Τ	PROCEEDINGS
2	CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: We're all set. Okay.
3	Good morning. This is a special meeting of the Common
4	Council's Utilities and Licenses Committee for Monday,
5	April 8th, 2002.
6	My name is Jeff Pawlinski. I'm the chairman
7	of the committee. I represent the 13th District on
8	the south side, joined today by fellow committee
9	members. To my far right is Alderwoman Rosa Cameron
10	from the 10th District. To my far left is Jim Bohl of
11	the 2nd District. Joining us shortly will be Alderman
12	Fred Gordon of the 7th District, and Alderman Terrance
13	Herron, who is the vice chairman of this committee, is
14	excused from this meeting today.
15	We are joined by other City Hall staff
16	today. On my far left is Bruce Schrimpf, who is our
17	Assistant City Attorney, and Linda Elmer is our staff
18	assistant, and she's our committee clerk. We're also
19	joined by Jim Copeland from the Licensing Division,
20	and I'll ask Mr. Schrimpf to swear our staff in,
21	including Alderman D'Amato.
22	(Whereupon Alderman D'Amato, Jim Copeland,
23	and the Court Reporter Were Sworn Under Oath.)
24	CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Now, all those
25	individuals in the audience today who wish to testify

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on this matter, either in favor of the request or in
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- 2 opposition to the request, you'll also need to be
- 3 sworn in, so why don't we swear everyone in at the
- 4 same time.
- 5 (Whereupon All Witnesses Were Sworn Under
- 6 Oath.)
- 7 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Thank you. Okay. We
- 8 only have one item on the agenda today, and that is
- 9 the item in Alderman D'Amato's district, and that's
- 10 the 3rd Aldermanic District, for Brian Barmore, who
- is the agent for the Jewel Food Stores, Inc., the
- 12 Class "A" liquor and malt application for Jewel-Osco
- No. 1403, at 709 East Capitol Drive.
- How we're going to proceed is this way.
- We're going to have Alderman D'Amato make a couple
- of opening comments, followed by a presentation from
- 17 the representatives from Jewel-Osco. Then we had
- individuals sign in, and I will call you by name.
- 19 And prior to having everyone testify, we will take
- 20 the opponents first, followed by the supporters.
- 21 Prior to taking citizen testimony, I'll
- 22 establish some ground rules for you so we can proceed
- properly. So we'll start off with Alderman D'Amato.
- 24 ALDERMAN D'AMATO: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
- 25 If I could just ask for one deviation from the way in

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1 which you listed things, there is a covenant that has
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- 2 been signed by a number of members, and if at the very
- 3 least, after the representatives from Jewel-Osco
- 4 speak, if someone from the Riverwest Neighborhood
- 5 Association can speak and explain that so that others
- 6 who testify afterwards know what they're talking
- 7 about.
- 8 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: All right. Excellent.
- 9 MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman, just on that
- 10 point, I would ask that whoever testifies as to that
- 11 agreement, indicate its truthfulness and its
- 12 authenticity. So it would be helpful if one of the
- signatories, for example, could testify to it just for
- 14 hearsay purposes.
- 15 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Okay. If that person
- is here, that would be wonderful.
- 17 ALDERMAN D'AMATO: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
- 18 Thank you for calling this special meeting. I just
- want to set the stage for you. This is a liquor
- 20 license for a grocery store at 709 East Capitol Drive,
- 21 formerly a Pick 'N Save store, now a Jewel-Osco store.
- 22 About two years ago we received and passed
- on to the Licensing Division a petition of 600 names
- of individuals who wanted to be notified if this store
- ever applied for a liquor license. That application

3 When we learned that this was going to proceed to committee, we had notified the neighbors 4 that was going to happen, and there was one 5 6 neighborhood group who took the initiative to meet 7 with people at Jewel-Osco, the Riverwest Neighborhood 8 Association, staffed by the Riverwest YMCA, and those 9 two parties got together to put together a covenant 10 that they believe would go far in governing what would 11 happen at the store with regard to the types of 12 products they have, the size of the store, and some other things. I believe that both those parties 13

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forward.

We sent out the notices as was requested by those in the petition, so for this meeting 600 notices were sent out. Some of those neighbors over the weekend and late last week contacted my office to say that they did not agree with the covenant and with the Riverwest Neighborhood Association and would like to come and testify on their own to the committee to let them know of their objection.

worked in good faith with one another as they went

So as we go forward, we really have, I think, three parties. We have the applicant, we have

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1 the Riverwest Neighborhood Association, and their
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- 2 working with the applicant, and then we have neighbors
- 3 who live near the store who are generally opposed to
- 4 the granting of a liquor license. And I would ask
- 5 that you take each of them and show them respect for
- 6 their opinion.
- 7 I don't think any one should weigh over any
- 8 other, and I'm sure that the committee in their wisdom
- 9 will make the right decision.
- 10 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Okay. Thank you very
- 11 much.
- MR. COPELAND: Mr. Chairman.
- 13 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Yes, Mr. Copeland.
- 14 MR. COPELAND: Point of clarification.
- There was 886 notices sent out.
- 16 ALDERMAN D'AMATO: Thank you.
- 17 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: And they were all
- mailed out about 10 days ago; is that correct?
- MR. COPELAND: Yes.
- 20 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Okay. We're going to
- 21 start with Jewel-Osco. In fact, in interest of time,
- 22 if the representative from the Riverwest Neighborhood
- 23 Association could also come to the table, perhaps the
- Jewel-Osco folks can sit here on my left, and the
- 25 Riverwest Neighborhood Association people can sit here

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- 1 on the right.
- 2 Mr. Farris, I'll ask you to maybe kick it
- 3 off with your representative here. I assume this is
- 4 Brian Barmore, correct, the agent?
- 5 MR. FARRIS: Correct.
- 6 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Okay, Mr. Barmore.
- 7 Sir, what is your name?
- 8 MR. SINGLETON: I'm George Singleton.
- 9 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Zingleton, with a Z?
- 10 MR. SINGLETON: Singleton, S-i-n-q.
- 11 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: All right. Thank you,
- 12 Mr. Singleton. Mr. Farris, why don't we start with
- you, and then perhaps we'll hear from Mr. Barmore,
- 14 followed by Mr. Singleton.
- MR. FARRIS: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
- I'll be brief. As Alderman D'Amato indicated, we've
- been working over a period of time with the Riverwest
- 18 Neighborhood Association and George Singleton here and
- 19 Jan Christenson of the YMCA to see if there was a way
- 20 to accommodate the interests of both the neighborhood
- 21 and the Jewel-Osco Store, and as a result of those
- 22 discussions, Jewel-Osco agreed to reduce the size of
- 23 the proposed store to only 24 hundred square feet.
- It's going to have a separate entry, common foyer,
- 25 the standard protocol in the City of Milwaukee.

1	The store also agreed to carry Riverwest
2	products, and we've already started performing under
3	that covenant; Lakefront Brewery and some other items
4	that we're carrying in the store.
5	And then the other the most important
6	thing as far as the covenant, in my mind, was limiting
7	the products that would be sold there so that we don't
8	encourage patrons coming in for just a bottle, people
9	that have problem drinking issues and who want to come
10	in and pick up just a half pint or a big bottle of
11	beer or malt liquor or something like that.
12	So we have a covenant that we'll put in the
13	record that indicates the kind of things we won't
14	sell; individual cans of beer, bottles of beer,
15	fortified wines, things like that, so
16	CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: 40-ouncers, I would
17	assume, is part of that covenant?
18	MR. FARRIS: Right. And so that's what
19	we've done. We don't believe there's any kind of
20	concentration issue in the area. It's an important
21	service to patrons of the food store.

If you're like me, you like being able to buy a bottle of wine at the same time as you buy your groceries. It's a matter of convenience. It saves a trip. And that's what we hope to offer to the

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1 customers from the Riverwest area. The agent's here
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- 2 if you have any questions.
- 3 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Now, for the record, we
- 4 do have a copy of the covenant within our packet, so
- for the record, we do need to make it a part of our
- 6 committee record, and I'll have Alderwoman Cameron do
- 7 so. Is there any objection to that from the
- 8 committee? Hearing none, so ordered.
- 9 So we have had a chance to review this as
- 10 part of the meeting today, but I wanted to get you on
- 11 record, Mr. Farris, as to the kinds of things you
- won't sell as part of the covenant. Mr. Barmore, is
- there anything you want to add as part of that or not?
- MR. BARMORE: No, I don't think so.
- MR. SCHRIMPF: Question.
- 16 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Yes, Mr. Schrimpf.
- 17 MR. SCHRIMPF: Thank you. Either for
- 18 counsel or for Mr. Barmore, however you wish to handle
- 19 it, what do you envision as the length of time of this
- 20 covenant? In perpetuity for the store, for the life
- of the store? For a year, two years, three years?
- 22 MR. FARRIS: No, I think perpetuity would be
- our understanding on it. The products would be
- limited forever. We'll continue to work to try to
- 25 carry Riverwest products. We want the store to be a

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1 benefit to the neighboring community, and the size
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- 2 will never be changed. I guess -- So I think we could
- 3 say it's perpetuity. Obviously 10 years from now --
- 4 Things change sometimes, so perpetuity isn't always
- 5 perpetuity, but I would say for the long-term,
- foreseeable future, this should govern the operations
- 7 of the store.
- 8 MR. SCHRIMPF: And directing it specifically
- 9 to, for example, the issues of individual cans of
- 10 beer, bottles of beer, the exclusion of 32- and 40-
- 11 ounce bottles, the exclusion of fortified wines, half
- 12 pints and blunts, these are legal products that could
- otherwise be sold in the store, and it is the
- 14 intention of the store not to sell those products?
- MR. FARRIS: That's correct, Counsel. One
- other thing I had, too, just so the -- One concern
- 17 that everybody had would be that students would do a
- 18 lot -- shop here; we would be encouraging more student
- 19 drinking by opening up another liquor outlet, and it's
- 20 a very small part of our business.
- 21 Quarter barrels and things like that, you
- 22 have to make a reservation beforehand. You can't just
- 23 walk in and buy one, like you can at a lot of places
- like on Oakland Avenue where you can go in, and last-
- 25 minute parties can sprout up. So we don't have that.

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                  We don't think it will be a problem as far
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        as increasing the teenage drinking problem, the
        student drinking problem that I know that Alderman
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        D'Amato has a lot of issues with on the east side.
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                  MR. SCHRIMPF: That's all I have,
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       Mr. Chairman.
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                  CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Okay, thank you,
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       Mr. Schrimpf. Other questions of Mr Farris?
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                  ALDERMAN BOHL: Yes, Mr. Chairman.
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                  CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Alderman Bohl.
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                  ALDERMAN BOHL: Thank you. Mr. Farris, in
        terms of the operations, you indicated that there
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        would be a separate entrance for this liquor store.
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                  MR. FARRIS: Right.
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                  ALDERMAN BOHL: Does that mean that items
        could be purchased, and there would be a separate
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        scanning area where those items would have to be
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        purchased? Or would individuals be able to grab the
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        wine bottle, walk around to the main shopping area,
        put it in their cart, and pay for it with their
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        regular groceries in the general checkout area?
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                  MR. FARRIS: No, you have to pay for it
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before you leave the segregated liquor area. We

prefer not to call it a liquor store because it's part

of the store, although it's physically separate. But

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1 you have to pay for it, come out. They would be able

- 2 to take it in their cart with them if they bought
- 3 groceries.
- In my experience, people usually do their
- 5 grocery shopping first and then come in and get a
- 6 bottle of wine afterwards.
- 7 ALDERMAN BOHL: That's all, Mr. Chairman.
- 8 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Thank you.
- 9 MR. FARRIS: Should we move back?
- 10 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Yeah, why don't you do
- that. We'll hear from Mr. Singleton, and then we'll
- move on to the neighbors.
- MR. SINGLETON: Well, what I'd like to say
- is regarding the Jewel-Osco proposed liquor store or
- 15 liquor site at 709 East Capitol Drive, I don't
- 16 believe -- Should I read this covenant that we have?
- 17 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: We have it in our
- 18 packets.
- 19 MR. SINGLETON: You've got it in your record.
- 20 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: We've read it, right.
- 21 If you would like to review some basic --
- MR. SINGLETON: Just some basics, yeah.
- 23 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Go ahead.
- 24 MR. SINGLETON: In working with the
- Jewel-Osco people since last year, the Riverwest

Neighborhood Association was concerned as well as the alderman at that time about the proposed liquor store

3 going in at that location.

One of the things was just the sizing of the store itself, and through working with Jewel-Osco people, the Riverwest Neighborhood Association had proposed a 36 hundred square foot store down from the 48 hundred that was proposed. But in working with the Jewel-Osco people, the proposed sizing is limited to 24 hundred square feet.

And, again, regarding the development of the Jewel-Osco liquor store at the East Capitol Drive location, the Riverwest Neighborhood Association has taken on the following positions: Again, proposed sizing, 24 hundred square feet. We expect the Jewel-Osco store to be good neighbors with a well-managed operation and adequate security measures both in the store itself and in the parking lot.

I visited several stores. I found that to be true. The stores are well-maintained. The liquor stores that are -- or the liquor places that I visited, they were all generally the same size, separate entrances, well kept-up, clean. And the products that we indicated as far as the individual cans of beer, individual bottles of beer, that's the

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1 15- and 24- ounce cans and the 32-ounce and 40-ounce
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- 2 bottles of beer, I did not see those at any of the
- 3 stores that I visited.
- 4 And this covenant is based on the covenant
- 5 that was proposed for Jewel-Osco at their newest store
- 6 at 35th and North Avenue.
- 7 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: In your capacity with
- 8 Riverwest Neighborhood Association, are you the
- 9 co-chair?
- 10 MR. SINGLETON: I'm one of three co-chairs,
- 11 that's correct. And in working with the Jewel-Osco,
- 12 we have -- As far as their supporting local businesses
- 13 in the area, they are doing that and have done that
- 14 with Bologna, which you have noted in the records
- 15 there, Bologna Pasta. Their products were introduced
- into the stores just in the last month. Lakefront
- Brewery. Some of the products are in three of the
- 18 stores, but as far as I know, their products will be
- increased or expanded in all of the stores of
- 20 Jewel-Osco.
- 21 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Okay. Questions of
- Mr. Singleton by the committee? None.
- MS. REESE: I would like to just add, I'm
- 24 also a member of the Riverwest Neighborhood
- 25 Association. My name is Tess Reese. And we would

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1 like to clarify what our position is on this
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- 2 application, and that is we are not either in support
- 3 or opposed to the license.
- 4 We felt that if they went in to apply for a
- 5 license, that we would work out an agreement with them
- 6 as to what would be acceptable should a license be
- 7 granted, but we at this point are not either in
- 8 support or opposed to the license.
- 9 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Tess, tell us what
- 10 comprises the Riverwest Association. Is this a group
- 11 of neighborhood associations, or is this strictly your
- 12 own separate board?
- MS. REESE: Riverwest Neighborhood
- 14 Association has been around for three or four years,
- so it's a group of residents that live in the
- 16 neighborhood. They meet on a monthly basis. The
- 17 minutes of the meeting are reported in the Riverwest
- 18 Currents Newsletter, and the Riverwest Currents is now
- 19 a monthly community newspaper.
- 20 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: And what are the
- 21 physical boarders of Riverwest? I mean, I assume
- 22 when you have membership, you have people within the
- boundaries of some border, correct?
- MS. REESE: Yeah. There are residents that
- 25 live within Riverwest from North Avenue to Capitol

1 Drive, and from the river over to Holton Street and

- 2 some even west of Holton Street.
- 3 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Okay. Do you -- Are
- 4 there dues paid by the membership, or you can just
- 5 join by being a resident of the area?
- 6 MS. REESE: The only requirement is that
- 7 you're a resident in the area, and only residents
- 8 can vote on things as far as the organization is
- 9 concerned.
- 10 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Okay. How big is the
- 11 board?
- MS. REESE: We have three co-chairs, we have
- a secretary, and we have -- and we don't have a
- 14 treasurer. We don't have funds. But at the monthly
- meetings we get anywhere from 20 to 30 people,
- depending on what the issues are.
- We also have three subcommittees that are
- 18 concerned with crime and safety issues, Holton Street
- 19 development as far as how it's affecting Riverwest,
- and guardians of green space. We're all concerned
- 21 about preserving green space in Riverwest.
- 22 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Great. Questions by
- 23 committee?
- MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman?
- 25 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Yes, Mr. Schrimpf.

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1 MR. SCHRIMPF: Actually, I have a question
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- of Mr. Singleton if that's appropriate.
- 3 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Go ahead.
- 4 MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Singleton, do you have a
- 5 copy of the agreement before you?
- 6 MR. SINGLETON: Yes, right here.
- 7 MR. SCHRIMPF: And that is your signature
- 8 there?
- 9 MR. SINGLETON: Yes.
- 10 MR. SCHRIMPF: And in addition to Ms. Sense,
- 11 yourself, and Ms. Smart, could you tell me how many
- 12 co-chairs of the organization there are?
- MR. SINGLETON: There are three.
- MR. SCHRIMPF: And you are the three?
- MR. SINGLETON: I'm one of the three, yes.
- MR. SCHRIMPF: That's all I have,
- 17 Mr. Chairman.
- 18 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: All right. Thank you
- 19 very much for coming in. We're going to move on to
- 20 citizen testimony, and we did have all of the people
- 21 who wanted to testify register. We're going to take
- 22 the people that are opposed first, and I'm going to
- call them in the order that they were signed up, so
- this is just first-come, first-serve.
- 25 Here are the ground rules. I'll establish

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1 those first before we call individual names up.
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- 2 Because we are a quasi-judicial body, and because we
- 3 operate under state statute and city code, there are a
- 4 couple of things we cannot consider. Number one,
- 5 competition. We cannot consider competition as a
- 6 reason to deny a license. Competition is left up to
- 7 the free market, and that is not under our
- 8 jurisdiction.
- 9 Number two, if you have a neighborhood
- 10 petition, we cannot receive a neighborhood petition.
- 11 Individual people have to testify on their own as to
- their own feelings on this issue. So if you've
- gathered neighborhood petitions over the weekend, we
- 14 unfortunately cannot receive that as part of our
- 15 record. That would be illegal. Those are really the
- 16 two basic ground rules. Other than that, you're free
- 17 to give us the testimony that you have.
- I would ask you, if you can, to be direct
- 19 and concise because in the interest of time, we have
- 20 at least 10 people here that want to testify, so I'm
- 21 going to call up first Thomas Collin, followed by Amy
- Weisbrot, and the next person after that would be
- 23 Roseanne Screven. We'll take those three first, so
- 24 we'll go with Mr. Collin first.
- MR. COLLIN: Good morning. My name is

1 Thomas Collin. I have lived and raised my family at

- 2 3429 North Bremen Street in Riverwest, 3rd Aldermanic
- 3 District, for more than 20 years.
- 4 I speak today in opposition to Jewel-Osco's
- 5 request for license to sell alcoholic beverages.
- 6 That's East Capitol Drive Supermarket. The license
- 7 should be opposed for the following reasons: The area
- 8 does not need additional outlets for sale of liquor,
- 9 wine and beer. There are numerous existing retailers;
- 10 Extant, Love's Liquor, Gilbert's, Siegal's and
- 11 several others in the area within a short drive from
- 12 Shorewood.
- This has been opposed previously, and we
- 14 think it should be continued to be opposed. In a
- 15 community that's still struggling with all issues of
- substance abuse, including a surge in binge drinking
- among young adults, regardless of what ameliorated
- 18 affects are attempted, is not needed. We do not need
- 19 to further saturate our neighborhood.
- There's a larger impact as well. With a
- 21 retailer with such deep pockets, you will not only
- 22 have a physical presence, you're also going to have a
- 23 presence in the media. Everybody who lives in the
- area, whether they shop there or no, gets saturated
- 25 with ads from not only Jewel-Osco, but Kohl's and all

- 1 the other major chains.
- Now, added to that is going to be
- 3 advertisement, which I heard nothing about in the
- 4 covenant, for liquor. This just adds to a climate in
- 5 which we are struggling with binge drinking. I've got
- 6 three girls in Madison, Wisconsin. I've been in the
- 7 Riverwest area for a long time. I've been in UWM, and
- 8 to say that you don't need to look at this and care
- 9 for it is to turn your back on a serious problem.
- 10 Also, this is an area where you have some
- 11 history of addiction. I mean I've got people who have
- been in school, friends who've been in public school
- and private school, and there is a problem. This has
- 14 to be addressed, and people are turning towards
- 15 alcohol more after being into other kinds of drugs in
- 16 previous decades. I think we have to pay attention to
- 17 this.
- 18 Furthermore, I would like to address briefly
- 19 safety, road safety. We live very close to Keefe. We
- 20 live close to the major intersection in the Riverwest
- 21 area that leads into the backyard of these stores by
- 22 which many people travel. That is Fratney and Keefe.
- 23 Any additional travel at that intersection is going to
- 24 make for more danger, more traffic. There is a
- 25 residential section directly on Keefe. There are --

- 1 It's a mixed neighborhood.
- I think those are the points that I wish to
- 3 make today. I think the request should be turned down
- 4 for the good reasons cited above, and for those of
- 5 which you will continue to hear about. I urge the
- 6 committee to continue to keep liquor sales out of the
- 7 East Capitol Drive site. I thank the committee for
- 8 the opportunity to comment on this issue.
- 9 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Thank you, Mr. Collin.
- 10 Let me see if there are any questions.
- 11 ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chairman.
- 12 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Alderman Bohl.
- 13 ALDERMAN BOHL: Thank you. Mr. Collin, are
- 14 you a member of the Riverwest Neighborhood
- 15 Association?
- MR. COLLIN: No, I'm glad you asked. I
- 17 think the Riverwest Neighborhood Association has done
- 18 a less than perfect job of outreaching to the people
- 19 who are directly affected -- most directly affected by
- 20 this. I think the notice procedure, if not directly
- 21 flawed, has been truncated and was given a light
- 22 touch.
- I think Jewel-Osco has taken the opportunity
- 24 to negotiate with people who are not directly
- 25 involved, and personally, it gets my blood moving a

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1 little bit. I really think that they chose the right
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- 2 people, in that they chose people who were not easily
- 3 opposed, to negotiate with.
- 4 ALDERMAN BOHL: Were you one of the 886
- 5 individuals who, in the past, had indicated on a
- 6 petition to be notified?
- 7 MR. COLLIN: We did receive a letter.
- 8 ALDERMAN BOHL: Okay. So you were one of
- 9 those individuals who did receive the notification
- 10 from the city?
- MR. COLLIN: The negotiations have been
- 12 ongoing for a time. This letter came out 10 days ago.
- I am not -- Basically what I've learned about the
- 14 process has happened -- you know, has been learned in
- 15 this room.
- 16 ALDERMAN BOHL: And that you're aware of,
- 17 was there any public meeting that was held or that you
- 18 received notification --
- MR. COLLIN: Let me tell you the most
- 20 effective way --
- 21 ALDERMAN BOHL: -- from Riverwest?
- 22 MR. COLLIN: I'm sorry to interrupt, sir.
- 23 ALDERMAN BOHL: No, go right ahead.
- 24 MR. COLLIN: Thank you. The most effective
- 25 way to get ahold of people in the area would have been

1 to contact the block clubs and the block leaders, and

- 2 this has not happened in the area. We can assure you
- 3 of that. I mean that would have gotten -- If you
- 4 wanted to hear what the people wanted to say, that
- 5 would have been the way to do it. It was never done.
- 6 Why?
- 7 ALDERMAN BOHL: You raised a number of
- 8 issues. One was that there was already a
- 9 concentration of outlets, and there was no need for
- 10 an additional outlet. Another one had to do with
- 11 advertising, your concern that Jewel-Osco may
- 12 advertise liquor in its weekly flyers or circulars,
- 13 whatever you want to call them.
- I know that Jewel-Osco has other outlets
- that have liquor. I know Pick 'N Save and a number of
- 16 the other stores have outlets that have alcohol at
- 17 them. I don't ever recall, in terms of paging through
- 18 those circulars, seeing, you know, advertised next to
- 19 the cantaloupe special, that Captain Morgan's is on
- 20 sale here. I know that that is true with places like
- 21 Discount Liquor, especially around the holidays where
- 22 you'll see half page ads in the Journal Sentinel and
- some of the neighborhood flyers.
- 24 If they were to provide a commitment that
- 25 they would not do that here, would that ease your

- 1 concerns in some direction?
- 2 MR. COLLIN: It would ease a specific
- 3 concern about some advertising. I can't believe they
- 4 will for perpetuity -- and evidently perpetuity is not
- 5 an absolute phrase, as we've heard here today, -- back
- 6 off on advertising. I mean they have tried hard to
- 7 get into this place. They have tried hard to fill
- 8 that parking lot. They have only been partially
- 9 successful.
- 10 We think they should try and continue to
- 11 work being an effective retailer without the crutch
- 12 that -- that Gold Pick 'N Save was able to do without.
- 13 As far as ads are concerned, I -- It would allay a
- portion, but by no means the major concern.
- The major concern is more outlets, more
- booze in the area, a larger presence of traffic, the
- 17 potential for a deleterious impact in the local area.
- 18 I didn't cover that originally, but that shopping
- 19 mall, which has had its problems, but is -- I mean I
- go there all the time, you know. I mean you've got
- 21 numerous places there that could be affected if bad
- things happen, and bad things have happened there.
- 23 There was a murder.
- 24 ALDERMAN BOHL: Okay. The final question I
- 25 have for you is, I wanted to get a sense in terms of

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1 how far you are away. I know that you indicated
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- 2 you're on the 34 hundred block. Capitol is 39
- 3 hundred?
- 4 MR. COLLIN: 4,000.
- 5 ALDERMAN BOHL: 4,000. Okay.
- 6 MR. COLLIN: We're the last block before the
- 7 factories start.
- 8 ALDERMAN BOHL: Okay. So you're probably at
- 9 least in the area of roughly about a mile or so.
- MR. COLLIN: We are five blocks away.
- 11 ALDERMAN BOHL: Five blocks away. Okay. So
- three-quarters -- half, three-quarters of a mile away.
- 13 ALDERMAN GORDON: Half a mile.
- 14 ALDERMAN BOHL: Six blocks is a good half
- mile if they're long blocks, probably.
- 16 MR. COLLIN: We're the closest blocks to the
- 17 store. We have traffic, and traffic has continued to
- increase.
- 19 ALDERMAN BOHL: Okay. All right. That's
- 20 all. Thank you.
- 21 ALDERMAN GORDON: Mr. Chairman?
- 22 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Yes, Alderman Gordon.
- 23 ALDERMAN GORDON: Thank you. Mr. Collin, I
- just had a couple of questions relative to the
- 25 notification issue. Are you a member of a block watch

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1 or a block club?
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- 2 MR. COLLIN: I have been, and I work with
- 3 people who are.
- 4 ALDERMAN GORDON: And you indicated in your
- 5 testimony previously that that is the best way in your
- 6 estimation to get in contact with people in the
- 7 neighborhood, correct?
- 8 MR. COLLIN: It is, yes. The Riverwest
- 9 Currents is in its second complete edition. That
- 10 second complete edition -- I mean it's number two,
- issue number two. So to say that's been the means by
- which word has been passed is ingenuous.
- 13 ALDERMAN GORDON: Riverwest Currents?
- 14 MR. COLLIN: Yes. That was the paper that
- was claimed to be the means by which word was passed.
- 16 That is issue number two. It's the first one that's
- 17 been broadly distributed.
- 18 ALDERMAN GORDON: So you've attended no
- 19 block watch or block club meetings on this issue.
- MR. COLLIN: No, because none was called,
- 21 because notice never got there.
- 22 ALDERMAN GORDON: Is there a block club or
- 23 block watch to your knowledge within --
- MR. COLLIN: Fratney.
- 25 ALDERMAN GORDON: Fratney. That's the

- 1 closest one that you know of?
- 2 MR. COLLIN: That's across my alley. People
- 3 will talk to that.
- 4 ALDERMAN GORDON: Okay. And you indicated
- 5 that you feel that there are enough outlets in the
- 6 area currently.
- 7 MR. COLLIN: Anybody that goes to Jewel-Osco
- 8 is going to go by car with a very small set of
- 9 exceptions. Occasionally you'll see somebody walking
- along the industrial area, but most of the time it's
- 11 by car.
- 12 ALDERMAN GORDON: Is there an outlet close
- to where you live?
- 14 MR. COLLIN: Love's Liquor, yeah.
- 15 ALDERMAN GORDON: Thank you.
- 16 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Okay. The next speaker
- is Amy -- is it Weisbrot?
- MS. WEISBROT: That's correct.
- 19 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: For the record, I'll
- give the address for the court reporter. 3426 North
- 21 Fratney. Miss Weisbrot is part of the 34 hundred
- 22 block club of North Fratney.
- MS. WEISBROT: That's correct.
- 24 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: The block watch club
- over there. We'll hear from you next.

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1 MS. WEISBROT: Okay, thank you, and good
2 morning. Thanks for giving me the opportunity to
3 speak this morning.
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I served as co-captain of our block club.

John Lindquist is the official captain of our block club. Neither of us were invited to -- Neither of us were included in the decision making processes. We didn't even know about these meetings until we received a letter. We were one of the 800 however many people that received letters in the mail saying that there was a hearing today. That was the first we heard about it.

I personally went around this weekend, and I spoke to almost every household on our block. I also circulated a petition, which I wasn't aware wasn't going to be acceptable today, but that's okay.

I can honestly say that every neighbor that lives on our block without exception that I spoke with was strongly opposed to having Jewel-Osco sell liquor or alcohol on the premises. Fratney is already the main artery to Jewel. There's no other north-south streets that go between Humboldt and Holton directly to Capitol. You should see all the traffic that we already have that goes through to Capitol.

We have a high population of children, of

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1 \, pets, and vulnerable elderly on our block, and we're
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- very concerned about the increase in traffic volume,
- 3 as well as drivers that would possibly be under the
- 4 influence of alcohol speeding down the street.
- 5 Of even greater concern is the correlation
- 6 between liquor stores and increased crime in the area.
- 7 The corridor between Keefe and the Capitol store
- 8 contains way too many places for guys to be hanging
- 9 out and loitering, and that would be jeopardizing the
- 10 safety of kids that walk back and forth. Yes, it's
- 11 six blocks, but it's really -- This is our backyard
- 12 basically. We're right -- we're the last block before
- 13 the corridor that goes -- you know, there's a few
- factories, and then there's the entrance to the
- 15 parking lot.
- 16 And I want to add that it is not maintained
- 17 that well. It's already a security risk, and I feel
- 18 that selling alcohol on the premises would make the
- 19 shopping center a much scarier place for young kids
- and elderly who walk back and forth. The neighborhood
- 21 is not suffering for access to alcohol. Safety is a
- 22 much greater priority than increased access to
- 23 alcohol.
- I feel strongly about the fact that we
- 25 weren't included in the basic decision making. I feel

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1 like basic etiquette would have been to inform the
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- 2 block club members or the block club captains and co-
- 3 captains about this issue, and so I'm asking that
- because we weren't informed, -- we really weren't,
- 5 this is the honest to God truth, -- I'm asking that
- 6 you delay this decision for six months so that we have
- 7 an opportunity to organize our neighbors who really
- 8 feel this strongly about it. This is our backyard.
- 9 It would really directly negatively effect the quality
- of life in our area. Thank you.
- 11 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Thank you very much.
- 12 Questions by the committee of Miss Weisbrot?
- 13 ALDERMAN GORDON: Mr. Chairman.
- 14 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Alderman Gordon.
- 15 ALDERMAN GORDON: Thank you. Miss Weisbrot,
- you're requesting a six-month delay in order to notify
- 17 other residents in the area?
- MS. WEISBROT: Yes.
- 19 ALDERMAN GORDON: And would that encompass
- any other block watch organizations that you're
- 21 familiar with in the area?
- MS. WEISBROT: Well, there's Pier Street
- 23 block, there's Fratney Street block, and there's
- 24 Bremen Street block, and those are three critical
- 25 blocks. I just think it's coincidental that we

weren't all informed. This is our neighborhood.

- 2 This is our backyard.
- 3 The people who spoke with Alderman D'Amato
- 4 about this issue didn't really represent us, and it
- 5 doesn't really affect them as much as it affects us
- 6 because they don't live right next door to the store.
- 7 They don't see how much traffic goes in.
- 8 I guarantee you that if I was on a committee
- 9 to put in a liquor store at the Jewel-Osco on Humboldt
- and North, I would have included all of the people
- 11 that sat on that committee because it's closer to
- 12 their neighborhood. It's just common courtesy, basic
- 13 etiquette.
- 14 ALDERMAN GORDON: Thank you.
- 15 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: Mr. Chairman.
- 16 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Alderwoman Cameron,
- 17 and then Alderman Bohl.
- 18 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: Have you made an
- 19 attempt to talk to Alderman D'Amato about the Osco
- 20 having liquor?
- 21 MS. WEISBROT: I just saw him this morning
- 22 and shook his hand, and I understand that he was put
- in a compromised position because -- He supported it
- 24 because he felt that our area was adequately
- 25 represented by the Riverwest Neighborhood Association

- when, in fact, they were not.
- 2 But I'm pretty sure he's aware of the fact
- 3 that we had over 2,000 petitioners opposed to a liquor
- 4 store going in when Pick 'N Save was there, and most
- of the people that live in the area are homeowners and
- 6 feel strongly about it. They haven't moved. They
- 7 still feel strongly about being opposed to a liquor
- 8 store going into the neighborhood, and I'm pretty sure
- 9 he's aware of that.
- 10 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: Did you contact the
- 11 organization and voice your opinion once you received
- 12 the notice?
- MS. WEISBROT: Actually I didn't. What I
- did was I contacted neighbors in the area, and we all
- 15 kind of divvied up what we would do, and I volunteered
- to go around and talk to the neighbors in my
- 17 community. I gave up my entire weekend to do that,
- and I spoke with almost every single household on my
- 19 block.
- 20 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: Did the organization
- 21 come out and canvass your neighborhood?
- MS. WEISBROT: No, they did not.
- 23 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: Did someone from
- 24 Alderman D'Amato come out and canvass your
- 25 neighborhood?

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1 MS. WEISBROT: No. The first I heard about
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- 2 this was the letter that this gentleman here sent out,
- 3 and then I read about it in the paper last Thursday
- 4 that it was a done deal, and then there was going to
- 5 be a hearing afterwards, which I thought, well, this
- 6 is kind of backwards, and I questioned it.
- 7 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Well, for the record
- 8 there is no done deal.
- 9 MS. WEISBROT: That's good. That was the
- impression the article gave, though.
- 11 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: And I don't know who
- 12 wrote the article. I don't know if it was a Journal
- 13 Sentinel article, but --
- MS. WEISBROT: It was.
- 15 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Okay. I can tell you
- it was never a done deal with this committee.
- 17 MS. WEISBROT: Well, thank you for that
- 18 correction. I appreciate that. But I was a little
- 19 alarmed when I read it because I thought, well, geez,
- 20 I live right on the block that would be most directly
- 21 affected because it's the main thoroughfare. You
- should see all the traffic we've got. It's just
- 23 abominable. And having a liquor store there would
- just make it even more unsafe.
- 25 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: How far do you live

- from Gaenslen School?
- MS. WEISBROT: Gaenslen School is on
- 3 Burleigh -- What hundred is Burleigh? 30 hundred?
- 4 So it's about four blocks --
- 5 ALDERMAN BOHL: 31 hundred.
- 6 MR. COLLIN: It's about three blocks south
- 7 and -- It's about seven blocks in total.
- 8 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: From you, where you
- 9 live?
- MS. WEISBROT: Uh-hmm.
- 11 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: Or from the store?
- MS. WEISBROT: Fratney Street School is even
- 13 closer.
- MR. SCHRIMPF: We can't have people from the
- 15 audience chiming in. We've got to get this down on
- 16 the record.
- MS. WEISBROT: Fratney Street School is just
- a couple blocks south of where I live. They would be
- 19 directly affected, too.
- 20 MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman, the record
- 21 should reflect that -- and he's chosen, apparently,
- 22 not to do it, but Mr. Farris should have the
- 23 opportunity to cross-examine.
- 24 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Right. And he's
- 25 welcome to sit at the table and do that on any

individual he wishes to, but I didn't see him jump

- 2 up, so I assumed he didn't want to.
- 3 MR. SCHRIMPF: I just wanted to make that
- 4 clear.
- 5 MR. COLLIN: Is it possible to ask
- 6 Mr. Farris a question?
- 7 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Well, you can direct
- 8 it to the committee and see if he'll respond.
- 9 Mr. Farris, why don't you take a seat up here.
- 10 MR. FARRIS: Sure.
- 11 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: It might be best to
- have you up here the whole time anyway. Mr. Collin,
- 13 why don't you address your question to the committee,
- 14 and Mr. Farris will answer.
- MR. COLLIN: Are you going to sell pints?
- 16 That's very straightforward. Is pints covered by the
- 17 covenant?
- 18 MR. FARRIS: I think half pints was all that
- 19 was requested, but if that's the -- I mean we can --
- 20 We're always willing to discuss that issue.
- 21 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: So you're open to the
- 22 idea of not selling pints.
- MR. FARRIS: I think we're open to anything,
- I mean -- And I'll just point out one thing. We
- 25 didn't selectively pick the Riverwest Neighborhood

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1 Association to negotiate with. This is somebody we
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- 2 were put in contact with that was -- who we believed
- 3 and were under the impression that were representing
- 4 the entire group. There's no attempt to try to
- 5 conduct anything secretly.
- This took a long time, and we assumed that
- 7 consensus takes time, and that's what was going on.
- 8 And it's unfortunate that there's some people that
- 9 feel like they were excluded from the process. That
- 10 was not our intent at all.
- 11 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Okay. I know you can't
- make this decision on behalf of Jewel-Osco right now,
- 13 but before the end of the meeting, I would like to get
- 14 you to go on the record as saying that you will or you
- will not include pints as part of the covenant.
- MR. FARRIS: There's half pints. I think it
- was just half pints.
- 18 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: You could always amend
- 19 it on the record, so I'll let you discuss that with
- Jewel-Osco, and you can let us know before the end of
- 21 the meeting. All right. Alderman Bohl, anything
- 22 else?
- 23 ALDERMAN BOHL: Yeah. I don't recall asking
- 24 any questions yet. Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Is it
- 25 Miss Weisbrot?

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1 MS. WEISBROT: Weisbrot, uh-hmm.
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- 2 ALDERMAN BOHL: I think that we're always
- 3 appreciative of residents who are willing to take
- 4 their time out and speak with neighbors regarding
- 5 issues that are important to them.
- I wanted to ask you if you had ever been to
- 7 another grocery store that had liquor sales within the
- 8 confines of that store --
- 9 MS. WEISBROT: Yes.
- 10 ALDERMAN BOHL: -- and what your thoughts
- 11 were about that.
- MS. WEISBROT: I think it depends on the
- neighborhood. Just for example, Pick 'N Save, the
- east side Pick 'N Save sells alcohol, and, you know,
- there have been studies that have shown that there's
- an increased correlation between liquor stores on the
- 17 premises and crime, and increased crime. And the Pick
- 'N Save over on the east side on Ogden, -- Are you
- 19 familiar with that store?
- 20 ALDERMAN BOHL: Uh-hmm.
- MS. WEISBROT: Okay. That happens to be a
- 22 little bit nicer neighborhood than ours, and so their
- 23 crime -- I'm sure if you check statistics, you'll see
- that the crime in that area is less than the crime in
- 25 the area that we live in. And I honestly feel that

1 crime in our area would definitely increase if we had

- 2 liquor on the premises in our area.
- 3 ALDERMAN BOHL: Okay. The question I have
- 4 is if -- Mr. Collin mentioned that there already is a
- 5 fair number of alcohol outlets.
- 6 MS. WEISBROT: Yes.
- 7 ALDERMAN BOHL: He mentioned Love's as one.
- 8 MS. WEISBROT: Right.
- 9 ALDERMAN BOHL: How many would you say in
- 10 the distance you know of, three-quarter mile distance
- 11 from your home, how many liquor outlets would you say
- 12 that there are roughly?
- 13 MS. WEISBROT: Oh, there's at least a half
- 14 a dozen. I know that Roseanne had a list of all of
- them. You know, my husband and I drink, and to tell
- 16 you the truth, I don't mind the inconvenience of
- 17 having go across the river to Otto's. It used to be
- 18 called.
- 19 I kind of feel that if we had a liquor store
- 20 right down the block, we'd probably have more alcohol
- 21 in our house than we want, or at least that I would
- 22 want. But there's one, two, three, four -- There's
- 23 over a dozen within --
- 24 ALDERMAN BOHL: Would that encompass liquor
- 25 stores and taverns both?

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1 MS. WEISBROT: No, this is just liquor
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- 2 stores. There's 14 or 15 listed right here. We have
- 3 a lot of bars in our neighborhood, and I remember when
- 4 my kids were little and I used to walk them to camp,
- 5 what a hassle it was going past all the bars in our
- 6 neighborhood.
- 7 I've lived in Riverwest for over 22 years,
- 8 and it's a great concern when you have people spilling
- 9 out of bars who are drunk or hanging around stores who
- 10 are under the influence of alcohol, or driving down
- 11 the streets under the influence of alcohol. It's a
- great concern when you have children, and we have
- quite a number of children on our block.
- 14 ALDERMAN BOHL: The stores that are listed
- on that paper there, please give me a sense, if you
- 16 can, --
- MS. WEISBROT: Of where they are?
- 18 ALDERMAN BOHL: -- the distance roughly
- 19 from --
- 20 MS. WEISBROT: Okay. They're within one and
- 21 a half miles, one to one and a half miles.
- 22 ALDERMAN BOHL: Fourteen liquor outlets
- 23 within one to one and a half miles.
- MS. WEISBROT: Yes, more than enough.
- 25 ALDERMAN BOHL: You had mentioned a concern

1 regarding individuals who may drink and drive.

- MS. WEISBROT: Yes.
- 3 ALDERMAN BOHL: Now, I'll just kind of give
- 4 you -- this is sort of a perception that I have, and
- 5 sort of see where it leads you.
- I know that with some of the smaller
- 7 mom-and-pop outlets, particularly, that you see on
- 8 corner stores, on occasion you'll see individuals go
- 9 in there, purchase the 40-ouncers or the half pints
- or whatever else, and sit around the corner and pound
- it and whatever else, and that tends to attract
- individuals that are a little displeasing at times.
- One perception that I would generally have
- is, I don't recall in any of the grocery stores that
- 15 I've seen, individuals that are purchasing, you know,
- a six-pack of beer and going outside and pounding the
- 17 beer.
- 18 You had mentioned individuals driving more
- 19 likely than not. The perception I would have would
- 20 be an individual would go there, purchase the
- 21 six-pack, drive back home while they're with their
- groceries, watch the Packer game, and drink it at
- 23 home, versus somebody who would necessarily be at a
- tavern and would tend to drive under the influence.
- 25 I was wondering if you could respond to some of that.

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MS. WEISBROT: Well, I think there's already
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 2
        drinking around the area that's going on because I
 3
        frequent that area quite a bit on bicycle, and I see
       broken liquor bottles and cans lying all over the
 4
 5
        place, and when Mr. Singleton mentioned that they kept
 6
        the parking lot so clean, I thought, no, they don't.
                  I ride on my bike all the time past there,
 8
        and I see trash and litter, and a lot of it is alcohol
 9
        related there. I've seen guys hanging around already
10
        drinking there. I just think that would just increase
11
        if they had liquor on the premises. There's just too
12
       many empty lots and corridors that are just perfect
        areas for guys to be hanging around drinking.
13
14
                  I'm a registered nurse who worked for the
15
        last 15 years doing home visits in the inner city.
        I've been through every area of the city, and there's
16
       plenty of places just like that where guys stand on
17
        the corners and drink, and that's the last thing we
18
19
        need right in our backyard. And for us not to be
20
        included in any of the decision making regarding that,
21
        it's just not cool. That's why we're here.
                  ALDERMAN BOHL: Okay. Thank you. That's
22
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24 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Thanks for coming in.

Okay. Next is Roseanne Screven. And Miss Screven

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all.

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1 lives at 3357 North Humboldt Boulevard. She'll be
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- 2 followed by Judith Swanson and Rosemary Oliveira, so
- 3 if you want to take a seat next to those two
- 4 individuals.
- 5 MS. SCREVEN: Okay. Thank you for letting
- 6 me talk. I think many of the points I was going to
- 7 make have been made already, but I do want to
- 8 emphasize some of them that are especially important
- 9 to me.
- 10 As has been said, we don't need another
- 11 liquor store in this neighborhood. And these 15
- 12 liquor outlets just represent the liquor stores.
- 13 That's not to mention the more than two dozen taverns
- and pubs and nightspots that people can get liquor.
- 15 I think that's a big issue.
- And you can't always control what people do
- 17 after they take this liquor out of your store, so --
- And I've lived in this neighborhood over 20 years.
- 19 I'd like to live here another 20 years. This in
- 20 perpetuity may or may not last 10 years. I don't
- 21 want to see things deteriorate in 10 years from now,
- 22 either.
- 23 And I live right on Humboldt, and I can tell
- you that whatever is sold in this neighborhood, I get
- a sampling of it in my front yard, and I end up

1 picking up these things. I have to walk out into the

- 2 island and pick these up. I'm constantly picking up
- 3 litter. Now, I don't need liquor bottles to pick up
- 4 as well as all the other litter that I pick up. And
- 5 that's a big issue for me.
- 6 And I agree with what Amy had said. You
- 7 drive by that parking lot, and it is not kept clean.
- 8 There's litter on the street, there's litter in the
- 9 parking lot. You sell these things to people, and
- 10 they take them away, and there's going to be litter in
- 11 my back -- in my front yard.
- 12 Let's see what other points have not been
- made clearly. I think that those are the major points
- 14 that have not really been emphasized, and I don't want
- 15 to take up any more time.
- 16 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Let me just address
- this issue that's come up a couple of times now, this
- in perpetuity issue. The one thing that we can
- 19 control as a committee is the physical boundaries of
- 20 the store. So they are requesting 24 hundred square
- 21 feet. We have control over that. It cannot be larger
- 22 than that without Common Council and this committee's
- 23 approval.
- 24 The issue of whether they'll sell Riverwest
- 25 Wine and Lakefront Brewery products or whatever, is

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1 something we cannot control, and I think that's maybe
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- 2 what Mr. Farris was referring to in that. If those
- 3 products are not selling, they might not try to offer
- 4 them. Am I right on that, Counsel?
- 5 MR. FARRIS: Oh, no. To me it's forever,
- 6 but when you say -- being a lawyer, perpetuity always
- 7 has a -- Circumstances change. I mean that's just the
- 8 nature of things. This store might disappear.
- 9 You know, I mean five years from now we
- 10 don't know what will happen, so I just hate to say on
- 11 the record that it's going to be forever because there
- 12 might be a different committee here, there might be a
- 13 different store owner in the future. You never know.
- 14 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: What I'm saying is
- they could not double the size of their, you know,
- 16 geographic portion of that store without this
- 17 committee's approval. That's one area we do have
- 18 solid control over.
- 19 MR. FARRIS: It's going to be physically
- 20 made that size so it's not something that can be
- changed.
- 22 I just want to respond to one comment that
- 23 Amy made about litter, and it's just a perception, I
- guess. I don't think the litter's from the grocery
- 25 store. There are some fast food restaurants in the

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1 area. We do try to police the area, but generally
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- people don't walk out of a grocery store and eat
- 3 something and litter it in the parking lot.
- So I think it's because there's a Wendy's
- 5 there and there's other restaurants, that people eat
- 6 and discard their trash. And like every other -- like
- 7 your property, we get trash put upon our parking lot
- 8 as well. We try to keep it clean, but --
- 9 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Okay. Questions by
- 10 committee?
- 11 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: I have a question,
- 12 Mr. Chairman.
- 13 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Go ahead, Alderwoman
- 14 Cameron.
- 15 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: Thank you. I would ask
- Osco, is it possible that you -- like two things
- 17 mentioned, security and litter. Is it possible that
- 18 maybe -- I know where she live at, and it's kind of
- 19 like almost like a block and a half from the store
- 20 going east. And that's kind of far to ask -- To me to
- 21 visualize that, --
- 22 MR. FARRIS: Well, she's a block and a half
- east and then four blocks south, so we couldn't really
- 24 patrol that area. I mean that's --
- 25 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: No, no, that wasn't --

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I was going to ask that, but when I visualize where
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- 2 she lived at, how the store is located, it would be
- 3 kind of unfair to him because there's about four to
- 4 five different little vendors east of Osco which could
- 5 contribute to that. And I think most of it -- really
- 6 a lot of it comes from that -- It's like where
- 7 Blockbuster and that sub sandwich over in there, a lot
- 8 of that could be contributed to that. You got Burger
- 9 King right there.
- 10 But I was going to ask you, was it possible
- 11 you all could do a little bit of extra picking up?
- 12 But when I went to visualize the area, I just -- if I
- 13 could get permission to speak, -- I wouldn't say that
- 14 wouldn't be a pretty wise thing to ask you to go and
- 15 pick up another vendor's trash that you could say it
- 16 related to you.
- 17 Another one, maybe looking at it, once they
- 18 get the liquor in that area, is it -- How wide a range
- does your security patrol there? Do they just patrol
- 20 the parking lot only? Or do they got a block --
- 21 Because, you know, --
- 22 MR. FARRIS: They stay in the parking lot.
- 23 Generally there's liability concerns to go off-site.
- You have no authority to do anything off-site, so you
- 25 really -- And we'll do our best.

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I don't think -- We don't believe that there
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- 2 will be any kind of security issues presented by this.
- 3 Generally it's going to be people like you, --
- 4 although I understand you don't drink very much, --
- 5 but you or me, or even these folks, buying a bottle of
- 6 wine and things like that. It's not some -- we don't
- 7 envision this as being a kids' hangout.
- 8 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: I don't visualize it
- 9 being a kids' hangout, either, but knowing that area
- 10 and being shopping there for the last 30 years, --
- 11 because I was there when it was a Pick 'N Save, and I
- do shop there, and I do know the manager there, but --
- that was the one that I had got close with, a friend
- 14 with, and they did tell me they was coming down to
- apply for the liquor license, and that was a while ago
- 16 back.
- MS. SCREVEN: I'm sorry to interrupt, but
- 18 on this whole issue of people would go there and buy
- 19 things and take it home, I've seen kids riding down
- 20 the street drinking in their cars and tossing things
- 21 out on my lawn, so you have no control over what
- 22 people do after they leave the store. And if you're
- selling a pint, or you're selling a 40-ounce, or
- you're selling -- whatever you're selling, I mean
- 25 they can go in and get a six-pack and drink in the

1 car. It just seems to me there's enough alcohol in

- the neighborhood. We don't need more alcohol in our
- 3 neighborhood.
- 4 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: I would -- I think what
- 5 Osco needs to do, especially the last three -- the
- first three that came up, you all should have been in
- 7 negotiation, and I think you should still try to work
- 8 out some kind of relationship with them because you
- 9 are definitely the neighbor, and you should work out
- 10 something where you would feel comfortable if -- I'm
- 11 not saying it is, -- where if they do get their
- 12 license, that you would have a kind of a relationship
- where you can go and voice your opinions about, if it
- is, that you believe some of the debris is coming from
- this store, why it ends up in your front yard. That
- 16 you should be able to voice your opinion, and it
- should be taken care of and looked at at that
- 18 particular point.
- 19 MS. SCREVEN: Well, I appreciate that, and I
- 20 think that Amy's suggestion that, you know, you put
- 21 this on hold for six months so that the neighbors
- 22 really --
- 23 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: Well, to be reasonable
- 24 with the six months, -- I don't want to speak out of
- 25 turn, Mr. Chairman.

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1 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Go right ahead. You're
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- 2 doing fine.
- 3 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: Thanks a lot. Hey,
- 4 hey, hey. This is a new month. I don't think six
- 5 months is really being reasonable to the merchant
- 6 here, that to delay -- If you would come and say,
- 7 well, we would like for you to delay at least a cycle
- 8 to give us an opportunity, that would have been
- 9 reasonable or something, I would have been more
- 10 willing to entertain.
- 11 But six months, I don't think, is fair to
- the merchants because they did their work, even though
- it was short-handed, even though -- and I know,
- 14 honestly, I've been in your shoes where organizations
- or a company comes into a neighborhood, and someone
- 16 referred them to an organization, that that company
- 17 really do believe that that is -- that organization
- 18 reflects the neighborhood, and it's not their fault.
- 19 It's really not. Whosever that organization involves
- 20 itself with doesn't get to the nitty-gritty of the
- 21 persons that it needs, so I would feel like if you did
- 22 this, -- I'm not defending your case, but if we did
- 23 this in this particular case, we would be -- actually
- 24 be doing some unfairness to them.
- MS. SCREVEN: Well, I think it becomes an

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1 issue of whose rights are more important, and as
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- 2 citizens of this community, -- And as I said, I've
- 3 lived here over 20 years. All the people who have
- 4 spoken so far have lived here over 20 years. I've
- 5 seen stores come and go in that location, and I'm
- 6 still here, and so I think that my rights are at least
- 7 equally important, and they've had how many months to
- pull this issue together? And we've had 10 days.
- 9 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: Did you contact your
- 10 alderperson?
- 11 MS. SCREVEN: Oh, long ago I had written to
- my alderperson saying that I opposed the liquor
- license at -- I think at another store. I mean I've
- 14 all along opposed them. I didn't call on this time
- 15 because I just planned on attending this meeting.
- 16 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: Did he contact your
- office -- I mean your residency to tell you about this
- 18 location applying for a liquor license? And did he --
- 19 MS. SCREVEN: No, no. I didn't get anything
- 20 from him. I got this letter.
- 21 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: Did he contact you
- 22 about the neighborhood meetings that was in the area
- regarding this application?
- 24 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Well, why don't we have
- 25 Alderman D'Amato answer that question. I mean he's

- 1 right here.
- 2 ALDERMAN D'AMATO: Yeah, Mr. Chairman.
- 3 And Alderwoman Cameron, you've asked a couple times.
- 4 Mr. Copeland sent the 800 requests out, notifications
- 5 at my request. They didn't come from my office, under
- 6 my signature. They came from the Licensing Division
- 7 informing the people about the hearing. Anybody who
- 8 has contacted my office about this, anybody who
- 9 appeared on the petition, anybody who was called with
- 10 regard to this store, received a notice of this
- 11 meeting today.
- 12 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: That wasn't the
- 13 question.
- 14 ALDERMAN D'AMATO: In addition, we referred,
- probably six months ago, Mr. Farris and Jewel-Osco to
- 16 the Riverwest Neighborhood Association to work out
- 17 their covenant and to inform neighbors with the --
- having full faith in them, that they would notify
- 19 people and work through the block club network so that
- 20 people would be notified.
- 21 So I think there are two things here.
- There's a legal responsibility to notify people, which
- 23 we did through Mr. Copeland's office. Those people
- 24 received notice, and they're here today. And then
- 25 there is a neighborhood responsibility. We tried to

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1 work through that neighborhood responsibility through
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- 2 the Riverwest Neighborhood Association with the
- 3 expectation that they would poll people, inform people
- 4 who were going to be affected by this, and came back
- 5 and worked with Jewel-Osco and are here at the
- 6 committee to testify.
- 7 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: The question I asked --
- 8 MR. FARRIS: There was not a massive public
- 9 community hearing if that's your question.
- 10 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: No, the public --
- it was several, -- that there was public meetings
- 12 regarding this location.
- MR. FARRIS: No, there were not.
- 14 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: Oh, it wasn't.
- MR. FARRIS: This has been pending for
- 16 years. The application's been on file for three
- 17 years, I think, so it's nothing new.
- 18 What happened was, as the alderman said, --
- 19 and I think Mike is being unfairly singled out here
- 20 because he's not championing the cause of this
- 21 license. He indicated he had great concerns about it.
- 22 He was initially opposed. He was -- I think now he's
- not opposed, he's not in favor, so it's -- But we
- 24 worked through the neighborhood association, and the
- 25 neighborhood association, I think, believes that they

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were speaking for the majority of the residents.
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We have 10 people here this morning, and it's always easier to find people opposed to something, and I think -- You haven't heard -- I don't see any life from any one of these people that there's some condition that we haven't looked at, that if we agreed to, they would support the license. They're just opposed, and that's -- These people are going to be opposed no matter what, and I think if you ask them, they'll honestly admit that, and that's their

right.

But I think you have to -- In the context of how many notices went out and how big the Riverwest Neighborhood Association is, the silent majority speaks loudly here today, and I think the conditions we've negotiated are reasonable. I think Capitol Drive is a commercial strip. I know these people are nearby in the sense of five or six blocks, but it's a commercial strip. People are going to be driving on Capitol to go there.

This is nothing new. It's -- I think in Milwaukee and in the suburbs, this is the way people like to shop. They like to be able to buy all these things at one place, and that's all we're trying to do is to offer that service. Obviously to make money,

1 but the neighborhood has a stake in that as well that

- 2 this store do well. It's part of the service that
- 3 other stores can offer, and we want to be able to
- 4 offer it to compete and to thrive and to be there for
- 5 a long time.
- 6 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: I want to ask you one
- 7 question. What side of the store is the liquor store
- 8 going to be?
- 9 MR. FARRIS: West side.
- 10 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: Over by the front, over
- 11 that area, because --
- 12 MR. FARRIS: It would be further on the Osco
- 13 side of the store.
- 14 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: Oh, because I thought
- 15 you was going to use the west -- the east side of it,
- 16 you know, where -- I thought that you all was moving
- over a little bit, expanding the store. You weren't
- 18 going to take that vacant --
- MR. FARRIS: No.
- 20 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: You know, it used to be
- 21 some kind of dollar store or something, over in that
- 22 part.
- MR. FARRIS: Oh, over to the east end,
- 24 right. That's a bigger space.
- 25 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: Uh-hmm. I thought

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1 that's where you would move. Thank you.
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- 2 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: All right. We're going
- 3 to move on now to Miss Swanson, Judith Swanson.
- 4 ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chairman?
- 5 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Oh, I'm sorry.
- 6 ALDERMAN BOHL: I do have a brief question
- for Miss Screven if you'll oblige me. Miss Screven,
- 8 was it you who generated this list of liquor outlets
- 9 in the general area?
- MS. SCREVEN: Uh-hmm.
- 11 ALDERMAN BOHL: If you wouldn't mind, could
- 12 you briefly enumerate what those outlets are and
- roughly where they're located if you do have that?
- 14 MS. SCREVEN: Love's Liquor. They have two
- stores, one on Burleigh and Holton, which is closer;
- one in the 35 hundred block of Port Road, which is
- what, -- equivalent to what, 3rd Street or 4th Street?
- 18 Holton Liquor, 2305 North Holton. Sunshine Foods, 1st
- 19 and Keefe. Riverwest Supermarket, Holton and Locust.
- 20 Midget Foodmart, Booth and Wright. Sunrise Food Mart,
- 21 Locust and Weil. A & J Liquor Mart, 513 East Center.
- 22 And then they have another one at 2469 North Martin
- 23 Luther King Drive. Davis & Son Food and Liquor, 3562
- North Martin Luther King Drive. King on Ring Liquor
- 25 Store, 3305 North Martin Luther King Drive. Mac's

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1 Liquor, 3079 North Holton. Otto's Beverage, 3476
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- North Oakland. Wick's Beer and Liquor, 4496 North
- 3 Oakland. Gilbert's Liquor, 2853 North Oakland, and I
- 4 forgot to mention Kohl's on Oakland.
- 5 ALDERMAN BOHL: Thank you.
- 6 MS. SCREVEN: And as I said, that's not to
- 7 mention over two dozen taverns in the neighborhood.
- 8 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: For the record, all
- 9 those were all in the city. I think the Kohl's on
- 10 Oakland, though, is in Shorewood, correct?
- MS. SCREVEN: Yes.
- 12 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Okay. All right. Miss
- 13 Swanson now is next, and she lives at 3446 North Weil
- in Milwaukee. Miss Swanson?
- 15 MS. SWANSON: I was notified by mail, the
- letter that was sent out, and I am opposed to the
- 17 liquor license for several reasons. One of my first
- 18 concerns is a concern about litter. There is already
- 19 a lot of litter in that area along Capitol Drive, and
- 20 not necessarily all of that litter is generated by the
- 21 Jewel-Osco. There's other businesses like Wal-Mart,
- 22 and a lot of fast food restaurants that contribute to
- 23 a lot of the litter.
- But as an example of a litter concern, my
- 25 husband and son were just at the Jewel-Osco store

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1 yesterday, and when they were leaving the store to
2 return to the car, in a car that was parked next door
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- 3 in a handicap spot, even though it didn't have a
- 4 handicap sticker, was a car filled with a group of
- 5 young men who were drinking. And even though there's
- 6 not a liquor store there yet, they were drinking in
- 7 the parking lot and depositing their beer bottles out
- 8 of their car right into the parking lot.
- 9 Safety and concern is also an issue. We've
- 10 got a lot of traffic on Humboldt. We get a lot of
- 11 traffic on Keefe, and we are on the east side of Weil,
- 12 so my kids do play around the block on their bicycles.
- We already have a lot of people who are driving fast
- on Humboldt and Keefe, and there is a concern for
- people who are drinking and driving. I have an
- 16 elderly neighbor who does not drive. She does walk to
- the Jewel-Osco. So there is that concern for crime.
- I also don't think another liquor store is
- 19 needed in the area. We are, I feel, well-covered with
- 20 liquor stores on Keefe and Oakland and Holton. I
- 21 don't think it's inconvenient to drive over to Oakland
- 22 Avenue to buy what we need.
- I also have a concern about littering and
- 24 drinking in the nearby parks. Current Park and
- 25 Estabrook Park, which are both parks that are near to

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1 that Jewel-Osco, are easy for kids and other people to
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- 2 drive into to park or to walk into and drink illegally
- 3 or legally, but they leave their litter behind. I
- 4 know this because I have been involved in park
- 5 cleanups and have picked up many liquor bottles.
- And, yes, those liquor bottles are always
- 7 going to be there, but why add to the problem. And
- 8 these are parks that my family and I go to often and
- 9 enjoy, and I really don't feel like seeing more litter
- 10 contribute to that problem that's already there.
- 11 Thank you for hearing me.
- 12 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Thank you, Miss
- 13 Swanson. Questions by committee? Mr. Farris,
- 14 anything from you on that one?
- MR. FARRIS: No.
- 16 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Thank you for coming
- in. Next is Rosemary Oliveira, followed by George --
- 18 I'm sorry, George already spoke, George Singleton.
- 19 Karen Royster, is it? And after Karen, Jonas
- 20 Karvelis. And Mr. Karvelis will be the last person
- 21 opposed. Mr. Karvelis, perhaps you want to take a
- 22 chair up here already. Rosemary, good morning.
- 23 Go ahead.
- MS. OLIVEIRA: Good morning. Thank
- 25 you. First of all, I would like to thank you all for

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1 having this hearing and having it special because I
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- 2 know this has been on the plate for a long time.
- 3 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: You're welcome. And
- 4 I'm sorry, one quick thing. Mark Lawson, -- I'm
- 5 sorry. Are you Mr. Lawson? I neglected to call you.
- 6 You'll be last, how's that? Okay, I'm sorry. Go
- 7 ahead.
- 8 MS. OLIVEIRA: Back to my thank you. So I
- 9 would like to thank you very much for being here this
- 10 morning for this issue.
- 11 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: You're welcome.
- MS. OLIVEIRA: And I'd like to thank Mike,
- 13 who has worked in this field for many years and has
- done really an amazing job, considering when you
- 15 compare him to the responsiveness of possibly other
- 16 aldermen who I don't know, but maybe other people can
- 17 complain about their alderman, but --
- 18 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: No one on this
- 19 committee does.
- 20 MS. OLIVEIRA: As that street sweeper went
- 21 by this morning, I go thank you, Mike, so -- I live
- 22 at -- well, I used to live at 3302 North Humboldt, and
- 23 now I moved next door.
- I own three properties in Riverwest, one
- of them is on Fratney, and then of course I live on

Humboldt Boulevard. I did attend the RNA meeting. I
was there when this was discussed. This is where I

met this gentleman and his companions.

I feel that the -- I do also feel that this
was flawed. There were -- There was no consensus at
this meeting about whether we should enter into any
kind of a covenant or any kind of an agreement with
Jewel-Osco, because they were notorious badnicks in
our neighborhood as you know. As it refers to the
liquor license, however, which is a separate issue,

there were many people opposed to that as well.

It was given to three people in the -- It was finally decided to get involved in a covenant, which people also opposed doing that. Then three people went to write this covenant, one who is in favor of the liquor store, one who was opposed, and one who I don't know what their position was, but we may say possibly that they were neutral.

In my e-mail the next day or the next couple of days, -- and I brought all my e-mails, I have them here, -- boom, we have a covenant. No input, no draft covenant saying does anybody want to comment on this. It was just done. I wrote to complain, others wrote to complain, and I have those letters here. You know, we don't want this liquor store, and this is the

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1 Riverwest Neighborhood Association group responding to
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- their own people.
- 3 Okay. I'll take my glasses off now. One of
- 4 the things that I wanted to know, I think they -- When
- 5 we first went down this Jewel-Osco road for many
- 6 years, they also agreed that they were going to be
- 7 good neighbors and do things for the neighbors, which
- 8 they have. They've contributed to some neighborhood
- 9 organizations. They agreed to do a number of things;
- 10 keep their parking lots clean, patrol them, and I now
- 11 have to say that -- So I decided to take a tour of the
- grocery stores that sell liquor near me, so that's
- 13 Kohl's, North Oakland, Kohl's downtown, and the Pick
- 'N Save downtown. Spotless, beautiful, well done,
- 15 clean.
- So, and then I went to the Pick 'N Save
- 17 at -- or I went to Jewel-Osco, -- I wish it was a Pick
- 18 'N Save, -- Jewel-Osco at the end of my block right at
- 19 the end of my street, and I have photographs of -- I
- 20 don't know when the last time they picked up the
- 21 trash, but I can pass these to you and you can look at
- them, but it's pretty appalling.
- 23 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: If you want, --
- 24 Actually, we can not only take your e-mails and make
- 25 them part of our record, but also your photographs.

- 1 It's up to you.
- MS. OLIVEIRA: Okay. That's great, yes.
- 3 MR. SCHRIMPF: But Mr. Chairman, Mr. Farris
- 4 should look at them.
- 5 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Okay. And we'll also
- 6 have to keep those, as you know.
- 7 MS. OLIVEIRA: Yes, you can have them. I
- 8 have the negatives. And you can also have these
- 9 because when I went yesterday to the Pick 'N Save, I'm
- 10 sorry, to the Jewel-Osco parking lot, these must be --
- 11 Are these the bottles they threw out of the window? I
- don't know, because they look like they've been there
- 13 a long time.
- 14 This was inside the parking lot. Here's
- some more. There's 14 different types of -- Here's a
- six-pack holder of something. I couldn't find those.
- 17 This is an Old Milwaukee. There was actually still
- 18 beer in this one.
- 19 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: And you found these in
- the Jewel-Osco parking lot?
- 21 MS. OLIVEIRA: In their parking lot. Oh,
- 22 this is the -- I know they're not going to be selling
- this size, but you know what's remarkable about all
- these small, hard alcohol bottles? Whoever drinks
- 25 them, they put the lids back on. They're neat

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1 alcoholics. I was amazed at that.
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- So this to me is way out of control. So if
  they cleaned their parking lot last week, they had I
  don't know how many people there drinking in this past
- 5 week already in the parking lot.
- These are just the bottle caps and some
  things that were broken I didn't want to hurt myself
- 8 with but, you know, Miller Genuine Draft, a Heineken,
- 9 Smirnoff. So they're going into that, and the big
- 10 mouth whatever, Bush or something, that they can chug.
- Now, you know, and I'm thinking nobody's going to
- 12 believe I found these in the parking lot, so I'm
- waving at the -- You know, I'm holding up my bag, and
- 14 I'm waving at the video camera going, ha, just in case.
- 15 Well, I'm walking around some more, and here
- 16 comes a guy in a security car, and I'm going, cool,
- 17 and I introduced myself to him. I said, "Who are
- 18 you?" And he said his name was Charles. I said,
- 19 "Charles, remember me, my name is Rosemary Oliveira,
- 20 and I'm here picking up liquor bottles out of your
- 21 parking lot." He saw me, so this is true.
- 22 Now, I can tell you that not all this stuff
- is coming from -- I mean it's really, really grossly
- 24 unfair to blame the two little neighboring fast food
- 25 places. Sure, they contribute some, but, you know

1 what? Their stuff was pretty darn clean. It wasn't

- 2 until you got to the perimeter of the Jewel-Osco
- 3 that -- You couldn't even see the dirt underneath.
- 4 It was like mulch.
- 5 And then across the street at the
- 6 Blockbuster in the trees, guess what? Jewel-Osco
- 7 bags flying around stuck in the trees. The place
- 8 is a mess. I mean we're going to believe about a
- 9 covenant?
- 10 And I mean six months would be a minimum. I
- 11 want to know what these people are planning to do. We
- 12 need to put this off. They're not going to follow
- 13 through. They haven't followed through on this.
- 14 They've already got people drinking in there. In
- fact, God knows, they may even have -- I don't know
- 16 who Tony D. is, but this is their -- "Thank you for
- 17 shopping at Jewel-Osco, Tony D." It was next to one
- of the hard liquor bottles, so you may have another
- 19 problem there.
- MR. FARRIS: Cheap shot, Rosemary.
- MS. OLIVEIRA: Cheap shot, no. All's fair
- in love and war.
- MR. FARRIS: No, I don't think so.
- MS. OLIVEIRA: So at any rate, I think this
- is really, really very bad. Moving on, my concern is

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drugs, more alcohol, trespassing, crime, litter,
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- 2 public urination. You know, it does happen.
- I was gardening in my award-winning garden,
- 4 Mayor's award-winning garden. Car stops, a bunch of
- 5 drunks pull out, a man and a woman. She drops her
- drawers and pees on my tree, and so does he. Now, I'm
- 7 sorry. It does happen. They got their liquor from
- 8 someplace else, but you know what? We don't need to
- 9 make it that easy.
- 10 Another thing, two nights ago or three
- 11 nights ago, a truck wrapped itself around the tree in
- my front yard. The tree is now coming down. It's
- 13 like a 30-year-old tree. It just got killed by a guy
- 14 who was too drunk to maneuver his car.
- 15 I'm tired of drunks going down Humboldt
- Boulevard, and we know it's going to be even worse
- because it's going to be much more convenient.
- 18 Anyway, I think that children's safety is an issue,
- 19 but also my own personal safety crossing the street.
- Now, I don't belong to a block club. I'd
- 21 like to, but I also kind of stay tapped in, and I know
- 22 that my neighbors kind of count on me to get the word
- around, so this notification thing was done quite well
- 24 by the city, much better than I thought it was going
- 25 to be done, so I just want to, again, say thank you to

1 that in terms of notification, but there are people  $\,$ 

- 2 who were beyond that rim of notification.
- I think that the silent majority about not
- 4 wanting this liquor store is at work today, because
- 5 this is a daytime meeting. I have friends who are
- 6 teachers and nurses. They can't come here today
- 7 because they're at work, so for every person here
- 8 opposed, there's probably 100 who are at work who
- 9 didn't come today.
- 10 And so my closing thoughts are, you know
- 11 what? This parking lot is out of control. It's out
- 12 of control. When the guy -- The security guy saw me,
- but I think he was afraid to approach me. I had to
- 14 approach him. And the amount of trash, it looked like
- 15 Tobacco Road. It is not what I want my neighborhood
- 16 to look like, especially with the taxes I'm paying.
- 17 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Thank you very much.
- 18 ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chairman?
- 19 MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman, I have some
- foundation questions.
- 21 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Real quick, I need to
- 22 first make these items part of our record, and
- 23 Alderwoman Cameron moves to make the photographs, as
- 24 well as Miss Oliveira's e-mails, part of our record.
- Is there any objection? Hearing none, so ordered.

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1 We will not make the beer bottles part of our record.
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- 2 They won't fit in our files. Mr. Schrimpf and then
- 3 Alderman Bohl.
- 4 MR. SCHRIMPF: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
- 5 ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chairman, --
- 6 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: He's got some
- 7 foundation questions.
- 8 ALDERMAN BOHL: I was going to ask a
- 9 foundation question myself, but that's fine.
- 10 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: That's fine. Why
- don't -- He may, from a lawyer's perspective, cover
- 12 some of that stuff, so --
- MR. SCHRIMPF: First of all, with respect to
- 14 the e-mails, these are e-mails you sent, and you were
- the drafter of the e-mails?
- MS. OLIVEIRA: No. Well, some questions I
- 17 sent in which are not there. These are responses to
- 18 e-mails that I sent. It's like a list serve where
- 19 they send out -- we all send to a central location,
- and that person turns around and e-mails everybody's
- 21 responses back. I'm not sure what that's called. Is
- 22 that a list serve?
- MR. SCHRIMPF: Okay. But these were then
- e-mails that you received in the manner that you have
- 25 described?

- 1 MS. OLIVEIRA: Yes.
- 2 MR. SCHRIMPF: All right. And you received
- 3 them on or about the dates indicated on the e-mails?
- 4 MS. OLIVEIRA: Yes, correct.
- 5 MR. SCHRIMPF: With respect to the pictures,
- 6 these are pictures that you took?
- 7 MS. OLIVEIRA: I did not take them. My
- 8 friend over here took them.
- 9 MR. SCHRIMPF: All right. So the foundation
- 10 will have to wait for that witness. And then finally,
- 11 with respect to the beer bottles that you had, the
- 12 record should reflect that you brought how many beer
- 13 bottles here?
- 14 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: There are about a dozen.
- MS. OLIVEIRA: Well, no. I'd say more like
- 16 14. There's 14 different types of liquor represented.
- 17 MR. SCHRIMPF: Okay. And these were picked
- 18 up by you personally?
- 19 MS. OLIVEIRA: Yes.
- 20 MR. SCHRIMPF: And where did you pick them
- 21 up?
- MS. OLIVEIRA: I picked them up on
- Jewel-Osco property in the parking lot, on the eastern
- side of the parking lot where -- There's a tower there
- coming out. There's parking, and then I walked across

1 the parking lot to where they have a loading area, and

- 2 I went there, too.
- 3 MR. SCHRIMPF: And this is the location
- 4 which is under consideration today for the liquor
- 5 license?
- 6 MS. OLIVEIRA: Yes, it is.
- 7 MR. SCHRIMPF: Okay. And when did you
- 8 pick up these beer bottles?
- 9 MS. OLIVEIRA: Yesterday afternoon.
- 10 MR. SCHRIMPF: So for the record, that would
- 11 have been April 7th, 2002?
- MS. OLIVEIRA: Yes.
- MR. SCHRIMPF: That's all I have,
- 14 Mr. Chairman.
- 15 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Alderman Bohl?
- 16 ALDERMAN BOHL: Mrs. Oliveira, in terms
- of -- You picked up the bottles yesterday. In terms
- of the photos, when were these taken?
- MS. OLIVEIRA: I believe they were done
- 20 yesterday.
- 21 ALDERMAN BOHL: You didn't utilize any film
- 22 services that Jewel-Osco has, did you?
- MS. OLIVEIRA: It was Walgreen's One-hour.
- 24 ALDERMAN BOHL: Thought maybe they were
- 25 assisting you in your efforts. And you were the

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1 person who shot all these; is that correct?
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- 2 MS. OLIVEIRA: Actually, this gentleman here
- 3 shot them.
- 4 ALDERMAN BOHL: All right. And I know that
- 5 the chairman typically has issues with comments, but
- 6 I'll go ahead and make them anyways.
- 7 I have sort of the same issue with a Kohl's
- 8 Food Store that's located -- Kohl's Food Emporium
- 9 that's located in my district. I have the same issue
- 10 with a lot of fast food restaurants that are in my
- 11 district, and that typically is that they will go out,
- 12 and what they see in their immediate parking lot, they
- will occasionally put somebody out there. However,
- 14 what they will not do is they will not go out on the
- periphery where you have the landscaping, where you
- 16 have the street, the sidewalk, and send people out
- 17 there.
- 18 When I've had agreements with different
- 19 businesses in my area, what I like to say is I think
- you're responsible for a half block around your area,
- 21 a half block, even if it means that, Mr. Farris, that
- 22 it's Wendy's that's next door and their bag blows over
- on the Jewel-Osco parking lot. Because simply stated,
- if we all had this view, -- I don't, when I get home,
- go into my house, have a candy bar, and walk out to my

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front and throw the wrapper on my front lawn, but I
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- wind up picking up other people's wrappers because
- 3 it's my responsibility to keep my neighborhood clean,
- and if everyone had the view, well, hey, I'm not the
- 5 guy who threw it out there, therefore I can't pick it
- 6 up, we would have a lot messier city than what we
- 7 already have, and we already have some issues here in
- 8 the city, so that's my two cents on that.
- 9 MS. OLIVEIRA: None of these were picked up
- on the sidewalk or in the gutter or anyplace.
- 11 ALDERMAN BOHL: As I said, it looks as
- 12 though their parking lot is very clean, but they're
- 13 not hitting the periphery.
- MS. OLIVEIRA: No, it's not. It's not
- 15 clean. It had rained that day, so it washed it off
- into the -- kind of outside of where the cars are.
- 17 ALDERMAN BOHL: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
- 18 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: Mr. Chairman?
- 19 CHAIRMAN GORDON: Alderwoman Cameron.
- 20 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: Thank you. Osco,
- 21 I'm trying to be the go-between person here on this
- 22 committee.
- MR. FARRIS: Brian, it's your store. Come
- 24 up here. The store manager is here. I think you
- 25 might want to hear from him. If this is the issue

1 that -- the litter issue, I'm sure Brian's concerned

- 2 about it.
- 3 CHAIRMAN GORDON: Well, first of all,
- 4 Alderwoman Cameron, do you have a question of
- 5 Miss Oliveira?
- 6 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: No.
- 7 CHAIRMAN GORDON: Fine. I do. Hold on just
- 8 a minute. Miss Oliveira, you indicated in your
- 9 testimony that you attended the public hearing on this
- 10 license, correct?
- MS. OLIVEIRA: It was a meeting.
- 12 CHAIRMAN GORDON: A public meeting?
- MS. OLIVEIRA: Yes. I read about it, and
- 14 there were maybe about 15 to 20 people there. That
- included three or four people from Jewel-Osco, and
- 16 then --
- 17 CHAIRMAN GORDON: Where was it held?
- MS. OLIVEIRA: It was held at a little
- 19 church on -- Holton and Chambers? No, maybe Hadley.
- 20 A very brightly-colored green.
- 21 CHAIRMAN GORDON: And to your knowledge that
- 22 was the only meeting that you knew of that was
- 23 scheduled on this issue?
- MS. OLIVEIRA: It was the only one I heard
- 25 of, yes.

1 CHAIRMAN GORDON: And you've heard of no

- 2 other meetings since that time.
- 3 MS. OLIVEIRA: No.
- 4 CHAIRMAN GORDON: When was this meeting?
- 5 MS. OLIVEIRA: I don't know. It's on my
- 6 e-mails. Oh, gosh.
- 7 MR. FARRIS: October.
- 8 MS. OLIVEIRA: October?
- 9 CHAIRMAN GORDON: October of last year?
- 10 Okay. Thank you.
- 11 MR. FARRIS: Can I ask Rosemary a question
- 12 real quick?
- 13 CHAIRMAN GORDON: Sure.
- 14 MR. FARRIS: Those notices -- I mean notice
- of that meeting was given to people, wasn't it, that
- 16 that was a topic of conversation, and that --
- MS. OLIVEIRA: Yes, it was.
- 18 MR. FARRIS: -- you were going to meet with
- 19 us? And so do you know how many people get notice of
- your regular meetings, what's on the agenda?
- 21 MS. OLIVEIRA: I don't know. I don't even
- 22 know how many -- You see, they're not really members.
- 23 They do send it out to people who have an interest in
- 24 community issues. They know that I have definite
- strong, 20-year roots in the community, so they always

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notify me of stuff. I don't know. I think I may have
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- 2 read about it in the Riverwest Currents, the first
- 3 edition, which was a mimeographed sheet at that time
- 4 and a little article.
- 5 MR. FARRIS: You attended the first meeting,
- 6 right?
- 7 MS. OLIVEIRA: Yes, I did.
- 8 MR. FARRIS: And you were opposed, right?
- 9 MS. OLIVEIRA: Yes, I was.
- 10 MR. FARRIS: And there were other people
- 11 there that were opposed. This gentleman was opposed.
- I don't remember your name. I remember he was there.
- But there were some people that were in favor?
- MS. OLIVEIRA: Right. There were two other
- people that I know of, particularly, that were opposed
- 16 as well.
- MR. FARRIS: But there was a group of
- 18 people; you said 10 or 12 or 15?
- MS. OLIVEIRA: Yes, there was.
- 20 MR. FARRIS: One other question, Rosemary.
- 21 In the e-mails you turned in, I see that the one --
- 22 there's one from October right after we met, right?
- 23 Apparently you saw a covenant a short time after the
- 24 meeting, and you criticized it.
- MS. OLIVEIRA: Right.

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1 MR. FARRIS: Okay. So this has been, at
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- 2 least in your mind, a topic of conversation since
- 3 October of last year; is that a fair statement?
- 4 MS. OLIVEIRA: No, it's not a fair statement
- 5 because the conversation was pretty much closed once
- 6 the covenant was -- They produced that as this is our
- 7 covenant. There was no conversation.
- 8 MR. FARRIS: I notice that your e-mail there
- 9 said that the covenant said a 3,000 square foot store,
- so there has been some change since then in the
- 11 covenant, correct?
- MS. OLIVEIRA: I don't know, but frankly, I
- guess that since I felt locked out of the process of
- 14 commenting on the covenant, that it was -- you know,
- it was in others' hands.
- 16 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Okay. Ma'am, are you
- part of the Riverwest organization?
- 18 MS. CHRISTENSON: Mr. Chairman, my name is
- Janice Christenson. I'm a community development
- 20 specialist, and I work for the YMCA Community
- 21 Development Corp., and I do technical support for the
- 22 Riverwest Neighborhood Association, and I'd like to
- 23 maybe give you some facts and figures that would clear
- this up.
- 25 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Facts and figures

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1 regarding some of the confusion?
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- 2 MS. CHRISTENSON: Yes.
- 3 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: That's fine. I
- 4 will take you out of turn, but not for the purpose
- 5 of providing, you know, testimony other than the
- 6 clarification.
- 7 MS. CHRISTENSON: Yes, I understand.
- 8 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Okay. Go ahead.
- 9 ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chairman?
- 10 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Yes.
- 11 ALDERMAN BOHL: Sorry to interject here.
- 12 Before we go to Miss Christenson, I don't know if
- 13 Miss Oliveira is done. I do have one follow-up
- 14 question for her.
- 15 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: All right, go ahead.
- 16 ALDERMAN BOHL: Mrs. Oliveira, I see from
- one of your e-mails that you are a member of the
- 18 Riverwest Neighborhood Association.
- MS. OLIVEIRA: They count me a member
- 20 because I -- I mean I never signed up. I mean it was
- 21 like I went to one meeting, and that was this meeting.
- 22 ALDERMAN BOHL: Okay. And --
- MS. OLIVEIRA: And by the way, they do do a
- 24 good job on most things. They do.
- 25 ALDERMAN BOHL: Okay. Well, that's

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1 reassuring.
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- MS. OLIVEIRA: This is not a criticism of
- 3 that organization at all.
- 4 ALDERMAN BOHL: But prior to that one
- 5 meeting, then, you were not considered a member then?
- 6 MS. OLIVEIRA: They probably did consider me
- 7 a member because I'm just sort of around, but -- I got
- 8 e-mails.
- 9 ALDERMAN BOHL: The only question I wanted
- 10 to get at is whether or not they provided notification
- 11 to those who they consider their members, versus --
- 12 You indicated you wound up reading about this meeting
- in the Riverwest Courier?
- MS. OLIVEIRA: In the Currents.
- 15 ALDERMAN BOHL: Currents?
- MS. OLIVEIRA: Yeah. They're a little
- 17 newsletter. I believe that's what prompted me to go.
- I may have heard from other -- God knows, October.
- 19 ALDERMAN BOHL: Was that lit-dropped or
- 20 mailed to your home?
- MS. OLIVEIRA: It was mailed to me, yes.
- 22 ALDERMAN BOHL: But there was notification
- as to this upcoming meeting on this topic.
- MS. OLIVEIRA: To me, I got that, yes. Yes,
- 25 there was.

1 ALDERMAN BOHL: Okay. That's all. Thank	-		ALDERMAN	BOHL:	Okay.	That'	S	all.	Thank
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- 2 you.
- 3 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Miss Christenson, go
- 4 ahead.
- 5 MS. CHRISTENSON: Just for your information,
- 6 the Riverwest Currents has been around for three
- 7 years. We have recently changed the format to -- from
- 8 coming out every other month to coming out monthly,
- 9 and from being a small Xeroxed sheet to a tabloid
- 10 size, so there might be some confusion with people
- 11 saying that the Riverwest Currents is only in its
- third issue. That's not the case. It's been in
- existence for three years.
- 14 There is a regular column of what's coming
- 15 up with the Riverwest Neighborhood Association in the
- 16 Currents and information concerning the Jewel-Osco
- 17 meeting. It was an informational meeting, was in the
- 18 Riverwest Currents, that was mailed out to
- 19 approximately 13 hundred people in our neighborhood.
- The people that it is mailed to are people
- 21 who have ever attended a community meeting, a variety
- of types of meetings in our neighborhood.
- In addition, there are approximately 120
- 24 people on the mailing list for the monthly notices of
- 25 the Riverwest Neighborhood Association. Anyone who's

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ever attended a meeting of the Riverwest Neighborhood
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- 2 Association and signed in at that meeting receives
- 3 notice of our meetings and a copy of the agenda and
- 4 notification of the time and place of the meetings.
- 5 And the Riverwest Neighborhood Association,
- 6 among other functions, takes it upon themselves to
- 7 study -- gather information on issues that affect the
- 8 Riverwest neighborhood and to hold meetings,
- 9 informational meetings, about those and to prepare
- 10 position papers concerning those events.
- 11 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Okay. Thank you very
- 12 much.
- MR. FARRIS: Do you want to hear at all from
- 14 the store manager on the litter thing?
- MS. OLIVEIRA: Let me just talk about -- I
- don't get those things, so I don't know whether I'm a
- member.
- 18 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Wait. One second.
- 19 Miss Oliveira, I'll allow that, but then we're going
- 20 to have to move on because we have at least three
- 21 other people that want to testify.
- MS. OLIVEIRA: I just wanted to clarify
- 23 that.
- 24 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Okay.
- MR. FARRIS: This is Brian Barmore, he's the

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1 store manager, and it's good to have him here.
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- 2 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Okay, Brian. Go ahead.
- 3 MR. FARRIS: There's some pictures that show
- 4 a lot of trash and refuse. In the landscaping area,
- 5 particularly along the perimeter of the property. Can
- 6 you tell us what you do for litter, and how often it
- 7 is, and what we can do to get rid of this trash?
- 8 MR. BARMORE: Yeah. And, you know,
- 9 basically it's a big challenge, and it's something
- 10 that we work on, but every day we've got a sweeper
- 11 that goes through our parking lot. It's an outside
- 12 service. It vacuums the parking lot.
- 13 We occasionally will send people around the
- 14 parking, around the perimeter, to clean up. When the
- 15 weather breaks in the spring, we do some outdoor
- 16 cleanup with trees and things, so, you know, it's
- 17 something that we are constantly working on, and we
- 18 put a lot of energy into it.
- 19 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Well, when you say
- 20 occasionally send someone out in the parking lot, what
- 21 does occasionally mean?
- 22 MR. BARMORE: Occasionally will be certain
- times of the day that we'll send someone out to pick
- 24 up trash, sweep the front area up, in addition to
- 25 daily having the parking lot swept and vacuumed.

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1 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Okay. I think everyone
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- 2 would agree that you need to do a better job. I mean
- 3 those photographs speak for themselves.
- And once again, because -- my comment would
- 5 be that, -- and I'm not sure which person here
- 6 testified to it, -- even though it might not be your
- 7 litter, -- obviously you're not selling beer there, --
- 8 it's ending up on your property.
- 9 It's like if somebody dropped a bunch of
- trash on my front lawn, I'm still really responsible
- for cleaning it up. That's the way I would look at
- it. You're the property owner. Alderwoman?
- 13 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: Oh, I wanted to say
- something about the litter, the pictures that she
- 15 shown.
- 16 Since I shop there, I can just tell about
- 17 what angle they come from and where she's taken the
- 18 pictures at. And one of the pictures she has is right
- 19 up there by those transmitters right behind Wendy's.
- 20 When those guys go out there and sweep, I
- 21 mean pick up the trash, they don't go out there and
- 22 pick it up from them bushes. They need to do that a
- 23 little bit often.
- 24 And over by Channel Four on Capitol Drive,
- 25 right directly in front of there where the iron fence

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        is, they need to pick it up. Instead of having an
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        occasional, like at least two times or three times a
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        day, because people passing by just dump it. They
        just go in your store and just throw that stuff out,
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        and the wind just blow it. It's not saying that
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        you're not doing a thorough job because it really is.
                  I like the store. I really like the store
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        because it has a large variety of foods and things in
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        it, and so it's a very well -- And I've told you
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        numbers of times how nice the store was, so to not
        take away from the inside, you know, when someone
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        and dump that stuff out, when the guy just went and
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14
        picked it up, well, just her luck, -- just your luck
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        that she went there and took the pictures of the guys
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maybe not even coming to your store just drive through out there drinking beer, so, you know, just a good 16 suggestion to her and the rest of them to try to, you 17

know, go out there a little bit more.

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And, actually, when they picking it up, tell those guys they're getting paid by the hour, not by piece so they don't go out there and goof off and only half do it. And I know some of them guys, and I talk to them a lot and just joked about it; how do you get paid. So when they do go out there, tell them to go into the bushes. They have that stick; you know, that

- 1 stick you all have to use. Just tell them to hit the
- bushes with it. That way it won't scratch their arms
- 3 up as they were complaining about.
- 4 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Thanks very much.
- 5 Thank you, Miss Oliveira. We're going to hear from
- 6 Karen, and then -- Actually, Mr. Lawson, you were next
- 7 on the list, so we're going to finish up then with
- 8 Jonas Karvelis. So Mr. Lawson, if you want to take
- 9 the seat there. Miss Royster, you're next.
- 10 MS. ROYSTER: Hi. My name is Karen Royster.
- 11 I live at 728 East Townsend, which is on the corner of
- 12 Fratney and Townsend. I'm here to speak in opposition
- 13 to the license.
- 14 I drove down this morning. It was just
- interesting, I drove past a liquor store on Burleigh
- and Holton, on Locust and Holton, on Center and
- 17 Holton, on North and Holton and one on Lloyd and
- 18 Holton, and I thought, geez, it does seem like if you
- 19 need to get liquor in this area, there seems to be a
- 20 number of outlets, and it's interesting that we're
- 21 having to defend why not to put it there versus the
- 22 store having to really seriously defend why we
- 23 actually need it.
- I'm here in opposition for three reasons.
- One is the concentration of outlets in our area is

1 already severe. There is, in fact, a lot of research

- on the correlation between the concentration of liquor
- 3 outlets and crime, particularly in a neighborhood.
- 4 Our neighborhood is kind of a low and
- 5 moderate income area. We have very high unemployment.
- 6 For young people, the unemployment rate among young
- 7 people, as you know, is very high, and we have too
- 8 many young people who don't have enough money.
- 9 They don't have enough to do, and liquor is a bad
- 10 combination for young people with that kind of a
- 11 situation.
- I went down to 5th District to get data on
- the crime rate existing around there, and I had to go
- 14 to open records, and there just was not time. Again,
- 15 we really did not know that this covenant was in place
- until this weekend, so we weren't prepared to -- we
- 17 didn't realize, again, that there was sort of this
- deal made that we would have to oppose the deal as
- 19 well as this.
- 20 The other problem is, and again, the safety
- 21 issues. I have a teenage daughter. She walks down
- 22 there. I don't want her to have to walk down an
- industrial corridor when the number of people who have
- 24 access to liquor are going to be driving back and
- forth. It's not safe.

1 Also the store itself has reduced the 2 amount of groceries available because they have the 3 drugstore in there. If you -- you know, when it was Pick 'N Save, it was all groceries. Now it's 4 5 groceries, plus toys, plus drugstore, plus all kinds 6 of things. If you add liquor to that, you will in 7 fact reduce more of the amount of groceries that can 8 be sold, and in our area a lot of people -- I shop 9 there two or three times a week, and the choices and 10 the amounts of fruits and vegetables are already 11 reduced. I'm not sure we need less choices of food there. 12 In addition, I was there a week ago at 13 14 night, and there was a fight that involved about six 15 people. The police were called. We already have a number of incidents both in the store. The parking 16 lot is not always terribly safe at night. It is 17 18 filthy. I don't know if there's a cleaner that comes 19 every day, but there's a lot -- I don't know how it 20 could be that dirty and be cleaned every day. 21 And we've had, you know, in other instances 22 agreements made by different stores when they have 23 asked for liquor licenses. I remember the drugstore on Holton and Center that asked for a liquor license 24

and made all kinds of promises about what they would

25

1 do. They eventually almost phased out everything but

- 2 liquor and went out of business.
- 3 The oriental drugstore which was taken over
- 4 and became sort of a little restaurant, and they asked
- 5 for a liquor license. Again, they made all kinds of
- 6 promises about doing things for the community, and it
- 7 became nothing but a liquor license. The liquor store
- 8 went out of business. The promises people make at
- 9 these committees are not necessarily -- There's nobody
- 10 to enforce them.
- 11 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Well, actually, I'm
- going to stop you there because the two situations you
- 13 cited were different in that they got liquor for the
- 14 entire geographic portion of their store. Again,
- they're only asking for a license for 24 hundred
- 16 square feet.
- MS. ROYSTER: But both of those stores
- 18 promised that they would keep their liquor, you know,
- 19 within a smaller -- I'm just saying promises are not
- 20 always kept.
- 21 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: But we have legal
- 22 authority to --
- MS. ROYSTER: But you don't have legal
- 24 authority to deal with the littering, with the crime,
- with the other things.

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                 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Right, I understand
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       that. But what I'm saying is I know for a fact those
       are completely two separate cases and two separate
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       situations.
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Those liquor stores had liquor for the entire configuration of the store even though they said they would only section them off. We have legal authority to say 24 hundred square feet, and that's it.

MS. ROYSTER: Right. I'm just saying -- I'm trying to draw the similarity to promises people make that they don't keep. And I think the whole process of the covenant is really problematic in that the block club captains were not notified. This was done once in October. There was never any article in the Riverwest Currents subsequent to that about any covenant that people could react to, so I'm saying we got multiple problems here.

One, we have lack of neighborhood involvement in the decision making. Two, we have problems that have already been documented at this site that need to be dealt with before we add another risk factor. And three, we have information that we were not able to get on crime issues that I think would be important for this committee to know, because

as you said, it's not a done deal; you're open-minded

- 2 people, you want to make neighborhoods safer. You
- 3 know, as alderpeople, that's your job.
- 4 And so I think that it's really important
- 5 that this committee delay this decision for a period
- of time to do three things. One is to allow the
- 7 neighborhood people to collect more information and
- 8 see if our perceptions of crime, speeding tickets,
- 9 those kind of things are correct. If that's more
- 10 concentrated here.
- 11 And two is to find out if we can sit down
- and see if in fact the store will do a better job of
- 13 cleanup before they get the liquor license, to hold
- 14 that out as a possible reward for being a better
- 15 store. But to give them a license now, to grant them
- that license, is to ignore the wishes of the
- 17 neighborhood who are -- you know, who do pay the taxes
- 18 and pay your salary.
- 19 Two, it is to really overlook and possibly
- 20 place our neighborhood in greater risk, which I don't
- 21 think you want to do.
- 22 And three, it's to take away any incentive
- for this store to do a better job as a retail outlet.
- 24 So I would ask you to seriously, seriously consider a
- 25 significant delay of time, anywhere from -- I mean six

- 1 months seems to be reasonable.
- They've waited three years, Alderman
- 3 Cameron. I think they can survive another six months
- 4 and see if they can straighten out their business
- 5 before we give them more rewards. Thank you.
- 6 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: We've not made a
- 7 decision as to how we're going to proceed yet. I
- 8 will say that delaying the decision is certainly a
- 9 possibility for this committee. I think we're going
- 10 to talk that out a little bit here and see where it
- 11 goes, but I appreciate your comments. I certainly
- think every member of the committee has got a handle
- on your concerns, and I appreciate your testimony.
- 14 The one issue that I think most of us are
- unaware of, as you said, is the crime rate issue, and
- 16 the CAD reports are not available to you at this
- 17 point, so --
- MS. ROYSTER: We could get those, though, if
- 19 we had more time.
- 20 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Okay. Questions of
- 21 Miss Royster by this committee? If not, then thank
- 22 you very much. Mr. Lawson, you're next. You live at
- 23 922 East Center Street?
- MR. LAWSON: That's correct.
- 25 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: By the way, were you

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1 sworn in at the beginning of the meeting?
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- 2 MR. LAWSON: Yes, I was.
- 3 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Mr. Karvelis, were you
- 4 sworn in?
- 5 MR. KARVELIS: No.
- 6 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Why don't we swear you
- 7 in right away, and then you'll be last.
- 8 (Whereupon Jonas Karvelis Was Sworn Under
- 9 Oath.)
- 10 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Mr. Lawson, go ahead.
- 11 MR. LAWSON: Well, first of all, I'd like to
- 12 thank all the members of this committee for hearing us
- 13 all this morning, and your engagement with this issue
- is really appreciated by all the neighbors, on both
- 15 sides I'm sure.
- A lot of the points that I came here with
- 17 were brought up very eloquently by other neighbors, so
- I won't belabor those at this point.
- 19 One issue that I don't think has been
- 20 brought up before, one of the folks who had testified
- 21 earlier mentioned that Jewel-Osco has very deep
- 22 pockets, and that's true with many of the other large
- chain grocery stores in Milwaukee, it's not just
- Jewel-Osco.
- I think one of the problems of having large

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1 corporations own liquor licenses is that they, for
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- one, can defend those licenses with attorneys and
- 3 lobbyists, etcetera. They can also -- It's also much
- 4 more difficult on a one-to-one basis for neighborhood
- 5 residents to interact with management decisions in
- 6 those corporate entities.
- On my particular street, Center Street, we
- 8 have a liquor store. It's a smaller-scale operation.
- 9 I go in there once in a while to buy a six-pack or
- 10 whatever, and I know the guys that operate it.
- 11 They're perfectly nice guys, but even with that
- 12 situation, even with that being said, that store
- causes an enormous number of problems on the west
- 14 end of Center Street. People buy alcohol there,
- they just pull into the alley and drink all the
- alcohol, throw the bottles out behind their cars.
- 17 There are accidents down there or near accidents
- 18 almost every day.
- 19 I'm involved in an artist organization. We
- 20 recently opened a gallery on the corner of Holton and
- 21 Center, and there are so many drunks on our block that
- 22 in the summer we -- people coming to and fro to the
- gallery are harassed by people on the street, and our
- 24 aim is to go to the folks that run this liquor store
- 25 next summer or next spring and make this an issue, and

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our hope is that since it's a small operation, they'll
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- be responsive to our concerns. We certainly don't
- 3 want to see them go out of business.
- 4 How would that scenario be enacted with a
- 5 big entity like Jewel-Osco? If individual neighbors
- 6 close to that operation try to interact with the
- 7 management down the road, how can they do that? You
- 8 know, I think it's long been the policy of the city to
- 9 not grant these liquor licenses to large corporations
- primarily for that reason. And I guess that's my
- 11 concern is that we like to keep the liquor operations
- small so we have a chance to influence those
- 13 operations. Thank you.
- 14 CHAIRMAN GORDON: Questions, comments, by
- 15 committee? Mr. Farris, do you have any questions?
- MR. FARRIS: We'll be there, that's all I
- 17 can say. I mean it's only my word, but the people
- that work there are all local people. The district
- 19 manager is a local person, and we're responsive, I
- 20 think.
- 21 Jewel-Osco has a reputation. I think they
- have built one, they've worked hard, they give back to
- the community, and I think they're a good retailer. I
- don't think you'd have any problems, but that's just
- 25 my own view. I understand your concern.

1 CHAIRMAN GORDON: Any other questions,

- 2 comments?
- 3 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: I have a question.
- 4 CHAIRMAN GORDON: Alderman Cameron.
- 5 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: Who's the agent for
- 6 this store?
- 7 MR. FARRIS: Brian is.
- 8 MR. BARMORE: I'm the agent, yeah.
- 9 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: Where you live at,
- 10 Brian?
- 11 MR. BARMORE: I live in Waterford.
- 12 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: What did you say?
- MR. BARMORE: Waterford.
- MR. LAWSON: Where's Waterford?
- MR. FARRIS: Northwest.
- 16 ALDERMAN BOHL: No, that's Watertown.
- MR. FARRIS: That's Watertown. Excuse me.
- 18 ALDERMAN BOHL: Waterford. It's near
- 19 Mukwonago, southwest.
- 20 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Do you have any other
- 21 questions, Alderwoman?
- 22 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: No, no.
- 23 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Thank you, sir, for
- your testimony.
- MR. KARVELIS: Hi. I'm Jonas Karvelis.

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1 I used to be part of the leadership of the Humboldt
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- Yards Coalition, and I guess I'm still sort of
- 3 involved with the Boycott Jewel-Osco Committee.
- 4 I circulated many petitions long before it was
- 5 fashionable opposing this liquor license.
- I'm also a sort of a poor, amateur
- 7 photographer. I was practicing a little bit on
- 8 Sunday morning taking some photographs. I hope
- 9 they turned out well enough for you.
- 10 MR. SCHRIMPF: Just for the record, you
- 11 are the individual who --
- MR. KARVELIS: I am the individual who took
- those photographs and had them developed at the
- 14 Walgreen's in Shorewood, and I feel bad, now that I
- think about it, for patronizing a business in
- 16 Shorewood rather than keeping my money in the City
- 17 of Milwaukee.
- 18 MR. SCHRIMPF: But anyway, the pictures that
- 19 have been shown to the committee are in fact the true
- and correct pictures that you took?
- MR. KARVELIS: Yes, they are.
- 22 MR. SCHRIMPF: And you took them yesterday
- 23 morning on April 7th?
- MR. KARVELIS: Yes. I took them between
- 25 11:45 and 12:15, during the noon hour.

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1 MR. SCHRIMPF: And all of the pictures that
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- 2 you took that are in evidence here depict things that
- 3 you saw where?
- 4 MR. KARVELIS: In the parking lot of the
- 5 Jewel-Osco that is applying for this liquor license.
- 6 MR. SCHRIMPF: Okay. Mr. Farris, do you
- 7 have anything further?
- 8 MR. FARRIS: No. I'd just to point out that
- 9 we're going to address that problem, and I'm sure you
- 10 picked the best time after Saturday night.
- MR. SCHRIMPF: I just wanted to lay the
- 12 foundation. That's all I had, Mr. Chair.
- MR. KARVELIS: I didn't really think there
- was a best time or a worst time to take a look at
- 15 litter in a parking lot. I think it's the
- 16 responsibility of corporations to clean up the mess
- 17 all the time, not just on Monday mornings.
- I was out in the parking lot for about 30
- 19 minutes or so as I just said, and, you know, I sort
- 20 of drove around the parking lot first slowly taking a
- 21 look at, you know, what was what in my car. I drove
- around slowly around the perimeter I think twice.
- Then I walked around the parking lot for about 30
- 24 minutes. Security guard never bothered to look at me.
- 25 Didn't bother to ask what this guy was doing walking

- 1 around the parking lot.
- I was taking photographs. I heard a couple
- 3 car alarms go off. I never saw security respond to
- 4 the car alarms.
- 5 I was panhandled in the parking lot while
- 6 taking pictures. It scared the daylights out of me
- 7 because I was busy looking through the lens, and some
- guy walked up and said, "Hey, buddy, can you spare
- 9 some change?" The security guard was nowhere to be
- 10 found. I walked over to the loading dock area. The
- 11 security guard was just parked in front of the store.
- 12 I was really amazed at the lack of concern for what
- was going on in the parking lot.
- 14 This is less than a minute from Interstate
- 43, so highway access to this parking lot is really
- fast and real easy, much easier than many highway
- 17 cloverleafs, really. And so there's going to be a
- problem with people just zooming off the expressway
- 19 and grabbing stuff here.
- 20 We need -- there needs to be patroling
- of not just the parking lot, but the neighborhood
- 22 surrounding the parking lot, because it is an
- 23 industrial zone. It's sort of a wasteland there a
- large part of the time, and who knows what's going
- 25 to be happening there.

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1	CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Well, Mr. Karvelis,
2	you have to acknowledge that Jewel-Osco has no
3	authority outside their property. That would be the
4	responsibility of the Milwaukee Police Department.
5	MR. KARVELIS: It's an added burden on the
6	City of Milwaukee to take care of this.
7	CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Okay. I understand.
8	MR. KARVELIS: I think we also need to take
9	a look at the concentration issue from a different
10	perspective because this is a retail strip in the
11	middle of an industrial zone, and there's not going to
12	be the foot traffic that we ordinarily look at to
13	judge concentration for a store.
14	Anybody who's shopping at this store is
15	driving to this store, and I think we have to look at
16	concentration from that sort of perspective, also.
17	It's not the immediate vicinity, but it's the other
18	large liquor stores surrounding it. And this is going
19	to be the largest liquor store on the east side in the
20	Riverwest neighborhood as I understand it.
21	They came initially Well, as far as the
22	covenant and working out an agreement with the
23	community, these people showed up originally before
24	the meeting. We were told they were going to have a
25	proposal for a 48 hundred square foot liquor store

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1 which would have been just massive, and I said --
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- because I worked at Jewel-Osco before at the Humboldt
- 3 Yard site, -- that, you know, this is just a
- 4 negotiating ploy, they really have no intention of
- 5 going in with a liquor store this size.
- 6 And I figured they were also going to be
- 7 willing to not sell those products that are trouble
- 8 products, 40-ouncers, half pints, malt liquor, this
- 9 sort of stuff.
- 10 And at the meeting they compromised. Before
- 11 any community member had an objection to the size of
- the store, they said we're going to make it smaller.
- 13 We're still going to make it one of the biggest liquor
- stores, but it wouldn't be nearly as big as we
- originally wanted, and we're not going to carry those
- 16 products that are going to cause problems in the
- 17 neighborhood; and, you know, since we've got this huge
- store with lots of vacant space, we can easily give up
- 19 a couple square feet of space for Riverwest products.
- 20 So I don't really know how much Jewel-Osco's
- 21 been willing to compromise with the community as far
- 22 as actually working with the community. I think they
- 23 came with their proposal, doubled it, and then halved
- it again for the sake of saying, hey, look at us,
- 25 we're good people, we're willing to listen to you.

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I think finally the one other thing I'd like
to add in the ground rules, and this is sort of going
off the point, but I do think we need to look at the
whole issue of competition and free market.
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- 5 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: And we can't hear that.
- 6 MR. KARVELIS: I understand, but I just 7 wanted to mention this to the entire committee here 8 just to think about how we already don't have a free 9 market; that we have zoning laws, we have licensing 10 laws, and we don't have necessarily free market 11 competition out there. There are already restrictions 12 in place, and sometimes I think we hamper the best ideas of development by saying, well, it's the free 13 14 market, and we have to let the market do what the 15 market wants to do, even if it leads to sprawl,
  - So this doesn't pertain anything specific to this, but I just think that we do need to think about how the competition argument, the free market argument, is not really as valid as it used to be. Thank you very much.
- 22 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Thank you very much,
  23 Mr. Karvelis.

pollution and bad developments.

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MR. FARRIS: Just a quick question. Sir, you were at the October meeting, correct, of the

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1 neighborhood association?
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- 2 MR. KARVELIS: I am here to give public
- 3 testimony to this committee, and I'm happy to answer
- 4 questions from this group of public officials. I
- 5 don't particularly enjoy having to answer questions
- from a paid corporate lawyer.
- 7 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Mr. Karvelis, he has a
- 8 legal right to cross-examine any witness who testifies
- 9 in opposition to this request.
- 10 MR. KARVELIS: I just want to mention my
- irritation, and then I'll answer the question.
- 12 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: I understand that,
- but we would appreciate if you answer the question,
- so Mr. Farris, go right ahead.
- MR. FARRIS: I just wanted to ask, you
- 16 attended the meeting back in October, the first
- meeting, the informational meeting?
- 18 MR. KARVELIS: I did attend the very first
- 19 meeting where you approached the Riverwest
- 20 Neighborhood Association for the first time, and that
- 21 was the first and last meeting I have attended of the
- 22 Riverwest Neighborhood Association.
- MR. FARRIS: And you were strongly opposed
- to the liquor license at that time, were you not?
- MR. KARVELIS: I was strongly opposed to it

when I circulated many of the petitions several years

- 2 ago against this store.
- 3 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: Mr. Chairman?
- 4 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Okay. Alderwoman
- 5 Cameron.
- 6 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: Oh, I just wanted to
- 7 say since he had a question, that maybe the lawyer
- 8 could direct his questions to you, and you could
- 9 reverse them to him.
- 10 MR. FARRIS: No, that's all I wanted to ask.
- 11 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Mr. Farris, I'm going
- to ask you if you want to make kind of a wrapping up
- 13 kind of comment, --
- MR. FARRIS: Yeah, I do.
- 15 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: -- and then I'm going to
- 16 offer some direction to this committee, and perhaps we
- 17 can come to some from of a conclusion so to speak.
- But Mr. Farris, I'll ask you to go first, and then I'm
- going to make a couple of comments.
- 20 MR. FARRIS: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I
- 21 just want to -- The way I see things, there's really
- 22 two separate issues here. One is the covenant, and
- one is notice of the hearing today, and I just want to
- 24 talk first about the notice of the hearing which went
- out to over 800 people, and I believe we have 10

- 1 opponents here today.
- 2 The Riverwest neighborhood, for a liquor
- 3 store at a Jewel-Osco store, I mean it's --
- 4 Historically those of you that it went through
- 5 Humboldt and North, there was no difficulty on an
- 6 issue where people were strongly concerned about
- 7 bringing in substantial numbers, and we have 10
- 8 here today, so we're talking about notice, and then
- 9 we're talking about the covenant. Today notice went
- 10 out to more than 800 people on a liquor license at
- Jewel-Osco, and we have 10 people that oppose it.
- 12 Second is the covenant. There's a lot of
- 13 talk about the covenant being flawed. It may or may
- 14 not be. I don't think it is, personally, but the
- 15 covenant is not a requirement of this process. The
- 16 covenant is something that we've agreed to that's
- going to benefit the community.
- 18 The people here today want to delay things
- so they can gather and go door-to-door and get more
- 20 opponents. They don't want to sit down with us and
- 21 negotiate because that's been -- the opportunity has
- been there. The opportunity has been there since
- October, and if you listened today, there was not one
- thing directed at us as far as the liquor store area
- goes; one condition that they would insist on or they

1 feel would alleviate their concerns or anything like

- 2 that. It was just they're opposed.
- 3 The litter problems with the store, Brian's
- 4 going to go back, and I'm going to call Tim Lynch when
- 5 I'm done here today, and tell him it's unacceptable.
- 6 It's unacceptable whether or not we get a liquor
- 7 license because I think it's bad for business. I
- 8 don't think people like coming to a store if they
- 9 see litter around there. It's a clean store on the
- 10 inside, so I know the company can do it on the
- 11 outside.
- I don't see any purpose by delaying this
- matter other than generating more controversy.
- 14 Obviously it's in our interest to try to have this
- matter voted on today because it's easier to get
- 16 people to be opposed to things.
- We're not going to be able to go door-to-
- door and get people to come to a meeting to support a
- 19 liquor license for a Jewel-Osco. That just doesn't
- 20 happen. We have a co-chair of the neighborhood
- 21 association who came here today, and Jan Christenson
- was kind enough to come here today, but we're not
- going to have any more people than that, and if this
- is delayed, the opponents are going to go door-to-
- door, and we're going to have kind of a junior

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1 Humboldt Yards again over a liquor license, and
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- they're going to get more people here.
- 3 And if that's what the committee wants,
- 4 that's fine, but it's just going to become more and
- 5 more controversial, and I don't think it's going
- to be for legitimate reasons, because I think Jewel-
- 7 Osco -- Obviously we don't have the entitlement that
- 8 a licensee has, but there's no question about the
- 9 suitability of the applicant. They have other
- 10 licenses throughout the country, and they run an
- 11 exemplary operation. These are not the kind of
- people that you're going to have trouble with.
- I think the location is suitable. If
- 14 you -- Obviously it's separated geographically by
- 15 the industrial area. It's a commercial strip. The
- outlets that everybody referred to are generally to
- 17 the south, five, six, blocks or more, and to the west,
- and there's some to the east. There's nothing up here
- 19 except for the Kohl's in Shorewood.
- 20 You didn't hear of any other stores on
- 21 Capitol Drive in this area in the immediate vicinity
- on Holton or Humboldt, like 38 hundred or 36 hundred,
- 23 something like that. So it is a suitable location as
- 24 well.
- 25 So we have a suitable applicant, suitable

1 location, and then we have concerns about trash and

- 2 crime and things like that that are present in every
- 3 liquor store license matter.
- And, again, I just want to go back to its
- 5 notice. The notice went out to over 800 people, and
- 6 we have 10 people opposed here, and many who made up
- 7 their mind from the very beginning that they were
- 8 opposed. Their minds didn't change, and I appreciate
- 9 that, that's their right.
- 10 Rosemary was at the first meeting, Jonas was
- 11 at the first meeting. These are just people that are
- opposed. And they didn't say we want you to insist on
- 13 this condition in the covenant or that kind of thing.
- 14 They just said, we don't want a covenant at all.
- 15 And there were other people in the
- 16 neighborhood association that thought it was a
- 17 better approach to work with Jewel-Osco. Obviously
- 18 Jewel-Osco is an important part of that community.
- 19 They took over a store, they refurbished the store,
- 20 and they run a clean operation. It's a quality store
- 21 that offers a great service to that community, so
- 22 there's many reasons to want to work with Jewel-Osco.
- 23 And it's not a mammoth-sized liquor store.
- We're talking 24 hundred square feet. It's not very
- 25 big at all, and it's part of a large -- much larger

store, so it's going to be very small in comparison to

- 2 the rest of the store.
- 3 So I ask the committee not to prolong this
- 4 controversy. It's been pending for a long time. I
- 5 ask you not to delay things any further because it's
- just going to become more controversial, and I don't
- 7 think that benefits anybody.
- I think we've worked in good faith,
- 9 Riverwest Neighborhood Association worked in good
- 10 faith. We came to a agreement under which they would
- 11 not oppose us. I think that's really a lot for this
- 12 community, for a retailer to come in there and work
- with a group and convince them not be opposed to a
- 14 liquor license. I'm familiar with Riverwest, and I
- 15 know they're vigilant. They care about the community,
- and they're hard to work with if you're representing a
- 17 retailer, but we did that, and we managed to come to
- 18 terms in a way that allows us to proceed with our
- 19 business plan.
- Now, this is something that Jewel-Osco does
- 21 all over the country. This is part of their plan.
- It's not something we're just trying to do in this
- 23 area alone. We're not trying to single them out
- 24 because it's a problem community. This is what we do,
- 25 we do it well, and so we ask you to vote today and

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1 hopefully allow us to proceed with this operation.
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- 2 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Thank you, Mr. Farris.
- 3 I'm just going to make a suggestion to the committee.
- 4 MS. WEISBROT: Can I ask a question?
- 5 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Yes, but real quickly.
- 6 MS. WEISBROT: I want to know why they
- 7 didn't single out the store on Humboldt and North,
- 8 and I also feel like it's a cheap shot to say that
- 9 there's only been 10 people here representing our
- 10 neighborhood. First of all, we weren't included, and
- 11 second of all, --
- 12 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Amy, Amy.
- MS. WEISBROT: Second of all, there's plenty
- of people that work during the day. We had to take
- off of work to be here.
- 16 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: I understand, but I
- 17 thought you had a question directed at the committee.
- 18 I'm not going to get into a point-counterpoint here
- 19 at this committee, so -- I appreciate that, but I'm
- 20 not going to allow that. We've had two hours and 10
- 21 minutes now of testimony, and I have a suggestion
- 22 which I'd like to make, a recommendation to this
- committee, because I think we ought to do this openly,
- and I don't want to do this behind closed doors.
- 25 Here's my suggestion to the committee; is

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that Amy suggested originally, and a number of other

people have suggested since her comment, that this

matter be delayed. I think that's reasonable, but I

think it's unreasonable to have it delayed six months.
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They've had an application pending now,

Jewel-Osco has, for nearly three years. This matter
has been in the works with the Riverwest Neighborhood
Association since October, and I think they have a
right to be heard and have a right to have a decision
rendered by this committee and by the Common Council
in a reasonable amount of time. I think a six-month
delay is way too long.

My suggestion is this: Is that we delay a decision on this matter until a meeting of this committee which is regularly scheduled for May 21st, which is six weeks from now, with the Common Council making its final decision on June 4th, which is nearly two months.

Now, we heard from 10 neighbors, and I'm just going to go through some of the same themes that came up over and over again by these neighbors; litter, unruly behavior, traffic, concentration, crime, maintenance of the store, media saturation, access to alcohol, concentration. Again, some of the same things; safety, the crime rate and those kinds

- 1 of things.
- The 10 people essentially had the same four
- 3 or five or six themes that came up over and over
- 4 again, all legitimate, but I'm not convinced that if
- 5 we had a hundred people here today, that we would hear
- 6 anything more than what we heard.
- 7 So my suggestion to this committee is that
- 8 we delay the decision, but not to hold another public
- 9 hearing. I'm not going to conduct another public
- 10 hearing and have the room filled with people saying
- 11 the same thing that these very good citizens who are
- 12 concerned about their neighborhood have already
- 13 testified to, but only to give Alderman D'Amato a
- 14 chance to mediate this potentially between the folks
- 15 that are here and Jewel-Osco.
- Then on May 21st, at the public hearing,
- 17 have Alderman D'Amato respond on behalf of the
- 18 constituents and on behalf of his neighborhood, have
- 19 Jewel-Osco make a couple comments, but then we need to
- 20 make a decision, and that would be the end of it. One
- 21 way or the other, they deserve a right to know, and
- 22 one way or the other, you deserve a right to know, and
- 23 I think unnecessarily delaying it is simply creating a
- 24 whole slew of other issues for us that I don't want
- 25 to get into.

1	MS. WEISBROT: Could we have a public
2	hearing at another time, especially not during work
3	hours, for the public and the community to talk about
4	this?
5	CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: No, because today was
6	the public hearing, and we mailed out 886 notices as
7	well as the Riverwest Neighborhood Association sending
8	out 16 hundred newsletters. A lot of people knew
9	about it.
10	MS. WEISBROT: But then there was an article
11	in the paper just a few days later saying sorry,
12	but it said in the paper that a deal was made already,
13	and that the hearing was going to be today. A lot of
14	people thought, well, why should I even bother arguing
15	about this because the deal was already made.
16	CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Here's the thing. We
17	can't conduct two public hearings on every single
18	liquor license request. I mean we've got 13 hundred
19	liquor licenses in the city, and if we did that all
20	the time, we
21	ALDERMAN D'AMATO: Mr. Chairman, we will
22	have a public meeting, not a public hearing. We'll
23	call a public meeting at a public location in
24	Riverwest where we'll invite all the block club

leaders so they can disseminate that information to

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1 people on their block. We can take minutes, -- have
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- an initial party, take minutes, and then we'll send
- 3 those on to the committee for their information.
- 4 MS. WEISBROT: That's what I want.
- 5 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Okay, that's different.
- 6 But then on May 21st, Alderman, it's really your
- 7 responsibility to let the committee know what's going
- 8 on.
- 9 ALDERMAN D'AMATO: We'll let you know
- 10 what's going on. My other question is, I know you
- 11 won't take public testimony at the next hearing, but
- 12 will you accept the CAD report from the police
- 13 department?
- 14 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: If you want to enter it
- as part of the record on your behalf, we'll take it.
- 16 ALDERMAN D'AMATO: And if Mr. Karvelis, for
- instance, goes out once a week for the next six weeks
- 18 and then provides you with photographs of the parking
- 19 lot, would you take that information?
- 20 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: We already have
- 21 photographs of the parking lot. I mean they're
- 22 pretty detailed photographs. I'm not sure you can
- take pictures of something we haven't already seen.
- 24 ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: Mr. Chairman?
- 25 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Alderwoman.

1	ALDERWOMAN CAMERON: To me it doesn't make
2	sense to have to delay this. If you're going to delay
3	it, then the residents should be able to come and
4	voice their opinion. If we're going to just rely on
5	Alderman D'Amato, by the time the council meet, he can
6	give us this information and we can render the
7	decision.
8	Now I'm not supporting Osco, I'm not
9	supporting the residents, because right now I feel
10	like this committee has been forced to be in between
11	when it should have been worked out before it arrived
12	here.
13	I'm saying that if we're going to hold this
14	over just to get an opinion, and to me, fairly, if
15	the residents over there said they don't want it, and
16	one or two over here said they do want it, and as it
17	was stated in the paper a couple days ago, that
18	agreement was already worked out, well, these
19	residents are going to still be in the same situation
20	they're in today. So we should do one or the other.
21	If we're not going to have a public hearing, we should
22	render our decision today.
23	A lot of stuff you're asking Alderman
24	D'Amato to give us, a CAD report from the police

department, is not even legal. That is not a part of

25

1 the police report, so it's -- well, not defending you,

- but it's kind of putting one side at a disadvantage.
- 3 I think we should be fair with this. If we're going
- 4 to do it over, do it all the way.
- 5 You're going to set aside for the residents
- 6 to have an opportunity -- and I'm sorry to say that
- 7 if -- that we would have all of these residents come
- 8 up as we did at the Humboldt Park project situation,
- 9 but fair is fair.
- 10 Alderman D'Amato is the alderman of that
- district, true and fair, and he's supposed to make a
- decision according to what the residents are asking
- 13 him to do. Now, if the residents is saying they feel
- 14 somewhat disadvantaged today because they read in the
- 15 paper that a decision was made, I don't know was they
- 16 represented -- was he taking their views, or was he
- 17 taking someone else's view, or maybe, you know, the
- 18 paper doesn't state everything truthfully all the
- 19 time, so I don't really know.
- To me, to be caught in the middle, -- I
- 21 would prefer to listen to the residents for my own
- 22 self to hear what they have to say to us because we're
- 23 the one that has to make that decision even including
- 24 Alderman D'Amato's recommendation. But as you have
- 25 said time after time after time, that's the charter of

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1 this committee, not the alderman that represent that
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- 2 district. Now those are your words.
- 3 ALDERMAN PAWLINSKI: Well, okay. Can I
- 4 respond to that, Mr. Chairman?
- 5 CHAIRMAN GORDON: Yes, go ahead.
- 6 ALDERMAN PAWLINSKI: Here's my point.
- 7 There's some legitimate concerns by these local
- 8 neighbors, and I'm of the feeling that there's always
- 9 at least hope that some of these matters can be
- 10 resolved. If they can't be resolved, at least I think
- 11 we gave it our best shot.
- 12 And I think it's unfair to the public, it's
- 13 unfair to us, it's unfair to the other license holders
- who will be waiting in this room, to have a whole
- other public hearing which might go five or six hours.
- Today was the day. We scheduled a separate
- 17 day just for this. Tomorrow is our regularly
- scheduled licensing hearing. We're going to be here
- 19 tomorrow for at least six or seven hours. I mean we
- 20 dedicated this day for this issue alone. I think that
- 21 is a service to the committee, and I don't want to
- 22 have two public hearings on every controversial item.
- 23 I'm hopeful that these matters can get
- 24 resolved. I hope Alderman D'Amato can remediate them.
- 25 If not, they deserve a right to know and so do they.

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1 That's all I'm saying. We've done this before, and
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- 2 we've never held two public hearings, but we have
- 3 delayed it with the hope that there can be a
- 4 compromise. That's my only hope, Alderman.
- 5 MS. WEISBROT: That's fair.
- 6 MR. COPELAND: Excuse me. May I speak?
- 7 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Mr. Copeland.
- 8 MR. COPELAND: If this is delayed to the
- 9 21st, and if the committee decides to take testimony,
- 10 then --
- 11 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: We are not.
- 12 MR. COPELAND: I'm just saying if. Then
- 13 you must be aware that that is our busiest time for
- 14 alcohol beverage renewals. In fact, sometimes in the
- month of May and June we have to double up on U & Ls,
- so I would caution the committee about scheduling this
- on a regular date if you're going to include other
- 18 testimony, because you're going to --
- 19 ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chairman.
- 20 MS. WEISBROT: We can have a separate public
- 21 meeting.
- MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman?
- 23 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Alderman Bohl first.
- 24 ALDERMAN BOHL: I don't believe I heeded
- 25 your remarks or comments. I don't believe a formal

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1 motion was made.
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- 2 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Not yet. That was just
- 3 a suggestion.
- 4 ALDERMAN BOHL: If you don't have that
- 5 problem, I will certainly make the motion to hold this
- 6 item over to the call of the chair. I think it's
- 7 necessary.
- 8 The only comment that I would have in terms
- 9 of the caveat is that I believe at this point, and I
- don't want to go out on a limb and say that Jewel-Osco
- 11 was at fault here because I think that they were given
- 12 direction to go to the Riverwest Neighborhood
- 13 Association and did follow up on that in terms of
- 14 meeting, and that a meeting was conducted.
- I will say that it's pretty evident to me
- from the 10 individuals who are here, maybe two or
- 17 three of which did attend that meeting, that there was
- not suitable notification for the public, and that,
- 19 you know, the meeting that I assume is going to be
- 20 probably occurring the next two weeks under the guise
- 21 of Alderman D'Amato is probably what should have taken
- 22 place here three weeks, a month ago, under the guise
- of Alderman D'Amato directing it, and unfortunately,
- 24 we're in a situation now where we are once again, as a
- committee, trying to mediate issues that should have

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been -- at least the attempts of mediation, handled
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- 2 well in advance before we take our time here.
- 3 So I will -- if you want to make a motion,
- 4 that's fine. If not, I will move to hold this item to
- 5 the call of the chair.
- 6 However, I just think that this meeting,
- 7 this public meeting; one, the 886 letters of
- 8 notification were sent out to members of the public
- 9 saying we are meeting at Fratney School on this
- 10 evening to discuss this issue, present will be
- Jewel-Osco, present will be I, the alderman of the
- district, present will be the neighborhood
- 13 association, that should have occurred three weeks
- 14 ago, it shouldn't have occurred here today.
- 15 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Let me hold the motion
- for a second. Mr. Schrimpf, is there anything you
- want to add before we take the motion up?
- 18 MR. SCHRIMPF: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. A
- 19 couple of thoughts, and it's always dangerous to think
- out loud, but under the circumstances, that's what I'm
- 21 doing.
- Number one, it is certainly within the
- 23 committee's purview and discretion to hold it to
- 24 the call of the chair so long as the hold is for a
- 25 reasonable purpose and a reasonable time, and that's

1 certainly within your discretion.

Number two, that the issues that the chair addressed was the fact that there is concern regarding crime statistics, and specific reference was made to the CAD reports. The CAD reports regrettably are not going to give you crime statistics. They give you the rawest form of information that pours in the Milwaukee Police Department, and it really doesn't indicate crimes. What it indicates is calls for police service to an address.

If it is the intention of the neighborhood people to get crime statistics before the committee, that is certainly an appropriate consideration that the committee can use so long as the evidence is properly qualified as coming from a witness from the Milwaukee Police Department. And I understand that you have to go through open records, and I understand it may take some time to get that, and it's a perfectly reasonable thing for the committee to consider that and hold this until they can get the information. My only thought is the CAD reports aren't going to do it for you.

Finally, with respect to the role of

Alderman D'Amato in this matter, I caution the

committee to be very careful here. If it is the

desire to have continued neighborhood meetings to try

- 2 to work this thing out, that's fine, and that's
- 3 another good reason, perfectly appropriate reason, to
- 4 hold the matter to the call of the chair.
- 5 However, testimony that is presented to that
- 6 meeting, coming to this committee, is sadly hearsay
- 7 and does not afford the committee the opportunity to
- 8 cross-examine those individuals, even if those
- 9 individuals are cross-examined at the meeting, and
- 10 there could be technical objections either from the
- 11 opponents or the supporters of the license to the
- 12 committee receiving that information.
- 13 Finally, with respect to Alderman D'Amato
- making a recommendation, I understand that the
- 15 committee does like to have the knowledge and the
- input of the local alderman to the area and relies on
- 17 that to help it make intelligent decisions in this
- 18 area, but under no circumstances should the
- 19 recommendation of the alderman be viewed as binding
- 20 upon the committee for making the decision because
- 21 then you get into an out-and-out aldermanic purpage,
- 22 and you can't have that going on, either. So with
- 23 those cautions to the committee, hopefully you all
- 24 understand that.
- 25 ALDERMAN D'AMATO: Mr. Chairman, one final

comment. Thank you, Mr. Schrimpf. I haven't made
those recommendations for that purpose, and just in
response to a couple comments made by the alderman.

This is a community that has very active people and people who are very independent. The estimation that we're going to go to a community meeting and that 800 people are going to agree this is a good idea or bad idea is sadly mistaken. What we're going to have is a mixed bag, and I think to say the meeting should have taken place three weeks ago is also mistaken because we mostly would have come with the same type of testimony. We would have added those people who are here against it, and those people who worked on the covenant. Those are the two parties you have that represent the neighborhood.

At this time I do think we should get some factual information, and we'll be able to provide at least the crime statistics.

CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: And I just personally believe we can probably get this done one way or another in 20 minutes at the next hearing. You're going to speak, Mr. Farris is going to speak, and we'll ask a couple questions, and that's going to be it, and we'll make a decision. So I think within 20 minutes after we start, -- Mr. Copeland's concerned we

1 might have to double up, but I really believe we can

- 2 finish it within a reasonable amount of time.
- 3 ALDERMAN GORDON: I support the motion to
- 4 hold for the reasons that are already stated because
- 5 clearly a notice issue is of concern, and I think we
- 6 can resolve this in short order at the next scheduled
- 7 hearing once we get the information as provided by
- 8 Alderman D'Amato.
- 9 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Okay. The motion
- 10 before us is for -- Alderman Bohl's motion is to
- 11 delay our decision until May 21st, and we'll work
- 12 with Mr. Copeland and put that on the calendar perhaps
- 13 right away in the beginning of the meeting if we can,
- 14 with the Common Council decision hopefully then coming
- on June 4th, which is the regularly scheduled meeting
- 16 after that date.
- 17 ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chairman, would you like
- me to amend the motion? It was to the call of the
- 19 chair. It should be two cycles.
- 20 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: Yes.
- 21 ALDERMAN BOHL: I would amend to move to
- 22 hold this item two cycles.
- 23 CHAIRMAN PAWLINSKI: You've heard the motion
- from Alderman Bohl. Any objection to that motion?
- 25 Hearing none, so ordered. Thank you for coming.
