Introduction

- Context for study: the potential for the Residents Preference Program (RPP) and other
 community participation programs to provide employment opportunities for low-income
 city residents (particularly minorities) during a period of major downtown redevelopment
- Key research questions:
 - o What are the tangible results of the RPP and other community participation programs over the last five years in terms of numbers of Milwaukee residents gaining employment, the socioeconomic and racial characteristics of those residents, and any longer-term outcomes that can be identified with regard to permanent employment and other benefits?
 - o What are the objectives of these programs and are they designed and administered appropriately to meet those objectives? What changes in scope or operations could be considered to improve their effectiveness and to enhance participation by people of color?
 - Are there best practices from other cities that should be considered by Milwaukee officials to enhance the effectiveness of existing community participation programs and/or to implement new policies/programs that will link public investments to jobs for city residents?
