- 1. This amendment transfers an additional \$500,000 from the Parking Fund to the General Fund for a total 2009 transfer of \$17.5 million.
- 2. The additional transfer requires recognition of revenues by the Comptroller.

The paint is peeling and dirty, providing an unsafe appearance. White glossy paint will be applied to provide increased lighting levels and brighten the structure's entire appearance.
- 3. This project does not have a property tax levy impact. The costs associated with project are funded by the Parking Fund.

This amendment eliminates \$290,000 in capital funding for the MacArthur Square Plaza Renovation Program.

AMENDMENT INTENT

This amendment adds position and funding authority for one Mini-Concrete Crew, one Crackfill Crew and one Sidewalk Grinder Crew.

BACKGROUND

The makeup, function and recent funding history of Mini-Concrete, Crackfill and Sidewalk Grinder Crews are as follows:

➤ Mini-Concrete Crew

- *Makeup*: This 3-person crew consists of an Infrastructure Repair Crew Leader, a Cement Finisher and a City Laborer.
- Function: A Mini-Concrete Crew removes and installs small areas of concrete pavement and sidewalks. This seasonal work can be performed approximately 8 months of the year.
- Recent Funding History: A crew was eliminated in both 2003 and 2005 and a crew was restored in 2006. There are currently 2 Mini-Concrete Crews.

Crackfill Crew

- *Makeup*: This 4-person crew consists of an Infrastructure Repair Crew Leader, an Infrastructure Repair Worker and 2 City Laborers.
- *Function*: A Crackfill Crew performs pavement crack filling and sealing operations for approximately 7 months of the year.
- *Recent Funding History*: A crew was eliminated in 2003. Since that time, there has been a single Crackfill Crew.

➤ Sidewalk Grinder Crew

- Makeup: This 2-person crew consists of an Infrastructure Repair Worker and a City Laborer.
- Function: A Sidewalk Grinder Crew removes concrete sidewalk surfaces utilizing grinding equipment for approximately 7 months of the year.
- *Recent Funding History*: The sole Sidewalk Grinder Crew was eliminated in 2005 and then restored in 2006, though the department may utilize this crew as-needed in other areas.

DISCUSSION

AMENDMENT INTENT

This amendment eliminates \$46,000 in tax levy funding for the restoration of 11 miles of bicycle lane markings.

BACKGROUND

A majority of funding for bicycle lanes and trails comes from federal and state sources, including the Surface Transportation Program, Transportation Enhancement funds and Congestion Mitigation & Air Quality grants. This grantor funding typically requires some level of local participation, most commonly a 20% match. In addition, the City may include some level of individual support for bicycle lanes and trails in the annual budget.

The 2008 Budget included \$13,000 to restore 6 miles of bicycle lane markings. This contract is pending and scheduled for completion in Fall 2008.

DISCUSSION

The 2009 Proposed Budget includes \$46,000 to restore 11 miles of bicycle lane markings. The 2009 allocation has been updated to account for increased costs of labor and materials, including the use of an improved paint.

Passage of this amendment would eliminate the \$46,000 in tax levy funding earmarked for the restoration of approximately 11 miles of bicycle lane markings.

FISCAL IMPACT

Passage of this amendment will decrease the 2009 Budget and tax levy by \$46,000, for a tax rate impact of \$-0.002 per \$1,000 assessed valuation. Maintenance and/or restoration of the City's current bicycle lane markings may be compromised unless an alternate funding source is found.

This amendment eliminates position and funding authority for the Bicycle & Pedestrian Coordinator.

BACKGROUND

The Bicycle & Pedestrian Coordinator works within the Transportation Unit of the Infrastructure Services Division. The post was originally filled as an Engineering Drafting Technician IV (PR 604) in 2005 and was renamed to Bicycle & Pedestrian Coordinator (PR 604) in the 2006 Budget.

The Bicycle & Pedestrian Coordinator acts as the project manager for most bicycle and pedestrian related projects and programs that the City is engaged in. Projects include trails, bike lanes, developing a City bike plan, streetscape initiatives, distributing bike racks and bike maps, as well as various neighborhood traffic calming initiatives. Programs include Streetshare, developing a Pedestrian Safety Week, Bike to Work Week, and other bike/pedestrian safety initiatives.

The Bicycle & Pedestrian Coordinator is the chairperson of the Mayor's Bicycle & Pedestrian Task Force. This position routinely attends evening and weekend meetings with neighborhood and business groups. The Bicycle & Pedestrian Coordinator has been quoted in the local and national press on bicycle related issues, and has been featured on several programs broadcast on local television and radio.

Based on these responsibilities, Infrastructure Services requested that this position be reclassified from Pay Range 604 (\$41,308 to \$55,313) with a 2008 salary of \$45,735 to Pay Range 628 (\$60,964 to \$72,671) with a 2009 salary of \$60,954. This requested reclassification was not included in the 2009 Proposed Budget, with the position remaining in Pay Range 604 with a budgeted 2009 salary of \$53,057.

DISCUSSION

This amendment would eliminate the position of Bicycle & Pedestrian Coordinator.

AMENDMENT INTENT

This amendment eliminates one of the two proposed weekend (Wednesday through Sunday) street-lighting crews intended to deal with emergency area outages.

BACKGROUND

Due to an aging street lighting infrastructure, the frequency of area outages (referred to as "troubles" and defined as 3 or more lights out) and single/double unit outages continue to rise. Area outages have increased from 1,944 in 2002 to 2,547 in 2007, a 31% increase. It is the policy of Infrastructure Services to respond to and rectify these emergency area outages within 24 hours, including weekends, necessitating significant manpower and, if required, overtime expense. An indirect cost of the manpower devoted to troubles is the increased backlog of single/double outages and corresponding underground repair work.

To directly focus on emergency response to troubles and indirectly address the backlog of single/double outages, the 2009 Proposed Budget includes:

- Adding 4 Electrical Mechanic positions.
- Adding 2 Special Laborer, ES positions.
- Converting 2 Laborer, ES 0.67 FTE positions to full-time.
- Converting 3 Laborer, ES 0.67 FTE position to full-time.

DISCUSSION

The Proposed Budget includes 2 street lighting crews, consisting of an Electrical Mechanic and a Special Laborer, to specifically provide supplemental coverage over weekends to improve response time to emergency area outages and reduce the need for weekend call-in overtime. These crews work Wednesday through Sunday and typically address between 2 and 3 troubles per day.

The salary for each 2-person crew is \$96,992, of which 70% (\$67,894) is expected to be charged to emergency response O&M activities, while the remaining 30% (\$29,098) of time/salary will be allocated to current Capital project activities. The additional O&M cost is partially offset by anticipated overtime salary reductions of \$58,000 per crew, as these new "regular" crews will supplant current weekend overtime work.

This amendment proposes eliminating one of these 2-person weekend street-lighting crews.

IMPACT

Passage of this amendment will decrease the 2009 Budget and tax levy by \$17,894, for a tax rate impact of -\$0.001 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation. The ability to reduce the backlog of single/double outages and corresponding underground repair work may also be compromised.

 This amendment would fund mechanized snow removal at crosswalks and bus stops within 24 hours at an approximate cost of \$450,000. DPW anticipates 3 such operations annually.

- 2. The reduction in Forestry staff will result in an extension of the pruning cycle from 5 years to 7 years and the spring/early summer mowing cycle from 7 to 10 days.

IMPACT

- 1. This amendment funds 7 Urban Forestry Specialist positions at \$431,844 and one Urban Forestry Crew Leader position at \$44,442, increasing the Salaries and Wages for the DPW Forestry by \$476,286.

Eliminate "snow pay" for certain management employees.

OVERVIEW

- 1. The "Snow Pay" allowance for certain employees was originally established as a biweekly flat rate in 1971 and was adjusted in 1976, 1977, 1982 and 1994. In 1998, based on a DER recommendation, the allowance was changed from a biweekly flat rate to 4.8% of certain employees' salaries. The Snow Pay allowance of 4.8% of a position's base salary was originally based on an average 100 hours of snow related overtime work. Managers eligible for Snow Pay are on duty (24/7) 2 out of every 5 weeks from October 15th to April 15th (6 months).
- 2. In 1998, at the request of the Finance and Personnel Committee, DER surveyed other iurisdictions to evaluate other "snow pay' allowance options. DER surveyed 8 cities (Buffalo, Chicago, Detroit, Minneapolis Syracuse, Waukesha, Wauwatosa and West Allis) The DER survey found that 7 of the cities compensated supervisors for all overtime related to snow and ice control, and this was done at rate of 1.5 times their salaries, with one jurisdiction paying double time for working a 7th consecutive day and another paying double time for working on a Sunday. The one jurisdiction (Wauwatosa) which did not pay for overtime, allowed supervisors informal time off (up to 2 days) for each occasion of substantial snow and ice control overtime worked.
- 3. The number of managers eligible to receive Snow Ppay has been reduced from 79 in 2000 to the current number of 61. The table on page 2 shows the positions eligible for Snow Pay.

- Responsibilities include mobilizing both fleet and contractors for emergencies, including snow plowing and salting, managing snow and ice operations on a rotating basis with other division administrators, administering and implementing enhancements to the fleet information system for financial management, developing an affordable replacement schedule, developing equipment specifications and approvals, establishing lease and rental rates, managing services contracts and inventory control, and assuring compliance with state and federal laws.

IMPACT

- 1. This amendment eliminates position authority, funding, direct labor hours and FTEs for the position of Fleet Operations Manager (SG 13).
- 2. This amendment is a reduction of the 2009 Budget by \$-92,036, for a tax rate impact of \$-0.003 per \$1,000 assessed valuation.
