- Project Staying Alive is a program designed to educate & inform children in our community on proper anger management, conflict resolution and problem solving techniques to help reduce incidences of violent injury in the City of Milwaukee.
- Modeled after the highly successful Milwaukee Fire Departments Survive Alive Program. It consists of five two hour sessions taught by Milwaukee Fire Department personnel, Project Ujima staff and the student's teachers.
 - Due to multi-agency grant funding initiatives, this program is available at no cost to schools within the City of Milwaukee. All training, education, supplies and equipment are paid for by the various grants.
