


OVERVIEW

- The city's overall infant mortality rate has been declining, but significant racial disparities continue to exist.
- Racial disparities also continue for birth outcomes such as preterm births and low birthweight births.
- Teen pregnancy rates have decreased considerably in recent years overall and across racial and ethnic groups.
- Milwaukee's rates of chlamydia and gonorrhea remain high compared to other cities.
- The city's childhood lead poisoning rate continues to decrease, but remains higher than the national rate.


INFANT MORTALITY RATES FOR SELECT CITIES: 2015



MILWAUKEE INFANT MORTALITY RATES BY RACE/ETHNICITY




PERCENT PRETERM BIRTHS FOR SELECT CITIES: 2015




MILWAUKEE PERCENT PRETERM BIRTHS BY RACE/ETHNICITY




LOW BIRTHWEIGHT BIRTHS FOR SELECT CITIES: 2015



MILWAUKEE LOW BIRTHWEIGHT BIRTHS BY RACE/ETHNICITY




NATIONAL TEEN BIRTH RATE TRENDS (AGES 15 – 19)


Chlamydia and Gonorrhea

 Milwaukee has typically ranked among the 10 highest in chlamydia and gonorrhea rates for large US cities.


HIV

- In 2015, the Milwaukee metropolitan statistical area (MSA) ranked 71st out of 108 for HIV diagnosis rate.
- However, the 2015 City of Milwaukee HIV diagnosis rate is over twice the Milwaukee MSA rate (17.5 versus 8.3).


MILWAUKEE CHLAMYDIA RATES BY RACE/ETHNICITY




MILWAUKEE GONORRHEA RATES BY RACE/ETHNICITY

CITY STRATEGIES

- Home visitation programs focus on promoting healthy pregnancies, birth outcomes, and child development among high risk families.
- Efforts to prevent childhood lead poisoning include:
 - Lead-Safe Milwaukee campaign
 - Lead abatement in high risk homes
 - Distribution of water filters among vulnerable populations
 - Long-term strategies for lead service line replacement
- Development of *Blueprint for Peace*, a comprehensive plan that uses a public health approach to focus on the prevention of violence before it occurs, as well as intervention after violence to reduce the impacts and prevent future perpetration and victimization.




