EMPLOYEES

Member institutions employ over **92 thousand** people, including:

- 5,000 academic faculty members
- 20,000 staff and healthcare practitioners
 - 7,000 physicians
 - 15,000 government employees

PEOPLE

Populations surrounding the southeastern WI base of each member institution (Milwaukee and Ozaukee Counties) total over **1 million** people.

When including other university branches, clinics, and hospitals, our members reach counties totaling over **3.3 million** people or 58% of Wisconsin's population.




Why is an approach of GH important?


