




- Establish spatial context for strategies to improve public safety & resolve neighborhood conditions that contribute to neighborhood concerns

Spatial Context

- 1. Challenges and neighborhood problems are geographically concentrated.
 - Significant ethnic disparities regarding victimization
- Public safety challenges are correlated with economic and property conditions.
- 3. Strategies relating to resource deployment, prevention, and problem resolution have a significant spatial dimension.







In addition to FOCUS, MFD installed an additional 736 smoke detectors to homes that were requested through the Smoke Detector Hotline or First Responder installations.


Milwaukee Fire Department Calls for Service Comparison



Milwaukee Fire Department Average Response Times




City of Milwaukee Fire Fatality Report 25 Year Overview 1989 – 2013




2015 FOCUS Strategy

- 4. Response times to 2014 fires with fatalities were within standards







Homicide Victims, 2009-2013




Homicide Victims Killed with a Firearm, 2007–2013




Victims of Gun Violence, 2007–2013




Non-Fatal Shooting Victims, 2009-2013

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Neighborhood Blight Elimination

- DNS issues and enforces 8-900 placard orders a year for buildings that are unsafe or unfit for human habitation.
- DNS has averages 1,200-1,300 board ups of vacant property.
- On average DNS does 3,300 nuisance property investigations per year in conjunction with MPD.
- ▶ There are 1,600 active cases in the monthly re-inspection program. Typically in a given year 900 cases are resolved while an additional 400 cases are added. Many of these cases relate to nuisance activity at blighted property.
- DNS demolished 210 properties in 2013 and have demolished 221 buildings so far in 2014. Additionally DPW has demolished 41 properties in 2014. By definition, these buildings are either deemed unsafe or nuisances.

Key Takeaways
