



RAISING THE BAR FOR EARLY LITERACY STANDARDS IN MILWAUKEE

EARLY CHILDHOOD LITERACY PROMOTION THROUGH PEDIATRIC INTERVENTION

The Model:

Reach Out and Read – Milwaukee (ROR-M) is part of a nationwide program that makes early literacy promotion a standard part of pediatric primary care. ROR-M has had great success in encouraging the message of reading together from birth, based on a three part clinical model:

- Each Well Child Visit is provided with a new book that is developmentally and culturally appropriate beginning at the 6 month Well Visit through five years of age.
- Health care providers discuss early childhood literacy development and techniques with the parents.
- Waiting rooms encourage literacy through providing a literacy corner where gently used children's books are available for patients to take home and Volunteer Readers can also read with the children.

Annually, ROR-M is able to contribute to early literacy development with over 25,000 Milwaukee Children!!!

ROR- National Center:

- Serves **4.7 million children** and their families annually
- Trains 29,000 medical providers to deliver the Reach Out and Read program
- Has over **5,800 program** sites in all 50 states and D.C.
- Reaches 1 in 4 low-income families.
- By providing books and promoting the importance of <u>reading aloud</u> from birth as part of doctor visits, **ROR-M uses the provider/patient relationship to support the healthy development of Milwaukee children**, with a special emphasis on children growing up in low-income communities.
- Families served by Reach Out and Read (ROR) read together more often. Their children enter kindergarten with larger vocabularies and stronger language skills, better prepared to achieve their potential.

WHAT THE RESEARCH TELLS US!

The evidence-based Reach Out and Read <u>model</u> is supported by 16, independent, peerreviewed, <u>published studies</u>.

DID YOU KNOW...Research, conducted by Dr. Earnestine Willis regarding ROR book distribution, suggests that caregivers are more likely to read to their child after receiving four or more books from the pediatrician¹.

Based on Pamela High's research supporting the ROR model, providers can further support the message of reading together by promoting "...'**5 Rs' of early education:** Reading, Rhyming, Routine, Rewards, and Relationships. This research concludes that providing books and "anticipatory guidance...has a powerful effect on the home environment of young children.²"

According to a study conducted by Alan Mendelsohn et. al., "...ROR exposure is associated with gains in both receptive and expressive language... large enough to be clinically relevant, with the potential to lead to decrease in the incidence of preschool language delay."³

As local Milwaukee clinics have increased interests in having their own program, a new position was created by the National ROR program in order to help onboard health centers interested in starting their own ROR program. Amber Bloom (abloom2@chw.org) is the main point of contact for any pediatric health center in Milwaukee interested in starting a new ROR program.
