Program Goals

Milwaukee County and the cities of Milwaukee and West Allis will utilize the JAG funds to improve coordination on crime prevention and detection programs between jurisdictions. JAG funds will be used to support community prosecution initiatives, re-entry, staff training, and purchase police patrol vehicles. The Milwaukee Police Department will use the fund to purchase: Ford Police Interceptor Utility Vehicles (\$168,108), Supplies related to vehicles (\$126,918), Equipment related to vehicles (\$115,002).

Programmatic Summary

The Edward Bryne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant Program (JAG) allows states and units of local government, including tribes, to support a broad range of activities to prevent and control crime based on their own state and local needs and conditions.
