

## A TRIBUTE TO A GREAT LADY AND ICON OF TRUE AMERICAN HISTORY

Ms. Claretta "Mother Freedom" Simpson

Founder of Career Youth Development, Inc.

Ms. Claretta Simpson, a nationally known, highly respected civil rights leader and a dedicated Christian was born on November 28, 1901 in the small, country town of Smedes, Mississippi. Not having the convenience of our modern day hospital facilities that the "space age" families now take for granted, Ms. Simpson was delivered in her home to this world by a mid-wife.

Ms. Simpson who is known locally and nationally as "Mother Freedom" has spent all of her 100 years in service to God and mankind. Ms. Simpson began her civil rights work long before the days of the great Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. She is a modern day Harriet Tubman who started working for justice and civil rights for her fellowman and woman with Dr. T.R. M. Howard of Mount Bayou, Mississippi. Dr. Howard was the predecessor of Dr. King.

During this period of time she put her life on the fine many, many times. She was a initial and integral part of the "underground" N.A.A.C.P. Literally riding hidden under the covers of horse drawn wagons to secret N.A.A.C.P. meetings. Because frankly speaking, during that period of history in the south, racism and the Ku Klux Klan and other entities were prevalent and would kill, malm or hang participants of such a "freedom movement". But having no fear in her heart, "Mother Freedom" bravely participated anyway at her life's risk, for what she felt would bring justice and equality to those who were not rightfully obtaining it. She was the essence and epitome of the term "trailblazer".

She basically participated in "every phase" of the Civil Rights Movement. She was a part of every major march that Dr. Martin Luther King, Ir. spearheaded. She was involved in the Birmingham, Alabama march where she was bitten by the dogs and thrown into jail. She was involved with Dr. King in Detroit, Michigan where she was literally ran over and trampled by the Police Officers who were mounted on horses and was sprayed by high powered water hoses. Still she prevailed and continued her quest as a advocate for the downtrodden, those without a voice in the American justice and civil rights system. She was without fear and time and time again called on God to provide her strength, wisdom and direction. With God on her side she continued on her journey of freedom for all. Ms. Simpson was some kind of a lady!

She protested the injustice that took place with the charges surrounding the Emmitt Till case in Mississippi. She was there with her grandson Charles "Butch" Walton propped on her shoulders when she heard Dr. King give his now famous, "I Have A Dream" speech in Washington, D.C.

"Mother Freedom" was involved in the movement with H. Rapp Brown, Kwame Ture (Stokley Carmichael) and his student movement, where we first heard the words "Black Power" coined. She was there standing up for freedom of speech, empowerment and civil rights for the economically poor and disadvantaged of our nation.

She was heavily involved in all of the Milwaukee School Board marches concerning busing along with Attorney Lloyd Barbee. She marched for open housing with Father Groppi as well.

Just recently in the summer of '97 she was one of the leaders of Career Youth Development's Victory Over Violence March & Rally held here in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. In the Year 2001, she continues to be a strong voice and advocate for the most in need.

"Mother Freedom" along with her daughter, Jeannetta Robinson were the co-founders of Career Youth Development, Inc. a 31 year old, non-profit, multi-service, social service agency that has over 20 different programs designed to meet the needs of the community and a staff of approximately 100 people, C.Y.D. was founded in 1970, as a response to this community's social service needs. They did not start C.Y.D. by writing a grant. "Mother Freedom" funded C.Y.D. out of her own money and operated the agency out of her own little back house because she loved the youth and families who needed her assistance.

This organization that she founded has been recognized by Congress and President Bill Clinton as a model agency. "Mother Freedom" stated that, "I wanted to develop a community based agency that would last forever, as a testimony that God will always provide and have a love-in-action center for the youth and families of this community". Therefore it was only fitting that our Child Care Institute for adolescents for male youth, ages (2-17 be named after her, "The Claretta Simpson House". She is truly a phoneme, an icon and a part of our true American history. She too can be heard singing the words of our famous patriotic song, "My County Tis Of Thee, Sweet Land Of Liberty, Of Thee I Sing..."

That's the essence of this great American lady. She continues without hesitation to do her part for the most in need of our community as we all strive toward achieving the American Dream.
