### Key Operating Budget Changes & Highlights

- \$630,000 in savings anticipated from rate adjustment for street lighting electricity
- Reflects Reclassification of Digger's Hotline locators from Electrical Workers to Locating Technicians
- Reorganization of Transportation Operations section will utilize increased grant funding to create Multi-Modal Unit responsible for bicycle, pedestrian and traffic calming efforts
- Reduced Personnel Cost Adjustment to reflect recent experience
- Reclassification of Electrical Mechanics to Municipal Services Electrician

## Infrastructure Capital Highlights: Paving

- Expanded High Impact Streets Program
  - Over 90 miles improved through Local and High Impact Program 2015-2017
  - Less than 50 miles would have been improved through traditional reconstruction
  - 2016 Call Center requests to fill potholes down significantly from 2014 (highest year)
- \$16 million for Local and High Impact Streets
  - Increase from \$15.6 million in 2016
  - 6 miles improved through Local Streets Program
  - 24 miles improved through High Impact Streets Program

## Infrastructure Capital Highlights: Bridges, Street Lighting

- Bridges- \$6.9 million
  - 2<sup>nd</sup> Phase of funding for S. 1<sup>st</sup> St. over KK River Rehab
  - Declining State aid for bridge replacement and rehabilitation will put pressure on Cityfunded Bridge Program
    - No State funding received from WisDOT for Local Bridge Program for 2019-20 funding cycle
- Street Lighting
  - 77,642 Total Lights Maintained by DPW
    - 25,971 Series System (35% to be completed)
    - 42,879 Multiple System (65% completed)
  - Series Circuit Conversion
    - Approximately 1% of system is replaced from series to multiple per year.
    - Reduction of outages by 20%
  - LED lamp conversion
    - Series conversion projects
    - Reconstruction projects
    - Concurrently working with ECO to identify and secure additional grant funded projects.

## Infrastructure Capital Highlights: Other

- Use of carryover balances
  - Street Lighting \$5m; Major Streets \$4m; Underground Conduit \$2m; Communication Manhole Repair \$500k
- Increase to Special Assessments proposed
  - Alley recovery rate increased to 50%
  - Sidewalk recovery rate increased to 50%
- Electrical and Communication Manhole Repair
  - Manhole replacement/repair cost:
    - 2014 by contractor:
      - Replacement \$29,236 each.
      - Repairs \$4,333 each.
    - 2016 by City forces
      - Replacement approx.\$5,800 each.
      - Repairs Approx. \$4,250 each

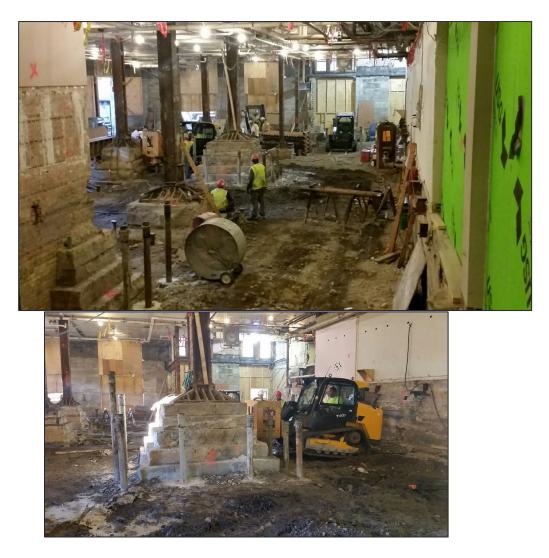

## **Facilities Capital Highlights**

- \$2.2 million for DPW-Facilities in 2017 excluding Foundation Restoration and ADA Compliance
  - \$4.8 million in 2015
- \$1.5 million for Facilities Systems & Facilities Exterior Programs
  - \$400,000 for window repair at NW Garage and Municipal Services Building
  - \$600,000 for non-programmed mechanical, electrical and building exterior repairs
- \$250,000 for MKE Plays Initiative

## **City Hall Foundation Repair Project**

- \$13 million included in 2017
  Proposed Budget for Phase
  2 of project
- Total project cost: \$53 million to \$60 million
- Work began February 2016
  - Phase 1: Northwest Section of City Hall
  - Piling installation complete in NW quadrant
- Long-term repair- estimated
  100 year service life



#### 2016 Bicycle, Pedestrian Safety Accomplishments

#### Bublr Bike Share System Expansion

- 50 stations will be operating in the City by end of 2016
- 59,661 trips (Jan. 1 through Sept. 30, 2016)

#### New / Upgraded Bike Lanes Completed (24.85 new centerline miles)

- 12 segments completed with High Impact Paving Program
- 2 segments completed with Major Capitol Projects
- 32 segments/intersections completed with a federal CMAQ project
- TOTAL bicycle lane centerline mileage = 112 miles
- Safety improvements at RR crossings on S. Water St. scheduled late Fall

#### Pedestrian Safety Improvements

- 10th/Oklahoma School Crossing (curb extensions)
- N. 2nd / W. Pleasant St. Crossing (curb extensions with TID funding)
- Accessible Pedestrian Signals (APS) installed at 4 intersections
- Raised intersection on W. Pierce at S. 37th St. (part Zilber Foundation funding)
- W. Becher St. at S. 7th, 8th, 10th Streets (curb extensions)





#### 2017 Planned Bicycle, Pedestrian Safety Work

- Initiate Phase 2 Bike Share CMAQ grant station planning work (\$1.9 million CMAQ grant awarded in 2016)
- 3 6 new miles of bicycle lanes anticipated with Major Capitol Projects, draft High Impact Program projects
- Start Design phase of N. Fratney/E. Wright Bike Boulevards project with consultant help (federal Transportation Alternatives grant awarded in 2016)
- Install bicycle bridge plating on N. Emmber and N. Plankinton bridges (federal TAP grant)
- Significant work on Pedestrian Transportation, Safe Routes to School, and Coordinated Trail/Bicycle Facilities Signage Plans (federal TAP grants)
- Additional APS upgrades slated for 3 5 intersections (annual target)



#### **Gateway Project**



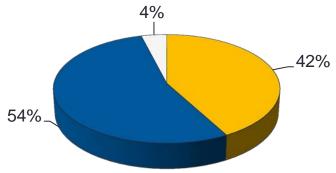
- Substantial completion this year with finishes in Spring 2017
- New bicycle and pedestrian way with increased connectivity
- Continued momentum in 2018 with Cass and Michigan Streets reconstruction in coordination with the Couture and Streetcar Lakefront Line.
