - Includes \$1 million for series circuitry conversion
 - \$2.2 m for Neighborhood Lighting program
 - \$4.3 million driven by paving projects
- 5. Traffic Controls: \$2,303,000
 - Slow-down to some federal MUTCD mandates
- Conduit/Manholes: \$1,456,500
 - Includes essential & Greenfield Ave redevelopment conduit projects (\$1,156,500) and 50% increase for manhole improvements (\$300,000)

Core Infrastructure Programs

- 7. Alleys: \$800,000 City-financed
- 8. Sidewalks: \$1,000,000 City-financed

Alleys and sidewalks remained funded at 2011 levels. Goal is to increase funding by 2016 for these two programs.

Core Infrastructure Programs

- 9. Sewer Maintenance Fund: \$40,640,000
 - 29 miles of sewer work (15 replacement/14 relining)
 - 90-year replacement cycle
 - \$400,000 channel restoration project
 - Private property partnership with MMSD (\$2.64 million)
- 10. Milwaukee Water Works: \$9,320,000
 - Virtually no new funding for Water Mains due to existing authority available & financial shortfall
 - 2012 focus is on Facility Improvements & back-up Power generation
- 11. Forestry Programs: \$3,194,000
 - \$1,584,000 for Tree Production & Planting
 - \$923,000 for EAB Protection
 - \$447,000 for Concealed Irrigation

Major Projects

- 1. 8th Floor of City Hall City Attorney's Office
 - \$1,600,000 for Phase I (\$4.8 m Total Project)
- 2. Police Administration Building
 - \$5,460,000 (\$58 m. estimated through 2019)
- 3. DPW Facilities Capital Accounts:
 - \$3,502,900
- 4. DPW Fleet Equipment:
 - \$6,000,000
