3	District, Rafael Luciano, extended hours
4	establishment application for McDonald's, 1931
5	South 14th Street. Good morning.
6	THE APPLICANT: Good morning, sir.
7	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Would you raise
8	your right hands, we'll swear you in, please?
9	(Whereupon those present were sworn.)
10	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And then, you
11	gentlemen are going to testify in this matter,
12	also?
13	THOSE PRESENT: Yes.
14	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. Could you
15	both raise your right hands, we'll swear you in,
16	please?
17	(Whereupon those present were sworn.)
18	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: State your name
19	and address for the record, please.
20	THE APPLICANT: My name is Rafael
21	Luciano. My address is 1300 North Prospect in
22	Milwaukee.
23	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And then, with you
24	is?
25	THE APPLICANT: The gentleman with me
24	is?

23	REBECCA BARRON: I don't have all the

1	this license, it will be drive-through only.
2	THE APPLICANT: It It will be only
3	drive-through. Correct, sir. We close our lobby
4	every day at ten p.m.
5	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. And did I
6	ask you if you received a notice that there's a
7	possibility this could be denied because of
8	neighborhood objections?
9	THE APPLICANT: We did receive the
10	notice.
11	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Do I have to check
12	with Neighborhood Services? Health?
13	HEALTH: No objections.
14	DNS: No objections.
15	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And are you
16	gentlemen here to testify in support or
17	opposition?
18	THE WITNESSES: Opposition.
19	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. If you,
20	sir, could We'll start with this gentleman
21	here. Could you pull that microphone towards
22	yourself, because we have to get this
23	COURT REPORTER: Can you spell your
24	name?
25	THE WITNESS: My whole name? L-O-R-E-

14	there's too much garbage around there, mostly. I
15	mean, they go through the drive-through and they
16	park right on the street and they just throw the
17	garbage out. And he hasn't improved anything on
18	that. It's garbage all over the place, all over
19	the street there. They never go out and clean it
20	up or anything. They just clean their lot.
21	That's it.
22	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. And your
23	testimony, Mr. Susek.
24	THE WITNESS: The thing is that the
25	noise

10	evening hours, it's noisy after ten o'clock, and
11	the last meeting we had here they were supposed

13	jukebox while they're driving through. And,
14	also, the last meeting, if I'm not mistaken
15	referred to about right-hand turns or left-
16	hand turns. Because they turn in and out of the
17	lot there, and they're hot-rodding towards Rogers
18	where there's kids playing all the time.
19	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: So they were asked
20	to put up a sign?
21	THE WITNESS: Yes, we had that, if I'm
22	not mistaken, if you looked at the meetings from
23	last time when we here, they were told that.
24	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Do you recall
25	that, Mr. Luciano?

00007 1 THE WITNESS: And a speed bump. 2 THE APPLICANT: No, we don't. May I 3 say something, sir? 4 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Go ahead. 5 THE APPLICANT: I think Mr. Susek, if I 6 have his name right, and I apologize if I don't, 7 he's saying that there's kids in the street, and 8 we're talking about a 24 hour service. At that 9 time of night I don't think there's kids out in 10 the street, so. It - - You know, our - - our 11 customers are not posing a threat to anybody who 12 is out there. Actually what I can say about the 13 cars that go through our drive-through is that 14 just because of the physical layout of the drive-15 through where the cars must come in and make a 16 left-hand turn first, and then they - - After 17 they order, they make another left-hand turn, and 18 then in order to exit they need to make a right-19 hand turn after picking up their food. There is a curb right in front of where they need to exit, 20 21 and then there is the sidewalk, which obviously a 22 car cannot leave the premises at high speed. Not 23 only because of the physical layout of the drive-24 through, but also, because they do have usually 25 another car in front of them. So I think that is

very important to bring out in terms of what cars can do and cannot do as they're going through that drive-through lane.

With regards to the garbage that Mr. Mena is mentioning, that is totally false. That is totally false. We do have three maintenance employees. We always have a maintenance employee on the premises, and these people have been instructed, and that was done after we came here last year, that they need to walk the street in both directions up to the stop signs on both sides of the street and pick up any garbage that has a McDonald's label on it. And we're doing that faithfully. I personally inspect that, and my operation's manager also looks at that. Actually, sometimes I'll take the route of coming in from Beecher towards the - - towards the restaurant, even though that's not the natural route for me to come in to the restaurant, just to check that there is nothing out there that - that is - - is litter on the - - on the street.

Now obviously, our employees go out there once, sometimes twice a day, and in between somebody will drop something, but it - - it is not obviously our responsibility. Actually,

there's two garbage cans, one on the right-hand side of the exit, and there's another one on the left-hand side of the exit as cars are coming out. And we usually see some customers dropping their litter there, and we sometimes even see people from — that are not customers of ours, but use our stations to drop their garbage. So I can tell this committee with no hesitation that if there was ever a garbage issue there, that is not the case.

 $\label{eq:chairman withowiak:} \quad \text{Have you met with these two gentlemen?}$

THE APPLICANT: No. We have not seen these - - these gentlemen since the last time we were here. Actually, when we came here last year, we weren't aware of a situation that had happened with Mr. Mena. He was a regular customer of our - - of our restaurant, and I would like to ask Mr. Mena if he ever brought to the attention of the prior owner any issues that he had with the 24 hour service, or if he ever had reported issues with the 24 hour service under the prior owner to the authorities, to the city officials. And he was a regular customer of ours, and he stopped going to the restaurant

because some time in the month of February Mr. Mena, who was a regular customer of ours, exposed himself to one of my employees in the lobby, and there is a police incident report on that. And I believe that - - that his intentions and his credibility should - - should be questioned as to the motive of why is he truly here.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Mr. Mena, could you, for the committee, could you answer to that for us, please?

THE WITNESS: Well, on - - on the garbage issue, you know, I always told the prior owners, too, about it, you know.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Um-hnh.

THE WITNESS: And the reason I haven't gone is last time he told me that - - not to park there anymore. You know, he told me out in the - - on the elevator, you know. I don't want to see your car parked there no more, on the - - on the lot. Because a lot of times there were no parking on the street, so I - - I would park on the - - on the - - on his lot. So he told me in the elevator when we were going down, don't park - - don't park there no more.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And, Mr. Mena, was

there - - was there a police incident involving your presence in the restaurant at one time?

THE WITNESS: Well, yeah, but there's nothing to it, you know. Not - - Not - - There's nothing - - There hasn't gone anywhere on that,

so, I don't know.

THE APPLICANT: The police record reflects that it was lewd and lascivious behavior. He was booked for it. I have the police incident report. I mean, if the committee wants to go over it, we can get graphical as to what the - - the - - what the police officer wrote down on that - - on that record. But

that's the situation.

Just to - - Just, you know, I think we've also bent backwards with Mr. Mena. We - - We put some lights on our roof. And obviously it's an expense to us. They're still there - - They're still sitting there. Mr. Mena, we - - we had - - we got the city's permission to put these lights on the roof. So we were operating with the proper permits on this. Mr. Mena called in to the restaurant and he - - and he said, "Listen, these lights are bothering us." I made it a point to immediately tell - - "Listen, take

1	down," you know. "Don't Don't use the
2	lights." So I think that we are a good corporate
3	citizen of the community. We don't have I
4	mean, if if there was an issue, he should
5	have brought it to us. He has never spoken to us
6	regarding any issues since the last time we were
7	here.
8	We have no complaints from other people
9	who live on the street. So, I mean, them not
10	being here, I think that that in a certain
11	way is a silent majority that although they
12	they might be very busy or they don't find the
13	need to come here to to talk about our
14	business and the way we conduct our business.
15	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. Ma'am,
16	could you stand by the microphone. Raise your
17	right-hand.
18	THE WITNESS: I'm sorry. I stepped out
19	of the office to call my office. When I came
20	back, I was late.
21	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Please raise your
22	right hand.
23	(Whereupon the witness was sworn.)
24	THE WITNESS: I do.
25	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Your name and

14	THE WITNESS: On 14th and Rogers. And
15	I would like to ask for the license for extended
16	hours be denied. The fact is that there is a lot
17	of garbage in the neighborhood. I have request
18	of Alderman Witkowiak about putting receptacles
19	on my corner and across the street, because we do
20	have people who are throwing garbage all over the
21	place, McDonald's garbage. Right now in front of
22	my house I have a bag of McDonald's garbage
23	that's been sitting in the gutter for three days.
24	And they park around our house right on the
25	corner. They eat in front of our house in their

00014 cars. They throw their stuff out the windows. 1 They leave trays with cups behind. And - - And all last year I've been writing to Wit - -4 Alderman Witkowiak. I have the letters right 5 here, about the garbage problem in our 6 neighborhood and that. And I've called 7 McDonald's. I know this is a new owner a few years ago. I've called down to McDonald's like 8 9 on the weekends that there is garbage out there. 10 I have seen them come once in a while, but not as 11 often as they should. And they did have 24 hour 12 service before, and on the weekend on Saturday 13 mornings, Sunday mornings, I would wake up, lo' 14 and behold, there's McDonald's garbage all over 15 my property. Because during the night they're 16 sitting there eating their food, and then throw 17 stuff out the windows. 18 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. Thank you. 19 Do we have any questions by members of the 20 committee of this witness? 21 THE WITNESS: Do you need the - - the 22 letters on the garbage problem? 23 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: I - - I actually 2.4 have copies, but I'll tell you what - -THE WITNESS: Okay. 25

2	MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman, it would
3	be better for them to come in through the

9	objections, so ordered.
10	THE WITNESS: These are copies. You

13	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Bohl.
14	ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Luciano, you had
15	indicated that you have three maintenance
16	employees that will periodically comb the area
17	for for litter and debris. Are they Are
18	they just working on your your property
19	proper, or do you send them out in at least the
20	immediate vicinity around including some of the
21	neighboring properties?
22	THE APPLICANT: Daily, they will go out
23	and they will walk the street. They leave the
24	restaurant. They They turn to the left, and
25	they go down to the to the stop sign. And

then they're instructed that they have to cross the street and walk on the other side of the street, and anything that has a McDonald's label on it, they will pick up. Obviously, there's garbage in the neighborhood from other sources. We do not pick up that garbage. I mean, that would belong to the city or to - - I think we're going beyond our responsibility.

ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Luciano, let me ask you one question. Why not? Why not? If - - If somebody dumps something - - You live on Prospect Avenue. If somebody dumps something in front of your home, do you believe it's the city's responsibility to go over in front of your property and pick that up?

THE APPLICANT: No.

ALDERMAN BOHL: Why - - Just out of curiosity, why not, as a - - out of respect for the neighborhood that you yourself are a neighbor in, would you not while the employee's there and walks and steps over and kicks a can to pick up the - - the cheeseburger wrapper, why wouldn't you just instruct them to go down and pick that up? You know what, because you want to be a good neighbor in the neighborhood that you're a part

right, and I won't discuss that. But I - I - I Is it possible to ask the lady who was standing, a question, because she was - - Is that allowable at this time?

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Please.

THE APPLICANT: She - - She's saying that there's cars parked out there. Usually, we have an ample parking lot which is never full. I've been there for a year now, and I've never seen it full, either in the daytime or during the day - - during the nighttime. Is this that frequent, or is this something that happens, you know, very - - once in a while a car will go out there and park in front of her house? Because we do have parking and - - and there's always $\,$ parking on the street. I've - - I've never seen this - - this particular street jammed with cars, I mean, the only time I could probably say that happens is sometimes early in the morning when everybody's about to leave or something, you know. They're - - They have their cars there, so.

My customers, you know, have a place where they can eat without leaving the restaurant, even though our lobby is closed.

THE WITNESS: I've often wondered that myself. They park right on the corner, and I know it can be a beautiful day, trees. They just feel like parking there around my house. It happens every week, every weekend. When I'm home at night from work, I see them park around there. I don't know if they have someplace else to go or something and they don't want to go home and take their stuff home with them. But it happens every single week, and every single week we always have McDonald's stuff. And like I said, there's a pile - - there's a bag of gar - - McDonald's garbage stuff in the gutter in front of my house. It's been sitting there for three days.

And another thing, too, at night when you were open for 24 hours before, cars did go screeching out. They would come out of McDonald's, turn right. They would screech, come out, because they had been drinking. Bars close, go to McDonald's, get some stuff. They'd come out. They're probably lubricated. They come out. They come screeching out, and they come roaring past. And sometimes they don't stop for the stop sign that's there. We've been noticing that. And they come roaring past. And so there

00020 1 is screeching around the neighborhood. There is. 2 And it's - - It's going on late at night, too. 3 THE APPLICANT: I don't know. I - -4 You know, you would need to be there and - - and 5 be physically checking every car that's leaving 6 McDonald's and - - and taking a survey if they 7 actually are screeching because they are leaving 8 McDonald's or they were just passing through. So 9 I think, you know, that sort of behavior will 10 happen I would say in a lot of neighborhoods 11 where you will get a car screeching. Now, is it 12 because it's my neighbor? Is it because it's our 13 customer? Or is it somebody that was actually 14 driving through? How do we establish that, you 15 know? 16 THE WITNESS: It's not only people who 17 are driving. It's people who are walking, too.

THE WITNESS: It's not only people who are driving. It's people who are walking, too. And I live five houses away from the establishment. So walking past our house, they get done with a soda cup, oop, right by the corner. They throw their stuff right on our lawn, throw it out on the street. They don't want to carry it anymore. They're walking home. That happens now even when they're driving, but when they're walking home, too. And they just

00021 1 throw McDonald's garbage. THE APPLICANT: A question. Do they also throw Taco Bell and Burger King and Auto 4 Zone? 5 THE WITNESS: Not - - We do see some 6 - - some, a little bit, but the majority is 7 McDonald's. Everybody likes McDonald's, and everybody knows that. Everybody likes - -8 9 There's a lot of people that like Taco Bell, but 10 the majority of the people go to McDonald's. And 11 since we're only five houses away from you, we 12 get hit with all McDonald's garbage. Taco Bell 13 is across the street down a ways. So probably 14 the people that live across the street is getting 15 - - maybe Taco Bell garbage. I don't know. I 16 don't live across the street. I can only testify 17 to my experience, since I live five houses away 18 from you, right - - right on the corner. 19 THE APPLICANT: Taco Bell is right in 20 front of our premise. I mean, it's - -21 THE WITNESS: Right. But it's farther 22 from me. 23 THE APPLICANT: - - straight - - We 2.4 would be more than happy to put one of our, you 25 know, if - - if that would help the community, we

00022 1 would be more than happy to put one of our canisters on both ends of the street. I mean, if the city will allow us to do that. We would be 4 more than happy to do that. If that would 5 obviously create a - - a station where the people 6 walking down the street would throw their garbage 7 there, and my employees would pick it up every 8 day. I mean, that - - that's an easy solution to 9 something that she is presenting as a problem. 10 We're more than happy to do that. 11 THE WITNESS: That's - - That's what 12 I've been fighting for, a receptacle on my corner 13 for garbage. 14 THE APPLICANT: I'll be more than happy 15 to provide one in front of, which I believe is 16 your house - -17 THE WITNESS: Right. 18 THE APPLICANT: - - and the other side 19 where the - - I mean, we would need - -20 THE WITNESS: Right. 21 THE APPLICANT: I don't know if we 22 would need city permission to do that, but - -23 THE WITNESS: Okay. 2.4 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Actually, I don't 25 think we can do that. I don't think you can put

00023 1 a private container out there, but the - - the 2 city - -THE WITNESS: I've - - I've been 4 noticing the garbage receptacles on 2nd and 5 National, the black wrought iron ones, and that 6 would fit beautifully in a residential area. It 7 wouldn't be an eyesore. CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: I wish I had the 8 9 money to do that in the whole district. We got a 10 - - We got a state Department of Transportation 11 grant last year, and it had to do with the fact 12 that National Avenue was a - - a state highway, and that's how we got that extra money, and 13 14 that's why we did those receptacles. So don't 15 think I favored them over you. 16 THE WITNESS: Okay. 17 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: It was just there 18 were - - There were parameters we had to - -19 THE WITNESS: But you - - in 20 consideration to a residential area that's right 21 on the same block as a food establishment, a 22 popular food establishment, like McDonald's. 23 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: If - - If we could 2.4 - - If we could lessen the - - the garbage

problem, that would - -

00024 1 THE WITNESS: Um-hnh. 2 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: - - that would help considerably? 4 ALDERMAN WADE: Mr. Chair. 5 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Wade. 6 ALDERMAN WADE: If I may speak about 7 this garbage issue. I wish it was as simple as 8 just putting a garbage can out there and that 9 would solve the problem. But unfortunately in my 10 district and throughout the city we have garbage 11 receptacles at bus stops, at corners, at schools, 12 at corner stores, and citizens still disregard 13 the garbage can and throw stuff on the ground. I 14 see people all the time at the bus stop eating 15 something. The bus come, they're leaning on the 16 garbage can. They throw it on the ground and get 17 on the bus. So I don't think a receptacle in a 18 certain area is going to solve this problem. 19 This - - This is a practice, a bad habit of the 20 community. People just don't respect handling 21 their garbage in - - in the right fashion. 22 As a matter of fact, every time - - I 23 guess it's my turn to be on my soapbox now. But 24 every time I go to speak to students at schools, 25 I ask them to do two things for me. Number one,

put your garbage in the garbage can. Because we can save millions of dollars if we did that. And number two, just vote when you turn 18. Those are the only thing - - two things I want you to do. But there's a problem in the city with people being disrespectful or mishandling their garbage. People throw garbage in the garbage can without a garbage bag which gives us problems. People throw garbage off the top porch. I mean we have problems with garbage in the city. So the receptacle, although it sounds like a fix, I don't believe that's a fix. I see people driving down the street and throw garbage out of the window of the vehicle while they're driving. So I would like to - - I would like it if we could just put a garbage can there and fix it, but un -- unfortunately, I'm convinced that that will not fix the issue.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: I - - I concur with Alderman Wade, and I thank - - thank you for those comments. I, you know, 6th and Mitchell where I live is one of the busiest streets on the south side. I see the same thing. I see people leaning - - leaning on the garbage can waiting for - - waiting for the bus. All of a sudden the

00026 1 bus comes, the potato chip bag goes right on the ground and they run on the bus - -ALDERMAN WADE: I see it every day. 4 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And they could 5 have just as easily - -6 ALDERMAN WADE: Put it in the garbage 7 can, yes. 8 MR. PEREZ: Actually - - Actually, we 9 - - we got some neighbors that like to put their 10 trash bags on the side of our - - inclusive on 11 the sidewalk because we - - we just pick it up 12 and throw it to our - -13 THE APPLICANT: Container. 14 MR. PEREZ: Container, so. 15 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: But so - - I'm not 16 not - - We're not saying - - And I'm not saying 17 the containers wouldn't help. The containers 18 help. Because there are some people that are 19 conscious enough - - Hopefully, Alderman Wade's 20 message is getting out there. My message will 21 get out there. If you can just get a few people 22 to throw something in there, it's better than all 23 that stuff floating around out there. That's 24 better than nothing. But what - - what would 25 help more is the - - your staff, as Alderman Bohl

suggested, picking up everything that they encounter. And, I mean, I - - I do it on my block. And it bothers me, because I know - - I always tell people, I say, "You know what? I don't mind picking up my own garbage. I do mind picking up everybody else's." But the problem is if I don't pick it up, it will probably stay out there. And then it makes my place look bad, because I've got so much litter floating around my place.

I have - - I have either myself or my people at seven in the morning and at noon and at four in the afternoon, we go around and we pick everything up. And it aggravates me a lot because a lot of times at seven o'clock in the morning I'm out there and I pick everything up and I go and I - - and I even go to the median strip and sometimes even across the street if I see a bottle or a can, and I - - and I look when I get done, and I say, "Well, that looks pretty good." And it aggravates the heck out of me. Because sometimes at noon I go out there, it looks like I didn't do anything. You know, the wind is blowing. Alderman Wade is completely right. If everybody put their garbage in garbage

bags before they threw it out, because what happens on a collection day, people that just throw their loose papers in the garbage container, on a windy day the truck comes, places it up, the wind is blowing, 25 percent of it goes flying back in the neighborhood, and we end up picking it up again. So that, you know, those are problems that - - But - - But it would help if your people not only picked up the McDonald's stuff, but, you know, and I'm - - I'm not -
THE APPLICANT: We will certainly do

that, sir.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. And I just want to share something with the committee here, and I - - I want to add this to the record. This is a - - I had the South Side Organizing Committee do a door-to-door survey on this. This is a touchy subject in the neighborhood. There's no - - no doubt about it, the - - the 24 hour thing. And they did a total of - - a total of 34 face-to-face visits at the door. And they had 28 people responded in favor of allowing them 24 hours. And six people said no, one of which was Mrs. Benitez, and the other - - the other five are not here. These - - These two gentlemen, did

00029 1 somebody come to your door? THE WITNESS: Unless they came when I went to work. 4 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: I see. Okay. 5 THE WITNESS: That's the part, also, is 6 they're going to be open that long, then coming 7 with their radios blasting and waking people up, 8 and, you know, people get up at four o'clock in 9 the morning to be up by noon - - by midnight when 10 they come in. 11 THE APPLICANT: Sir? 12 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Yes. 13 THE APPLICANT: Can I say something 14 regarding the noise? In order for us to take an 15 order through the drive-through we need - - we 16 use a speaker system. And - - And it's 17 impossible to take an order if somebody is really 18 their - - their - - their radio is going on that 19 loud. We could not take an order. I mean, 20 sometimes somebody will come with their volume on the radio a little bit, you know, on the - - on 21 22 the excessive side, and the people - - the person 23 taking the order must tell that individual you 24 have to lower it, because we won't be able to

take the order. So, like I said, regarding the

00030 1 drive-through lane and now with the noise, physically some things are - - it would be impossible for us to operate if - - if they were 4 at the magnitude that - - that - - that these 5 individuals want us to - - to believe they are. 6 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Ms. Benitez, did 7 you - -8 THE WITNESS: I was just thinking that 9 a lot of times when they leave after the order, 10 after they get their bag in the car, they will 11 turn it up again and leave. 12 THE WITNESS: Or waiting there because 13 they ordered something special. 14 THE WITNESS: So - - If they have to 15 wait. 16 ALDERMAN PUENTE: Mr. Chair. 17 VICE-CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Puente. 18 ALDERMAN PUENTE: Real quick. I'd like 19 to read the service performed on complaint 20 service requests, tracking number 17982.1. 21 Basically this is a letter from the office of 22 Alderman Witkowiak addressing Mrs. Benitez' 23 concern about the littering in the area, the 24 subject matter that everybody was just talking 25 about. Basically it talks about the - - the

I - - I want to look at - - I want to research two things. Possible signage, and I know that people don't always read these signs or pay attention to them about - - about people keeping their - - their radios down. And I understand exactly what you mean. They have to turn the radio down to order, but then after they

order they might pump it up again before they leave. So I want to see what the possibility is for signage of that about respecting our - - our neighborhood or something with that. It would be a good idea whether it goes 24 hours or not.

And then I also want to take a look at this - - What is the preferred direction for the people to turn? It would be - - When they come out of the drive-through, it would be to turn towards the - - $\frac{1}{2}$

THE WITNESS: Turn towards Burnham would probably be better off as - - I mean, at night-time they just go that way, they're squealing their wheels when they do leave, it's going down the whole block. The other way there's no homes really. You got the Taco Bell. You got the automotive store. But there's nobody really on that street by going to the left.

THE WITNESS: Well - - Yes, when they come out of the parking lot, if they turn left, they're hitting businesses, there are businesses. But when they turn right, they're hitting all the residential houses when they turn right.

ALDERMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. So if they were - - If they were all forced to turn left,

00034 1 that would help. THE WITNESS: Yeah. In fact, when they first opened up a long time ago, they had a sign at the - - at the exit ramp as they came out, 5 that they had only, you know, the city - - making 6 a left-hand turn only. 7 ALDERMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. So, Mr. Chairman, I would ask that this matter be held at 8 9 the call of the chair. I want to - - Two things 10 I want to - - Actually, three things. I want to 11 check that if we can do that left turn only. I 12 want to check with traffic engineering and see 13 what we can do about that. I want to take a look 14 at the possible signage. And then I want to see -15 16 - - I hope that regardless of the outcome of this 17 hearing, that - - that you'll go to work on the 18 garbage thing anyway? 19 THE APPLICANT: We'll take that at 20 heart. 21 ALDERMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. 22 THE APPLICANT: And we'll make that 23 happen immediately. 2.4 VICE-CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman 25 Witkowiak, was - - was your motion to hold to the

a little more research on this, I think. I think

we all need that. Feel more comfortable before

we - - we render a decision. Okay? Thank you.
