

- Accounts for rectangular shapes only
- Only intended to provide context while shapes & styles are chosen, more detail is required before accurate quotes can be obtained









Added costs

- Plaque shapes beyond simple rectangles or ovals are quoted on an individual basis
- Highly detailed images such as the city seal or a QR code are *etched* to preserve details, and attached to the plaque after it is cast, which adds \$150± to any plaque.







QR codes

- A snapshot away from learning more online from a mobile device
- Currently popular and relevant technology immediate interest and impact
- Added cost associated with metal etching a small detailed element
- QR code and associated links/pages require manual upkeep

Written web address

- Internet is likely here to stay, thus web address nomenclature will probably remain too
- Link and associated pages require manual upkeep
- Not quite as 'snappy' as a hip piece of technology like QR code
- No extra cost for normal lettering

Visual search engines / Google Glass

- Current/future technology may allow for information/website linking to images, with no codes or links required of the user
- Removes the need for dated technology references on "timeless" casted bronze piece
- No real guarantee that this technology will become part of every day life






