"It's almost a waste of the sworn officers' time to handle all the minor calls," Gatch said.

Commissioners unanimously approved the chief's request to hire two community service officers instead of the patrol officers originally requested.

The community service officers will take much of the administrative burden off the sworn officers, Gatch said. They can respond to nonemergency calls when there is no threat of physical confrontation and no crime in progress. They can also prepare incident reports.

The non-sworn officers would work noon to 8 p.m., when most of the calls come in, Gatch said.

"This would free up the swom officers to handle the more serious cases and help avoid burnout of the officers," he said. "The community officers in Altamonte Springs and the county have worked out well."

Gatch estimated the yearly savings from hiring a community service officer instead of a patrol officer would be between \$8,000 and \$10,000 each.

Of the 79 Police Department employees, 52 are sworn officers. There are 13 employees in the communications area, four in animal control and 10 in administration, SEQN: 81561178
