HOUSING & SUPPORTIVE SERVICES

491 individuals, \$1,148,480 in leveraged goods, services and funds

The Chrysalis Transitional Housing Program served 48 families, including 51 adults and 108 children, as well as 37 single women.

The Thresholds Emergency Shelter Program served **160 single** men.

Surgeon's Quarters SRO supportive permanent housing program run in partnership with the *City of Milwaukee, Friends of Housing*, and the *Department of Veterans Affairs* assisted 75% of its **16 clients** in maintaining permanent housing for 6 months or more.

The Housing Authority of the City of Milwaukee and Friends of Housing in 2012 provided over \$59,600 in Rent Assistance and management services to individuals living in the Surgeon's Quarters SRO program.

Over \$24,799 in new clothing was distributed, over \$41,810 in furniture and household goods, and over \$4,558 in hygiene supplies were distributed to homeless adults, children, and members of the community.

Mercy Housing Lakefront, Milwaukee County, and Hope House partnered to open the Johnston Center in 2010, low income apartments for 91 individuals who are chronically homeless or at risk of homelessness. In 2012, the project housed 119 individuals. Mercy Housing Lakefront contributed \$453,077 in property management fees.

Milwaukee County Housing Division provided over \$564,636 in rent assistance to individuals residing in the Johnston Center in 2012.

EDUCATION

HEALTH

704 individuals, \$70,863 in leveraged goods, services and funds.

550 youth staying at Hope House and living in the Clock Tower Acres neighborhood, received backpacks stuffed with a year's worth of school supplies with a total value of **\$30,863**.

50 adults participated in the Pathways to Progress Adult Education Program, with **9 adults** completing their General Equivalency Diploma in 2012.

MATC provides a teacher, computers, and GED software to the Pathways to Progress Adult Education Program - a \$40,000 investment.

The Shining Stars Youth Program served 104 students who participated in 3,419 hours of individual tutoring and 8,052 hours of educational enrichment workshops and summer field trip activities in 2012.

4,155 individuals, \$495,104 in leveraged goods, services and funds.

Angel of Hope Clinic provided medical care for **4,155 Milwaukee county residents**, including those suffering from diabetes and hypertension.

Wheaton Franciscan Healthcare provides over \$371,084 in support to the Angel of Hope Clinic, including 3 full-time and 2 part-time staff, medical testing, and other services.

Healthcare for the Homeless provides a full-time bilingual Medical Social Worker, and other support to the Angel of Hope Clinic valued at over \$118,000.

35 hours of mental health services valued at \$6,020 provided by *Aurora Family Services* to homeless individuals in 2012.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

Over 10,500 individuals, \$291,870 in leveraged goods, services, and funds.

In 2012, **3,642** households from the 53204 zip code received emergency food distributions from the United South Side Food Pantry. This totals **5,512** adults and **4,310** children.

The United South Side Food Pantry brings in over \$232,875 in food donations for distribution to the community.

Hope House Protective Payee Program manages money and provides case management for 47 disabled households - 8 families and 39 singles - to prevent homelessness and maintain permanent housing.

Through the Hope House Street Fair Event, over **550 youth** received school supplies valued at over **\$30,863**.

100 households received holiday food and gifts in 2012. In addition, Career Youth Development and Healthcare for the Homeless received toys and gifts to distribute throughout Milwaukee. Holiday toy, food, and gift distribution were valued at over \$28,132.
