The purpose of this grant is to fund expenditures in support of the Milwaukee Police Department's STOP program.

**4. Results Measurement/Progress Report (Applies only to Programs):**

*The overall goal of the STOP Program is to address and build relationships between the police and youths and decrease the likelihood that a police/youth encounter will become a volatile interaction. The MPD seeks to cultivate sustainable positive relationships that can have a meaningful impact on youth that sustains itself into their adult years. The MPD has identified three (3) specific goals of the program that when achieved will be able to guide the program outcomes. These are:*

- a. Increase positive perception and decrease negative perception of the police among youths (relationship building).*
- b. Increase knowledge of police officers functions (especially knowledge related to field interviews and traffic stops) among youth.*
- c. Increase knowledge of what to do when in contact with or stopped by the police.*

*The primary objective of this project is to assist in the full implementation of the STOP Program within the public and charter school system in Milwaukee for the 2013-14 school year. The MPD will conduct approximately 30 STOP sessions. Each session will have 12 students. It is anticipated that 360 students will be trained in the STOP Program for the 2013-14 school year.*

*In addition to the implementation of the STOP Program, the MPD will continue their partnership with the researchers from University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee to conduct pre and post evaluations in order to measure program effectiveness. The researchers will conduct visual observation of the program in order to measure classroom dynamics and police/youth engagement. Upon completion of the evaluation, the researchers will publish a report describing their findings of program effectiveness. It is expected that the final evaluation can serve as a national model that can be used to enhance police/youth relationships nationwide.*
