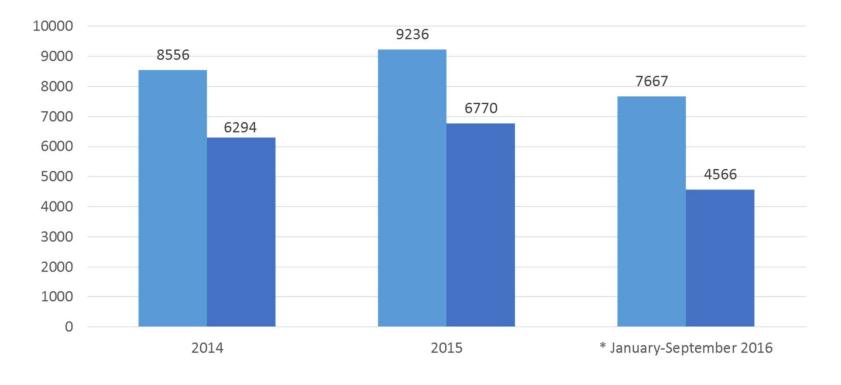
- Community Health Assessment Released April 2016

Total # of Inspections (all types)





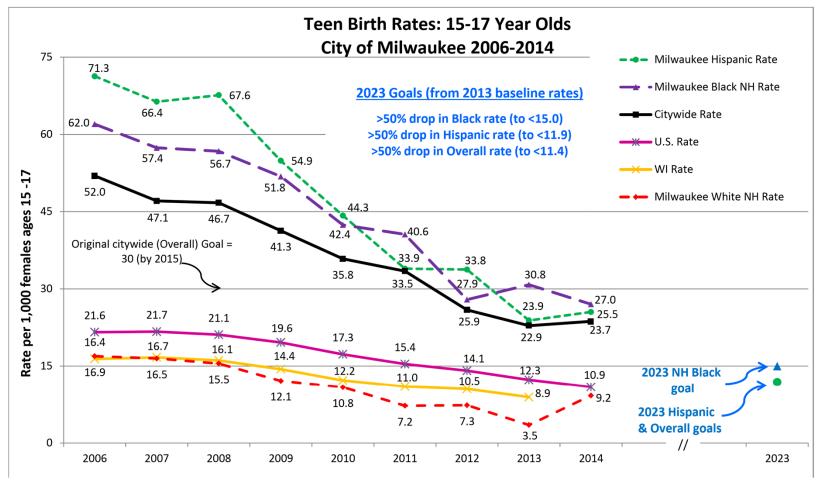

 - 1,399 screenings performed in 2015, exceeding goal of 900

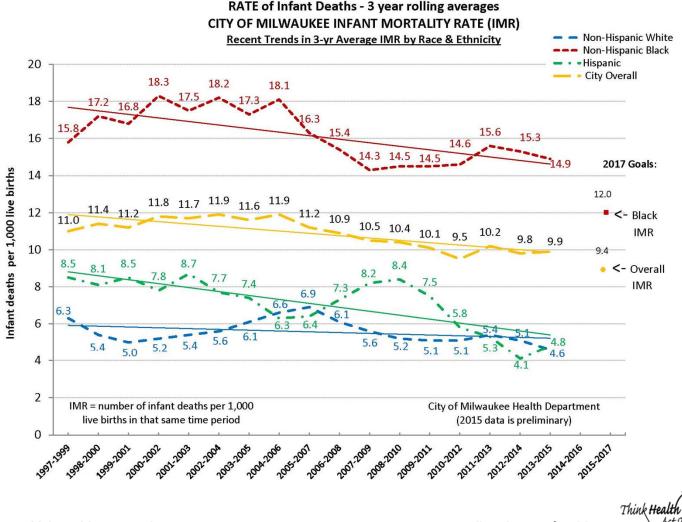
Division of Family & Community Health: Teen Pregnancy Prevention



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Division of Family & Community Health: Infant Mortality

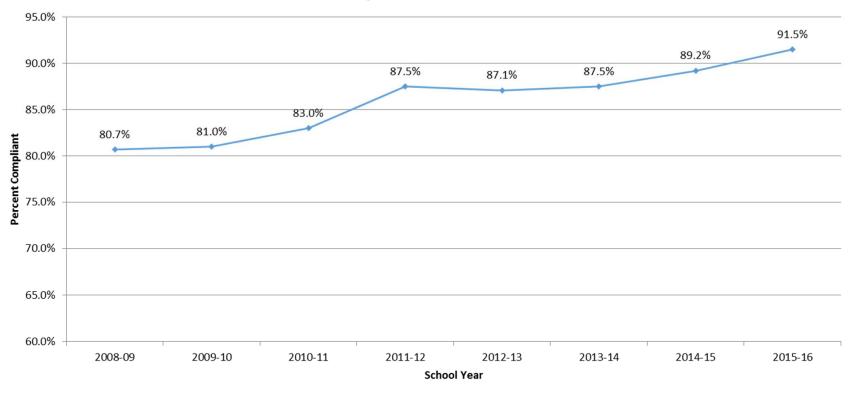

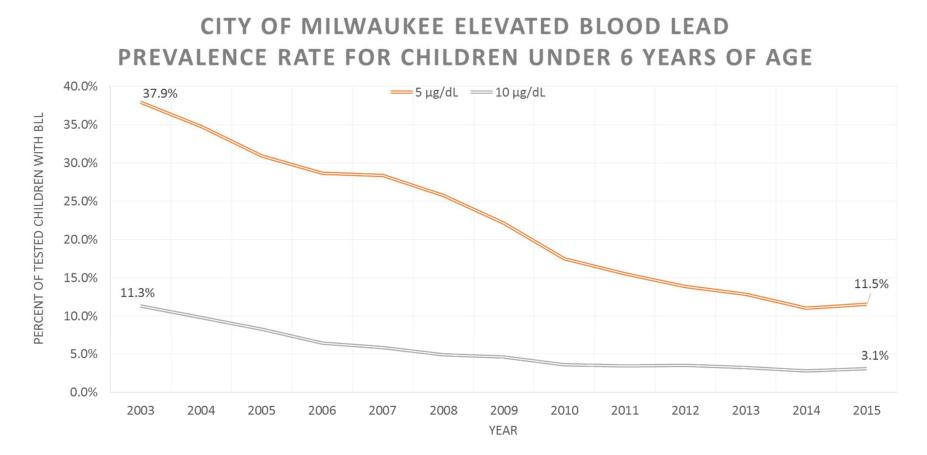
Division of Disease Control & Environmental Health: School-Required Immunizations

Immunization Law Compliance Rates for Milwaukee Schools





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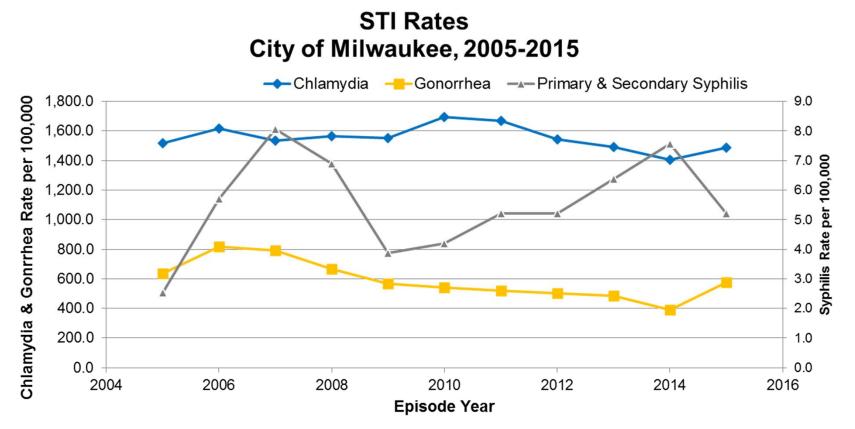

Trauma Response Initiative

- June 2015 August 2016: 240 referrals
- Majority result of battery/domestic violence
- District 7 refresher trainings, District 5 under consideration
- Safe Zone Initiative
 - Garden Homes = 176 contacts made, 4 conflicts interrupted, 31 hot spots identified
 - Franklin Heights = 260 contacts made, 12 conflicts interrupted, 7 hot spots identified
- ReCAST Grant
 - Community Needs Assessment to begin 2016
- Youth Development & Violence Prevention Plan
 - November 2016 Prevention Institute planning process

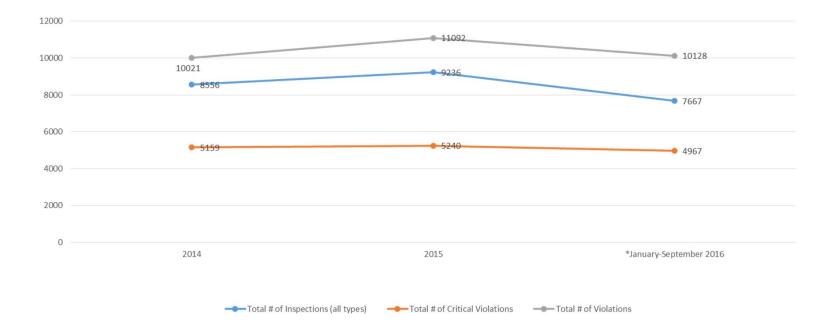


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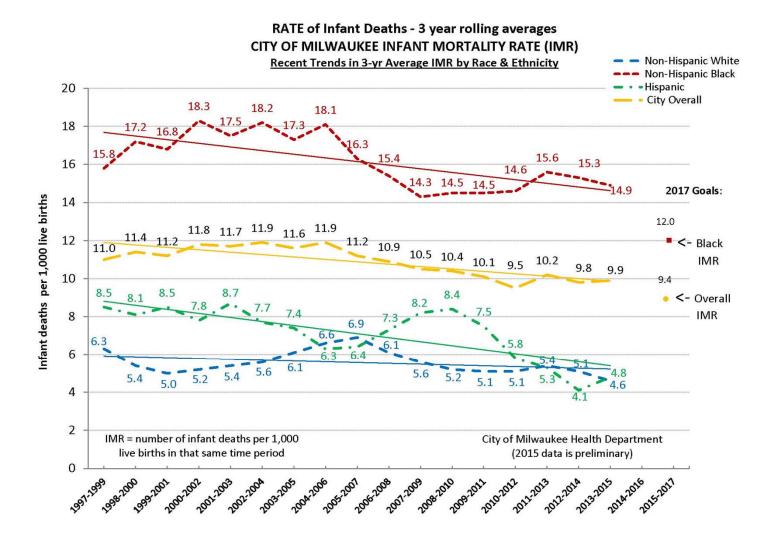

Infant Mortality Trends

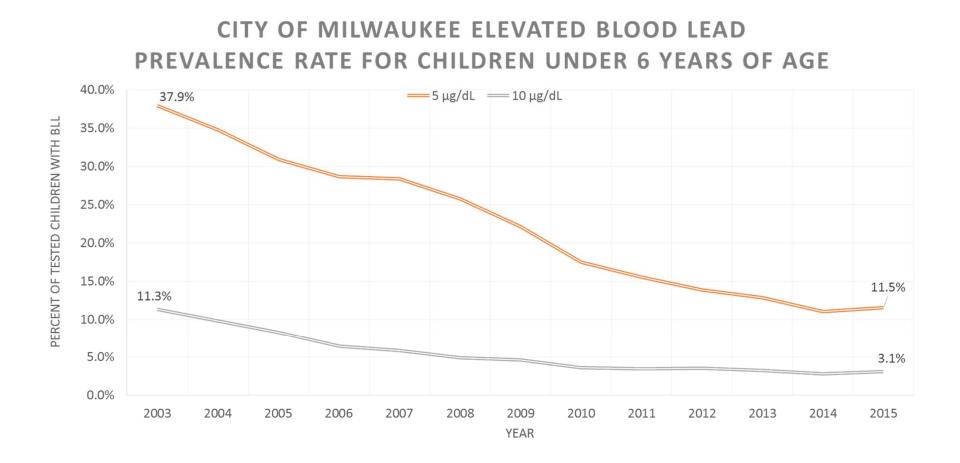

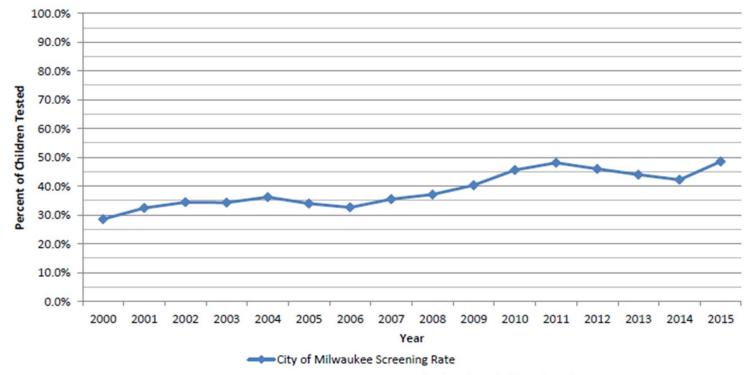

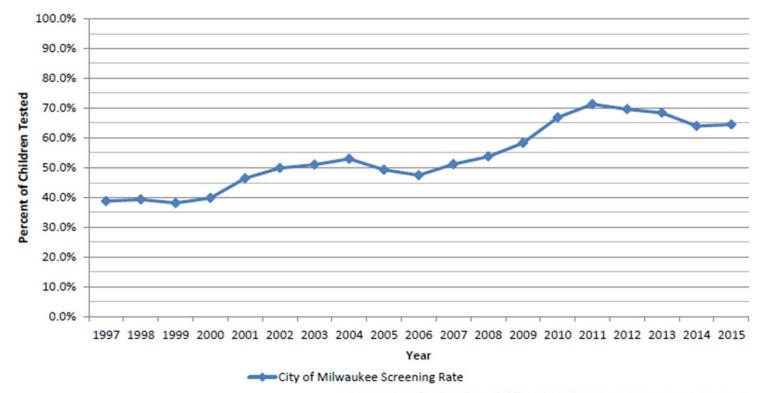
