I just want to describe my perception of the place, which is pretty consistent with what was heard before, that there is a noticeable loitering, and which goes pretty much in - - in the area in front of the store, spilling over to right next to the store is an empty lot with nice, a very nice newly painted fence.

I seen people loitering there or - - or congregating there, different numbers, two to maybe four of different ages. I would not say that - - I would - - I could not say that it's always the same crowd. But it is very noticeable. As I drive in to my property, I almost always have to stop on the red. That is in front of the other store. So I have about maybe a minute to see the place. It's right in front of me. On my way back, often stop at the red light. I do my banking at the Maritime, which is across from the store. Occasionally walk down the street. So - - So that has been a problem that was pretty consistent. Actually, I do remember it as getting rather worse. When I

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go seven years back, I'm not sure if I can recall that clearly that this - - this occurring. Maybe what I was most concerned about

Maybe what I was most concerned about was that I did observe an individual that I'm pretty certain is a drug dealer, that I haven't seen for a couple of months now, that used to hang occasionally in front of my property, but very often at that particular corner, which would be either in front of the store or in front of the Mexican restaurant. Of course, that wouldn't be every day. I didn't keep any records. I would have recognized the individual if - - if I saw him. I did, in one of the blockwatch meetings, I did report that to the police. I reported to the police on a couple of different occasions various - - various drug dealing situa -- situations that I've seen on Howell, on Smith and in this particular block.

And I don't know that's relevant, but within that block, which is Howell, Lincoln, Austin and Smith there are - - there is a mixture. I'm not telling you where to live, but I'm just saying, whether this is applied for or not, you're describing a scene of problem, problem, problem, with just this being a legitimate grocer on the corner or convenience store where this is still going on. The other legitimate issue, and I do not - - just as I'm not trying to provide a side

We ought to stop officially sanctioning it here. We ought to prohibit it, because when my kids run around, they come back home with a - - with a whole boat load of crap that they don't need. Currently you may find somebody who goes to his store to buy cigarettes and food, and if they ever want a six-pack of beer, they may go across the street. I don't know that there are going to be any more or any less. If we're honest with ourselves, if there's public consumption of alcohol, I don't know that there will be any more or any less if he's granted a license than if the place across the street still continues to sell. If there are people who are going to imbibe and walk around drunk, I'm not certain that it's going to be more or any - - or less. I'm not saying that that's a reason for

people thinking that government needs to protect us from ourselves. Alderman Kovac.

ALDERMAN KOVAC: Yes. I just wanted to say quickly I do think areas with the higher concentration of carryout alcohol tend to have a higher concentration of people drinking that alcohol. And you're right that overall maybe it's not going to change the equation that much, but most - - take a poll, most people in the city wouldn't want three Class "A" licenses on their block. I don't think you would want that on your block.

He has also been very cooperative with at least my organization when we have expressed parking problems, because a lot of people will park on our parking lot and run into his store to get a bag of whatever, and he's agreed to help us with that.

Loitering out front. I've lived there since 1999. I do not consider what I've seen in front of that store loitering. We're a neighborhood, we're in a transitional neighborhood. It's getting better. The graffiti is way down, the street crime is down, everything is down. Actually, I see no real reason to deny Mr. Singh a license. He's a good business neighbor, he's a good citizen in our neighborhood. The people who have spoke against him don't live in the block. I walk by his establishment every day.

Parking is tight, yes. Besides his establishment, we've got four restaurants, three bars, a theater, an ice cream store, a bakery, a bank. Of course parking is going to be tight in the city. Most of Mr. Singh's customers are pedestrian. We live in the block, we run down there to get our cigarettes,

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before us.

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

This is like much ado about nothing. But this is the American dream. This is what my grandfather started when he came here. This is the American dream. He put his kids through school, he's supporting his family. Why can't he have a piece of that?

I understand that Alderman Zielinski is going to now introduce a map saying that it's probably the concentration is too much, although I might add that when I looked at the file, under the application sheet it said concentrated area, no. The other people that came down and testified are people he does business with, people he does banking with and so forth. If you're going to weigh the testimony of both groups, are you going to weigh the blockwatch captains put in their effort, who have a proven record of working to improve the neighborhood by getting it organized and putting in

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Kovac at this time would move to make the concentration map centered on 2305 South Howell Avenue, dated October 1st, 2008 part of our official record in this proceeding, and hearing no objection to that, so ordered. You had a question, Alderman Kovac?

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ALDERMAN KOVAC: Couple of clarification things. I'm familiar with a lot of the establishments in this area, but Dee's Wine Shop, is that take-out or is that a sit-down place or both?

ALDERMAN ZIELINSKI: That's primarily a take-out. They want to have some wine tasting in the near future, if they don't have it already.

ALDERMAN KOVAC: That's why they have a Class B license? How does that work? ALDERMAN ZIELINSKI: They sell beer and

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the time, or are you going to place more weight on the
other testimony? Both are important, and I respect
both of them, but I think in this situation if you
have to weigh them, I think the greater weight in this
particular case goes to the blockwatch captains and
not people who live in Cudahy and bankers and so
forth.

MR. MAISTELMAN: I think, Mr. Chairman, he's

MR. MAISTELMAN: I think, Mr. Chairman, he's making a leap. There wasn't any testimony that all of these people are his friends. They're his customers the first thing. And saying that they came down here because they're his friends is -- They're customers.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Theoretically they could be both.

MR. MAISTELMAN: There hasn't been any evidence of that. And I would ask Mr. Zielinski did he have communications with -- the four or five people that came down and testified against us, did you have conversations with them before they came down here to kind of make sure that they had their testimony straight?

ALDERMAN ZIELINSKI: I talked with them, and they wouldn't have wasted their time coming down here if they didn't think it was a negative influence.

If it was a positive influence, I'd be here

was going to say.

Gentrification of the area is what's happening here. What's going to happen to all the 30-some people and the other people who are served by this community? You want to move everybody out? That's what this is all about, okay. So we can make a nice bistro there instead, which will charge \$100 for a bottle of wine. Okay. I'm done.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Knowing Alderman Zielinski like I do, I don't believe that's a characterization of Alderman Zielinski. I don't know that you're directing it at him.

MR. MAISTELMAN: No, no, not at the Alderman. I can tell you certainly that that is not the case with Alderman Zielinski. Mr. Schrimpf?

MR. SCHRIMPF: Mr. Maistelman raised an issue regarding a document that was in the files that he apparently saw that indicated there was something official that said this was not a concentrated area, and depending how this vote goes, I'm very concerned about that. I think Ms. Grill could easily explain that document.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Ms. Grill.

MS. GRILL: I believe the document which he's referring to is the status sheet that we use in

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fighting for him like I fought for the people that opened up Cafe Central and the other places in the area that have been moving Bay View in the right direction. We have the Alchemist Theater lady that was right before you on this item. I supported her 110 percent. The Alchemist Theater has been a wonderful addition here. You heard her testify they spent 18 months improving the exterior of the building to have a nice development on KK over there. If this is something that was positive, if I thought for one second it was positive, I'd be out here fighting for them. I'm not going to waste my time being against something that I think isn't in a positive direction, I can tell you, based on my contact with my constituents and so forth, I hear regular complaints about this property and the issues that the few blockwatch captains and other people came down and testified on.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: I'm going to give you the last word last word, Mr. Maistelman. I'm sure you two could go back and forth for a half an hour, and that's an understatement.

MR. MAISTELMAN: We're lawyers, that's what we do for a living. He's an alderman, too, and a good guy, and I respect him very much. And I forgot what I

our office for processing applications, and as you're aware, when an area is designated concentrated, if a new application comes in within that area, we will note that in the notice that we provide to the applicant. So that simply was just advising me that this location was not in an area that has previously been designated as concentrated, it was not saying that we thought it was not a concentrated area.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you for clarifying that. If there's a determination made on concentration, anything coming forward within that square mile radius would be then noticed in the future. That was my part of my conversation with you earlier, Mr. Maistelman, is that there's nothing pre-empting the ability of any interested party, it could be the alderman, it could be any interested neighbor, from raising concentration saying that I believe that the area now has reached a point of concentration, then it's the committee's determination whether that's valid to use in argument.

I will pose, because it's been very lengthy, the ability, if there are any follow-up questions by committee at this point. Otherwise, if there are no additional follow-up questions, we can take it into committee.

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ALDERMAN PUENTE: Mr. Chair. I have a motion to approve this license. We did hear testimony on both sides. I believe the testimony from all people are equal. Captains on a blockwatch are very important, but that does not mean that any others' voice that comes before me is less important. Again, I weigh all the testimony. We had five people in opposition. Their testimony as it pertains to the reason to deny this mainly was the possible loitering that was in front of this store, but as we all established, I believe, it could have been anybody conversing with neighbors.

We did have testimony possibly about parking, double-parking. We also heard the possibility of that parking problem associated with other businesses in that area, the bank, the intersection the way it is, et cetera. We heard numerous things which outweighed the testimony of opposition in support of this application for all the reasons. That testimony also was in denial of the reason to deny this application.

As far as concentration, the Alderman of this district on numerous times stated that if this application or applicant would have done some type of improvement in his establishment, he would have been recommendation for approval of this license, based on all the testimony that was given before this committee. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Motion by Alderman Puente is to recommend approval of the license despite items contained in the notice. On the motion, Alderman Kovac.

ALDERMAN KOVAC: We've spent three hours on this, and I honestly don't think it was a waste of time. I think I've learned a lot. It's a neighborhood that I thought I knew well, and I think I know about it three times as well as I used to think I knew this neighborhood. I have to be honest, I was disturbed myself, as I said at the time about some of the testimony by the opponents, and I didn't like the road it was going down. I actually agree wholeheartedly with what Attorney Maistelman has said about the gentrification issue, and that concerns me greatly.

I am incredibly impressed with the people that have testified here and have come out with their sense of community, and actually, I hope to see them loitering more often outside the store because I think that is incredible symptoms of a good neighborhood. So for me, I'm thoroughly, thoroughly convinced that

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in support of this license. So then where do we get the concentration from? "If the gentleman would have done improvements on his building, I would have supported this license." Well, then, why give us this concentration map? So I'm not going to weigh that as heavily as some people on this committee would have normally because of that reason.

I believe this individual is a responsible individual, I believe this individual is a caring individual of not only his business but the people who live in and around this neighborhood. I believe that if there is problems with this establishment that this individual will correct those. I heard no testimony except that one individual about this other establishment who has a liquor license, nothing from the other ones of the impact, per se, of the detrimental to the health, safety, and welfare of the neighborhood. And I'm speaking of those who were here in opposition to it. Again, they did point out some things, but, again, as everybody heard here, every individual that came before us I asked that question if they thought it would be detrimental to the health, safety, and welfare of the neighborhood, and nobody who came down and supported this said yes.

So given that, again, I would make a

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this location is not currently a problem and most of the loitering going on is good stuff. I'm sure there's a bit of loitering, parking, a bit of traffic, but that happens all the time.

As for the drug dealing and the prostitution and the mumbling, I mean that's something that I don't think was established very well it was definitely going on, and I think it was established by the proponents and the friends and the customers and all of above, business contacts of Mr. Singh that it does not go on, or if it does go on, it's discouraged by the positive neighborhood activity that the store creates. Bus tickets to get to work and credit for people who are on fixed incomes, it is the American dream. I'm incredibly impressed by it.

My decision on this motion, honestly I don't think I've ever been -- I think I said last committee hearing I was conflicted about something -- I can't remember what it was now -- but I don't think I've ever been quite this conflicted. I'll say this: If the vote goes the way I am voting and you really do close tomorrow, I'm going to regret this vote.

But when you look at the issue of concentration, I think it's reasonable for neighbors to say we don't want multiple Class A licenses on one

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- block or across the street from each other. Now,
- 2 there's some argument for it because maybe price will
- 3 go down a bit, but there's also there's one just down
- the block, too, that sells the wine, and I guess
- 5 that's little more upscale. The Hub is not that
- 6 upscale. You've got both. You do have Siegel's
- 7 pretty far away, certainly have a lot of bars to go
- 8 to. I don't think it's unreasonable for a

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9 neighborhood to try to draw a line there, because once 10

these things exist, they don't disappear unless 11 somebody gets shot and killed, frankly. They don't

disappear easily, so that's why they don't appear easily.

I did not expect to be this conflicted when this started. The testimony has been extremely compelling, but I do think the concentration argument is persuasive, and I think as much as I was disturbed by some of the testimony, I think it -- And the other thing I'll say about numbers, I agree 100 percent with Alderman Puente that every voice is equal. We do live in a democracy, but I don't think you just count the number of people that show up. Now, it was pretty overwhelming, and I was impressed with the testimony, and the fact that somebody came down just because they saw it on TV and ran down, wow. I've certainly never

- argument. The question is is apples apples, and if
- 3 apples are apples, do you compare McIntosh versus

In terms of on the larger map, have I seen maps where there are more what I'll call typical a retail place of selling out the door? Yeah. I've seen other areas where there's significantly more. What's the adequate line? I guess it varies on each individual neighborhood. Depends on what you're trying to make in a neighborhood, too, whether you want a destination location like Water Street, where having a number of restaurants is a good thing, you know. If there are one or two other restaurants that want to make a significant investment in this neighborhood, would I doubt that Alderman Zielinski and/or others in the neighborhood association would disuade them from applying for a license as an addendum to what they attempt to do? I highly doubt it. So all that has to be weighed against some of the

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seen that, but I've only been on this committee six months.

So what I'm saying is I don't think a vote of people who show up today is necessarily a vote of the neighborhood. That's a separate issue, and that's something I don't know. This is a difficult decision, but I'm not going to go with this motion. So with that, Mr. Chair, I leave it up to you.

ALDERMAN PUENTE: The testimony as it pertains to concentration was overwhelmed that there wasn't an issue with the people who live, not four blocks or eight blocks of those people who were opposed, but two to three houses away. Who's going to impact this more as it pertains to concentration, the people who live right next door to it or the people who drive by it four or five, eight blocks away? I've been on this committee four years ago, and I just --

So if the concentration is going to be the issue, and we look at what we're supposed to here and the application to deny, we have not established, I believe, enough to deny this, based on the testimony that was given to us, and I think we're going to have a hard time in court to defend this if we deny this license. That's it. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: I'll let my vote speak for

greater concerns.

This one's not easy, it's not. I see inherent concerns that come at times with the over-abundance of alcohol. I also believe that has to be balanced and tempered on a number of factors; and that is, the proximity in which individuals testify, the length of time in business, all these things factor in and make this a very difficult decision. I, among other things, I do appreciate, and to say in terms of raw numbers, I think that it was a very difficult decision for Alderman Zielinski to come here, and to say that there were many more individuals who were here to testify in favor of this, call that profile in courage, if you will, in a way to say that he stands up for what he believes in in terms of what is the right decision. I fully believe that he did that with all faith in my heart. That's a tough decision for him. It's sometimes tougher to say that I don't believe it's necessarily the best thing, even though there's greater number of you who have taken time to show up here for it, because I just, in the larger part, don't think it's part of the better effort.

That being said, the motion by Alderman Puente is to recommend approval of the license. Are

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      there any objections to that motion?
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             ALDERMAN KOVAC: Yes.
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             CHAIRMAN BOHL: Hearing one objection, the
      motion will carry on a two-to-one vote. This comes
      before the Common Council on a grant list, which this
      is a recommendation. The Common Council will have a
      say on this license like all others. Thank you.
