Our New Sanctuary Stained Glass

The design of our new stained glass was taken directly from panel fragments and glass pieces discovered in the basement studio of a late stained glass artist. The original windows from St. Stanislaus Church were removed during a renovation in the 1960s.

The salvaged inventory included hundreds of fragments of broken glass and pieces with badly flaking paint. As the recovered glass was in such poor condition (likely one of the factors in the decision to remove it), the majority of the pieces were not usable for reconstruction.

Most of the material used in the original windows was opalescent glass produced in Kokomo, Indiana. Since this manufacturer is still in existence today, artists were able to match replacement pieces to the original glass very closely. Opalescent glass is highly textured, with many colors offering a range of tone throughout individual pieces. Usable, recovered glass pieces will be incorporated into future designs wherever possible to retain a historic tie with the original windows. There are four original rosettes in the lower panels of the new windows.

The painted designs on the glass, primarily in the borders, are taken directly from the salvaged fragments.

The Immaculate Conception - Mary, full of Grace

The iconic image of the Immaculate Conception embodies the dogma that Mary was conceived free from original sin. The painting, The Vow of Louis XIII, by renowned French artist, Jean-Auguste-Dominique Ingres, was the inspiration for Mary's facial features. Mary, eminently graced, is pictured strong and determined - fully aware of her special destiny. Under her feet, she is crushing a serpent, representing evil on Earth. Mary, Queen of Heaven, is standing among the Earth, Moon and stars.

In the medallion above Mary's head, a dove is pictured, symbolizing the Holy Spirit and her Immaculate Conception. Mary holds lilies in her hand, symbolizing virginity.

St. Stanislaus -Bishop and Martyr

St. Stanislaus is depicted in his ceremonial bishop's regalia, carefully selected for historical accuracy. He is wearing an ornately embellished mitre atop his head. The cope, the sleeveless outer garment, is richly textured. The alb, the full-length white garment, represents purity and the red color of the cope represents martyrdom. His gold bishop's ring symbolizes his union with the Church and features an amethyst-colored faceted glass jewel. The gold pectoral cross hangs from his neck near his heart. The crosier is the ceremonial staff, shaped like a shepherds crook, which symbolizes the role of the bishop to lead his flock. His face is a combination of various historic depictions and features the characteristic blue eyes of Polish descent. In the background of St. Stanislaus, the foliage illustrates the Corn Poppy – the national flower of Poland.

His medallion features a sword, symbolic of the Bishop's death by King Boleslaus after the Bishop had the king excommunicated from the church. St. Stanislaus holds a palm branch as a symbol of his martyrdom.

The Bas-Relief

a beautiful marble sculpture that featured an episode in the life of St. Stanislaus. Lifesize figures illustrate St. Stanislaus in the act of confronting Poland's lawless ruler, King Boleslaus II. St. Stanislaus holds the miraculously reanimated remains of the King's father, wrapped in the cerements of the grave and bearing witness to the transgressions of his wayward son.

The original panel was carved in Italian marble by artist Charles Lohr and was inspired by an original oil painting.

We would like to recreate this panel using resin and wood in faux marble to replicate this design in a lighter weight and more cost effective manner.




