## Project Management

UWM – CUIR has received this competitive award during five funding cycles, over \$450,000 funding from the Office of University Partnerships.

- Facilitated partnerships with health-related organizations including: 16<sup>th</sup> Street Community Health Center, City of Milwaukee Health Department, and Latino Health Organization to develop needs assessment instruments.
- Facilitated strategic planning process to Layton Boulevard West Neighbors (community development organization) for Residents Leadership Program (comprised of staff, residents

- and public officials). Created a process and plan that required community-based learning objectives.
- Provided applied research expertise to aid nonprofit organizations including: conducting surveys, interviews, and focus groups. Examples include: conducted focus groups (Community Assessment Study Social Development Commission); conducted focus groups (Needs Assessment Council for the Spanish Speaking); conducted interviews with financial service representatives (Needs Assessment Milwaukee Saves Coalition); conducted focus groups (Needs Assessment Milwaukee Public Schools).
- Coordinated with UWM's Roberto Hernandez Center as a collaborative grant to the
  Hispanics in Philanthropy project that created an inventory of Latino nonprofit
  organizations in the four-county region of metropolitan Milwaukee. Responsible for
  designing survey instruments, database design, conducting personal and phone interviews
  with small and medium sized Latino-led and Latino-serving organizations.

## Campus-wide Community Engagement

- Coordinated and organized Annual Urban Initiatives Conference, university-sponsored community forums to explore pressing local issues including: College Access and Success, Urban Sprawl, University-Community Engagement, The Milwaukee Idea, Metropolitan Governance, Milwaukee's Urban Environment, Youth Development, and Healthy Aging. Created and led interdisciplinary planning committees for each conference with faculty, staff, and practitioners to determine goals and objectives for each conference. Developed sixmonth plan from brainstorming session, to planning and implementation. Development of interdisciplinary partnership across several colleges and disciplines to disseminate knowledge, share best practices and increase collaboration between the university and the community. Several examples include: Partnership between CUIR and School of Continuing Education Coordination of national conference on Participant Action Research for Health and Environmental Social Equity; Partnership between CUIR, School of Architecture and Urban Planning and College of Letters and Science for Community-Development Grants.
- As elected chair of the Latino Advisory Committee (comprised of faculty, staff, students and community members) led committee through strategic planning process for the Roberto Hernandez Center including: change in administrative departments from Letters & Science to Administrative Affairs; initiate national search for Director of RHC; and an increase in financial resources to the Roberto Hernandez Center.
- Recruited to serve on numerous "search and screen" committees for the following positions in various colleges/schools across campus: Advisor, School of Education; Advisor, College of Letters and Science; Advisor, Graduate School; Center Director, Administrative Affairs; and Outreach Specialist, Graduate School.

## Student-Based Learning Partnership

- Recruited community-based organizations to serve as hosts in student placements for Institute for Service Learning (ISL) at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee.
- Created and managed a graduate/undergraduate Internship program placing over 100 students (graduate and undergraduate) in community service opportunities in community/economic development positions. Throughout the internship program,

- responsible for students meeting learning objectives, evaluating opportunities and challenges students face in field placements, identifying relevance of coursework to practical work experience.
- Funded internship programs, the first one supported by the Fannie Mae Foundation and was
  recognized as a "promising-practices" in student-based learning. by the Fannie Mae
  Foundation. The second internship program, funded by the Community Outreach
  Partnership Center Program supported undergraduate and graduate experiential learning in
  community-development organizations aimed at creating and implementing community
  revitalization initiatives in a central-city neighborhood deteriorating economic and social
  conditions.
- Directed and managed Community Development Work Study Program by the US
  Department of Housing and Urban Development for the following years: 1997-1999, 20022004, and 2005-2006. This program recruits minority and economically disadvantaged
  students to pursue graduate studies in community/economic development. This program
  has been highlighted by the Office of University Partnerships because of our exceptional
  graduation rate, recruitment strategies, and professional placement after graduation (CDWSP
  Central Newsletter, Vol. 2, Issue 1, Winter 2004).
- Co-instruct Urban Planning course, spring 2005 to explore UWM's School of Architecture and Urban Planning sponsoring a charter school with a curricular focus on urban planning theory, concepts, and experiential learning models.
- Initiated and forged partnership with UWM, City of Milwaukee, and Local Initiatives Support Corporation to create a graduate-level course in the Department of Urban Planning focused on the Main Street Milwaukee Initiative, scheduled for fall 2005.

## Linkages and Partnership Building

- Forged a relationship with the Medical College of Wisconsin and Casa Romero Renewal Center for a planning grant to support innovative work in health promotion and spiritual healing in Milwaukee's Latino Community. Although, grant not awarded, a key relationship was created between both UWM and MCW and resulted in our involvement in a major national research grant to the National Institute of Health.
- Assisted the City of Milwaukee Housing Authority in annual proposals for HOPE VI grant applications. UWM's connection to HOPE VI grants is because we have extensive research on housing initiatives and we are part of a network with practitioners and advocates promoting affordable housing in the City of Milwaukee.
- Directed university-community revitalization partnerships fostering partnerships across with a variety of faculty/staff from across the campus. Managed four different components of the grant including: Internship program, Pre Urban Planning for PUPS (academic course work for middle-school students to learn about theory and practice of planning), Walls Project (project development of a non-violence art memorial), and Oral Traditions in the Walnut Way Community (partnership between Anthropology Department and nonprofit organization learning about historical, social and economics of a traditional African-American neighborhood).
