2	(All CITY PERSONNEL were duly affirmed.)				
3	CHAIRMAN BOHL: On our 9:00 a.m. agenda we				
4	have Sara Mahmud, Class A Malt renewal application for				
5	Sara's Foods at 3727 West Galena Street in the 15th				
6	Aldermanic District. Is Sara Mahmud present?				
7	AUDIENCE MEMBER: No. I'm here.				
8	CHAIRMAN BOHL: You're here to testify in				
9	this matter?				
10	AUDIENCE MEMBER: Right.				
11	CHAIRMAN BOHL: We'll bring you forward, how				
12	about that. You are a neighbor of the area there?				
13	AUDIENCE MEMBER: Yes. I work in the area.				
14	My name is Toni Anderson. I'm the Executive Director				
15	for Lisbon Avenue Neighborhood Development.				
16	(TONI ANDERSON was duly affirmed.)				
17	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Why don't you say that				
18	again here, Toni, tell us who you are again.				
19	THE WITNESS: I am Toni Anderson, the				
20	Executive Director for Lisbon Avenue Neighborhood				
21	Development. Our organization is at 3701 West Lisbon				
22	Avenue, and this store is two blocks away. So we do				
23	community organizing, and we also do economic				
24	development and community development.				
25	CHAIRMAN BOHL: And your thoughts on this				

00003 1 application here? THE WITNESS: We're in opposition of these 3 licenses being renewed, just the challenges and the 4 troubles around that store, just with the constant 5 traffic. I've been there when the police was there. 6 I have a family member who lives across the street. 7 I've been there after hours when the folks banged on 8 her door, and she's opened up her door to do business 9 after business hours. I think it's the negative 10 activity. It's the one less -- It is one added thing 11 that I think if that store was not there, it was not 12 in existence, or at least that the liquor piece was 13 away, it could change very much the climate of 38th 14 Street. 15 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Now, you indicate that the 16 door has been opened for individuals after 9:00? THE WITNESS: Yes. 17 18 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Also, it's a food and 19 liquor, it's like a corner store that sells both? 20 THE WITNESS: It is. 21 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Do you know for certain that 22 alcohol sales transpire after 9:00, after the legal 23 time? 2.4 THE WITNESS: No, I can't say that for sure. 25

I'm not sure what exactly has happened, but I have

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been there when they've sold a couple of cigarettes out of a package, I saw them sell three diapers, to open up a package of diapers and to sell three diapers out of the sealed package of diapers.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: But otherwise, the nature of concerns with the liquor license, have you seen public urination taking place in the area around this, have you seen open consumption of alcoholic beverages?

THE WITNESS: I have, yeah. This year, we were able to get the attention of KaBOOM, our organization, with the help of another community-based organization, economic development group was able to raise \$10,000 to bring a KaBOOM play set to that corner.

When they bounced the pictures back to me by e-mail, I was just sad to see the liquor, the beer cans. It just looked very unkempt. We did a block clean before we took our pictures and surveyed them, and our site wasn't accepted, even though we had raised all of our dollars, we had the support of the Alderman's Office, we had the support. Habitat was donating the property to us, and there were residents that had signed on and made a committment to help support a KaBOOM playground there.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you. Questions by

2	committee members? SERGEANT ULICKEY: Mr. Chair.					
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4	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Sergeant. SERGEANT ULICKEY: I know I'm not a					
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6	committee member, but if I could just ask a question.					
7	In regards to the sale of loose cigarettes that you					
8	observed, was that a long time ago, short time ago, do you recall?					
9	THE WITNESS: I would say it was this					
10	summer.					
11	CHAIRMAN BOHL: So it was in the last					
12	license year.					
13	SERGEANT ULICKEY: As you probably know,					
14	that is illegal to sell cigarettes that way.					
15	THE WITNESS: Absolutely.					
16	SERGEANT ULICKEY: Now, diapers I can't					
17	speak to because I do believe it is legal to do that,					
18	but cigarettes, it is illegal, and I just ask that you					
19	give us a call, and we can take a look into that.					
20	THE WITNESS: I can do that.					
21	CHAIRMAN BOHL: They call these lucky					
22	loosies, don't they?					
23	SERGEANT ULICKEY: Loosies is what they call					
24	them.					
25	CHAIRMAN BOHL: The Alderman's Office is					

00006 here. We've not sworn him in. Alex Runner. 1 2 (Legislative Aide was duly affirmed.) 3 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Runner, do you want to 4 identify yourself for our record, please. 5 LEGISLATIVE AIDE: Sure. Alex Runner, Staff 6 Assistant for President Hines, Alderman Hines. You 7 might remember, Alderman Bohl, from last time, Sara is 8 the owner, and her son had a situation where he went 9 outside with a gun to help a little girl up from her 10 bicycle. It's like a constant just trying to educate 11 these owners about what is and is not acceptable. 12 They got in trouble with the police for 13 that, of course, and vowed never to have the gun 14 again. And the ironic thing, the hard thing is that 15 there's not been anything on the police report since 16 our last hearing, and I think this was going to be agenda only until the Alderman's Office asked that it 17 18 be heard.

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I know that President Hines just told me he has some concerns if they're not here to not renewing the license, that they should have an opportunity to share their side of things, but at the same time, LAND and the great work that they do and Toni Anderson and other community groups have been concerned, to say the least, especially with the

loitering and the condition and the loose cigarettes and those kind of things.

President Hines was going to ask for some kind of suspension or, of course, leave it to the committee, and I know that LAND is asking for a revocation or a nonrenewal, but it's a concern to President Hines that they're not here, and so I don't know what the Chair -- what would be appropriate in this kind of circumstance. You would think that they would come when the situation is like this, and it almost seems as if things have gotten worse in some ways, and yet the police report has gone down, so I'm we're not sure what to do. People aren't calling the police, and maybe we need to have a neighborhood meeting with the neighborhood group and the police to get everyone on the same page, but we know that some action needs to be taken.

ALDERMAN HAMILTON: Mr. Chair.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Hamilton. Thank you for your testimony.

ALDERMAN HAMILTON: I was trying to get the actual date when this license expired.

MS. GRILLE: Mr. Chair. That would be March 18.

25 THE WITNESS: Can I just also add this is

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not only Lisbon Avenue Neighborhood Development. We also have made an honest effort to talk to the majority of the residents on Galena Street, and so we have maybe 10 to 12 folks that signed. And it was interesting, I had two families that were willing to sign, didn't want to put their addresses down because they were frightened of her son. I brought a resident down with me. He said if they're going to see me, I don't want to speak. So I think that also speaks volumes to the fear that's on Galena.

ALDERWOMAN COGGS: Mr. Chairman, I would move that we hold it to the call of the chair.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: That's one of our viable options. If we do do that, what I will ask, because it is a renewal, that we do have a transcript ordered, even though the testimony was limited, so that we do have Ms. Anderson's testimony. I know that the Alderman's Office will again be present. If she desires to appear again when it is rescheduled, she is free -- you're free to do so, Mr. Anderson, but otherwise, then your testimony then would be available, and it would be refreshed in our minds if they do come forward three weeks from now. I assure you if that motion is acceptable to the committee here, another non-appearance, and it's not three

strikes, it's two strikes and you're out.

The motion by Alderwoman Coggs is to hold this matter at the call of the chair. Are there any objections to that motion? Hearing none, so ordered. It will be rescheduled. Do we have Ms. Anderson's contact information?

THE WITNESS: You have.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: We will send you another notice if you so desire. And just so you are aware, because of neighborhood objections, if there are neighbors that do indeed desire to come forward and provide that testimony, they will be free to do so here three weeks from now.

THE WITNESS: You know what, they are frightened.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: I understand that. What I will tell you and I think that you probably know is this is a quasi-judicial body. Whether somebody is afraid to testify or not, we cannot accept testimony saying Suzi Smith told me she's afraid because Suzi Smith is not here telling us she's afraid. There's a vested legal property right in that license, we need individuals' testimony. I understand that they're afraid, but if you want action out of the committee, we need to hear from those individuals.

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Where that chasm gets crossed, I can't tell you, and I understand every circumstance, but we have a legal obligation to follow the Constitution of the State of Wisconsin, and the Constitution of the State of Wisconsin says with them having a legal vested property right, we need firsthand direct testimony.

THE WITNESS: I understand that. I guess my struggle is, as valuable as you would think these licenses were to her, she is the one that has not shown. So we've done diligence. We've walked that block, we've knocked on doors. We have not tried to persuade residents. The ones that did not want to sign, we didn't try to make them feel bad about it, we were respectful, and we understood.

ALDERWOMAN COGGS: Mr. Chairman. I understand and respect exactly what you're saying, but not for this being a renewal, I would have moved for it to be denied because of non-appearance, but because it is a renewal and because of that vested property right, we generally, to be consistent, have erred on the side of holding it to the call of the chair to at least give the opportunity for licensees to come before us.

Now, on new licenses we have a little bit more leeway as to whether or not to deny based on

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1	non-appearance on the first go-round, but to be pretty				
2	consistent with the way this committee's operated in				
3	the past, we do at least attempt to give people who				
4	are doing a renewal another opportunity.				
5	THE WITNESS: Understood. Thank you for				
6	your consideration.				
7	CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you, Alderwoman Coggs.				
8	That has been the precedent of the committee. You				
9	will be noticed again for three weeks from now. Thank				
10	you for your testimony here.
