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

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Doors Open is a two-day public celebration of Milwaukee's art, architecture, culture and history. This event offers behind the scenes tours of more than 150 buildings throughout Milwaukee's downtown and neighborhoods and in-depth tours led by community leaders. Doors Open sites include commercial properties, sacred spaces, apartment buildings, breweries, art galleries, community gardens and more stretching from downtown to the surrounding suburbs, and the neighborhoods between. The program is largely free, making this a uniquely inclusive event, accessible to families, seniors and anyone on a fixed or low-income.

The seventh annual Doors Open took place on September 23 and 24. Throughout the weekend, 26,100 visitors made 117,547 site visits throughout metro Milwaukee.

HISTORY

Historic Milwaukee, Inc. (HMI) held the first Doors Open in 2011. Excited to learn what their city had to offer, 10,500 people made 42,000 site visits the first year. Historic Milwaukee is proud that the event has grown each year, tripling its original attendance. In addition, the organization has diversified the featured sites, extending far beyond Milwaukee's downtown into Milwaukee's neighborhoods, and selecting sites of interest in neighboring suburbs.

The eighth-annual Doors Open Milwaukee is scheduled for September 22 & 23, 2018.

GOALS

Historic Milwaukee is committed to raising awareness of Milwaukee's built environment by sharing its history and architecture. Doors Open invites everyone to learn about Milwaukee's communities by opening doors to buildings and neighborhoods.

- Showcase the architecture and community stories of Milwaukee's downtown and culturally diverse neighborhoods
- Raise awareness of the critical role design plays in a vibrant and livable city.
- Foster civic and community pride
- Welcome exploration of new neighborhoods
- Improve perceptions and appreciation of neighborhoods





SPOTLIGHT NEIGHBORHOODS

In 2017, Historic Milwaukee worked with Layton Boulevard West and Lindsay Heights to open 20 sites in those communities during Doors Open. During the event, more than 7,400 visitors went to those spotlight communities. Here's a few sites in each of those communities that drew curious crowds during the event:

LINDSAY HEIGHTS

Alice's Garden, 2136 N 21st Street

An inviting and welcoming outdoor space in Milwaukee, often referred to as one of the city's "best-kept secrets," Alice's Garden is an agricultural oasis of beauty and culture. Alice's Garden Urban Farm, a community garden in the Lindsay Heights Neighborhood, was developed on a plot of land with a long history. It was first occupied by Sauk Native Americans until it was seized by the U.S. government, followed by a farm stop as a part of Wisconsin's Underground Railroad, and finally as a community garden.

Tandem Restaurant—Walter Schmidt Tavern, 1848 W Fond Du Lac Avenue

The Historic Walter Schmidt Tavern building was once Milwaukee's longest single-family operated beer hall. Built in 1893, many of the tavern's original historic features are still in place, including a patterned hex-tile floor, finished wood molding and millwork, wrought ironwork, and embossed glass in the tavern's entry door. In 2015, the building was bought out of foreclosure, renovated, and restored by Fix Development to its former glory and home to the newly opened Tandem restaurant.

LAYTON BOULEVARD WEST


Escuela Verde, 3628 W Pierce Street

Located at the edge of Silver City and the Menomonee Valley, Escuela Verde, a project based high school opened in 2014. The school's mission is to cultivate a community that is participatory, just, sustainable and peaceful. The school features a quality studio and recording booth, Zen Room, and meditation garden. The students have helped design, build and develop the school since it began.

Milwaukee County Greenhouses, 524 S Layton Boulevard

Doors Open Milwaukee marked the first time this facility has been open to the public. The newly built County Greenhouses feature state of the art computerized systems that manage and monitor the growing of the plant crops for the Conservatory. Energy efficient, grey water reuse, and timed programs all help to produce consistent size and quality of plant inventories. The new County Greenhouses were constructed 2013–2015 and designed by architects Kubala and Washatko.

SPECIAL FEATURES

CROSSING THE LINE EXHIBIT

The traveling display "Crossing the Line: The Milwaukee Fair Housing Marches of 1967–1968" commemorates the 50th anniversary of Milwaukee's civil rights marches by examining the practices and prejudices that led to segregation in Milwaukee and chronicling the school desegregation and fair housing movements of the 1960s. This display was available to view at Milwaukee's City Hall throughout the event.

WATER PASSPORT

With support from the Fund for Lake Michigan, Historic Milwaukee developed a water passport that offered a guide to water focused sites from the bridge houses downtown to the Global Water Institute to the newly constructed Fondy Park.

BETTER BUILDINGS CHALLENGE

The Better Buildings Challenge is a comprehensive program that provides building owners and property managers all of the tools and resources they need to develop energy efficiency projects for their buildings. With the City of Milwaukee's partnership, Doors Open highlighted which Doors Open buildings participate in this program.

TOURS

In addition to the 170 sites featured on Doors Open, Historic Milwaukee also takes visitors on a deeper dive in to some sites and neighborhoods though dozens of ticketed tours.

The tours are led by local experts and share incredible stories. In 2017, these tours included a bike tour through Lake Park focusing on Frederick Law Olmsted's legacy; a public art walking tour of the Bronzeville neighborhood; a rare chance to visit the top of the Rockwell clock tower; and many more.

Over 3,000 participants attended ticketed tours in 2017. Proceeds from tickets sold benefit Historic Milwaukee's mission and year round programming.

MUSIC

Access Contemporary Music created musical pieces which were performed at Two-Fifty, Colby Abbot, and the Clock Shadow Building. These moving musical works are written and performed specifically for those sites.

KIDS ACTIVITY BOOK

This year, Historic Milwaukee is worked with Adam Carr, resident of Layton Boulevard West and author of Explore MKE, and Sharp Literacy, to produce an activity booklet for Doors Open geared toward youth, creating activities that will invite kids and families to go beyond the buildings and explore their city. The booklet also featured 20 passport sites, highlighting child-friendly Doors Open buildings where they received passport stamps and have a hands-on experiences.

Try: Asian International Market, Supermercado El Rey, Dok Champa, Our Daily Salt, Value Village

Keep an eye out for smaller churches and beautiful homes

Try: Layton Boulevard, Three Bridges Park, 27th to 35th on Burnham Street


