I hope you'll agree the Little Free Library is quite good looking. We constructed it out of high quality cedar and pine and painted it to match the aesthetics of the Sanford Kane home. We love our historic property and everything we do we do with the intention of preserving it's beauty while also making it accessible to the community.
