Executive Summary: Public Health

- Home visitation programs address prematurity, but limited resources result in modest City-wide impact
- 2. Teen birth rate decline is a promising "lead indicator" for reducing poverty
- 3. Ethnic disparities in STD prevalence are extreme
- City continues to be a national leader in lead poisoning prevention

Overview

- Home Visitation Programs continues to show positive outcomes; Nurse turnover rates are affecting capacity
- Infant Mortality Rate continues to decrease overall but ethnic disparities remain
- Percentage of premature and low birthweight continues to be a challenge
- Teen Birth Rates has shown improvement
- Cribs for Kids and Strong baby initiative are expanding

MHD Premier Home Visitation Programs Program Highlights 2014-2015

Empowering Families of Milwaukee, Nurse-Family Partnership, and PNCC programs:

2014

- Received 520 referrals for home visitation services
- Served 442 families through almost 6,700 face-to-face home visits
- Enrolled 99% of women prenatally
 - 25% in 1st Trimester
 - 44% in 2nd Trimester
 - 31% in 3rd Trimester



2015

- Received 325 referrals for home visitation services
- Served 354 families through almost 5,181 face-to-face home visits
- Enrolled 94.2% of women prenatally
 - 16.7% in 1st Trimester
 - 50.0% in 2nd Trimester
 - 27.5% in 3rd Trimester




Infant Mortality Rate (per 1,000 live births)


Percentage of Children Born Premature

Percentage of Children Born Low Birthweight






Teen Birth Rates Ages 15-19 (per 1,000 Teen Girls 15-19)

Strong Baby Sanctuary




- Churches agree to be a safe place for pregnant women and families to go for resources
- Resource training provided in partnership with MHD, CSM, MOD and UWGM
- Connects pregnant women and families with a local community support network to increase healthy birth outcomes

- 10 area churches joined the Strong Baby Sanctuary initiative in 2015
- Goal for 2016 is to double the number of churches participating while expanding to the south side
- Last meeting was held in May, 2016

Milwaukee Cribs for Kids







- 806 families received safe sleep education and safe sleep environments
- MPD Partnership
 - Expansion of MPD District 7Cribs for Kids program
 - Districts 2 and 3 now providing cribs to families
 - All sworn in officers received infant mortality training at Fall In-service

Milwaukee and Comparative Data Overview:

- Compared to other cities Milwaukee does moderately well
- There is a significant disparity across aldermanic districts but concentration of challenges within certain districts














HIV Rates (per 100,000 of population)




Chlamydia Rates (per 100,000 of population)







Office of Violence Prevention Trauma/Youth Violence

Status of City/County – District 7 Response

- Trauma Response/Community Policing
 - 110 referrals (April 2016)
 - Average of 10 youth per month
 - MUTT TRT has trained over 95% District 7 officers in small group settings

Youth Violence

- Youth Violence Prevention Manager and Coordinator hired (anticipated start date June)
- □ Discussion with Prevention Institute for city wide violence prevention blueprint planning process. (July-Dec)
- Safe Zone RFP Released for priority neighborhoods
- Supporting city and community based Safe Summer activities
