2	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: This morning we're
3	considering file number 060290, a motion relating
4	to the revocation of the Class "B" Tavern and
5	Tavern Amusement Cabaret (Nite Club) licenses for
6	the premises at 618-624 North Broadway.
7	Could you all identify yourself for the
8	record, please?
9	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Alderman Robert
10	Bauman, Fourth District.
11	MR. BERNSTEIN: Attorney Aaron
12	Bernstein representing the Complainant who is
13	here in person, Don Arenson.
14	MR. ARENSON: Donald Arenson.
15	MS. JUNGERS: Mary Jungers, J-U-N-G-E-
16	R-S.
17	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And just so I know
18	who is who here. You're You're one of the
19	Complainants, also?
20	MS. JUNGERS: Yes.
21	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Would you like to
22	begin. Do you want to give us an opening
23	statement?
24	MR. BERNSTEIN: Thank you, I will.
25	MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman. We should

1	determine We should determine if if the
2	applicant is here.
3	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Is the
4	applicant
5	MR. SCHRIMPF: I'm sorry. If the
6	licensee is here.
7	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: If the licensee

16	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Would the licensee
17	please identify herself, name and address for the
18	record?
19	THE LICENSEE: Jodie Kornfehl, 2124
20	West Walnut.
21	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. And
22	represented by?
23	MR. ARENA: Ms. Kornfehl is represented
24	by Counsel, Attorney Andrew Arena.
25	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And then could we

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1	have both your names and addresses for the
2	record, please?
3	MR. ARENSON: Donald S. Arenson, 608
4	North Broadway, Milwaukee 53202.
5	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. And, ma'am?
6	MS. JUNGERS: Mary Jungers, W200 N16310
7	Pine Drive, Jackson, Wisconsin 53037.
8	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. Would you
9	like to start with an opening statement?
10	MR. BERNSTEIN: Thank you, Mr.
11	Chairman. Before I give a brief opening
12	statement I would like to pass out to the
13	Aldermen present, and also, the City Attorney, a
14	packet which I put together to help expedite
15	these proceedings with our documentary evidence,
16	and also, some the applicable law that
17	And if if I may approach and pass these out
18	to you. And I will be asking that this be
19	admitted into the record. There's also a CD ROM.
20	I will be showing a video of some of the
21	disturbances that have occurred. And I have a
22	copy of that, also, to be made part of the record
23	without any objection
24	MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman, before we
25	do that, I think it might be appropriate for the

00005 1 Chair to inquire of counsel for the licensee, whether or not they received the summons and a complaint and some other materials, I believe, 4 that was served with it to include the police 5 report, a copy of the Statute and a copy of the 6 ordinance on or about June 19th, 2006. 7 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. Does the 8 licensee admit to receiving the summons and the 9 attached documents? LICENSEE: Yes. 10 11 MR. ARENA: Yes. 12 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And for the 13 record, do we just want to identify how many 14 pages that is or? Mr. Schrimpf, is that - -15 MR. BERNSTEIN: I apologize. I 16 couldn't give you a page count on that. CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: No, that's okay. 17 18 MR. BERNSTEIN: Mr. Chairman, before I 19 - - I get into the meat of our complaint, so to 20 speak, I do want to say publicly and on the 21 record that on behalf of my clients, we cannot 22 express our appreciation any more strongly than 23 in this public manner to the Milwaukee Police 24 Department, in particular, Captain Linda Haynes,

who is here, I think, who will also be

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testifying. And also, Alderman Bauman, who have over the last two and a half, three years, been in very close contact with my client with regard to the matters that we're going to discuss today. And their conduct and response has been exemplary, and we just wanted to make that very clear from the getgo.

CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you.

MR. BERNSTEIN: Mr. Chairman, our complaint alleges that the Jungle has operated in a manner that constitutes a public nuisance, and has a substantial adverse effect upon the health, safety and convenience of the immediate neighborhood. We are here to advocate for this committee to revoke their license. Although not in our complaint as filed with the City Clerk, we also feel that the conduct satisfies the elements of private nuisance, as well. These violations fall under the City of Milwaukee Ordinance 90-12(1)(f). Which states in pertinent part, "The licensed premises is operated in such a manner that constitutes a public or private nuisance, or that conduct on the licensed premises, including but not limited to loud and raucous noise, has had a substantial adverse effect on the health,

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safety or convenience and prosperity in the immediate neighborhood."

The disturbances that we're going to talk about today fall under the above quoted section, and they have occurred since September of 2004. We will be offering documentary evidence in the form of the police synopsis, which I believe will be read into the record at some point. There are also call reports. I don't know what the - - the proper term is for them. Those are on Tab 3 of the booklet I gave you. 24 calls have been placed to the Milwaukee Police Department with regard to incidents at the Jungle. That's 24 calls since March 5th of this year, alone. We could not get records going back further. We assume that there are probably that same number of calls going back, but we just don't know.

We will also be offering video testimony. I have a lot of video. I'll be asking the committee to look at only four minutes worth of video, which is a perfect example of the ongoing chaos that occurs outside of the Jungle at closing time on weekends. This particular video is from June 11th, 2006, and there are two

incidents of shots being fired outside - - or in the vicinity of the bar. I will state right now on the record, we do not know positively who the shooters are, or whether they were patrons of the Jungle. However, my client did see individuals coming out of the Jungle who got into cars that we feel are - - were - - were involved in this shooting incident or shots fired. Those are also reflected in the police synopsis, and also, the call reports that we have.

We have hours of video, but I think four minutes is going to sum up precisely what you need to see. We also have here Mr. Arenson and Ms. Jungers to testify about what they have seen - - what they experienced. They live in the building next door. And the video is shot, that you'll see was shot by Ms. Jungers off of the balcony until she had to duck.

We also have individuals Jeffrey Doss and Luke Warnke from Milwaukee Private Detectives, who my client hired to also conduct surveillance in preparation for - - eventually for a proceeding of this nature. They - - While we're not showing any of their video, it's very similar to what I'll be showing you, and they

00009 1 have personally seen what has occurred there, and 2 we will be asking them to testify. 3 Also, in your packet is correspondence, and that's at Tab 4. It's a - - just a sampling 4 5 of correspondence between my client and Captain 6 Haynes of the Milwaukee Police Department, and I 7 believe, Alderman Bauman has been CC'd in on a number of those - - a number of those e-mails. 8 9 I don't ask that you sit and read all 10 of these, but I will give you a sampling, if I 11 may. For example, e-mail, September 14th, 2004 12 after outlining some of the chaos outside of the 13 Jungle, the complainant wrote Alderman - -14 MR. ARENA: What page, Counsel? Can 15 you give us a page number? 16 MR. BERNSTEIN: I don't have - - It's 17 Tab - - It's Tab 4, and then if you look at the 18 bottom right-hand corner are the dates. So 19 September 14th, 2004. I won't read the - -20 ALDERMAN BOHL: It's the last page. 21 MR. BERNSTEIN: It's the last one. 22 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: It's actually a 23 letter. 2.4 MR. BERNSTEIN: That's a letter. I may 25 - - I may have the date incorrect, then. I'll

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skip that one. I'm going to skip that one. I may have mislabeled the date, and I don't want to take up our time by going through it.

September 19th e-mail to Alderman Bauman. "As I indicated to you, I cancelled a dinner party Saturday night. I was afraid for myself and my guests."

September 23rd, 2005 e-mail to Captain Haynes. "Good morning Captain Haynes, Last night at Da Jungle madness was out of control on both the street (Broadway) and on the sidewalk. From 1:15 to after two a.m. it was crazy. I might suggest that the street be closed at closing time to avoid the madness. I know that you had said you don't want to close the street, but maybe it would be a good idea on Thursday and Saturday nights. I'm aware that you know this is a crazy situation and that you are aware of the various issues that concern both mine and my neighbors' safety and property because of this bar. I wish you a Merry Christmas and Happy and Health New Year."

Response from Captain Haynes to that e-mail. "Happy Holidays Mr. Arenson, I received a call approximately 1:30 on Friday morning

00011 1 regarding Da Jungle. I had them close down the 2 street." 3 E-mail dated December 31st, 2005. 4 "Hello Captain Haynes, As I am sure you are 5 aware, Friday night at Da Jungle was the worst I 6 have ever seen! At one time, sometime after 7 midnight, I saw 15 police cars! I also saw at 8 least 20 policemen! This is insane to let this 9 continue. Mark my words (also all the policemen 10 I have talked to) there is going to be a very 11 serious problem coming, shooting, fights and/or 12 both." And, Mr. Chairman, as the video I'll show 13 you indicates, that's - - that's occurring now. 14 April 28th, '06, e-mail to Captain 15 "Good morning. Last night, April 27th, 16 the police were out in force. I saw at least six 17 to eight motorcycles, bicycling and two officers 18 on the roof of my building from 11 p.m. to two 19 a.m. I want to thank you, Captain Haynes, once 20 again, for your efforts. I realize that you 21 cannot continue to have all this manpower out to 22 maintain order at Da Jungle every night that they

are open, a total waste of time and money for the

This goes on and on, Mr. Chairman. And

Milwaukee Police Department and taxpayers."

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00012 1 I - - I don't think I need to read all of the emails. One of my - - One of our contentions here is - - is this is a private nuisance to my client. It's a public nuisance to the neighbors. 5 But it is an absurd drain of scarce police 6 resources for the - - for this one club, frankly. 7 And that's best exemplified by the synopsis, 8 which is Tab 2, prepared by the Milwaukee Police 9 Department Licensing Investigation Unit for this 10 hearing. And I do want to highlight a couple of 11 those. I'm not sure if it will be read into the 12 - - into the - -CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: We - - It will be 13 14 read, yes. 15 MR. BERNSTEIN: It will be read. I can 16 - - Okay. Suffice it to say that the most 17 egregious one that I see as far as a waste of 18 resources is four police units having to take 19 five hours to clear a crowd after Da Jungle 20 closed. I would submit to this committee it is 21 not a useful use of our police resources. 22 With regard to the other aspects of the 23

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With regard to the other aspects of the ordinance, which I have included as Tab 6 in here for your - for your quick referral. Subsection "f" also says that in addition to loud - - loud

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1	and raucous noise, there has to be "a substantial
2	adverse effect upon the health, safety or
3	convenience and prosperity of the immediate
4	neighborhood." The video I'm about to show you,
5	I think will satisfy that burden, and if you
6	would like more, I will have individuals testify
7	with regard to what it's like to live with
8	next door to Da Jungle. As far as procedural
9	matter, Mr. Chairman, do you need to have me
10	authenticate the talk to the witnesses to
11	authenticate the the video? How
12	Procedurally, how would you like this to proceed?
13	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Yes.
14	MR. SCHRIMPF: Yes.
15	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Yes.
16	MR. SCHRIMPF: Before or after?
17	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Before.
18	MR. BERNSTEIN: Okay. If I may call as
19	a witness, Mary Jungers.
20	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: What I'd like to
21	do at this time is have the police report read
22	into the record.
23	MR. BERNSTEIN: Okay.
24	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Sergeant Ulickey.
25	SERGEANT ULICKEY: On 8/15 of 2004 at

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2:10 a.m. a Milwaukee Police off - - officer was flagged down regarding trouble with a person at 618 North Broadway. An altercation occurred between the bartender, Bradley L. DesArmo and a patron. The bartender claimed that the patron threw a glass and a candle at him and then stood on the bar. The patron was issued a citation for Disorderly Conduct.

On 12/18 of '04 approximately 1:10 a.m. officers responded to the area of 500 North Broadway regarding a shooting. Investigation revealed that two groups of youths who had been in Da Jungle, 618 North Broadway, for an "underage Event." Both groups were removed from the premises because they were flashing gang signs at each other. One group went to a parking lot in the 500 block of North Broadway when the second group appeared. Shots were fired and one person was struck in the shoulder.

On 2/11/05, 1:54 a.m., Milwaukee Police were sent to a fight at 618 North Broadway, The Jungle. A fight had occurred according to witnesses, but they stated it occurred outside and just around the corner. The officers observed no fight occurring.

On 7/8 of '05 at 1:47 a.m., Milwaukee Police were at 618 North Broadway for traffic and crowd control due to a large crowd at The Jungle Night Club. There were no reported incidents.

On 8/5 of '05 at 1:37 a.m. due to large crowds, Milwaukee Police conducted traffic and crowd control for patrons who were exiting The Jungle Night Club. There were no reported incidents.

On 8/12 of '05 at 1:47 Milwaukee Police were at 618 North Broadway for traffic and crowd control due to large crowds from The Jungle. There were no reported incidents.

If it's okay, Mr. Chairman, there are items number seven, eight, nine, ten, 11, 12 and 13 that are all the same text. Squads were sent on dates of 8/19/05, 9/2/05, 9/9/05, 9/23/05, 9/30/05, 10/14/05, and 10/28/05, all for crowd and traffic control.

On 11/25/05 at 1:43 a.m., Milwaukee Police were at 618 North Broadway to monitor crowd and traffic at closing time for The Jungle Bar. Officers observed a pedestrian in traffic who was refusing to get out of the road and causing a disturbance. When officers - - I'm

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sorry - - Officers arrested and identified him, he began yelling profanities and resisting arrest when another patron began to interfere with the investigation. This subject was also identified. He also resisted arrest and because of this, caused a crowd of about 100 people to gather, posing a threat to officer safety. More units were called and order was eventually restored. Both subjects were charged with disorderly conduct and resisting arrest. Another patron was arrested for disorderly conduct for his actions of yelling at the police and waving the middle finger, causing a disturbance. He was identified. One officer did suffer minor injury - - minor injuries while decentralizing one of the subjects. The officer was treated and released.

On 12/4 of '05 at 12:14 a.m., Milwaukee Police were flagged down at 618 North Broadway for a trouble with subject. An officer observed two subjects in front of the location yelling at each other. Field interviews were conducted and subjects were identified. Female claimed she was attacked by another person inside the club. Investigation revealed that this person and

another person were both fighting and both were issued disorderly conduct tickets. While officers were conducting this investigation, they observed a female hitting a security employee (for the bar) and arrested her for disorderly conduct. She was subsequently identified and received a citation. The earlier incident was witnessed by security personnel for The Jungle Bar.

On 12/31/05 Milwaukee Police were flagged down for a fight that was occurring inside at 618 North Broadway. Officers observed several people rushing - - or pushing and shoving and arguing as they exited the club. Additional units were called in and subjects were all directed to their cars and told to leave. One citation was issued for resisting/obstructing. Subject was refusing to leave after several warnings were given to leave the premise. A tavern check was conducted and no violations were found.

On 2/3 of '06 at 1:40 a.m., Milwaukee Police were dispatched to 600 North Broadway for a trouble with a subject. Officers were advised by security at Da Jungle, that a black male

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wearing a brown furry coat was standing in the middle of the road and he was armed with a gun. Officers began approaching the subject when the officers - - when he saw the officers and fled on foot. There was a brief foot pursuit and subject was apprehended and a loaded Glock .22 was recovered. Subject's identity was not included in this report. Officers spoke with a subject, who was security at Da Jungle and stated there were no problems with this individual in the bar. It was only when the subject left the bar that an argument began between him and another individual. That's when he noticed a gun in the subject's waistband and called police.

On 3/10 of '06, 1/14 a.m., Milwaukee Police were dispatched to North Broadway and East Wells for a fight complaint at Da Jungle. Upon arrival, all parties in this fight were no longer on the scene. However, due to this fight, there was a large crowd in front of the tavern. Officers began dispersing the crowd. The club also decided to close the bus - - to business early. More units were called in for traffic and crowd control. There were no further incidents.

On 3/24 of '06 at 1:09, Milwaukee

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Police were dispatched to 618 North Broadway for battery complaint. Officers spoke to the complainant, who stated she was punched in the eye by a guy she has known for a couple of months. This subject was identified. Security witnessed the incident and kicked that person out of the bar. Officers were unable to locate the subject and mailed a battery citation. Officers then remained on the scene with additional units for crowd and traffic control at closing time.

On 3/31 of '06 at 1:46 a.m., Milwaukee Police conducted crowd and traffic control regarding The Jungle Bar. No incidents were reported.

On 4/21 of '06, Milwaukee Police were sent to monitor closing at Da Jungle. Officers conducted a licensed premise check - - premise check and found no violations. At closing, the crowd began to disperse from the bar and congregate in the parking lot, playing loud music and shouting. Cruising also began in the area along with squealing tires, drag racing, passengers hanging out of their moving autos and other traffic violations. Some persons - - or patrons were observed with drinks in their hand

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24 25 as they left the bar. One patron vomited on the sidewalk and walked back into the bar where he remained well after closing time. Due to limited police resources, no enforcement was taken regarding these incidents.

On 4/28 of '06, Milwaukee Police were assigned to monitor closing time at Da Jungle. While monitoring patrons exiting the bar, officers observed a fight break out between several men near the door. Security separated the men and one actor was identified and issued a citation for disorderly conduct. Due to extra officers assigned to monitor closing, Milwaukee Police were able to enforce traffic laws and attribute the arrest of three subjects on state warrants, five municipal citations issued, 37 traffic citations issued, one pedestrian citation and 26 parking citations were issued. A pistol was found abandoned near - - or in the gutter after the crowd was cleared and placed on inventory.

On 5/5 of '06, Milwaukee Police were monitoring closing time at Da Jungle, 618 North Broadway from a roof - - rooftop directly across the street. It was also recorded on videotape.

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At 11:45 p.m., officers conducted a tavern check and found the tavern under capacity, the licensee was not on the scene and officers found no tavern violations. At closing, due to complaints of cruising in the area after bar closing, traffic enforcement was strictly enforced with the issuance of 15 traffic citations and 22 parking citations. The area was cleared by two a.m.

On 5/12 of '06, officers were assigned to monitor closing at Da Jungle and were in an unmarked squad car. At 12:03 a.m., officers conducted an FI of a subject who was parked across from Da Jungle and had been sitting in the car for more than a half an hour. Officers found the subject to be drinking cans of Milwaukee Best Beer. A consent search of the his auto revealed three beer cans unopened and two empty cans on the floor. A third empty can was found in the gutter. Subject was identified and issued a citation for possession of intoxicant by driver. At 1:50 a.m., officers conducted a FI stop - - or an FI of a subject who pulled up in front of the tavern turning up the volume of his car radio to an un - - unacceptable level. Officers could hear music from a block away. This subject was

00022 1 identified and he was issued a citation for noise pollution. No other incidents were reported. On 5/26 of '06, Milwaukee Police were 4 dispatched to 618 North Broadway, Da Jungle, for 5 crowd and traffic control. It took almost five 6 hours and four district police cars to remove 7 subjects and cars that were refusing to leave the 8 area after exiting the Da Jungle. Two patrons 9 were issued citations for several violations. 10 The patrons were identified, cited for 11 park/standing prohibit area, un - - unsafe lane 12 deviation and operating after suspension. 13 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. Do you 14 have - - Attorney Arena, do you have any 15 questions of the police report? 16 MR. ARENA: Yes, I do. Thank you, 17 Chairman - - Mr. Chairman. Officer, is it, in 18 fact, true that Captain Haynes has ordered heavy 19 enforcement in the area and ordered that any 20 citation be issued to anybody in that area? 21 SERGEANT ULICKEY: I am not aware of 22 orders that Captain Haynes gave. 23 MR. ARENA: Are you aware that signs 2.4 were put up indicating "no left turn" where they

hadn't been in the past, in an effort to give

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00023 1	people citations on the street?
2	SERGEANT ULICKEY: No, I am not aware
3	of that.
4	MR. ARENA: The last item that you have
5	read in the police report contains somebody
6	getting a citation for unsafe lane deviation.
7	That happened while I, presumably the person
8	was in their car driving on the street?
9	SERGEANT ULICKEY: I was not on the
10	scene at the time that was issued.
11	MR. ARENA: The item number two on your
12	report, isn't it true that was discussed at
13	length at a previous matter before this
14	committee, that that event actually took place in
15	the 300 block of North Broadway? Do you recall
16	that?
17	SERGEANT ULICKEY: If that was a
18	discussion, I wasn't present for it.
19	MR. ARENA: Are you certain that that
20	event happened in the 500 block of North
21	Broadway?
22	SERGEANT ULICKEY: These are synopses
23	taken from police reports filed. I believe them
24	to be true.
25	MR. ARENA: The fact remains that the

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1	500 block of North Broadway is one block away
2	from the premises.
3	SERGEANT ULICKEY: Yes, it is.
4	MR. ARENA: Are you familiar with what
5	the definition of "premises" is premises is,
6	in Chapter 125 of the State Statutes?
7	SERGEANT ULICKEY: I couldn't cite it
8	verbatim for you.
9	MR. ARENA: Well, is it fair to say
10	that premises as is defined as what the
11	licensee lists in her application as the place in
12	which she's going to serve alcohol?
13	SERGEANT ULICKEY: Again, I I
14	couldn't cite the the definition verbatim to
15	you.
16	MR. ARENA: It's a fact, is it not,
17	that Ms. Kornfehl does not conduct any operations
18	or serving of alcohol in the street. That's
19	true, isn't it?
20	SERGEANT ULICKEY: If you're asking me
21	if she's done that, I can't answer that question.
22	I would have to say I don't know. I would hope
23	not.
24	MR. ARENA: Are you familiar with this
25	area, yourself?

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1	SERGEANT ULICKEY: I'm familiar with
2	the the street, yes.
3	MR. ARENA: And are you familiar that
4	there's a number of clubs and night areas in that
5	area?
6	SERGEANT ULICKEY: I don't believe it's
7	that heavily populated with with nightclubs,
8	to be honest with you.
9	MR. ARENA: Isn't one block to the
10	west, the club called The Lady Bug Club?
11	SERGEANT ULICKEY: It's either one or
12	two. It's I would have to to look at
13	that.
14	MR. ARENA: Are you aware that the Lady
15	Bug Club's patrons use the same parking lot as
16	some of the patrons or Da Jungle?
17	SERGEANT ULICKEY: That, I couldn't
18	answer. I was informed that the Lady Bug has
19	MR. ARENA: I don't think there should
20	be any information to the witness. I mean, this
21	is a hearing. I have to object, Mr. Chair.
22	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Well, I'll
23	MR. ARENA: I mean, what he did is
24	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Lady Bug Club
25	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Let's I'll

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1	call Alderman Bauman.
2	MR. ARENA: Well, he went and coached
3	the witness.
4	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Lady Bug Club has
5	been open less than a year. So any reference to
6	2004 is is obviously off the radar screen,
7	because it wasn't even in existence at the time.
8	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: How close is the
9	Lady Bug Club to I'm going to ask Alderman
10	Bauman.
11	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: It's a block to the
12	east. That much is correct, but not the time
13	frame.
14	MR. ARENA: But that's not the
15	question, and it's highly inappropriate
16	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Go ahead.
17	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: The question was
18	relative to 2004, and it's important to have a
19	factual record.
20	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: All right. All
21	right. All right.
22	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: There was no Lady Bug
23	1 3
	Club in 2004.
24	MR. ARENA: Alderman.
25	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Wait a minute.

00027 1 Wait a minute. Wait a minute. Okay. Continue to ask the Sergeant questions. MR. ARENA: Are you familiar with what the closing time is for the Jungle? 4 5 SERGEANT ULICKEY: What the closing 6 time is for the Jungle? 7 MR. ARENA: Are you aware that the 8 Jungle closes earlier than the time that is 9 prescribed by law? 10 SERGEANT ULICKEY: I can tell you that 11 I've been told that they have closed at - - on 12 occasion earlier than the ordinance requires. 13 MR. ARENA: Well, in incidents in 14 regard to 2006, people that are doing things in 15 the street, you can't sit here and tell me today 16 that you're certain that they were, in fact, 17 patrons of Da Jungle and not the Lady Bug Club or 18 some other club? 19 SERGEANT ULICKEY: I can tell you, 20 based on  $\ensuremath{\mathsf{my}}$  reports, that I believe what I read 21 to be a true and factual report of what occurred. 22 As far as my participation in that, I'm assigned 23 to the License Investigation Unit. We review 24 reports that are sent to our office from the

officers on the street. So as far as personal

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00028 site knowledge of this, I have none. 1 MR. ARENA: It's fair to say that from that record, that actually there are very few, if 4 ever, any violations found to occur within the 5 premises. Is that a fair statement? 6 SERGEANT ULICKEY: What violations are 7 you referring to? 8 MR. ARENA: Any violations that would 9 be reported on a PA-33 to your office. For 10 example, number 6 through 13 in your report all 11 state that there were no reported incidents. So 12 I assume that no citations were issued to the 13 licensee or any of her employees. That's true. 14 SERGEANT ULICKEY: I can tell you that 15 it says there's no reported incidents. Whether 16 citations were issued, that, I couldn't answer. 17 MR. ARENA: Well, it's a fact that 18 Captain Haynes has been enforcing as much as 19 possible any rule violation that she can find, 20 and there are no citations that have been issued 21 to Jodie Kornfehl, as the licensee, are there? 22 SERGEANT ULICKEY: As far as the tavern 23 violations, no. 2.4 MR. ARENA: And you don't list anywhere 25 in any of your reports that there are violations

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1	of service of alcohol to underage people. That's
2	true, isn't it?
3	SERGEANT ULICKEY: I don't recall any,
4	as far as underage service of alcohol.
5	MR. ARENA: And there's never been a
6	citation issued to the premises for disorderly
7	premises. Has there? At least as far as we know
8	in your report?
9	SERGEANT ULICKEY: Well, going back to
10	2004, there's no indication.
11	MR. ARENA: So it's true that, at least
12	since 2004, there hasn't been a citation issued
13	for disorderly premises.
14	SERGEANT ULICKEY: That's correct.
15	MR. ARENA: I have no further
16	questions.
17	ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chairman.
18	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you.
19	Alderman Bohl.
20	ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chairman, a number
21	of of Attorney Arena's questions actually
22	that were directed at Sergeant Ulickey were
23	pertinent questions for the Captain of the
24	downtown police district, who is present. And
25	rather than address them to Sergeant Ulickey, who

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1	cannot speak on behalf of the Commander, I don't
2	know why we don't bring the Commander up.
3	Because I have a few questions for her, myself.
4	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. Captain,
5	please come to the table. We need to get your
6	testimony.
7	Could you raise Before we do that.
8	I want the record to reflect that Alderman Wade
9	joined the committee at the beginning of the
10	reading of the police report. Would you raise
11	your right hand, we'll swear you in, please?
12	(Whereupon Captain Haynes was sworn.)
13	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Name and address
14	for the record, please.
15	CAPTAIN HAYNES: Linda Haynes, H-A-Y-N-
16	E-S. Working address is 749 West State in
17	Milwaukee, Wisconsin.
18	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: And what is your
19	position?
20	CAPTAIN HAYNES: I'm the Captain with
21	the Milwaukee Police Department of District No.
22	1.
23	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you.
24	Alderman Bohl.
25	ALDERMAN BOHL: I Certainly I know

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that Attorney Arena raised a number of questions. The question that I have for Captain Haynes is in terms of - - of Da Jungle, as - - in the normal course of business do you find this establishment one where you are devoting a tremendous amount of resources? And if so, what are - - what are - - what are the - - what is the directive that has been - - that has been derived or directed to this particular establishment, if there is any, has been any?

CAPTAIN HAYNES: One of the things that's unique with the Jungle is that no - - we did not issue any citations to the owner for activity going on inside of the bar itself. The problem that happened with the Jungle is that a lot of the activity always occurred outside of the bar with the patrons that exit the bar. The patrons that exit the bar had a tendency to - - It became a party outside of the bar in the streets. There was a tendency where we, at one point, we were closing down the street. We utilized all of the police officers that I had at my district on the late shift to control the crowd, to direct traffic, and it became a nuisance. If it had been a residential area, it

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would have been - - it would have been just
absolute chaos.

One of the reasons why the Jungle was able to operate as long as it did, from 2004 up until 2006, was because it was basically not a lot of residents on that - - in that block. Every Thursday - - It started off sometimes when they had the teen night, there was times where all the - all the squads were utilized controlling the - - the patrons out of the bar and the traffic. When teen night stopped, the bar actually closed down for a, I don't know, a couple of weeks or whatever, everything went back to normal. We were able to patrol other parts of District 1. But - - I guess at some point, I don't have dates, at some point the Jungle became a lady's night on a Thursday night, and it was like one night a week in which it became total chaos again.

And initially I was telling the officers, I didn't want them to just concentrate on the Jungle. I wanted them to patrol all of District 1, because we have a total of 156 bars in District 1. So we - - And we have a total of like, on a good night, we may have seven squads

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working in District 1, and they're all one person. On a normal night we may be working with four squads - - four to six squads. When we're utilizing everybody at the Jungle, it's - - it's just way too much manpower. We're way overstaffed, and it became a point where it wasn't controlled anymore. It - - It escalated from a point of just doing traffic control, to shots being fired, fights in the street, people urinating, throwing up in the streets, cars - - It became almost like a parking lot in the 600 block of North Milwaukee - - I mean - - Broadway. And it was - - It was just too much.

So what I had to do, is I had to ask for assistance from other units in the Milwaukee Police Department, which took up more manpower. And I was thinking that, you know, we do this once or twice, you know, everyone would get - get the idea and everything would calm down. No. It escalated to even more. So now we're at the point where we're here today, trying to revoke the license, because I cannot keep utilizing my manpower. Summer's coming. Summerfest is coming. All the different festivals will be upon us pretty soon. I don't have enough manpower for

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                    ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chairman.
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                   ALDERMAN WADE: Mr. Chairman.
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                   ALDERMAN BOHL: If I may continue.
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                   CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you,
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          Captain. Alderman Bohl, please.
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                   ALDERMAN BOHL: Thank you, Captain.
8
         Captain, I - - My next question is, was this
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          establishment ever considered to be written up
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         for a nuisance action?
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                   CAPTAIN HAYNES: I sent a letter out
12
         the beginning of January, 2006 to the owner of
13
         the building, declaring this property to be a
14
         nuisance property. I asked that the owner get in
15
         contact with me, and present a plan for something
16
         to get this - - that building back in order. He
17
         did present a plan to me within the allotted
18
         time. I have a copy of the letter. I have to go
19
         through the file and find it. He did present the
20
         plan within - - It was less than - - And I think
21
         the next week after the plan was presented, the
22
         bar was actually closed down. The second week it
23
         was business as usual again, with disorderly
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         patrons running through the streets, driving,
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         continuing the party outside of the bar. So - -
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And at that point we went back and we backdated charges for police services and all of the city services that we utilized.

 $\,$  ALDERMAN BOHL: So something has been done to assess charges to this particular establishment.

CAPTAIN HAYNES: Correct.

ALDERMAN BOHL: I - - Mr. Chairman, I think that that absolutely is key, not only with potentially this establishment, but every type of operation across this city that continues to drain city manpower. I - - I don't know of any alderman in the City of Milwaukee that wants to see officers pulled out of their residential districts in the course of the middle of the night to come - - whooping and holler - - deal - - to deal with residents downtown that are whooping and hollering in the streets, dragging police resources away from the neighborhoods that they're supposed to patrol, when there is a concern and a neighbor calls at midnight or one or two o'clock in the morning if something were to happen in their neighborhood, and what - what's their - - their neighborhood squad doing? They're dealing with idiot young people, running

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around like morons in the middle of downtown in the street pretending it's Mardi Gras in New Orleans. It's absolutely ridiculous, and until we slap these club operators with the bill for this over and over and over again, we just are simply going to continue to drain the vital resources of the City, and continue to have the problems that we're having over and over again. Between the cruising and the idiotic play that we find is around some of these downtown clubs, it's - - it's a wonder that we have no police anywhere else in the City in the residential neighborhoods. It's - - It's just absolutely ridiculous. I appreciate, Captain, that you've -- you've taken that step. I think that it ought to be done with, frankly, almost every club, that it - - that it shows that its patrons are abusive.

And frankly, if the operators can't get it in their heads that that's the case, we either ought to shut them all down, every single one of them, or they ought to start playing Barry Manilow, and draw the kind of patrons that are going to be respectful of the citizens and the resources of this City, because - - And you know

00037 1 what? I don't have any qualms about everyone saying, well, what do we do for the young people? If young people want to act like monkeys, then we 4 ought to - - then they ought to just sit in their 5 homes and do absolutely nothing. Because this 6 type of behavior, I've seen it here. I've seen 7 it here. I've seen it at other establishments. 8 I've seen it in and around Summerfest. I've seen 9 it at a lot of places. It should not be 10 tolerated anywhere. And - - And I'm just tired 11 of it. I'm tired of it, and it just is - - is 12 not called for. Establishments want to do it? 13 They ought to pay for the service. 14 ALDERMAN WADE: Mr. Chair. CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Wade. 15 16 ALDERMAN WADE: Captain, how are you 17 doing this morning? 18 CAPTAIN HAYNES: I'm doing good. 19 ALDERMAN WADE: Good. 20 CAPTAIN HAYNES: Thank you. 21 ALDERMAN WADE: It is - - Is it a 22 dollar amount, or how is this assessed when we 23 apply the property nuisance code to this 24 location, or any other location? Do we do it by 25 the amount of officers per hour? What is the

00038 1 dollar amount? CAPTAIN HAYNES: I don't have a total dollar amount to date for all the services that's been rendered for the police services. But what 5 we do is that we multiply the pay rate that the 6 officer gets times the number of hours or temps 7 that the officer is at that location. And then 8 if the officer is on - - is on overtime, we 9 multiply that time and a half rate times how long 10 that officer has been at that location. 11 This is a couple of the packets, and I 12 - - I really - - We're still working on all of 13 our totals. We don't have all the totals 14 assessed yet for what will be billed to the owner 15 of the building. 16 ALDERMAN WADE: Mr. Chair, may I 17 continue? 18 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Please. 19 ALDERMAN WADE: Did we have a - - a 20 total for - - for 2005? Did they get any 21 services for 2005? 22 CAPTAIN HAYNES: No, we did not. As a 23 matter of fact, the billing that we've done has 24 not - - wasn't in 2004, nor 2005. It started in 25 the year 2006. From - - from the last total

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1	that we have I know for sure that the owner will
2	be assessed over 4,000 dollars.
3	ALDERMAN WADE: And this was starting
4	in what month?
5	CAPTAIN HAYNES: This started January
6	18th of 2006.
7	ALDERMAN WADE: And it's it's 4,000
8	plus
9	CAPTAIN HAYNES: 4,000 plus.
10	ALDERMAN WADE: for a half a year
11	of police services at this establishment.
12	CAPTAIN HAYNES: Correct.
13	ALDERMAN WADE: Ballpark figure.
14	CAPTAIN HAYNES: Right.
15	ALDERMAN WADE: Okay. Thank you.
16	MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Schrimpf.
17	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Mr. Schrimpf.
18	MR. SCHRIMPF: Thank you. Captain,
19	just a couple of follow-on questions here. First
20	of all, are you familiar with an entity known as
21	the Lady Bug Club?
22	CAPTAIN HAYNES: Yes, I am.
23	MR. SCHRIMPF: Okay. And just for the
24	record, where is that located?
25	CAPTAIN HAYNES: About a block west of

00040 1 the - - the - - Da Jungle. MR. SCHRIMPF: Okay. Is it about in the middle of the street? CAPTAIN HAYNES: Yes. 4 5 MR. SCHRIMPF: Okay. And if I recall 6 correctly, it is located on the east side of the 7 street. 8 CAPTAIN HAYNES: Yes. 9 MR. SCHRIMPF: And that street would be 10 Water Street? 11 CAPTAIN HAYNES: Yes, sir. 12 MR. SCHRIMPF: Have you had any 13 difficulties with the Lady Bug Club? MR. HAYNES: We've had a couple of 14 problems with the Lady Bug - - Bug Club, but 15 16 that's been in the month of June, for the last 17 couple of weeks. They have a teen night going 18 on, and we're looking at addressing some of the 19 issues that they have. But the issues that we've 20 had with the Jungle did not cross over with the 21 Lady Bug Club. 22 MR. SCHRIMPF: Okay. Now, there was 23 also some - - I don't think testimony, but I 24 think a question that was raised on cross-25 examination of the Sergeant with respect to the

00041 installation of a "no left turn" sign. Do you 1 have any knowledge of that? CAPTAIN HAYNES: No, we don't have - -4 The - - My officers do not have access to "no 5 left turn" signs. If any "no left turn" signs was in - - installed, it would have been from the 7 Department of Public Works due to the 8 construction and closing of the freeways in the 9 downtown area. 10 MR. SCHRIMPF: Okay. Good. Now, you 11 asked a - - Or there were some questions and some 12 testimony about teen nights, and you said that 13 there was a time when the teen nights were 14 stopped, and then the bar was closed for a while. 15 Do you recollect that? 16 CAPTAIN HAYNES: For - - With my 17 concern the teen night, when it came onto the 18 radar, it was about the time when Mrs. Kornfehl 19 had to come before the licensing committee. 20 MR. SCHRIMPF: Okay. 21 CAPTAIN HAYNES: And one of the things 22 that occurred is that she had decided not to have 23 teen night anymore. 2.4 MR. SCHRIMPF: Okay. Do you - - Was

that in the Summer or Fall of the year 2005?

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1	CAPTAIN HAYNES: That would have been
2	the year 2000 and
3	ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Schrimpf, we're
4	going to move on from that question. That was
5	part of our official record, as part of the last
6	hearing during her renewal, where as part of the
7	agreement on the renewal with a warning letter,
8	the applicant agreed to to not to no
9	longer hold teen parties, so if you want to just
10	move on with your That's part of our official
11	record.
12	MR. SCHRIMPF: Okay.
13	ALDERMAN BOHL: And it is in in the
14	packet we have here.
15	MR. SCHRIMPF: Okay.
16	ALDERMAN BOHL: Please proceed if you
17	have other questions.
18	MR. SCHRIMPF: Thank you. Is Ms.
19	Kornfehl the owner of this structure, or is
20	another person the owner of this building?
21	CAPTAIN HAYNES: There's another person
22	that's the owner of the building.
23	MR. SCHRIMPF: Okay. And that was the
24	person who was assessed the 4,000 dollars.
25	CAPTAIN HAYNES: Correct.

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1	MR. SCHRIMPF: Thank you very much, Mr.
2	Chairman. That's all I have.
3	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Mr. Arena, do you
4	have any questions of the Captain?
5	MR. ARENA: Yes. Thank you. Captain,
6	how long have you been in your current I'm
7	sorry.
8	I'll reask the question. How long have
9	you been in your current position as the Captain
10	of the District?
11	CAPTAIN HAYNES: It will be two years
12	in August of this year.
13	MR. ARENA: And you said something
14	earlier that prior to 2004 this street, Broadway,
15	there wasn't a residential area. As far as you
16	know, prior to 2004, did anybody live in the 600
17	block of Broadway?
18	CAPTAIN HAYNES: As far as I know, Mr.
19	Arenson lived in the 600 block of North Broadway
20	before 2004.
21	MR. ARENA: Okay. And as far as you
22	know, is he the only resident that makes a home
23	regularly in the 600 block of North Broadway?
24	CAPTAIN HAYNES: He's the only
25	resident, but there are other businesses that are

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1	in that block.
2	MR. ARENA: I presume so. That's
3	downtown.
4	CAPTAIN HAYNES: Okay.
5	MR. ARENA: I understand that.
6	CAPTAIN HAYNES: Yeah.
7	MR. ARENA: But he's the only resident.
8	CAPTAIN HAYNES: As far as I know, yes.
9	MR. ARENA: Do you know how long that
10	he's lived there?
11	CAPTAIN HAYNES: No.
12	MR. ARENA: You stated that you started
13	to get complaints in 2004. Were those complaints
14	generally just from Mr. Arenson?
15	CAPTAIN HAYNES: At the beginning a lot
16	of them came from Mr. Arenson, but there were
17	other citizens that would call that were making
18	complaints, also.
19	MR. ARENA: Other citizens from where?
20	Did they identify themselves? Did they have an
21	address? What was their connection to the 600
22	block of Broadway? Do you know?
23	CAPTAIN HAYNES: Business people. I
24	don't I didn't bring their names with me, but
25	they were other people that owned buildings,

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other businesses in the 600 block of North Broadway?

MR. ARENA: Did you give a mandate to your officers to write citations to anybody in the street for anybody that they could find in an effort to create a record to bring to this committee?

CAPTAIN HAYNES: What I did is in the year 2004, the same thing that has been documented in the year 2005 and 2006 was actually going on in 2004. But what happened is that my officers felt that because it was only traffic control, that it shouldn't be documented. And what I did is I had the officers to go back and they had to explain what they did that night. Each night what we do, we have what we call a activity sheet. The officer has to list what activity did they perform that night. One of the things that was a common theme in 2004 and in 2005 was this traffic control in which we had to control the crowd that exited out of the bar of the Jungle. And one of the things I became concerned about is that, you know, we're using up all of my resources to control a crowd coming out of a bar, when we have 156 bars in that area.

00046 1 MR. ARENA: Did you request the Department of Public Works to put a sign that said "no left turn" in an effort to be able to write citations? 5 CAPTAIN HAYNES: No. 6 MR. ARENA: Have you ever sent a letter 7 to the licensee, Ms. Kornfehl, telling her that 8 her business was a nuisance in your opinion? 9 CAPTAIN HAYNES: I had a few 10 conversations with Ms. Kornfehl. I had Ms. 11 Kornfehl come in on a couple of occasions to talk 12 to the lieutenants of whatever shift, which most 13 times was a day shift, and it was explained to 14 her that we were concerned about her premise. We 15 wanted to know what was she doing. We're trying 16 to help her. We can't manage someone's business. 17 But one of the things I am willing to do is talk 18 with you to try to let you know there is a 19 problem, to let you know we're here to help you 20 to do what - - whatever we can to try to correct 21 this problem. Now, there's only so many times I 22 can ask you and tell you and explain to you and 23 have officers come into your club. 2.4 Now one of the other - - Another thing

that the officers did during - - at night,

00047 officers would enter the establishment and talk 1 with Ms. Kornfehl. They would talk to another manager that actually showed up with Ms. Kornfehl one time when she came to District No. 1. The 5 Sergeants would go to her location. The 6 Lieutenants would go to her location. I've gone 7 to - - I've changed my shift time, and have 8 showed up at her location after midnight. The 9 - - The one night in the wintertime, I think it 10 was in 2005 when I went to her location, to me it 11 seemed like someone had told her that I was going 12 to be there or something, because when I get 13 there, when it should have been like very active, 14 nobody was there. When I get there, nobody was 15 there. They had actually shut down. So there's 16 only so many things I can do. 17 MR. ARENA: Are - - Excuse me. Are you 18 aware of what the capacity is for Ms. Kornfehl's 19 establishment? 20 CAPTAIN HAYNES: No. 21 MR. ARENA: Are you aware of what the 22 capacity is for Lady Bug? 23 CAPTAIN HAYNES: No. 2.4 MR. ARENA: Are - - How can you be 25

certain that not some of the patrons in the

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street on Broadway are from other clubs like Lady Bug Club or any other club in the area?

CAPTAIN HAYNES: Well, one of the things that we did is that I started having the Sergeant to pay attention to that, I had the officers to pay attention to. Because that was one of my concerns, also. I didn't - - Because we have so many clubs in the downtown area, my first question was how do we know that this - these people are coming from the Lady Bug? But, you know, when you go down there and you watch and see how the clubs are situated, and what nights. And one - - one thing that helped out with us figuring out the crowd that was coming from the Jungle was because on Thursday night there's not a lot of activity going on down there. Now, because of the Thursday night and the heavy volume of patrons that would come to her establishment, and then we videotaped it, also. So we - - A number of different - different kinds of methods we tried to try to establish that these were her patrons.

MR. ARENA: Have you sent the bill for services as you have done with this building for any other establishments, I guess, in your

00049 1 district? CAPTAIN HAYNES: What normally - - In the two years I've been in the downtown area, 4 normally when we get to the point that I've 5 gotten to with the Jungle, normally the owner 6 actually just surrendered their license, and they 7 start anew, versus continuing on for such a long 8 period of time. So she's the first one that 9 we've actually had to go to this extent with. 10 MR. ARENA: Is there an ordinance that 11 gives you the ability to do that? I'm unfamiliar 12 with it. I - -13 CAPTAIN HAYNES: Yes, there is an 14 ordinance. 15 MR. ARENA: Okay. CAPTAIN HAYNES: Did you want to - -16 17 MR. ARENA: No, that's okay. 18 CAPTAIN HAYNES: Oh, okay. 19 MR. ARENA: Item number 23 in the 20 Investigation Unit's report. It's noted that 21 there were 15 traffic citations and 22 parking 22 citations issued, presumably to patrons of this 23 establishment. Are those citations noted because 24 of your mandate to issue citations for any and 25 everything that could be issued?

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CAPTAIN HAYNES: The way those citations got issued was what we did, the week before, we had videotaped activity and the patrons coming out of the Jungle. One of the things that we'd notice - - One of the things I noticed when I reviewed the tape was how many violations were being committed with our officers just conducting traffic control. So - - And I was a little bit upset with that, because you have officers that are at that scene to control the crowd, but one of the things they have to do, also, is that they have to also issue citations when there are violations of ordinances. And so the next week, I told them if you see any violations, you must cite whoever is committing these violations. And the next week they cited, and that's how many citations they got in one night.

MR. ARENA: But this is an attempt to blame traffic citations on the licensee. I mean, she doesn't drive the car. She's not creating the problem. And if it's a traffic citation, why are you mandating it and putting it in a report concerning her?

CAPTAIN HAYNES: Due to the clientele,

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          patrons that frequent the Jungle Bar that - -
                   MR. ARENA: Well, let's just get into
         the clientele. What is that clientele, Captain?
                   CAPTAIN HAYNES: - - that caused the
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         traffic to gather, that caused the patrons - - As
 6
          a matter of fact, there was pedestrians that a
 7
          lot of times almost were hit by oncoming cars.
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          The clientele that was at the Jungle are
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          normally, they're younger, and I would assume
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          that everyone would have to be over 21, because
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          they serve liquor. They were over 21. They
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          looked to be
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          - - I doubt if anyone was over 40, but they were
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          a younger group of - - appeared to be, I don't
          know - - I don't know - - Younger, younger
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          people. I don't - - I don't know - - I didn't
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          know any of them personally.
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                   As a matter of fact, I have a son that
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          is in his 20s, and he has friends that do attend
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          that bar, also.

17	CAPTAIN HAYNES: If a loading zone is
18	filled Well, people park
19	MR. ARENA: Well, I'm asking if that's
20	a fair statement.
21	CAPTAIN HAYNES: Ah, yes.
22	MR. ARENA: Okay. Thank you.
23	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: I do have a question,
24	Mr. Chairman, if I could.
25	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Bauman.

00074 1 ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Let's clear this up once and for all, Captain Haynes. Is there any doubt in your mind, as a Captain of the First District in the two years you've been assigned 5 there, that the incident reports outlined by the 6 Sergeant and the crowd control issues are - - are 7 attributable to the Jungle and to other clubs in 8 the area? CAPTAIN HAYNES: Yes, sir. 9 10 ALDERMAN BAUMAN: So you have no doubt - -11 12 CAPTAIN HAYNES: There's absolutely no 13 doubt in my mind, whatsoever. 14 ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Thank you. CAPTAIN HAYNES: That was one of the 15 16 reasons why we did this for such a long period of 17 time. That's one of the reasons why we 18 videotaped. To make it real clear. 19 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: At this time 20 Alderman Dudzik moves to make the entire police 21 report part of the record - - permanent record in 22 this hearing. Hearing no objections, so ordered. 23 MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman, what about 2.4 the police reports which are Tab 3, which have 25 been identified by the witness, and at least the

00075 1 e-mails from Captain Haynes, the two that we identified? CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: I think, Mr. 4 Schrimpf, I'll ask, at risk of prolonging this 5 hearing until midnight, I'll ask Attorney Arena 6 if there is any objection to us entering this 7 entire booklet into the record, Mister - -8 MR. ARENA: Well, I - - I suppose I could make technical objections. I don't think 9 10 they're all authenticated. I think they're 11 hearsay. But for what they are, no, I won't 12 object. 13 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: So Alderman Bohl 14 moves to make the entire booklet, we'll identify 15 this booklet by its cover page. It's spiral 16 bound from the law offices of Jonathan Goodman. 17 And it has a Table of Contents, which lists Tab 18 1, Tab 2, Tab 3, Tab 4, Tab 5, Tab 6, and Tab 7. 19 Alderman Bohl moves to make this part of the 20 permanent record in this hearing, and hearing no 21 objections, so ordered. 22 Is there - - Is there anyone else 23

So would you 11 rather have this shown first? 12 MR. BERNSTEIN: I will be - - Yes. I -13 - I'll question them on it. The video speaks for 14 itself. I don't need to - - Once it's 15 authenticated it speaks for itself. 16 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Why - - Why don't 17 we - - Why don't we see the video at this time, 18 and then we can - - And then if there's any 19 reference to those activities by the future 20 witnesses, we'll have already have seen it. MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman, two things 21 on that. First of all, I did ask counsel to - -22 23 to lay the foundation for the video before we see 24 it. And I believe, and I'm not sure that - -25 that counsel is aware of this, but there are two

17	process No, I live there most of the time.
18	I'm in the process of putting my house up for
19	sale in Jackson.
20	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay.
21	THE WITNESS: But my residence
22	legal residence at this time is Jackson,
23	Wisconsin.
24	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. And just
25	what, say, out of a month how many nights do you

2	THE WITNESS: I'm there usually all but
3	two nights a week.

5	Thank you. I just wanted to establish that,

15	just elaborated, you have your legal residence is
16	not on Broadway. Correct?
17	THE WITNESS: That's correct.
18	MR. BERNSTEIN: You do, however, spend
19	at least five nights a week at Broadway.
20	THE WITNESS: Yes, that's correct.
21	MR. BERNSTEIN: And And that would
22	be in Mr. Arenson's residence.
23	THE WITNESS: Correct.
24	MR. BERNSTEIN: Ms. Aren Actually,
25	can you please hit the "B" button? Okay.

00079 1 If you please look up on the screen you'll see two slats. One is - - Two shots. One is labeled 6/11/2006 and the other is labeled Da Jungle. These, I will represent to you that 5 these were compiled onto one disk from two disks 6 that Mr. Arenson gave to me. Do you recall the 7 disks that I'm referring to? 8 THE WITNESS: Yes. 9 MR. BERNSTEIN: Were you the individual 10 who shot all of the video footage on those two 11 disks that I have had compiled onto one disk? 12 THE WITNESS: Yes. 13 MR. BERNSTEIN: And can you tell the 14 committee from what vantage point these videos 15 were shot? 16 THE WITNESS: Most of them occur from 17 the fourth story floor of 608 North Broadway. 18 Some of them occur from the top of the building 19 on the corner of Broadway and Michigan, that 20 would be - - it's the northeast corner. 21 MR. BERNSTEIN: And you had permission 22 to be on the roof of that building to shoot the 23 video? THE WITNESS: Yes. 2.4 25 MR. BERNSTEIN: Can you please - -

00080 1 Obviously, the - - I don't want to say "obviously". Was the film labeled 6/11/2006, in fact, shot on June 11th, 2006? 4 THE WITNESS: Yes, it was. 5 MR. BERNSTEIN: And can you tell me 6 what the contents of the - - the video labeled Da 7 Jungle, what the contents are of that video? 8 THE WITNESS: It's just snapshots of 9 various nights activity that occur, where there 10 was either street nuisance occurring and/or 11 traffic things occurring. 12 MR. BERNSTEIN: And again, you shot all 13 the video that we're about to see. 14 THE WITNESS: Yes. 15 MR. BERNSTEIN: Okay. Mr. Chairman, I 16 have on this disk which I am - - You have a copy 17 in front of you. There's 25 - 30 minutes of 18 video. I'm not - - I don't intend to show it. 19 I'm going to show the first four minutes of the 20 video labeled 6/11/2006, and because we are at a 21 public forum and on TV, I do want to warn you 22 there is explicit language that does occur, 23 loudly on this video. We apologize ahead of 24 time, but it is - - we want it part of the 25 record. So if there are any viewers out there

00081 with young children, this is when you should turn 1 2 it off. And with that I will - - We'll proceed. 3 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. Thank you. 4 (Whereupon the video is being shown.) 5 (Conversation during video viewing.) 6 THE WITNESS: (Shots fired on video.) 7 "Donny, get down. Get down, Donny. Get down. 8 Get down. Where are the fuckin' cops?" 9 MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman, I would 10 inquire as to where in this video can we see the 11 - - the tavern, itself, 618. 12 MR. BERNSTEIN: I will get to that. 13 MR. SCHRIMPF: Okay. 14 THE WITNESS: "There's something 15 happening down the block. Tell him to get down 16 here. There's a car coming the wrong way. They 17 should still get here, Donny. There are guns. 18 Do they hear it? Do you hear the guns? Get your 19 ass here." 20 (Video stopped.) 21 MR. BERNSTEIN: Just for a point of clarification or for - - I have a few questions for you, Ms. Jungers. Okay. Looking at this - -22 23 24 the shot on the screen. I know this is not the 25 best shot. From your vantage point, can you tell

00082 1 me where the entrance to Da Jungle is? THE WITNESS: It would be directly across from the - - the gold car parked in the 4 street. 5 MR. BERNSTEIN: So on the screen we're 6 looking at there are two cars parked, and it 7 appears they're pointed north. There is an 8 individual getting out of the car, one of the car 9 doors is open. There are three individuals next 10 to the other car. That is the entrance to Da 11 Jungle. 12 THE WITNESS: That is correct. 13 MR. BERNSTEIN: Okay. And this gold 14 car, you saw those people come out of the - - Da 15 Jungle, get into that car. Correct? 16 THE WITNESS: I personally did not see 17 it at that point. 18 MR. BERNSTEIN: Do you know if the 19 individuals that were involved in the subsequent 20 fight that we saw had - - had just come out of Da 21 Jungle? 22 THE WITNESS: No, not for sure, no. 23 MR. BERNSTEIN: I just wanted to - -2.4 Out of fairness I wanted to clarify that. 25 THE WITNESS: Right.

00083 MR. BERNSTEIN: Okay. But this is 1 2 clearly in front of Da Jungle? THE WITNESS: Correct. 4 MR. BERNSTEIN: Okay. I don't have any 5 more further - - I don't have any further 6 questions for you, Ms. Jungers, but I do want to 7 tell you, Mr. Chairman, if you do watch the full 8 20 minute version of this tape, which I don't 9 think we need to do for times sake here. The 10 Milwaukee Police obviously show up. The Fire 11 Department shows up. An ambulance shows up, and 12 they take somebody out of Da Jungle. I have no 13 idea what - - what happened, but they put the 14 individual on a stretcher and took him away. They're just passers-by, strangers 20 coming along, shooting up the streets. 21 MR. ARENA: Let me just say what - -22 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: This - - This 23 isn't going to get to - - to like open - -MR. ARENA: I - - I don't want this to 2.4 25 be either, you know, but at some point there is a

1	matter of decorum here we should all follow.
2	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Yes.
3	MR. BERNSTEIN: I will leave it up to
4	the Chairman. This is more of the same, and then
5	the second video are just more shots. But I
6	would not contradict Alderman Bauman.
7	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Is it Just so
8	I understand this properly. You're This is -
9	- These are taken from the roof of the building
10	next door.
11	MR. BERNSTEIN: From the balcony.
12	THE WITNESS: From our window.
13	MR. ARENSON: From the window.
14	MR. BERNSTEIN: Oh, from the window.
15	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: From the window of
16	the building next next to it.
17	THE WITNESS: Actually, two buildings
18	over.
19	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Two buildings to
20	which direction?
21	THE WITNESS: To the south.
22	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. And so you
23	you couldn't possibly actually see the
24	entrance
25	THE WITNESS: That is correct.

1	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: with the
2	camera you have.
3	THE WITNESS: We're on the same side of
4	the street.
5	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: You'd have to be
6	leaning out of the balcony.

9	understand where the where the vantage point
10	was. Thank you. Mr. Schrimpf, any anything
11	further on this?

14	if Alderman Bauman feels I am I am I have
15	all day. And I I want my clients to to
16	have their say. The only reason I was not going

21	here to watch this. I have no problem putting it

BERNSTEIN: Well, the crowd had 6 dispersed at this point from the gunshots, so 7 there's not much of a crowd left on this tape. 8 The second video, which are - - Ms. Jungers 9 testified are compilations that they put together 10 from different nights shows crowds, ridiculous 11 traffic, parking. I mean, absolutely. This tape 12 is - - The remainder of this tape is - - I don't 13 want to say boring - - but you're looking at the 14 Milwaukee Police Department, Fire Department, and other first responders doing their job with 15 16 regard to tending to whoever came out of the bar 17 that was injured. The reason that I showed the 18 first four minutes is obviously this melee in the 19 street that spilled over onto Michigan or 20 Wisconsin, and then the - - the shots fired. 21 If you'd like, I would be more than 22 happy to show the second video, which is - -ALDERMAN WADE: Mr. Chair, just my 23 2.4 personal preference. I would like to see some 25 evidence of some of the other things that have

00088 1 been alleged. I don't - - I don't really need to 2 see this over again. CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: I'll tell you what 4 I'd like to see. I would just like to see the 5 part where the - - the - - you said the fire 6 department brings somebody out of - - out of the 7 bar. Can you fast forward to that or? MR. BERNSTEIN: Yes. 8 9 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Let's just take a 10 look at that. 11 MR. BERNSTEIN: I will - -12 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Because it's been referred to and - - and we haven't seen it, so 13 14 I'd like to see it. 15 MR. BERNSTEIN: Here, this is halfway 16 through. The utility pole that's 4 in view in the upper right-hand corner of the 5 screen, would you say that is near the front door 6 of the Jungle? 7 THE WITNESS: Yes. 8 ALDERMAN WADE: Mr. Chair. 9 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Wade. 10 ALDERMAN WADE: To the owner of the 11 business. 19	more, Mr. Chairman?

21	MR. BERNSTEIN: Shall I go to the
22	second video?
23	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you.
24	MR. BERNSTEIN: To address Alderman
25	Wade's concerns?

9	questions of Ms. Jungers. First of all, Ms.

15	we would try and make some use of our time.
16	MR. SCHRIMPF: That's all I have, Mr.
17	Chairman.
18	MR. BERNSTEIN: Mr. Chairman, I do have
19	one question for Ms. Jungers.
20	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Go ahead.
21	MR. BERNSTEIN: Mr. Jungers, from the
22	based on what we've seen, it's disturbing.
23	Do you fear fear for your safety, living on
24	Broadway?

         it's because I'm the 7th District Alderman, I

         feel like this. I was expecting to see something
25
         a little more dramatic than what I saw. People
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leaving the club, I'm sure that same scene is outside of the bars on Water Street, the south side, Eve's, and other places. People making noise, leaving the club, getting in their cars, double-parking. That's a normal scene outside of a bar in downtown Milwaukee, or downtown anywhere in the nation. I was expecting to see a lot more chaos and a lot more of people being wild and out of control. People seemed like they were walking, one of the things that people do when they leave an establishment.

So the gunfire is definitely disturbing, but for the most part that appeared to me to be kind of mild compared to a lot of things that I've seen in different areas as far as people leaving establishments on - - on the east side, on North Avenue. I've been out to different areas and it's much more chaos than that. Now, living there, I wouldn't want it outside of my house, that's for certain. But I'm sure some - - the residents on Water Street or on Brady Street or on East North Avenue have some concerns, also. But I really thought I would see something that was much more incriminating than - - than what I saw.

00096 1 MR. BERNSTEIN: May I respond? 2 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Go ahead. 3 MR. BERNSTEIN: With all due respect, 4 Alderman, the reason I brought this here is so 5 that the committee can make up their own choice. 6 Personally, I find this shocking. This is 7 obviously something that you don't find shocking, 8 and I think that's why we brought it. It's - -9 this committee needs to make a decision. I would 10 only suggest when making your decision, that you 11 take the testimony and everything that you've 12 seen here, the testimony, the documentary 13 evidence, especially Captain Haynes, who I think 14 is more qualified almost than anybody here, to 15 discuss what is problematic with regard, at least 16 from her perspective, the police perspective. 17 And see if that fits in with the legal definition 18 of nuisance, which is why we're here. 19 I would offer to you that this is a 20 nuisance, and I believe, as Alderman Bohl said, 21 22

if this is happening in other places of the city, it is incumbent upon the Common Council, the police, other property owners, to start standing up, because I don't think that this is acceptable no matter where it happens or how shocking you

However, we're 4 discussing Da Jungle, and a quiet street in 5 downtown Milwaukee where developers are trying to 6 make these residential areas. And we are here 7 because my client has made a complaint, that this 8 is a nuisance, and apparently from Captain 9 Haynes' testimony, it's a chronic nuisance. 10 ALDERMAN WADE: Well, Mr. Chair, if I 11 may respond to that. I'm not questioning if it's 12 a nuisance or not. I'm definitely not 13 questioning that. 14 MR. BERNSTEIN: Okay. 15 ALDERMAN WADE: What I'm saying is 16 that's - - that's a little subpar normal 17 occurrence as far as people leaving Summerfest, 18

ALDERMAN WADE: What I'm saying is that's - that's a little subpar normal occurrence as far as people leaving Summerfest, people leaving the Brewers game, people leaving any area, the Bucks game, a party downtown, Turner Hall, people come out of the place, get in their cars. They talk. They take off. Part of it was pretty, you know, when - They got out of the car, double-parked, left their - All of that, that's a little past the line. But I was expecting to see something that was a lot more

00098 1 chaotic. Maybe because cruising goes on in my district, I'm jaded. That may be it. But I expected to see something different. I'm not 4 questioning if it's a nuisance or not. 5 MR. BERNSTEIN: Okay. Okay. 6 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: What I want to do 7 at this time is we're going to take a - - we're just going to take a five minute break. But I'm 8 9 going to ask the - - my fellow committee members, 10 please not to leave the floor, because we will 11 start exactly after five minutes. 12 (Whereupon a break was taken.) 13 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Friday, June 23rd 14 at 11:10 a.m. we're back on the record. 24	MR. BERNSTEIN: Okay. We've seen video
25	and we've heard testimony. There's an extensive

18	other buildings on the 600 block of Broadway?
19	MR. ARENSON: Yes, I own the the
20	building at 608 and 612 North Broadway.
21	MR. BERNSTEIN: Do you have any tenants
22	in those buildings?
23	MR. ARENSON: Yes.
24	MR. BERNSTEIN: What type of tenants?
25	MR. ARENSON: In the 608 building we

2	floor, I have a dance studio called East Town
3	Dance Studio. They encompass both floors of my

ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Mr. Arena, you should 15 16 know that it's not hearsay in the first instance, 17 because it's state of mind. 18 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. Okay. One 19 at a time. 20 MR. ARENA: It's hearsay. 21 ALDERMAN WADE: Mr. Chair. Mr. Chair. 22 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: You guys keep this up, I'm going to go to lunch. Okay. Alderman 23 2.4 Wade. 25 ALDERMAN WADE: Yeah, I got a few

23	witnessed people coming out of the bar creating

SCHRIMPF: What's the closest 18 tavern that could account for the activity? 19 MR. 23	could you please tell me why Mr. Arenson hired

00113 because he believed he had complaints about loud 1 and raucous activity outside his residence as a result of the tavern that .. 4 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Sir, could you speak 5 up just a little bit? I don't think the 6 microphone's working. 7 (Microphone adjustments made.) 8 MR. BERNSTEIN: Thank you, Mr. Doss. 9 Could you tell - - tell us what - - what services 10 you performed for Mr. Arenson? 11 THE WITNESS: Mr. Arenson asked us to 12 spend some time during the closing hours in 13 September of 2005 in the area of the 600 block of North Broadway, just to observe the activity that 14 15 was going on at closing time. 16 MR. BERNSTEIN: And if you could 17 explain very quickly, and then I'll let you go, 18 what you observed while you were employed by Mr. 19 Arenson? 20 THE WITNESS: What we observed, we 21 would arrive in the area of nine or ten o'clock, 22 and it was fairly quiet until approximately 1:30 23 or so. At that time police officers would come, 2.4 generally in the area of four to six squads.

They would set up east, north and south. They

videotapes that you were present for?
THE WITNESS: The 21st and the 28th.

Mr. Chairman, I'm going to I will leave it up
to the committee whether they want to see these
tapes after hearing Officer Deveraux's testimony.
The last question, Officer Deveraux, asked to Mr.
Warnke was whether he witnessed any fights. The
answer was no. Can you tell me whether you

20	"Let me know when the parking lot
21	starts getting filled up."
22	"There's the pick-up again."
23	"What have we got going on there?"
24	"That's the entrance."
25	"We got a fight here."

1	"Yeah. Big fight going on. Big fight
2	going on. Big old fight. Whoops. Yeah. Guy in
3	the black, a white shirt and a black jacket
4	there."
5	"There's one. All right."

8	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Officer
9	THE WITNESS: That's pretty much
10	That's pretty much it.
11	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. Thank you.
12	Any further
13	MR. BERNSTEIN: I have no further
14	questions for Officer Deveraux.
15	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Mr. Arena, do you
16	have any questions for this witness?
17	MR. ARENA: Yeah, Officer Deveraux,
18	were you involved in the report that went to the
19	license investigation unit for 4/28/06 that
20	night?
21	THE WITNESS: My partner wrote it.
22	MR. ARENA: There was Are you aware
23	that he included in what went to the License
24	Investigation Unit, there were 37 traffic
25	citations issued, a pedestrian citation and 26

2	THE WITNESS: Yes.
3	MR. ARENA: Why is it important to
4	include those traffic citations with this record?
5	THE WITNESS: Well, the patrons that
6	leave the club tend to just get in their cars and
7	drive around, and basically that's where the
8	cruising starts. Cruising downtown is pretty bad
9	at at night.
10	MR. ARENA: Well, parking citations,
11	what what types of violations would that be?
12	What does that lead to, parking?
13	THE WITNESS: Well, if you, you know,
14	park in the crosswalk, it blocks pedestrians'
15	walkway, and with all the cruisers coming by
16	people can get hit by cars and
17	MR. ARENA: Do you know what the basis
18	of all 26 of those parking citations are?
19	THE WITNESS: No.
20	MR. ARENA: Now, I believe you
21	testified that there were there were 15
22	people that you witnessed fighting outside the
23	door?
24	THE WITNESS: I said ten to 15.
25	MR. ARENA: Okay. Now, I I believe

00125 1 I saw one gentleman actually attempt to swing a fist, and there were ten to 15 people around. Isn't that more accurate? 4 THE WITNESS: It looked to me like 5 there was a group of people pulling and pushing 6 and swinging. 7 MR. ARENA: But out of that incident 8 there was one arrest for disorderly conduct. 9 THE WITNESS: I believe so. 10 MR. ARENA: And usually in disorderly 11 conduct cases, if two people are pulling and 12 swing, they both get arrested for disorderly 13 conduct. True? 14 THE WITNESS: They could. 15 MR. ARENA: And the Police Department 16 was there that night, surveillancing with video 17 and had cars there, as we saw in the video, and 18 the only person that was arrested was just this 19 one for disorderly conduct. 20 THE WITNESS: Yeah, we - - When the 21 fight erupted, we called it out over the airways, 22 and the police, they weren't in the immediate 23 area. They were in the surrounding blocks, and 24 they responded to our call over the - - the

radio.

2	mandate given to you guys to write as many
3	citations as you could on purpose?
4	THE WITNESS: We were just told to go
5	on on the rooftop and videotape.
6	MR. ARENA: Nothing further.
7	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you. We
8	have another officer from the Police Department
9	to testify. Your name and Raise your right
10	hand, we'll swear you in first.
11	(Whereupon the witness was sworn.)
12	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Name and address
13	for the record, please.
14	THE WITNESS: Officer Andrew Deptula.
15	It's D-E-P-T-U-L-A. I'm a Police Officer with
16	the First District, 749 West State Street.
17	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Thank you.
18	MR. BERNSTEIN: Thank you. Officer
19	Deptula, you were involved in making at least one
20	of those videotapes?
21	THE WITNESS: I was present for all
22	three. I did the videotaping on the April 21st
23	and May 5th.
24	MR. BERNSTEIN: Okay. We just saw a
25	fight that started at Da Jungle and came out. On

any - - And - - And we've heard testimony, and I don't want to beat a dead horse, for lack of a better term, but is there anything that you witnessed on the three nights that you were there that you would like the committee to either see on the videotapes or that you would like to express to the committee, besides what we've heard and what we've seen?

THE WITNESS: The videotape we just watched is the second week of the three weeks I was there. The plan was for the first week, the April 21st, after meeting with the Captain we decided we would go there and just videotape what happened on a normal night at closing time at Da Jungle. The second week, from that we formulated a plan on how to deal with it the second, third weeks. The video we just watched was the second week, and there was an additional group of officers assigned just to that area to deal with the problems shown on the video from the first week, which helped prevent the fight from escalating, and it helped clear the crowd quicker than usual.

As you can see on the tape, as soon as the fight broke out, before it had a chance to

00128 1 - - to escalate, there were four to five squads rolling up on the scene. MR. BERNSTEIN: If I may ask, what is 4 your normal assignment, if you - - if there is a 5 normal assignment. 6 THE WITNESS: I normally work on the 7 day shift on normally a plainclothes assignment, 8 on what's the Captain's car, where we address 9 specifically the issues going on in the District. 10 We do occasionally change hours to deal with 11 specific problems as we did in this instance. 12 MR. BERNSTEIN: And how long would you 13 typically spend on over those three nights up on the roof there? 14 15 THE WITNESS: On those three nights we 16 went to the location at approximately midnight 17 and remained until the crowd had completely 18 dispersed. 19 MR. BERNSTEIN: Which would have been 20 approximately how long? 21 THE WITNESS: Until about 2:30, three 22 in the morning on most cases. 23 MR. BERNSTEIN: So you could have spent 2.4 upwards of nine or ten hours on that roof

specifically just monitoring Da Jungle.

ARENA: But the police report that 13 has been submitted here today that's part of this 14 record, has no notation of any event occurring on 15 April 21st, that I see. Oh, I have to take that 16 back. April 21. But you find no violations in 17 this report. 18 THE WITNESS: We witnessed many 19

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violations. There were no officers available to deal with them. That was what we used to help document, to formulate the plan for the 28th and the 5th, when there was approximately ten to 12 extra officers assigned just to that area. The videotape of the 21st shows numerous violations going unaddressed.

13	nights that you were at the scene, could you
14	describe the attire of the individuals exiting
15	the bar?
16	THE WITNESS: They were wearing T-
17	shirts and pants and shoes.
18	ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Tennis shoes?
19	THE WITNESS: Some of them, yes
20	ALDERMAN DUDZIK: It was testified
21	earlier that that was forbidden by the dress
22	code, and I just wanted to make sure that I was
23	clear as to the attire that was being worn at
24	this at this particular upscale night club.
25	MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Chairman.

1	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Yes, Mr. Schrimpf.
2	MR. SCHRIMPF: Officer, so long as I -
3	- Or as I understand it, you were there on the
4	night of the 21st.
5	THE WITNESS: Correct.

7	of the building across the street?
8	THE WITNESS: Yes.
9	MR. SCHRIMPF: That's 611 North
10	Broadway?
11	THE WITNESS: I can't recall the

14	ask you if you Did you In terms of the
15	patrons Well, strike that. In terms Did
16	you see individuals out in the street, milling
17	about in the street, stopping traffic and being
18	noisy?
19	THE WITNESS: Yes, that was all
20	recorded on the video.
21	MR. SCHRIMPF: Did you happen to see
22	where they came from?
23	THE WITNESS: They It also shows on
24	the video, recorded as they leave the front door
25	of Da Jungle. They gathered on the sidewalk in

1	front, and the security from that club helped
2	move them along towards the parking lot, which is
3	in the 500 block of Broadway, moving them
4	approximately a block down Excuse me down
5	one block, and then they gathered again into the
6	parking lot.
7	MR. SCHRIMPF: Okay. And with respect
8	to those people that you saw leaving the bar, did
9	you see any of them carry drinks out of the bar?
10	THE WITNESS: Yes, I did. I don't know
11	if the videotape shows any of that.
12	MR. SCHRIMPF: Okay. Did you happen to
13	see anyone vomit?
14	THE WITNESS: Yes, that is on the
15	videotape.
16	MR. SCHRIMPF: And did that individual
17	then walk into the tavern until it closed?

9	the normal procedure.
10	THE WITNESS: That's correct.
11	ALDERMAN WADE: Everybody did what they
12	were supposed to do in a professional manner.

16	colleague go inside of the bar, any one of these
17	three days?

19	before we set up to videotape, we did walk

24	act differently, of course, when the police are

8	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. Mr. Arena,
9	proceed.
10	MR. ARENA: I'm sorry. I didn't get
11	your last name.
12	THE WITNESS: Brown, like the color.
13	MR. ARENA: Mr. Brown.
14	THE WITNESS: Um-hnh.
15	MR. ARENA: Sorry. On April 28th, '06,
16	I believe that was an incident that we saw
17	videotape of. Were you present? Were you
18	working that evening?
19	THE WITNESS: Yes, I haven't missed a
20	night, a Thursday night, so, yes.
21	MR. ARENA: And what What was it
22	that you recall out of this incident, the
23	disorderly conduct that occurred. Did that occur
24	inside the bar?
25	THE WITNESS: I didn't see it occur

1	inside. I didn't see anything. I'm in the DJ
2	booth upstairs, so I can't really see anything
3	unless it's on the dance floor. And I haven't
4	seen anything on the dance floor.
5	MR. ARENA: Now, you said that you were
6	there every Thursday night. Generally, what is
7	the Do you have an idea of what the size of
8	the crowd is on a Thursday night?
9	THE WITNESS: Anywhere from 250 to 300
10	people, 350.
11	MR. ARENA: Is What would be the
12	average?
13	THE WITNESS: I'll say 275, 300. It's
14	been slow.
15	MR. ARENA: Do you have anything to
16	to add as to the general operation of the club,
17	as you see it?
18	THE WITNESS: Yes. I've known Ms.
19	Kornfehl for about 15 years. Could be more.
20	I've worked at the club when it was under a
21	different name, as well, and I wrote some notes
22	down.
23	Me, as a radio personality, for our
24	station, our logo is V100.7. We increase the
25	peace in the neighborhood, you know, we're the

people station. So I can't really get involved. I'm very selective with the clubs that I do. I do three to four clubs a week, and I can't really get involved with the rowdy-rowdy clubs. We play hip-hop music at this club, and I'll keep it real. A lot of people don't want hip-hop downtown or anywhere in the area, or any part of the City of Milwaukee. Hip-hop tends to bring a rough crowd out, but it can also bring out an adult crowd. There's been aldermen, politicians, detectives, sheriffs, to the club on Thursday night, and they enjoy theirself.

There was a sheriff that was down there. He got pulled over by the police, and the police officer told that sheriff that, you know, that he shouldn't be there. So - - And I have talked to - - I wish he was still here, the Captain, and police officers, I tease them all the time when they come in the club. I ask them if they want something to drink. I tease them every now and then. But the Captain that was here told me she wanted the club to change the music, and the music is what draws the - - the people downtown. Every club in the city from Eve to Have a Nice Day Cafe', they play hip-hop, you

00141 1 know, but Da Jungle plays it every night, the nights that they're - - No, I can't say that. Every Thurs - - Thursday night, excuse me. On 4 Saturday, it's Salsa and Reggae. So that's what 5 I wanted to add. 6 MR. ARENA: Have you witnessed any 7 outrageous acts of violence and large groups 8 fighting inside the club? 9 THE WITNESS: Yes. In the three years 10 that I have been there, there was a couple of 11 times, but security were on it, and they got them 12 out, and Ms. Kornfehl has never received a 13 citation or anything. Oh, she got a parking 14 ticket one time for parking in the back. But 15 other than that, no citations or nothing and - -16 MR. ARENA: How many security people 17 are employed? 18 THE WITNESS: Wow, that's hard to say. 19 Anywhere from I'll say eight to ten. Ten, 20 probably more. 21 MR. ARENA: How many other clubs have 22 you worked in? 23 THE WITNESS: Oh, man, I've been 2.4 working - - I'm 40 years old. I'm 42 years old, 25 I'll be 42 next month. I've been working

00142 1 nightclubs downtown since 1983, when the club - -It was a Papagao downtown. I've been working 2 clubs since then. I was a resident DJ at the 4 Papagao, as well. I've worked at the Interns, 5 across the street from the bus station. So I'm 6 40 - - 40 - - I'll be 42 next month. So I've - -7 I've never seen the police presence at one spot 8 so much as - - as have I seen in the last six 9 months at Da Jungle. 10 MR. ARENA: What time do you stop 11 playing music on a Thursday night, typically? 12 THE WITNESS: Between 1:25 and 1:30. 13 MR. ARENA: Do you go outside and see 14 anything that goes on outside of the building 15 itself? 16 THE WITNESS: No, because I'm up there 17 with my equipment, my CDs and everything. 18 Sometimes I'll look out the window, and I'll see 19 people linger outside, but that's everywhere. My 20

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with my equipment, my CDs and everything. Sometimes I'll look out the window, and I'll see people linger outside, but that's everywhere. My son graduated last week at the Mecca, and there were people outside, and police was there. So they were in the street, so. It's - - It's normal. I've seen that. Way back in the day, when I was DJ in the Papagao's, been the same way. It never changes.

2	THE WITNESS: Okay.
3	MR. BERNSTEIN: I have no questions.
4	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Any questions by

20	THE WITNESS: No. No. Sometimes I
21	might do something on at Da Jungle on a
22	different night, but, no. I'm all over the city.
23	ALDERMAN WADE: So in the other areas
24	of town that that you DJ, are they a more
25	residential area than the downtown area?

00144 THE WITNESS: Yes, they are. Yes. 1 2 ALDERMAN WADE: And do you - - Do you have - - Do you have the same activity going on 4 at those clubs at the end of the night? People 5 leave. They socialize. Try to get phone numbers 6 or whatever. 7 THE WITNESS: Yeah. 8 ALDERMAN WADE: Do you see the same 9 amount of police presence in those residential 10 areas that you see downtown? 11 THE WITNESS: No, not at all. Not at 12 all. Sometimes the police will show up. They 13 have on numerous occasions at the other clubs, 14 but not like it's been at Da Jungle. ALDERMAN WADE: I don't even want to 15 16 ask you why do you think that is, because I - - I17 got my own theory. 18 THE WITNESS: Me, too. 19 ALDERMAN WADE: Yeah. But anyway, you 20 say that you've been doing this since '83. 21 THE WITNESS: Yes. 22 ALDERMAN WADE: Is - - Is the 23 atmosphere at Da Jungle made you feel uncomfortable or dangerous or fear for your 24 25 safety?

2	wouldn't be there at all. I wouldn't be allowed

9	ALDERMAN WADE: Were downtown.
10	THE WITNESS: Yes.
11	ALDERMAN WADE: Okay. I I don't
12	have any more questions, Mr. Chair. I do want to
13	thank you, Mr. Brown, and V100 for your support
14	of our college fundraiser last weekend. It was a
15	overwhelming success due to the help of you and
16	your station. So, two students get nice
17	scholarships, so thank you.
18	THE WITNESS: Appreciate that.
19	ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Mr. Chairman.
20	THE WITNESS: Appreciate that.
21	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Dudzik.
22	ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Mr. Brown, have you
23	ever worked at any clubs where shootings have
24	occurred?
25	THE WITNESS: Yes.

00146 1 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Have you ever worked at any clubs where shootings have occurred while you were there? THE WITNESS: Outside, yes. Not on the 5 inside of the club. 6 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Do you feel that a 7 police presence at this particular location is 8 undeserving? 9 THE WITNESS: Oh, no. I love the 10 police presence, and I'm sure Ms. Kornfehl does, 11 too. I love it. 12 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: So you feel that the 13 police presence is deserved, given the activities 14 outside the club. 15 THE WITNESS: Yes, at any club. That 16 helps move the crowd. Even after a basketball 17 game, I love to see police presence directing 18 traffic, everything. 19 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Thank you. 20 THE WITNESS: I also would like to add, 21 I interviewed the Police Chief on the radio, and 22 Annie Schwartz, last Wednesday, and I asked them 23 about the word "nuisance," and she said that if 24 someone calls - - All it takes is one call. One

call to the Police Department to get someone down

1	there, and that club is considered as a nuisance
2	for that night. So I also would like We had
3	a very interesting conversation on and off the
4	air.

9	'06. That involved an incident out in the
10	street. Cars were peeling off. Were you working
11	that night?

14	MR. ARENA: So you're You saw
15	vourself in the video?
16	THE WITNESS: Yes, I did.
17	MR. ARENA: Why don't you give us your
18	story of what Well, first of all, do you
19	believe that those people all were patrons, in
20	other words, inside the club that night?
21	THE WITNESS: Well, that night we have
22	a lot of patrons that comes to the club in front
23	of the club and try to stand in front of the
24	club, and they don't be the patrons from the
25	club. So sometimes we try to get them moving on,

00150 also, but they'll walk up the street and then 1 they'll walk back. And we have that going on. But the incident with the fight going on, it was 4 - - the patron came out and it was one standing 5 outside, and they got to fighting. We broke it 6 up right away, and they was moving on, and that's 7 when the police officer had arrested him. And 8 that incident was over in just the blink of an 9 eye. 10 MR. ARENA: You're talking about the 11 April incident, though. Correct? 12 THE WITNESS: Yeah, the April one. 13 Yeah, the April incident. 14 MR. ARENA: So one of the people in 15 that video that was fighting was not a patron of 16 the club. 17 THE WITNESS: No. 18 MR. ARENA: What - - What do you 19 normally do when you're working? 20 THE WITNESS: I'm usually - - I'm 21 usually in and out of the club, you know, making 22 sure security doing what they're supposed to be 23 doing, and make sure the outside is going okay, 24 and everything. I'm usually all over the place

14	containers of liquid or alcohol, drinks, as I
15	believe the police report says.

18	the committee that Officer Deptula is lying to
19	us?
20	THE WITNESS: Well, I'm honestly tell
21	you, I do my job and I do my job well. And I've
22	been doing this for ten - 15 years, so.
23	ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Mr. Chairman.
24	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Dudzik.
25	ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Sir, are you or any

00157 1 of your staff armed in any manner, shape or form? 2 THE WITNESS: No, we're not. ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Would you feel 3 4 comfortable doing your sweeps without the fact 5 that you have six to 12 police officers in the 6 area? 7 THE WITNESS: Well, a lot of times, 8 like I said, I've been doing this for ten years, 9 and so the majority of the people that comes out 10 to the club, already know us. They - - It's like 11 one big family. So I don't feel that I'm in 12 danger. No, I don't. But a lot of - - The 13 officers are guys that - - that been knowing me 14 for many, many years, also, and, you know, they come out there. I don't - - I don't mind by them being out there as present. That's, you know, we 15 16 17 work as a team, and that's what I like. 18 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Maybe - - You're 19 going in a different direction, and I just want 20 to be - - be real clear as to what I'm asking. 21 Do you feel that you would be safe doing your 22 sweeps without the presence of police officers? 23 When I say, "safe," I'm referring to the patrons, 24 not police officers.

THE WITNESS: Yes, I do feel safe.

SCHRIMPF: Have you ever seen 23 patrons of the bar get into cars and then stop in 24 the middle of the street, and open up car doors, 25 and discharge passengers, and walk around in the

2	THE WITNESS: Yes, I have. That's at a
3	lot of clubs. All the clubs that I've been doing
4	that have even at Have a Nice Day, I was at
5	Have a Nice Day, and they've done it, too.
6	MR. SCHRIMPF: And And these are

8	THE WITNESS: Yes, they are. Yes.
9	MR. SCHRIMPF: Have you ever seen
10	patrons of the club urinate outside of the club?
11	THE WITNESS: I never saw that. Never
12	saw that, because we're out there.
13	MR. SCHRIMPF: And I want to make sure
14	that I understand something with respect to who
15	is a patron and who isn't a patron. As I
16	understood your testimony, you indicated that
17	there are some individuals who will come up and
18	park in the vicinity of the bar and not really
19	ever go into the bar, but meet or greet people as
20	they're coming out of the bar.
21	THE WITNESS: Yes.
22	MR. SCHRIMPF: You wouldn't consider
23	those patrons.
24	THE WITNESS: Those are not patrons.

14	inside the club when that occurred?
15	THE WITNESS: In between being inside
16	and outside of the club.
17	MR. ARENA: Did you see that entire
18	event occur?
19	THE WITNESS: Not the entire event.
20	But I'm usually out in the street once everybody
21	is let out.
22	MR. ARENA: Did anything happen inside
23	the club of a violent nature prior to that
24	sidewalk incident?
25	THE WITNESS: No.

00163 1 MR. ARENA: So explain to us what you 2 witnessed in that - - what - - what occurred? THE WITNESS: Like normal time, 4 everybody - - We close down one side early, so 5 that the crowd capacity leaving at 1:30 is not 6 the same - - is not as high. So people are 7 actually leaving before 1:30. And then I guess 8 around 1:30 we let everybody out, and I guess 9 there was a little confrontation on the street, 10 and he was there to handle it right away. 11 MR. ARENA: Did you recognize any of 12 the people in that confrontation as being patrons 13 of the club that night? In other words, people 14 that actually paid and entered and were actual 15 customers? 16 THE WITNESS: No, I didn't. There's 17 - - In the area there's about nine clubs, and 18 19

there's only two parking lots. Each club have an average probably about 120 people. So between the two parking lots and everybody walking back from the clubs, we're not sure who is, you know, we can't keep track of that.

24	security guys who were there break it up.

5	of the people yelling from the car?

15	the security guards, between separating
16	everybody, there was a car that just sped up, and
17	he was in He was in the street separating
18	some individuals, so.
19	MR. ARENA: Did you recognize those
20	individuals as patrons of Da Jungle that evening?
21	THE WITNESS: No, I did not.
22	MR. ARENA: Do you have a pretty good
23	idea of who the people are in the club on a night
24	to night basis?
25	THE WITNESS: Yes.

1	MR. ARENA: Why is that? How can you
2	say that?
3	THE WITNESS: We have regulars. I
4	mean, every place have their regulars. But as
5	far as everybody else, no.
6	MR. ARENA: Do you know how many people
7	specifically were involved in that incident in
8	the street that weren't patrons of the club that
9	night?
10	THE WITNESS: No, I do not.
11	MR. ARENA: Do you feel threatened when
12	you're working at Da Jungle?
13	THE WITNESS: No, not at all.
14	MR. ARENA: Nobody's ever been shot in
15	Da Jungle with a gun.
16	THE WITNESS: No.
17	MR. ARENA: Has anybody ever been
18	stabbed?
19	THE WITNESS: No.
20	MR. ARENA: Is there an uncontrollable
21	unruly crowd in Da Jungle on a regular basis?
22	THE WITNESS: Not at all. We have many
23	celebrities that come down. We have NBA players
24	that come down. We have a lot of reputable
25	people.

1	MR. ARENA: What's your interpretation
2	of what happens after you close on a Thursday
3	night?
4	THE WITNESS: It's normal procedure to
5	walk everybody out to their cars, clean up the
6	streets and make sure all the trash is off the
7	streets, and close down the bar.
8	MR. ARENA: Typically, how much trash
9	would that be?
10	THE WITNESS: Just fliers, normally.
11	Fliers and water bottles, that's it.
12	MR. ARENA: Does it fill, for example,
13	an entire, you know, maybe 20 gallon garbage bag?
14	THE WITNESS: No, not at all.
15	MR. ARENA: Do you see a lot of people
16	congregating outside after you close?
17	THE WITNESS: In between walking
18	towards the parking lot, yes.
19	MR. ARENA: And what do you do, as a
20	club, to address that issue?
21	THE WITNESS: Well, like I said before,
22	we have the security guards walk them out to the
23	cars, and then once they're in the parking lot,
24	we have them push the traffic out towards the
25	street.

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1	MR. ARENA: And I assume they're asking
2	them to leave.
3	THE WITNESS: Correct.
4	MR. ARENA: And do you participate in
5	what Mr. Willis calls the sweep?
6	THE WITNESS: Yes. Yes.
7	MR. ARENA: You've participated in
8	that?
9	THE WITNESS: Yes. And I follow
10	MR. ARENA: Have you ever felt afraid?
11	THE WITNESS: No, not at all.
12	MR. ARENA: Do you feel safer just
13	because the police are there, or would you not do
14	it if the police weren't there?
15	THE WITNESS: I would do it,
16	regardless. So, I mean, I don't feel harmed or
17	endangered in any way.
18	MR. ARENA: And how old are you?
19	THE WITNESS: I'm 28.
20	MR. ARENA: Okay. Thank you.
21	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Questions by
22	anybody on the committee? Thank you for your
23	testimony. Next witness.
24	THE WITNESS: Adam Williams, 2124 West
25	Walnut. General manager, fiance' to Jodie.

00169 1 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Your testimony, 2 please. THE WITNESS: I would just like to 4 state that I've been down there for several years 5 with her, supporting her. This is really hard on 6 her. The last time when we surrendered our team 7 night, Club Safari, where we had teens coming 8 from all the suburbs, all over the community, 9 where even though Reggie's great, we advertise on 10 103, just to have a crowd that will be acceptable 11 downtown. Alderman Bauman threatened us, said if 12 you don't surrender the teen night - - It's on 13 record - - that we'll build a case next year to 14 take your license, and he proved true to that. 15 That's how we'd like to start out. 16 Besides that, I would like to address

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Besides that, I would like to address the fact that when Mr. Don Arenson - - Anderson, our neighbor, he was a friend of Jodie's when she was partners with Tom Wackman. You know, we knew Tom Wackman's record, you know, been found guilty of racial discrimination in Eve, a block east on Milwaukee Street. Currently going through a Federal indictment for racial discrimination. I'm not surprised, since we have new clientele, which - - which are black, which are Latino, and

which are white, because she has a lot of loyal friends. She's very well respected throughout the community. The community isn't just one resident on North Broadway Street. The community is the entire city, all of the Aldermen in the community, and the downtown, I believe, belongs in most cities to all the people of that city, where there's the Bradley Center, Turner Hall, whether you're going to the Lady Bug, whether you're going to Milwaukee Street, whether you're going to Water Street, which we know - - we know how Water Street is. All the college kids going crazy in the streets, fighting, drinking, but it's acceptable violence.

In our community in our neighborhood where we share it with Mr. Don right here, what's the problem? We have security. We've gone through several security companies. We have a very good one. George does a great job. It was my understanding that we're responsible for the inside of the tavern. Since we pay taxes, once they go outside, somewhere along the lines the police have a job to do that we pay them tax money to do. But our security we pay a premium price to clear the sidewalk, to please our

neighbors, pick the trash up, be polite. Don't curse and call them bums, get out of here. Be polite. So you will hear them talking loud, because as he said, yeah, if you listen to hip-hop music, they're parking lot pimping. Everybody want to show off their big rims, want to show off their big car. We have a problem all over the north side, all over the south side. But the problem today is that the City, our country is not segregated anymore. MR. ARENA: Mr. Williams, did you - -

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THE WITNESS: So you can't state - 
Excuse me - - So you can't stick all of the black patrons and say, okay, you can kill yourselves and you can stay trapped on the north side, and all of the Latinos, stay on the south side. The whites, downtown, and then, you know, the police are okay. Then we can - - we can keep it secure. Now I may have - - be saying a few things that no one really wants to fess up to and no one wants to say or address. That's my personal belief.

Not necessarily Jodie's belief. That's my personal belief.

I'm here holding her hand when she's crying, when she's saying how can Tom Wackman be

00172 1 sued for racism. How can they make us surrender our - - our teen night, which we got authorization from the police every week for a 4 year, and then turn around and issue a teen night 5 which the Captain says is having a problem at the 6 Lady Bug. Where we weren't serving alcohol, you 7 know. We weren't serving alcohol on teen night. 8 It was locked up in the basement. There wasn't 9 any chance of a teen getting any alcohol. So 10 that's what I want to address, and that's my 11 statement, and I'll answer any questions you 12 have. 13 MR. ARENA: Thank you, Mr. Williams. 14 THE WITNESS: You're welcome. MR. ARENA: I do have some questions. 15 16 THE WITNESS: You're welcome. 17 MR. ARENA: Are you typically present 18 during the hours of operation? 19 THE WITNESS: I'm present during the 20 hours of operation. I'm there during the 21 daytime, picking up orders, receiving deliveries, 22 and also, picking up cigarette butts from our 23 neighbors who can't smoke inside their buildings, 24 so they loiter in front of our nightclub during

the daytime and park in our parking space and

2	picking those up during the daytime.
3	MR. ARENA: Were you present on April
4	28th. That, I believe, is the incident on
5	THE WITNESS: Well, you know, the
6	nights start running together, but I'm there
7	every night.

9	nights that we saw the videotape on.
10	THE WITNESS: Yeah, I was I was
11	present.
12	MR. ARENA: A gentleman that comes from

16	bathroom, making sure no one's hanging out. I'm
17	making sure the security I'm normally the one

19	let's clear the sidewalk. Let's turn the music
20	off. Let's turn the lights on.
21	MR. ARENA: Did Did you witness
22	anything that occurred on that sidewalk that we
23	saw on the videotape?
24	THE WITNESS: I mean, I saw the
25	videotape, but, like he said, you know, the

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         Bug, people come from Eve. Eve's valet even
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parks down on our - - on our streets in a empty spot if it's open early. People come from Ocean. People come from Moe's even, as far away. Wherever they can park at.

Our security, one of them got hit by a car that was speeding by, as they pointed out on the tape?

MR. ARENA: Did you witness that? THE WITNESS: I witnessed it. I was outside that night, looking, standing in the doorway, because it was a big argument, but it was people coming from different places. We wouldn't even let our customers leave, because we didn't want it to escalate. It was a Latin Night. We play Salsa, Marenga, and Reggae tone. We wouldn't even let our customers leave. We turned all the lights on, and that's - - And as you notice, it was just a couple weeks ago, there wasn't this great police presence. We called the police. I know on the tape you hear I'm screaming, "Call the f--'n cops," and, "Where the f-- are they?" But we called the police. We let that guy came in. The reason - - Or the security come back in. We called them and said come get him.

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So the fire truck, which is just a block away. I don't know how much resources they used, coming a block down, sitting there for ten minutes and pulling off. There was no one on the sidewalk. Those were our security. And a lot of the gathering they had on tape is our security. They clearly have security written on the backs of their T-shirts to identify them. They have on sneakers, because you really can't secure the area if you're wearing dress shoes. So our security wear the sneakers, and they're wearing the black T-shirts, and we make them tuck them in. They're not allowed to wear hats. They're not allowed to carry weapons. They don't even carry the big flashlights that you see at a lot of other clubs, because we don't want anyone to take it from them or hit them one night. No pepper spray, no weapons at all. So it's really - - It really is a lot of communication and how you treat people. You treat them well and communicate with them. You can pretty much diffuse any incident by just talking. But once they get outside and once we escort them to the parking lot, which is another

block, which is a block away. Once they get in

1	their car, I mean, what can we do? What can our
2	security do? They can't like follow their car.
3	We can't issue tickets. We can't control
4	traffic. All we can do is, like we said, we
5	appreciate the police officers being there. When
6	we we came to this license committee before,
7	we were told that you shouldn't be punished for
8	cooperating with the police. You should be
9	proactive. You should call them. You should
10	want them to be there. Now we're being told
11	that, well, we're going to take it your
12	money, and we're going to do everything we can to
13	close you down.
14	MR. ARENA: On June 11th, the Salsa
15	night, did you see any of the people that were
16	arguing in the street inside the club?
17	THE WITNESS: No. No, I did not.
18	MR. ARENA: What What color were
19	the people that were arguing?
20	THE WITNESS: In the street?
21	MR. ARENA: Yes.
22	THE WITNESS: I mean, black.
23	MR. ARENA: And the Salsa night, do a
24	lot of black people go to Salsa night?
25	THE WITNESS: No, they don't. They

1	don't do that. No. Not that we want to
2	segregate it, but we have a Salsa night, and
3	predominantly, I'll say 90 percent of the
4	clientele are Latinos.
5	MR. ARENA: Were there any
6	THE WITNESS: And, also, we have a DJ

8	He's also a radio personality.
9	MR. ARENA: Were there any arguments or
10	violence going on inside, that night on June
11	11th?
12	THE WITNESS: No. No, there wasn't.
13	MR. ARENA: Do you feel safe working or
14	being around the club?
15	THE WITNESS: I love Milwaukee. I feel
16	safe everywhere.
17	MR. ARENA: Do you ever participate in
18	the sweeps that go on, to get people moving
19	along?
20	THE WITNESS: I I mean, like I
21	said, I'll just keep the security motivated, and
22	make sure, you know, when he says "push," that
23	kind of gives you the idea that we're mistreating
24	our customers. We want our customers to come
25	back. Everyone's been talking about how slow it
20	Each. Everyone 2 Seen talking about now blow it

23	THE WITNESS: I am. I have kind of a
24	multi-faceted interest. I know Jodie
25	professionally. I also I've worked for her

00181 1 over the years, but I also represent college children of my own that are part of this hip-hop generation. 4 MR. ARENA: So you go to Da Jungle, as 5 a patron? 6 THE WITNESS: I do. I've patronized Da 7 Jungle over the years, and I very much enjoy the 8 Salsa night. I feel very safe in the 9 environment, and I feel very strongly that this 10 upcoming generation comes from two-family homes 11 and needs somewhere to go. And I think Jodie has 12 shown all of us over the years that she's one 13 person that can make this happen. She can handle 14 her club. She's extremely professional. She 15 treats everyone there very well, and she can do 16 it. She's - - She's doing it very well. 17 MR. ARENA: Have you ever been there on 18 a Thursday night? 19 THE WITNESS: I have, yes. 20 MR. ARENA: Do you feel unsafe when 21 you're there? 22 THE WITNESS: Absolutely not. I've never felt anything but absolutely safe, and 23 24 frankly the only thing that frightened me here is 25 that the police aren't taking responsibility for

3 MR. ARENA: What W	hat time do you

19 closing, but I've had, I'd have	to say, my
20 experience there there's been les	ss traffic than
some of the other clubs downtown	, so.
MR. ARENA: How often of	do you go out?

MR. ARENA: Do you have	e a business

10	that you own, if I could ask?
11	THE WITNESS: Art gallery.
12	MR. ARENA: And where is that located?
13	THE WITNESS: My gallery is in
14	Brookfield, but I have worked for ten years two
15	blocks away from Jodie, 241 North Broadway.
16	MR. ARENA: Okay. And what's the name
17	of that gallery?
18	THE WITNESS: Gingrass Gallery.
19	MR. ARENA: Okay. Are there any clubs
20	around that that block?
21	THE WITNESS: There's restaurants that
22	have later traffic, but Jodie's club would be the
23	closest.

25	THE WITNESS: You're welcome.

14	to, and see a lot of the places that they go.
15	And I would feel very safe sending any of them to
16	Jodie's club for a teen night, or when they're
17	old enough. Now, they're Salsa dancers. My
18	daughters would love a venue to have just go and
19	dance safely.
20	ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Thank you. You
21	You would feel safe, or you you feel safe
22	even knowing that there is a potential for
23	individuals at this club to be armed?
24	THE WITNESS: I don't think there is
25	anywhere in the City that I feel there's not a

00185 1 potential for someone to be armed around my children. You have to teach them to be safe, and you have to teach them to - - You can go to the 4 gas station and someone is armed. 5 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Would you appreciate 6 a club such as this being located in the City of 7 Wauwatosa? 8 THE WITNESS: You know, I - - If - -9 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: It's a simple yes or 10 no question. 11 THE WITNESS: - - it was handled 12 appropriately on the street when people left, 13 yes, I would, because the inner workings of this 14 club are more than safe. 15 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: So the activity - -16 THE WITNESS: I have a lot of 17 confidence in the Wauwatosa Police Department, so 18 I'd have to say yes. 19 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Okay. I have a lot 20 of confidence in the activities of the Milwaukee 21 Police Department, and I - - I'd have to say that 22 I'll put any one of our men in blue up against 23 one of your men in blue, and they'll both - -2.4 THE WITNESS: They're not my men. 25 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: They'll both handle

00186 1 the situation appropriately, I'm sure. My - - My crux of my question is, would this type of activity outside of this particular club fly anywhere in the City of Wauwatosa? 4 5 THE WITNESS: I don't think any of the outdoor activity would be allowed. 6 7 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Thank you. 8 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Any other 9 questions of this witness? Thank you. Next 10 witness, please. 11 THE WITNESS: You're welcome. 12 MR. ARENA: We're done. 13 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. Would you 14 like to give a closing statement at this time? 15 MR. BERNSTEIN: I would. Thank you, 16 Mr. Chairman. I think, Mr. Chairman, I thank 17 everyone who is here, Aldermen who have taken 18 their time to hear both sides. And I want to 19 make clear before I get into my closing 20 statements that my client has nothing personally 21 against the licensee in this matter. And I don't 22 think that there's been any testimony. As a 23 matter of fact, there's been testimony that they 24 have had an amicable relationship in the past. 25 But that's not why we're here. And I think a lot

of the testimony has been kind of to deflect why we're here. The safety in the inside of the club for patrons and the like really have no bearing on the nuisance that it is for my client. Whether he's the only person on the block is also not an issue, as I'll get to in - - in a minute.

The ordinance that we're discussing indicates three instances where a license can be revoked. First is where the license premises is operated in a manner that constitutes a public nuisance. Supreme Court of Wisconsin and State Quality Ag Farm, Inc. 104 WIS 2nd 506(1981) defined a public nuisance as "An unreasonable activity or use of property that interferes substantially with the comfortable enjoyment of life, health, safety of another or others." Case log goes on to say it is the public annoyance and not the number of people annoyed by it that constitutes a public nuisance.

The case also indicates that in determining whether there's a public nuisance the trial court, this is a Supreme Court case, and we're now in front of the Common Council, but the court must first consider the nature of the

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business or the use made of the property. The lawfulness of the business or property does not control, nor do the corrective measures applied by the owner or the operator. These are matters to consider on the ultimate issue of lack of enjoyment of life and property due to the existence, location or activity of the business.

I feel, and I hope that others on the committee will agree that the record as presented to you today clearly reflects public nuisance. I'm not going to go through all of the testimony that we've seen here today, but you have a Captain of the Milwaukee Police Department telling you that she does not have the resources to police her district, because they are consumed by this one location and the activities that flow from it. This is not a lawyer. This is not somebody involved other than somebody who is protecting us and who is unable to do her job because of the activities at this place. This is not an interested person in any other regard. If you had no other testimony here today, Captain Haynes' testimony asking you to close this place down should be enough. But we've got videos from other police officers she's had to pull from

other places. We've got video taken and not presented here by private detectives that my client hired at his own expense to try to show to you in an even-handed manner, that this is a public nuisance. We have video that his significant other has shot showing all of these things. We've gone through a lot of time and a lot of expense so that people can't come and say that, oh, it was insinuated that apparently Alderman Bauman is apparently doing something to close this place down. I don't even know what that was about.

But I tell you that every police call that they have to respond to, every blocked street they have to clear, every incident they have to investigate, every officer that takes special assignment to videotapes - - videotape the operations of this premises draws those resources from other equally deserving areas of this district, and now ultimately, the City, because apparently they're drawing resources from other districts. So it's not just District 1 that's affected. I assume it's yours, as well.

I also want to make clear that we're not arguing, which was also insinuated from the

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testimony, that Da Jungle is not entitled to protections and services of the Milwaukee Police Department. Of course, they are. And, of course, the patrons are. And there is not going to be anybody here, not on our side, and I don't think out there or any of you that would argue otherwise. They are taxpaying citizens, and they deserve the right to have police respond in a timely manner to their - - their issues, as well. And nobody would - - would argue otherwise. They, however, are not entitled to the amount of resources they're using. This is also evidenced by the fact that apparently Captain Haynes has declared this a chronic nuisance and is charging them now for their resources.

The second instance under the code where a license can be revoked is if the operations of the premises constitute a private nuisance. In the Court of Appeals in Buboltz v. Dane County, 159 WIS 2nd 284, Court of Appeals, 1990, has defined a private nuisance as, "An unreasonable interference with the interests of an individual and the use and enjoyment of the land." The court goes on to indicate that the activity complained of must create more than an

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inconvenience. It must be offensive to a person of ordinary and normal sensibilities. Well, I would say that just looking at the video with shots going off outside of your apartment, that that standard has been met.

The third manner in which the Common Council can revoke a license is if the conduct of the licensed premises has had a substantial adverse effect upon the health, safety or convenience and prosperity of the immediate neighborhood. We've heard testimony from my client, his significant other, who are living there. They fear for their safety and welfare. We've heard that there is maybe potentially property damage with regard to operation of the club. We don't know for sure. However, the adverse effect on my client's business in that the e-mail that Alderman Bauman read, we've got - He's got a tenant now that is moving out directly as a result of the conduct of this bar.

Therefore, I believe that given the totality of the evidence that you have - - that's been entered into the record today, the fact that this is a public/private nuisance and otherwise is incontrovertible. Therefore, I ask on behalf

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1	of my client, Don Arenson, your complainant, we
2	ask this committee to recommend to the Common
3	Council that the license issued to Ms. Jodie
4	Kornfehl to operate Da Jungle be revoked.
5	We further that $-$ ask that if Ms.
6	Kornfehl requests to renew her license at the end
7	of the termination period, that Mr. Arenson or
8	myself is notified of the hearing, so that we may
9	be fully apprised of the proposed use of that
10	space. And that is all I have, Mr. Chairman.
11	MR. ARENA: Mr. Chairman, I have to beg
12	the committee's indulgence. There was one point
13	that I would need my client to testify on. So I
14	I guess I would kind of need to reopen the
15	evidence. It's a brief point. I have two
16	pointed questions for her, and I think it's
17	important for the committee to hear her answers.
18	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Go ahead.
19	MR. ARENA: Ms. Kornfehl
20	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: You're under oath.
21	MR. ARENA: She's under oath.
22	How long have you been involved with
23	the business located there?
24	LICENSEE: Since 1998.
25	MR. ARENA: And prior to being served

1	with the notice When were you served with
2	this notice of this proceeding?
3	LICENSEE: Monday.
4	MR. ARENA: What was your intention as
5	to how you were going to operate the business in
6	the future, prior to being served the notice?
7	LICENSEE: I called Mr. Bauman
8	approximately three weeks ago and explained to
9	him that I was closing at the end of June, that I
10	had a potential buyer, and that the doors would
11	be closed June 30th.
12	MR. ARENA: And would it still be your
13	plan to close even without a buyer?
14	LICENSEE: Well, I don't know, because
15	I just got notice on Monday, and my buyer called
16	Alderman Bauman, and Alderman Bauman told the
17	buyer that he wouldn't give anyone playing a
18	violin a license in that building.
19	MR. ARENA: Is it your plan to close,
20	regardless, though? Was it your plan?
21	LICENSEE: Yes, it was.
22	MR. ARENA: And what were you going to
23	do?
24	LICENSEE: I was going to sell the
25	business. I had the buyer lined up. But now, I

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1	don't know what I'm going to do.
2	MR. ARENA: Will you still close?
3	Let's assume that this committee would grant your
4	license. Would you still close at the end of the
5	month?
6	LICENSEE: Yes, I would close at the
7	end of June. If I didn't receive another buyer,
8	I was going to shut it down, remodel it, change
9	the name and try to do some other things with
10	this business.
11	MR. ARENA: In other words, change the
12	format.
13	LICENSEE: Correct.
14	MR. ARENA: And that wouldn't involve
15	hip-hop music, would it?
16	LICENSEE: I mean, I can't say that it
17	wouldn't just because every ethnic group, white,
18	black, Puerto Rican, Spanish, Asian, all want to
19	hear hip-hop. So if I didn't play a couple songs
20	of hip-hop, I I would be lying.
21	ALDERMAN WADE: You can add Christian
22	to that list, too. It's Christian hip-hop, also.
23	LICENSEE: Yes.
24	MR. ARENA: I have no further
25	questions.

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1	ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chairman.
2	MR. ARENA: And I'm sorry that I didn't
3	do that sooner.
4	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: That's okay.
5	Alderman Bohl.
6	ALDERMAN BOHL: Just to A brief
7	follow-up for for the licensee.
8	LICENSEE: Yes.
9	ALDERMAN BOHL: I'm wondering what
10	prompted your change to look your desire to
11	look for a change of format?
12	LICENSEE: I just purchased I just
13	purchased another building, where I'm starting a
14	restaurant, a little night life afterwards, and
15	my intention was to sell the building. And I had
16	a buyer set up, and it didn't go through now
17	because of what Mr. Bauman told him. So now, I
18	still have to pay the rent. I'm still obligated.
19	I'm on the lease. So if I don't find another
20	buyer, I'm going to have to change the format.
21	ALDERMAN BOHL: You were looking for
22	somebody to to sublet?
23	LICENSEE: To purchase the club,
24	correct.
25	ALDERMAN BOHL: Purchase the club.

00196 1 MR. ARENA: Purchase the business and sublet the lease. ALDERMAN BOHL: Okay. 4 MR. ARENA: Because she bought another 5 building. 6 ALDERMAN BOHL: That's all. Thank you. 7 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Bauman, 8 anything you wish to add before we go - -9 ALDERMAN BAUMAN: Yeah, I - - I just 10 would like to advise the committee that, you 11 know, I - - Actually I was asked by the 12 complainant here to initiate this process, and I 13 told him I frankly could not. I had no personal 14 knowledge of any particular thing with respect to 15 this establishment. All I know is what I hear 16 from citizens who complain to me. All I know is 17 what I hear from the Police Department, which 18 this Council charges to enforce the laws and 19 investigate crimes in this City. So I pretty 20 much rely on the word of other individuals. And 21 today I've heard their sworn testimony. And 22 based on what I've heard, this isn't even a close 23 case. This is clearly a public and/or private 24 nuisance. 25 Now, whether - - Now, the fact that

1 there may be other such nuisances in the City of 2 greater degree does not eliminate the fact that this, in fact, is a nuisance, as well. And under 4 our ordinance, this place - - this license should 5 be revoked. Now apparently they want to make me 6 the issue here. That's fine. I'm a big boy. 7 have no problem with that. The simple fact of the matter is that the last - - We probably 8 9 should have objected to renewal the last time 10 around, but in the interest of promoting a 11 downtown business, who I do believe it is 12 generally run in a professional way, we agreed 13 that if they at least eliminated the teen night, 14 which isn't a licensed event, per se, because no 15 liquor is sold, as I understand it. If they agreed - - Mr. Arenson was involved, because he 16 17 lived there at the time, and everybody came to 18 the table and we basically agreed that, fine, 19 they eliminated the teen night, which had been a 20 source of considerable difficulty, nuisance 21 activity, and consumption of police resources. 22 We - - I would not object to the renewal of a 23 license. Straight out renewal. No suspensions, 2.4 no penalties, no nothing. Straight out renewal, 25 but a warning letter, despite substantial

00198 grounds, I might add, to object to renewal. 1 Promises were made. We'll do better. We'll manage more tightly. We'll beef up 4 security. We'll run a better operation. We 5 won't have a repeat of the type of complaints 6 which I have received, nor of the consumption of 7 police resources, which we now have had testimony 8 about. Not only did it not improve. It got 9 substantially worse, and in particular, 10 substantially worse in the last three months. 11 Frankly, I listened to the testimony of the 12 licensee's agents, and you would think from that 13 testimony, had you not seen videotape of 14 gunshots, had you not seen videotape of the 15 vehicular activity and the pedestrian activity, 16 you would have thought that they run a church 17 service on a Sunday morning, from how they 18 testified. And - - And I'm really sick of that, 19 with these clubs coming in. We know there's 20 problems that these clubs - - They know we know. 21 They know we know they know. And yet, they come 22 in and attempt to deny the obvious reality. 23 Instead of coming in saying, as last time, we 2.4 understand there's a problem, we're going to

implement this. We're going to implement that.

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We're going to close down for a period of time to let dust settle. We - - We'll look at changing format. Whatever the case may be.

No, it's bulldog forward and say, damn the City Council. We'll make race an issue. We'll throw that out there to try to separate people, and divide people, when the issue here is behavior. Pure and simple. Behavior. And based on the behavior that we have seen video testimony regarding, and verbal testimony regarding, from not only the complainant but the Milwaukee Police Department, the behavior without question qualifies as a nuisance, period. End of discussion. Again, that Eve is a nuisance, that Lady Bug is a nuisance. They may be nuisances, and when complaints come to my attention or evidence is collected which rises to that level, we'll be right in here seeking the revocation and/or non-renewal of those licenses, without question. My record is unblemished on that point. If there's bad behavior, I want it stopped. I don't care what your format is. I don't care who your customers are. I'm worried about behavior. I'm worried about the quiet enjoyment of the neighbors that live downtown in

1	increasing numbers, and I'm worried about the
2	impact on other businesses downtown. Pure and
3	simple. End of discussion. If your If your
4	patrons behave, I'm your best friend. If your
5	patrons can't behave, I'm your worst enemy. It's
6	just that simple.
7	LICENSEE: May I say something?
8	ALDERMAN BAUMAN: So I I do urge
9	you to revoke this license?
10	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Go ahead.
11	LICENSEE: Just real quick. After that
12	incident occurred on Saturday with the shooting
13	that you've seen on the video, we closed our
14	Saturdays down, because we don't stand for that.
15	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: This matter is in
16	committee.
17	MR. ARENA: Just let me wrap up with a
18	couple of comments, please.
19	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Okay. The last
20	word. This is the
21	MR. ARENA: And I appreciate I
22	appreciate your indulgence.
23	CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: This is the last
24	word. The last word.
25	MR. ARENA: It appears to me, if you

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look at the police record, that, in fact, what goes on inside the location is closer to a Sunday church service than not. The record doesn't support a revocation on itself.

What we're really talking about is what goes on outside. And you can plainly see in the video, that there are things going on outside, her security gets involved, does what they can do, and I point out that there's a lot of heavy concentration of night life in that area, to point out, that maybe not necessarily these people are all coming from Da Jungle. Some of them certainly are. I wouldn't sit here and tell you that they aren't, but let's face reality. We've all been downtown. People going to Kennedy's, Milwaukee Street, Eve, Tangerine, they park wherever they can find a spot. She's only a block away. They're parking there.

The parking lot on the corner, you know the people are utilizing it from other locations. 311's right there in the 500 block. You've got Lady Bug. Their capacity has doubled, nearly triple of what Ms. Kornfehl's capacity is. So I'm just pointing that out, that maybe it's not all just her. And I can tell you, and you --

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you've heard this from me before, it's true, I sympathize to some extent with what, you know, Mr. Arenson witnesses. But it may not necessarily be all of her fault. We have a downtown area that has a vibrant night life. We are going to create a slippery slope. What's going to happen next? If you want to shut it all down, that's fine. But, you know, now the Blatz is going to condos, and somebody's going to walk in there and say, well, I pay taxes and paid 300,000 dollars for my condo, and I saw somebody urinate over coming out of whatever establishment on Water Street or Milwaukee Street. So, you know, are we going to go to that point where we're going to close everything down? That's the point we're going to. In this instance, we have one complainant, one resident that lives on a traditional non-residential block. We're letting the tail wag the dog to a certain extent.

I agree with these actions when they take place in a - - in a residential neighborhood. I mean, you'll all remember a few years ago I represented a very unpopular nightclub in Alderman Pawlinski's district at the time, and neighbors came in, single family

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residents, they documented the case well. You know, the place closed. It was probably appropriate. But we have to decide what's appropriate for downtown Milwaukee now to an extent. If we're going to say these things belong downtown at night because there isn't an impact on residents, we can't turn around and close them down when their patrons create some traffic. We don't condone the shooting. She closed her Saturday nights because of it. I don't know where those shots came from. I don't know who made them. I don't know if they're a patron of hers. But that's a big burden to put on her shoulder. There's 20 to 30 people employed by this club. There's 50,000 people a year that utilize that club. And to close it down on this - - at this point with this record, to completely revoke this license, I don't think is appropriate.

This is a location that's been a nightclub for as long as I can remember. I know it was - - I think it started as the Stone Toad, eventually it was Tom-Tom Club. Jodie was involved with it. So this Council has found that location to be fit for a night spot. Think of

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that. And now, we have people coming to this nuisance and want to complain about it. When I don't think you can wholly put everything that happens on the street on her shoulders.

We have a Police Department that comes in here, and I appreciate the job they do. does, as well, but, you know, let's talk about some overkill. We conducted surveillance to determine what was happening to determine how we were going to handle the situation, is what the testimony was. They went out there on a witch hunt in response to a large amount of complaints that I would guess came from Mr. Arenson. Look in his own packet. He's e-mailing the Captain of the District. I don't have an e-mail for the Captain of any district that, you know, well, now I'm going to take that e-mail address off of that packet. I'll have it. But I don't keep track of that. What is he trying to do here? He's manufacturing complaints. He's videotaping everything. He brings the police out. And they come in here and tell you, well, we wrote 40 parking citations, and this isn't exact. I'm just speaking anecdotally here. We wrote 40 parking citations. We wrote, you know, so many

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traffic citations. They're making illegal left U-turns. Oh, those terrible patrons of hers. That's all in an effort to create a record, to bring this here to you today.

And really look at her record of how she really runs her business. There's 12 security personnel. There isn't violence going on inside. You know, this isn't a, you know, three people were shot coming out of the men's room, or somebody was accosted. Little incidents happen. They do. Alcohol is involved. But that's not an overly terrible record that she has for how she conducts her business. And just at what point does the licensee have power over somebody who is hanging around in a parking lot. You can put up a sign and say "no loitering." Please don't loiter. And that guy can say, hey, up yours. I'll do what I want, lady. And she has no control. Her security has no control. They have no control over anybody once they're on the street. She does her best to control what's inside, you know, her plan is actually to close, and I - - I believe that. I've been working with her over the last several days in coming up with some alternative here. That hasn't been

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formatted yet. But something's going to change, because, for one, she doesn't like the stress of having to be here to answer to this. Not that she feels that her club is unsafe and that her patrons are terrible. It's that this is stressful. This woman has a large investment in this club. This club supports her and her children. She paid 30,000 dollars in taxes last year to the City of Milwaukee. She owns her home in the City of Milwaukee. And I think that all needs to be considered.

There's a list, and I don't say that these clubs are bad. I don't say they're doing anything wrong. But this is what's within a two block radius. A place called Taste, Eve, they have dancing, cabaret, Lady Bug, very large club, Three, Tangerine, Kennedy's, Sock it To Me, and Lex. That's just a quick put-together list. But yet all the parking problems and traffic problems have to be the fault of Jodie Kornfehl on Thursday nights when everybody parks all over downtown.

You know, last night was Jazz in the Park. I did go to that area, not to go to Jazz in the Park, but I'll tell you what, good luck

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finding a place to park. You could have been parking nine, ten, 12 blocks away, and having to hike it. And that's what goes on in the City. We all know it.

So I'm suggesting and asking this committee to not take revocation as an action in this case. We all know that there's other avenues. There should be some form of progressive discipline. She's been there since 1998. You know, if you want to see if she's' really serious about getting her format changed and doing whatever, a suspension is more than adequate, if you feel that's appropriate. I still don't feel that's appropriate, but I understand how that comes about. You know, there's many other locations which with much more problems. I've represented some of them. Some of them with shootings, underage people, dealing drugs in the place. I believe that individual was given a 40 day suspension. And, you know, here we are saying, well, the police manufactured all this stuff and they spent all this money, some of it, was it really all warranted or was that in an effort to show. Because, you know, they testified that not anybody else has ever

00208 1 gotten a bill or has anybody kept track of what happens when police respond. So, you know, I think you have to consider those issues, and I'm 4 going to ask you to, and I'm going to ask you not 5 to revocate this license. Thank you. 6 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: This matter is in 7 committee. 8 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Mister - - Mr. 9 Chairman. 10 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Dudzik. 11 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: I don't know where 12 this committee will go with this revocation. But 13 I will tell you one thing. As soon as I leave 14 this table, I'm going to go down to my office and 15 call Nan Haggerty and demand that the 11th 16 Aldermanic District receives the same amount of 17 police attention that Alderman Bauman's District 18 gets. Because I can tell you from personal 19 observation, and I have a club in my district, 20 maybe not as large, but just as active as this 21 one, and when there was a stabbing there, not too 22 long ago, it took hours for a police squad to 23 show up. Disgusts me.

 $\hbox{ If this young lady is closing and --} \\ \hbox{and moving, I pray to God she moves into}$ 

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00209 1 Wauwatosa. My personal opinion is that my District - - my City should be no less safe than the City of Wauwatosa or any other community in 4 the State of Wisconsin. Unfortunately, places 5 like Wauwatosa won't even let you come in there. 6 Again, I don't know where this is going to go, 7 whether this deserves a revocation, but I guarantee you that if it doesn't at least get a 8 9 severe, very severe suspension, I won't support 10 it. Thank you. 11 ALDERMAN WADE: Mr. Chair. 12 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: We're in 13 committee. Alderman Wade. 14 ALDERMAN WADE: It's a few things I 15 have to speak on here, because - -16 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: I'll tell you what 17 I'd like to do. I'd like to see a motion put on 18 the table, and then we can speak on the motion. 19 That's what I - - That's what I ask for. And 20 then we can give all of our opinions. 21 ALDERMAN WADE: I'm prepared to make a 22 motion for a 90 day suspension. 23 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Motion by Alderman Wade is to - - for a 90 day suspension, based on 2.4

items contained in the police report - -

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00210 1 ALDERMAN WADE: And testimony heard 2 here. CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: - - and testimony 4 that we have heard during this hearing today. On 5 the motion. 6 ALDERMAN BOHL: Mr. Chairman, on the 7 motion. 8 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Bohl. 9 ALDERMAN BOHL: Ever so briefly, I will 10 not support the motion. I will support nothing 11 short of a revocation of the license. I - - You 12 know, the - - the one thing that - - that I heard 13 from - - from a downtown standpoint, this 14 establishment is isolated. Yes, you have - - you have the Lady Bug Club. The Lady Bug Club is a 15 16 block west, and literally probably better than a 17 half block to a full block fully south. You talk 18 about the establishments that are Three and Eve, 19 literally a block east, and better than probably another good half block to two-thirds of a block 20 21 fully north. From a practical standpoint, this 22 is pretty isolated, and I think from the evidence 23 of the tape that was provided here, at least the 24 nuis - - I didn't see anybody coming from what 25 would have been west, that was - - that was

1 creating havoc and loud noise and whatever else. I think the Captain's testimony is - is very, very strong here in terms of what she 4 experiences. She's Captain of the entire 5 downtown area. I trust full well that the 6 Captain is not segmenting out one group because 7 they predominate from one racial group or 8 another. And frankly, the - - any - - any person 9 who makes that comment disgusts me, that plays 10 the race card. I agree fully with Alderman 11 Bauman, that the behavior of citizens - - Because 12 I've gone to hip-hop clubs and I've gone to other 13 clubs, as well, too. And it's the behavior that 14 - - that delineates the line between what is 15 acceptable and what is not acceptable. And it 16 just - - It really gets my goat when somebody 17 plays the race card and uses that excuse, as 18 well, too. There's no excuse, whether somebody 19 comes from a country bar or a hip-hop bar or any 20 other type of club to run around, to blast music, 21 to screech tires, to mill around, to scream, to 22 yell, fistfight, to shoot guns, to whatever else. 23 There's no reason that we need to, in the 2.4 Captain's own word, provide that much attention 25 to one club. And she represents all the others.

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I'm going to tell you, I know that Water Street isn't angel's paradise, that this isn't heaven on - - on wheels. At the same point I didn't hear the Captain say that she needed to provide the resources there. She indicated that this is the number one problem in her District, which is the downtown District. Those are her words, not mine. I just find it disgusting when we provide that much attention to one establishment, and we're pulling squads from everywhere else. It's just - - It's wrong. It's wrong. The fact of the matter is, is that there were promises last year that, you know, we're going to revise this. We're going to come up with this. We're going to come up with a clean plan.

You know, I agree with you, that not everything on this police report is the worst thing in the world. Then again, this police report is plenty long, and I'll tell you that one of the difficulties are when you have officers that are spread so thin, it's difficult to sit there and stand around and wait for the first guy that throws a punch and have somebody there, pulling them aside, arresting them and have - -

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and having something. Does it mean that doesn't go on? Does it mean that it's not a nuisance to individuals who live there? Whether this is a primarily residential neighborhood or not, Mr. Arenson and anyone else who may live in that area and have a residence there deserve the same peaceful enjoyment of their - - if their - - of their home as much as anybody who lives in a residential neighborhood that's primarily resi - - residential and single family.

The fact is that the activities and behavior here are just unbecoming of any establishment anywhere in the City. And - - And I'm very candid along with the lines of Alderman Bauman, you show me this evidence anywhere, whether it's a country bar or whatever else, I'll - - I'll move to yank their license there. I'll move to yank their license there. I'll do it everywhere. Because the fact is, we've got to just stop defending people and saying, oh, the kids, you know, where will they go? Well, you know what, when they learn to grow up and say, gee, it's been real fun. I enjoyed my time at the establishment. Just like I acted in the establishment, I'm going to walk to my

1 car, leave. And, you know, if we want to go to 2 my house, continue to have a drink or two there, we're not going to do it on the street. We're 4 not going to decide to cruise down to Capitol 5 Drive, get out on our cars and start dancing on 6 the hoods and pretend that that's the club. When 7 people start to - - to know when the night ends 8 and when the enjoyment period needs to come, is 9 when we will have a City that is not going to 10 drive residents out. But we're going to have a 11 City where we're going to have fewer shootings. 12 We're going to have a City where we don't drain 13 police resources all the place everywhere. 14 Nobody wants to call for that responsibility. 15 The fact is I will. Let's be responsible all the 16 time. Stop making excuses and saying, gee, the 17 young kids have nothing to do. Well, at four 18 o'clock in the morning I don't care if you're 18, 19 16 or 21, get your butts in bed. Stop dancing on 20 the darn streets in your car playing music, 21 driving over medians. I'm not going to call 22 somebody a thug for that. I'm going to call them a moron. Stop acting like morons in this City, 23 2.4 and we'll stop shutting down the clubs that you 25 hang out in.

00215 1 ALDERMAN WADE: Mr. Chair. 2 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Wade. ALDERMAN WADE: I'm going to move away 4 from Alderman Bohl here, because I don't want him 5 - - I don't want him to throw up on me, because I'm definitely going to talk about that race 7 issue, because I'm obligated to. Now, I - - It's 8 very easy for white men to sit around and say 9 that race is not an issue, and it detests them, 10 and so on and so forth. But I'm going to 11 guarantee you, you're not going to hear too many 12 black men say that. Now, I'm a Alderman, a 13 elected official in the City of Milwaukee, and I 14 go into establishments in Milwaukee every day, 15 the airport, bars downtown, restaurant, and me 16 being black is an issue in there. And I feel 17 that. And it's real. So those of you who think 18 racism in Milwaukee don't exist, let me be the 19 first to tell you that it is alive and well in 20 the City of Milwaukee. So, race - -21 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Listen - - Hold on 22 a second. Anybody makes a sound in that audience 23 is going to leave this room. Possibly, by the 24 escort of somebody from the Police Department. 25 It's totally out of line. Totally uncalled for.

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And I won't put up with it. Do you understand, everybody out there? I don't want any reaction from anybody in this audience. Please continue, Alderman.

ALDERMAN WADE: Thank you. Let me just talk about race being a issue for a minute. It's people who work for the City of Milwaukee, who speak to me when they see me in my suit, and see me as Alderman Wade, and they see me other places and walk right past me like I'm invisible. I'm not whining and crying about that. I could care less if a person is racist or not. That's their business. I just don't want them to do anything illegal. But that's part of the reality that I have to live with on a daily basis. And it's fine with me. I have no problem with it. If that's how you want to act and behave, fine. But to say that race is not an issue, the way that we divvy up our resources, how we carry out the law, the police officers that are black, the firefighters that are black, the attorneys that are black, the millionaires in the City that are black, will tell you that it is an issue. So if that's going to make somebody throw up, they need to get to throwing up. That's the reality that

we live in. And I have to speak on that. And am I mad about it or upset about it? Just so the white people know it's part of the reality of being black in the City of Milwaukee. We have to deal with it every day. Nobody's crying about it. We're dealing with it. And it's going to happen when it comes to this - - these committees. Aside from that, I'm off of that, Alderman Bohl, and I know you - - you - - you know - - you know, it's - - this is nothing that I'm trying to - - I'm just expressing myself.

I feel exactly the way he feels about some of the behavior of our young people. The whole excuse of we don't have anything to do is wearing thin on me, also. My constituents are crying because they don't feel safe. We're talking about loitering outside of a club where one individual lives, no disrespect to you, sir, your - - your comfort is important. But we got this loitering going on in my neighborhood in my District on a daily basis, at right now, it's a group of kids outside of somebody house, loitering. That's intimidating that person. That's real life situations that we have to deal with. Now, this lady has a business downtown.

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Everybody who gave testimony, no one talked about how she ran her business. No one talked about the good business person she was. Just some of the notes that I wrote down, we said the - - fights - - Fights happen in liquor establishments all the time. Fights happen at the Brewers game, the Bucks game, State Fair, Summerfest. We're not talking about taking their liquor license. It's part of it. That's why we have police.

The person who got hit. We made a big deal about the ambulance, the resource. It was somebody who worked for her who got hit by a car. The big fight with 15 people fighting, maybe I'm blind. I saw a scuffle. In my eye it was - - It wasn't even a fight. I didn't see any blood. What - - The person got apprehended and took away. I didn't see 15 people fighting. That's not what I saw. Some of the other stuff. No gun play inside of her club was reported. We've renewed license on people who have had shootings inside of their clubs.

This gentleman right here, fine gentleman, good citizen, has every reason in the world to complain, and I - I sympathize with you. You have a legitimate case. Everything you

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say is 100 percent legitimate. It is. But there are some other factors that we have to weigh in here when we talk about going from last year, she came in here and got a warning letter, a warning letter, and agreed to change her - her teen night. She changed the teen night. We come in 365 days later, and we want to revoke her license? If we got issues with the police and nuisance, she should be given the opportunity to deal with those issues. She not even getting a chance to deal with the issues.

Okay. My biggest beef about all of this is the amount of police resources that's going to it. I got a huge problem with that. That's ridiculous. The owner of the club needs to understand that that's something that cannot be tolerated. The tax payers just cannot afford to have - - let you have personal police service like that. We can't afford it. You need to be clear on that. And you need to do what you need to do that that's not the case. But I think she deserves to be given the opportunity to make that adjustment.

Some of the stuff that was talked about in here was exaggerated. The tape  $\operatorname{didn't}$  - - I

was expecting something else on the tape. It was exaggerated. Now, the gunshots, that's real. The 15 person fight was a little scuffle. All of the traffic and so on and so forth, I didn't see anybody have any problem - - If you've seen cruising, now that's a problem. This - - This right here was a small - - People could go around. Take their time. Yeah, there was some people acting and behaving and parking. Yeah, but that - - But to be honest, most people in this room know that that's normal in a drinking city like Milwaukee at bar time. That's normal. It goes on all around.

The last thing I want to say - - Well, two other things. Number one, the tenant that's - - that's leaving. The tenant's business stops at eight o'clock. This lady's business starts at ten o'clock and the issues that we have with her go on at one to two a.m. Now if this person lives in the building like this gentleman does, he has a legitimate issue. I don't know if he lives in the building or not. Does he live in the building? He does not. If he does not live in the building, how in the world is what's going on at two - - one and two a.m. impacting this

00221 individual. That's a stretch for me. Now, 90 1 days is, to me, that's excessive. That's more than what we should be doing, but the amount of 4 resources that we going through dealing with your 5 establishment, I can't justify to my constituents 6 who pay huge taxes, whose assessment is going up, 7 who can't get a police. I can't explain to them 8 why it's necessary for you to have seven every 9 Thursday night like they individually work for 10 you. That's why I think 90 days is enough time 11 for you to look at the reality of what you're 12 dealing with, do what you need to do, regroup, 13 redesign, and make sure that our police resources 14 are - - are freed up. That's my reason for the 15 90 day suspension, and at this point I'll get off 16 of my soap box. 17 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Any further 18 discussion on the motion? 19 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: Mr. Chairman. 20 CHAIRMAN WITKOWIAK: Alderman Dudzik. 21 ALDERMAN DUDZIK: I quess I - - I've 22 sat here long enough to now hear an Alderman 23 state that shootings happen. It was with regards 24 to a club a few years ago. Now, fighting

happens. I just can't accept that type of

25

mentality, and it doesn't have anything to do with race for me. It's not right, whether you're Latino, black, Hmong, white, I don't give a rat's patootie. And - - And one thing I want to address with regards to the counselor's comments that these - - that these items were manufactured. If they were manufactured by anybody, they were manufactured by your client. The police - - I'm not going to deny, the police spent an exorbitant amount of effort and resource capturing what was going on there. But it wasn't manufactured by the Police Department.

And I - - I'm going to say what I said earlier. I'm calling the Chief. Because if this is the type of response that Alderman Bauman can get for what I saw today, I got - - I got a bar in my District that I demand to have this type of resources expended on it. It's just ridiculous that we're spending this type of police presence on something that is inappropriate, but not anywhere near any different than what's going on in my District. I - - I just find it bizarre how the 11th Aldermanic District has - - has a stabbing and we can't get a police officer, but Alderman Bauman has some light cruising and a

scuffle, a shooting that may be linked to this particular location, and they've got six squads there, police surveillance. I mean, this is reminiscent of - - of surveillance that I saw that my father took during the riots, and - - and I just - - I'm - - I'm appalled by what - - what's going on in the downtown area, but I'm also appalled by the fact that the Chief, who constantly calls for more police officers, would expend this type of energy on this particular location.

If this is going to spiral out of control further than what it is, then let it be so, and - - and then we'll have all of the information, all the necessary reasons to have this particular location deemed a - - a nuisance, and have it eliminated from the licensing process altogether for the next three years. I - I don't - I'm still convoluted as to just how far we should go as far as our - - our sanctions are. I guess I'll wait and see what the roll call is, but this is just - - this is just too bizarre for me. Thank you.
