## DHS APPLIES FOR GRANTS FOR OPIOID FIGHT/DOJ TESTIFIES ABOUT METH

The Department of Health Services has completed a grant application with the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) to be used in the fight against the abuse of opioids. The grant application was part of Gov. Walker's Special Session call. The grant is available under the 21<sup>st</sup> Century Cures Act. Wisconsin is eligible for up to \$7,636,938 per year for the next two years, or \$15.7 million over the biennium.

According to the release, if DHS receives funds it will use the funds to:

• Support community coalitions focused on reducing the nonmedical use of opioids among people age 12 to 25.

- Establish a hotline to provide information on treatment services and recovery supports.
- Expand access to treatment for uninsured and underinsured individuals.
- Establish new opioid-specific treatment programs to reduce the distance people have to travel for these services.
- Establish a network of individuals in long-term recovery from the misuse and abuse of opioids trained to coach people through the treatment and recovery process.
- Develop training for professionals on proven intervention and treatment strategies for opioid misuse and abuse.

While the state is making strides in fighting opioid abuse, DOJ and others testified to a joint panel of the Senate and Assembly Judiciary committees that methamphetamine use is making a strong come back in Wisconsin.
