Re: Analysis of Milwaukee Police Department Quality of Life Data

At your hearing on the 5<sup>th</sup> of April, you asked some questions about the decrease in the number of Quality of Life traffic citations. Our responses follow.

Did the number of citations decrease because officers were responding to more calls for service, or making arrests for serious crimes?

Data provided by the Milwaukee Police Department show that while the number of Priority One dispatches increased slightly from 1999 to 2000, the number of dispatches in all other priority categories, and the total number, decreased.

The numbers of both adult and juvenile arrests for all crimes (including Index crimes) increased from 1996 to 1998, then decreased in both 1999 and 2000.

Index crime arrests have decreased for adults since 1994 and for juveniles since 1995. Given dispatch and arrest data, it is unlikely that there was a decreased response to traffic offenses because officers were responding to more serious crimes.

Did the number of citations for lower volume violations, especially graffiti, decrease?

Since littering, loud music, and public drinking are probably more prevalent in spring and summer, it is not surprising that the quarters ending in June and September have the most most citations. The quarter ending December 2000 was unusually cold and snowy, which may account for low numbers of concealed weapon, curfew, and pedestrian violations. Graffiti, however, shows a sharp decrease in the number of citations after the quarter ending March 2000.
