

Grill. Investigation revealed a patron at the bar was struck once in face, causing pain. On 6/17/2009 at 11:11 p.m. Milwaukee police responded to a noise nuisance complaint at Jerseys Sports Pub & Grill. Investigation revealed there was several patrons on the patio. These patrons were laughing and talking. Police advised the bartender, Scott Rick, there were still patrons outside and making enough noise that someone had called the police. Rick stated the patio was usually closed by 10:30 and no one should be outside. They were outside and asked the patrons to leave. They complied. On 7/17/2009 at 1:07 a.m. Milwaukee police responded to a battery complaint at Jerseys Sports Pub & Grill. Investigation revealed the applicant and her live-in boyfriend, Rodney J. Lass were involved in a fight in the basement of the business. Lass punched and kicked the applicant causing pain and injury. A battery domestic violence report was subsequently filed. The case was now processed by the Milwaukee District Attorney's office on 8/6/2009. CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you. Are there

MR. HANEY: Just - - Just a few. We have a number of letters in support from other businesses and neighbors in the community. Mr. Lass had been working at the - - at the tavern as the - - as a cook, and also, he was coordinating a number of the outdoor events. After the domestic violence incident, he has not been a part of the business there. She does not want him there. He has not been there. He had been employed there as a - - for a while. There was a - - He was actually on probation, and his probation officer agreed that when the complaint came to her, he's not allowed to work there and has not.

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and then winding down. And I - - I think that one noise complaint like that is not bad.

There was another incident where somebody got punched and they called the police. And by the time the police got there, they were cleaning up. They had been punched and getting iced. And so that's - - that's not good, obviously, to have any kind of disturbances at -- at any kind of a business. Quite frankly, given some of the problems we have at some of the 10 taverns, an incident where somebody gets punche 11 as opposed to some of the other potentials for violence, and unfortunately, the violence that we see in the varied areas of the community at times, this is - - I don't think this is too bad.

We - - The tavern has tried to keep pretty good relationships with the neighbors. We know that there are - - have been some problems with a couple of the neighbors with apparently some noise complaints and people - - people loitering after hours. In fact, Ms. Elliot told me that, you know, she's - - she's aware that part of what was exacerbating the problem apparently, has been that when Mr. Lass was there, she would have him contact the neighbors

THE APPLICANT: And no longer are we together, either.

MR. HANEY: Oh, I stand corrected on that.

ALDERMAN HAMILTON: Okay. Thank you. CHAIRMAN BOHL: Other questions by committee? How long has this location been open?

THE APPLICANT: I purchased the business last October. So, I've only been part of the business for the last year. And over the last Summertime I was hospitalized for several days and on several occasions, due to medical problems that I had, and that's when I was being represented at the time by Rodney, and that no longer will ever happen again. And I have taken it upon myself to also hire private security, in addition to a new operations manager, Scott Rick, who has been with Jerseys Sports Pub & Grill, prior to my purchase of the business, for approximately 11 years.

MR. HANEY: And also, there - - there are a couple of other things now that the tavern has done. The 4014 Lounge, which is on the premises is no longer used as a second bar. It's

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strictly used now for just private events, private parties. So that they don't draw this kind of - - the two bar crowd that they - - they had been getting. Also, with regard that in the - - with the volleyball courts, which we have to go in front of the zoning about, again, for variance and things, but they no longer use the whistles during the game to try and keep noise down, and instituted a - - a fine for profane language, which helps. It doesn't completely eliminate the bouts of swearing sometimes when people are playing volleyball. But when you're fined a dollar every time you swear, it has - it has made an appreciable effect.

THE APPLICANT: I can only do so much. I try.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you.

MR. HANEY: Did the committee care to. like I said, I've got the copies of letters from other businesses and things in the community. I've got them prepared if the committee would like to take a look at those. If not, that's

CHAIRMAN BOHL: And your testimony? THE WITNESS: I'm going to begin by saying that you probably have not gotten a stack of police reports from me, because I'm a paramedic in the City. I highly respect the police department, and have not called the police probably ten times when I could have. That said, my neighborhood is full of many young families, people that just work for a living, nice normal average people. We don't have big parties. We're not loud. We don't blast music. The bar does. And it brings an element into our neighborhood that none of us are really comfortable with.

I come home, often I work a - - a ten

CHAIRMAN BOHL: If you could all raise your right hand, we'll swear you all in at once. We'll need - - And I just want to say, last call for Jerseys Sports Bar & Grill, 4014-24 South Howell. Anyone else present? All right.

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and two shift. So I'm coming home at bar time or maybe a little bit later, a little earlier. But I come home late. A lot of times when I come home I've seen the patrons leaving the bar. And a lot of them are parked - - are - - The neighborhood where most of us live is like right around the corner from the bar. So within a block and a half. They come out of the bar. A lot of them park, even though there is parking for them, they don't use it, or there's not enough parking or whatever the issue is, frequently illegally parked. Again, it's not an issue like I feel like bothering the police department with, because somebody's parked on the wrong side of the street. But it is irritating and it is a hassle trying to get in and out of our street.

I come home, have found people vomiting in my front yard, urinating in my front yard. I - - I'll spare you the detail, but I do have a nice big bag of cups and beer cans that people are bringing out. And they're not, you don't get a plastic cup in a, you know, with some liquor logo on it like at the grocery store. So they're coming from the bar.

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We had an issue in the warmer months with the volleyball, with, again, the swearing and the cussing. I have small children. Their bedroom faces the back of their volleyball court, kitty-corner. But, you know, having to explain like what the "f" word means to a three year old is like not my style. I don't like it. You know, we've asked repeatedly, and it appears that they tried to make an effort to simmer that down, but, you know, I don't think enough has been changed that the neighbors are really happy about

Other issues are people coming out and using illegal drugs. You know, I don't think people smoke cigarette tobacco out of a bong, you know, and then they come in, they walk down, they 16 light up in the parking lot, and then they go back. I have actually gone outside often when I'm home, and like followed them just to see where they're really coming from. And this element of people was not around in our neighborhood prior to the change in ownership. We did have some issues were the volleyball was lound, but not - - not quite so significant. There's like a lot of broken glass around. I

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00015 in our neighborhood, and - - and we're just 1 2 hardworking people, trying to raise our families, 3

and want to sleep. We don't want people yelling and waking us up at two a.m., because they're stumbling to their cars drunk. I'm done.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you. Questions by committee of this witness? Alderman Kovac.

ALDERMAN KOVAC: When did you notice these problems in terms of the noise and the bike washings and the swearing?

THE WITNESS: The bike washings were more like in the Summer. Obviously, it's a little chilly to have a bikini now, but - -

ALDERMAN KOVAC: But it was just this past Summer? Not previous Summer?

THE WITNESS: Correct. Correct. I - -It may have occurred in the past. I never noticed it in the past.

ALDERMAN KOVAC: And then what about the - - the swearing and the noise?

THE WITNESS: That's really been an issue over the last Summer. There - - There was previously an issue with noise, but it was typically resolved with a phone call. And that has not been my experience this past season.

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don't know why people are walking around with beer bottles, but, you know, it's hard to walk the dog on the sidewalk there, because there's, you know, shards of glass and just junk, just crap all over the neighborhood.

Another thing, and I don't know if this is a licensing issue, but it irritates the heck out of me, is like little bikini-clad bike wash on the sidewalk. That is not what I want my children to see. I have two small boys. And the way that I'm raising them is not that girls are going to stand around in the middle of the street in a bikini and wash motorcycles. I don't appreciate it. I don't like it. I don't know if it's legal. You guys can figure that out for me.

I guess it's - - eventually I just really feel like it's bringing a - - a really unpleasant element into our neighborhood. And we 18 have made efforts. We have had meetings as neighbors. We, you know, today is the first time I've met Christina. So, perhaps, you know, she's going to make this good will effort to change. I hope so. But I also hope that there's some force behind whatever licensing issue goes down, that it makes her do that. Because we don't want this

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CHAIRMAN BOHL: Other questions by committee? Thank you for your testimony. Ma'am we'll take vou next?

THE WITNESS: I would echo - -CHAIRMAN BOHL: And if you would provide your name and address, first thing.

THE WITNESS: I'm sorry.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: That's all right.

THE WITNESS: Sure. It's Denise. The last name is Borzynski, spelled, B, as in boy, O-R-Z-Y-N-S-K-I. The address is 119 East Norwich Street in Milwaukee 53207.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: And your testimony, sentiments? You're pretty much echoing what she has stated?

THE WITNESS: Pretty much what she had to say. My concerns have arisen since the new ownership. Prior, I didn't really notice any - any real problems. I wasn't experiencing any problems.

My big problem has been sleep, lack of sleep. I'll be disrupted in the middle of the night, once, two, three times in the same night. So it's not just one time a night. So my pattern of sleep has not been consistent. You can't

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function after you've had two, three nights of interrupted sleeps. You just can't function anymore. It's really disrupting me. And the reason why I'm here is, when I read the notice about - - it said something about quiet enjoyment. I don't have quiet enjoyment at my home. I really do not. I cannot sleep in my bedroom, literally. And I thought, well, maybe this is an exaggeration. I took a little notebook and started logging, and it was every night. Every night except on Sundays for some reason seems to be a little quieter. But every night I'm - - I'm disrupted. So I had to move from my bedroom into a smaller room with a twin bed just to have a noise barrier of another door, and get my - - my bedroom is on the - - the street side. The guest room is on the back side of the house. So it's a little guieter back there, so I can get some rest. But I can't enjoy my full size bed. I have to sleep in a twin bed

quiet enjoyment of my home at all. There is a lot of noise outside. Just recently there was a fight that broke out. The police were called and I'm surprised that that

with a not so great mattress. So I don't have a

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marked signing that says, no parking. It's for employees and for bank patrons only. So I think that pretty much summarizes. I could go into detail in specific situations where there's been a lot of noise and - - But I don't know that you want me to go into all the details. Just in general. And I have not called the police, because, I, too, like Jen, by the time they get there, the people are gone, usually. And there was one night, I will mention. There was another night when between my home, there's a parking lot, the bank parking lot next to my home. There's two. There's one at - - on my corner, one across the street. The one next to my home, there was a lot of noise going on. I stepped outside, and there was a group of people that was from the bar. And the reason why I know is when they left, they went to the bar. But they had congregated again in that parking lot. There's a garage between my house and the bank parking lo entrance that the Vice-President of - - or the President of the bank uses, and they were there between. So no one on Howell Avenue could see this group of people, no one on the east side of my property would be able to see them. I stepped

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was not in the report. I don't know why it wasn't. However, they did call me. And they were at Packy's. And then I said, well, no, it's the other bar. So then they went over to Jerseys. So maybe that's why it didn't show up in the report. I don't know. But that it may create some confusion, but there was a fight that broke out in the street just recently that really had me quite disturbed. I was really upset. There was a lot of screaming. There's a lot of yelling. The people were trying to break up some individuals that were fighting, going at it. Tires started squealing, and then slamming on the brakes, and I was thinking, oh, my God, is somebody, you know, running down someone on tel:15 sidewalk? I mean, we see these things and hear these things on the news when things get crazy. And it was real scary. And I did call the police and I did report it.

I have observed drug use. Patrons that have left the bar have gone into the bank parking lot. Light up a bowl, and then went around to the other side of the bank and just disregard of parking signs, in "no parking" areas. The bank is a private lot. They disregard the clearly

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out on the porch. When they saw that I was there, then they slowly dispersed and went back to the bar. So what they were doing, I guess is, you know, use your imagination, but I don't know specifically. But there's just been a lot of problems. And it's - - It's just been on a regular basis, and that's why I'm here.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you for your testimony. Questions by committee? Mr. Haney, did you have any questions of either one of the first two witnesses at this point?

MR. HANEY: No, not - - not so much a question. I would like to just let the - -

CHAIRMAN BOHL: I'll - - If you don't have a specific question of them, you'll be provided an opportunity to - - to address and make comments if you will. But this is - - this is an opportunity if you do have any questions for their - - for their testimony.

MR. HANEY: Okay.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you. Thank you for your testimony. Next witness, please.

THE WITNESS: My name is Kelly Murphy, M-U-R-P-H-Y. I reside at 4021 South Burrell Street, and it's Milwaukee 53207.

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It is my testimony today that I agree and concur with the two previous testimonies. Basically, I've seen the same thing. However, my home is directly behind the volleyball court of this bar. I have three children, ages 12, nine and four. This bar - - I've lived in this residence for 17 years. There's been three owners of this bar in my existence at this residence. I have never had a problem with the first owner. They've always been polite, considerate. When he started the volleyball there, he's always - - came over, asked if there were any problems, asked if there was anything he could do. If we had an issue or a problem, he addressed that issue or problem immediately. Not - - Not one time did I have to call the police department, voice a complaint or have an issue with that owner.

The second owner came in, who I - - I'm under - - I'm under the understanding that this current owner is under a land contract. I'm not really sure. But that owner we did have some issues with. Things had escalated to a point with the volleyball court, specifically. Not so much the bar noise, but the volleyball court,

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he starts coming home and asking questions. Not to mention they're on the sidewalk, walking the sidewalk. We have a dog. We have to walk and use a different route to walk the dog, which I don't mind. However, it shouldn't be an inconvenience to me.

The other problem we had, too, is while I was taking the children for a walk or bike rides, they park - - they consistently park their Jerseys' minibus or whatever on the sidewalk. You can't - - You have to go into the street to go around, because there's a fence, there's a sidewalk and then the bar - - and then the entrance into the bar. I can't even enjoy my own neighborhood.

Another issue I wanted to bring up again with respect to the noise. I'm in school. I'm studying to be a nurse. I'm up quite late at night, studying. This last couple of weeks, consistently, having woken - - or alarmed to loud noises, fights, screams, yells, fighting. The smell of drug activity. I mean, it's pretty evident, I'm a little older. I know what marijuana smells like. You can smell it. You step outside your house. You smell it. In the

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where the volleyballs were coming over and damaging my property. The people on the deck were keeping my children awake, keeping my husband and myself awake, swearing, noise, same kind of issue. Not to the point or the escalation of this current owner.

Since this owner has taken over, I've had nothing but horrible night's sleep. I've got three kids, as per, you know, the other two testimonies, or one testimony, asking me what these words mean. I haver a four year old who started swearing consistently, telling me, oh, that's what they say across the fence, mommy. It is - - It is very hard, as a parent, to try to teach your children what acceptable language is and unacceptable language is when you're hearing it from adults. I have a 13 year old, and throughout the Summer, obviously, he's 13 - well, going to be 13. He rides his bike with his friends. I had to keep my son on our side of the - - not allow him to go to Howell Avenue, not allow him to go far, because there are string bikini - - women in string bikinis washing motorcycles on a sidewalk. This is not something you want your 13 year old son to see. And then

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Summertime I have to shut my windows and turn of the air conditioning, because my children can't sleep. On a nice cool Summer day, why should I have to shut my windows and turn on my air, because a bar wants to have their loud noise and their patrons? During the volleyball season, they are out there until 10:30, 11 o'clock at night. After volleyball, they're out there even longer. 20 to 40 people at a time, screaming, yelling, hollering, laughing, creating noise after volleyball. I know there's an issue being brought in front of the - - the Board for Zoning Appeals. We had that. There was a time issuance when volleyball was supposed to end. This particular owner didn't want to abide by that rule, continued to have the volleyball to 10:30. That issue was brought in front of one of the supervisors of the City, and from my understanding the volleyball was placarded. They weren't allow to use the deck, whatsoever. As of October 30th, they were on the deck. Patrons were on the deck.

Rodney, I'm not sure of his last name, the person that was representing the bar. On October 30th - - 31st, 2009, came to my home,

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       representing the bar, telling me that they were
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       having a live band until 2:30 in the morning. He
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       offered me a bottle of wine, and said, I am so
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       sorry. If there's anything I can do. We're
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       having this live band. I'm not sure if they have
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       a license to have live bands, music or not, but I
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       said, Rodney, my concern is not with - - I don't
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       want your bottle of wine. What I want is quiet
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       and peace in my neighborhood, in my yard,
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       surrounding my home. He goes, well, I just want
       to tell you we're having a band until two a.m.,
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       so you might want to shut your windows. Now this
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       person represented the bar on October 31st of
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       2009 at my home. He's been consistently at my
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       home. I've never met Christina Elliot. I've
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       only known of her. I've never met her. Rodney
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       has always represented the bar up until that day.
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       That was the last time he was at my home. He
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       gave me his phone number, the phone number of the 9
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       bar, Scott, I think his name was. And said if
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       you have any problems, please call. At 1:30 in
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       the morning on Halloween I called and said, you
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       have about 22 people - - because I went outside,
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       literally, and counted how many people were on
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00027 that. To me, it's all a lot of blah, blah, blah. 1 2 blah. Nothing ever happens. Nothing changes. 3 It just seems to be getting worse.

THE WITNESS: Gee, that was maybe ten years, I think.

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could you please remove those patrons from the deck who are not supposed to be on there anyway and could you please ask your band to quiet it down a little and shut the doors to the bar? About 15 minutes later, the people were off the deck, the noise came down a little bit. I continued to study. About - - About 2:05 a.m., people back out on the deck, noise was getting louder, doors were open. I called Rodney again. I called the alternate number again. I did not receive an answer.

So this is a continuing problem, and it seems like it's escalating worse and worse and worse and worse. And I - - I've talked to the police department. I've talked to the Sergeants of the police department. I've talked to the Captains of the police department, because we recently switched from District 2 to District 6. So this is a move for District 6. I've spoken with the Alderman. I've spoken with Rodney, the owner. Other - - Other neighbors and I have spoken in regards to this issue. Something needs to be done to stop this, because it's just going to continue to get worse. And I hear, we're trying, we're going to do this, we're going to do

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ALDERMAN KOVAC: How long has Rodney owned it?

THE APPLICANT: Rodney does not own it. I own it.

ALDERMAN KOVAC: How long has - - this current ownership?

THE WITNESS: It's just been a year.

ALDERMAN KOVAC: One year, okay. So you had no problems with it ten or so years with one owner, and then the five or so years with - with another owner.

THE WITNESS: Yeah. The second owner, we did have issues. We did have, but it's mainly with the volleyball and the noise from the volleyball, the damage to our home from the vollevballs.

ALDERMAN KOVAC: And the second owner started the volleyball?

THE WITNESS: No, the - - the first one started volleyball, but we did not have any issues, whatsoever. He ended at - - The volleyball always ended promptly at nine p.m. Lights were off at nine p.m. We did have a young - - We had a small - - small child at the time. Swearing did start to happen. I brought it up to

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       the owner at that time. He then kicked that
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       entire team out. And we never had a problem
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       since. So that to me is an owner who cares about
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       the people around his establishment, an owner who
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       cares about family and family values, an owner
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who tries to make a neighborhood happy.

ALDERMAN KOVAC: So you said that there were problems before last year, but they were always being resolved. And last year, you've had problems that were not resolved.

THE WITNESS: No, the - - the problems that we had, they were immediately resolved always, with the first owner.

ALDERMAN KOVAC: Okay.

THE WITNESS: His first name was Pete. That might help. The second owner was Todd. And 16 we - - The issues we had were Todd - - with Todd were not so much noise coming from the bar. because he didn't have live bands. He didn't have - - It was mainly - - It was tolerable. Put it that way. But the problems came with the volleyball with - - with Todd. It just went awry. And there was - - They got louder and louder. They swore more, and the volleyballs were coming over the fence, and they were

00031 ALDERMAN KOVAC: Okav. 1 2 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Other questions by 3 committee? Were there any questions that you had 4 of this witness at this time? 5 MR. HANEY: No.

6 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. Sir, we'll take 7 your testimony now. 8

THE WITNESS: My name is Pat Murphy. CHAIRMAN BOHL: And if you could come a little closer, please. Thank you.

THE WITNESS: I live at 4021 South Burrell, directly behind Jerseys Bar, with my wife. Basically, every - - everything she has said is what I - - I can say the same thing over again, and waste your time. Numerous nights I tried to go to bed, I can't, because of the volleyball. The noise bouncing off, balls coming in the yard. The other thing is we ended putting up video surveillance, because we had people walking up our drive. I have "no trespassing" signs on the lawn and - - and on my house, because people were coming in to get the balls. And they'd yell, well, those are our balls. And -- And once they hit my land, they're mine. I'm not going to put up with it. I've been told

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damaging our property. So we got - - At one point we had 44 volleyballs, because we kept putting them in a bag. And we had - - made issuance with him and talked to him. Did not get resolved. Brought it in front of the Board of Zoning Appeals at that time. And now we have this owner, which we've had for a year.

ALDERMAN KOVAC: And so you - - You mentioned a couple names. You mentioned Rodne Lass and Scott Rick, and you said Rodney came to your house - -

> THE WITNESS: Rodney - -ALDERMAN KOVAC: -- just to --THE WITNESS: Yes, Rod - -

ALDERMAN KOVAC: You're sure it was

Rodney, not Scott.

THE WITNESS: Yes, Rod - - Oh, I'm sure. Rodney is the only one that we ever had contact, physically, in person with. He's the only one who has ever represented the bar in the last year. And he was at my house on October 31st, 2009, representing the bar.

ALDERMAN KOVAC: So you've never met Scott or Christina before today? THE WITNESS: No.

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they're going to put new netting up for the volleyballs. That hasn't happened. Then you get the swearing with the volleyball and you get all this - - all the stuff all three of us have said. And it's - - And it's got to come to an end.

I've been - - Halloween night I heard people yelling, fighting, breaking up fights, you know. I don't need that. My kids don't need to listen to it. My two daughters sleep in the bedroom right by the volleyball court. They can't sleep. How can I send them to school? Sorry, kids, you got to stay up until 10:30 tonight, because they want to be up, when I put them to bed at 7:30. It's - - I can't - - It's been a lot better since the City placarded that volleyball, because my kids can go to bed. I can finally sit in my backyard and enjoy my backyard instead of listening to volleyball. If I want to go to a gym, I'll go to the gym and listen to volleyball. Or listen to a band, I'll got to a band. But I don't want to listen to it in my backyard.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you. Questions by committee? Mr. Haney? MR. HANEY: No.

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             CHAIRMAN BOHL: Just like - - Just like

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resident, did the - - Why do you believe it was Mr. Lass that came to you? Is that who he introduced himself as?

THE WITNESS: He's been to my house several times prior to that.

THE WITNESS: He's well-known - THE WITNESS: He's well-known. He
comes to all of our houses. And when I called
that evening of Halloween, he answered his phone
He was at the bar.

MR. HANEY: Well, and I was going to say, along with that, Ms. Elliot told me that on Halloween she was - - she was at the bar, and she was taking all the phone calls. So if Mr. Lass was receiving phone calls at his phone, he was not at the bar, and it was not - -

THE WITNESS: Everyone was -MR. HANEY: No, that - - There is
obviously, you know, I'm not - - I am in no way
want to be taken as saying that what you're being
told by this witness is not true. I mean, that - that I'm not saying at all. But I want to make
it real clear that if, indeed, Mr. Lass was
there, we will - - we will look into that.
Because he was - - He was not - - First of all,

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he's not an employee. An employee was given the direction to go and talk to the neighbors, and specific with giving the bottle of wine. But it was not - - not Mr. Lass, not his responsibility, not any of his business. And this Georgio reported back that he had taken care of that to Ms. Elliot. So that, as far as any kind of incident there, I am not - - I share the displeasure of these witnesses that that occurred. Because that was not - - not intended.

It's my understanding with the volleyball that in the, at least the lighting and stuff, that runs on a timer that turns off at 9:30 - 9:45?

THE APPLICANT: 9:45.

MR. HANEY: Yeah. So I don't know - - We don't know where - - At that, I don't - - I don't understand how or I got kind of an impression sitting here that we're having volleyball until two in the morning or something, and if it may be that an earlier hour, if 9:45 is too late of an hour, or something, perhaps it's something we can look at in the future. That is not a problem.

This whole thing with the motorcycle

THE APPLICANT: At bar time I have security for the patrons.

MR. HANEY: And that may be that what we need to do is have a little bit of patrolling security just before the bar time, too. So that it becomes known to the clientele that there are these official looking eyes that are - - are going through. I hope that - - You know, I hope that we can work with the - - with the neighbors, to be able to address some of these concerns. Because most certainly. I don't - - I don't in any way doubt the sincerity that these people have some issues, but I - - I don't think that there's anything here that's completely unmanageable, and I hope that - - that they'd be willing to work with Ms. Elliot in the - - in the spirit of being able to address their concerns. ALDERMAN ZIELINSKI: Mr. Chairman.

ALDERMAN ZIELINSKI: Mr. Chairman. CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you. Alderman Zielinski.

ALDERMAN ZIELINSKI: I'd like to - - Going back to the bikinis. Are there people with bikinis inside the bar?

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wash, apparently that was something that took place in July on four different Mondays. It was discontinued just because of a number of problems and happened those four times. So, that's not a - - again, I'm just getting all excited thinking what I was missing by not being there, but apparently it's an event that's already concluded and there's nothing - - nothing ongoing with that.

So, I - - I think that - - I think these people are bringing some concerns, and boy I understand and - - and - - Oh, last one is the parking. There have been a tremendous amount of problems with parking in the area, and the bank was good enough to work with Jerseys and does allow patrons to park there. I mean, this is not that they're just flooding into the bank's parking lot without the bank's knowledge or permission. That was secured. Now, if there are problems with that, there are a couple of things we can do. There is security at the bar that does not let people leave with glass bottles. And if, perhaps, we need to have some type of patrolling security to get out, make sure that they're going through those parking lots

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THE APPLICANT: Well, the same girls that did the - - the bike wash on the sidewalk were - - They'd come in and out of the bar, yes.

ALDERMAN ZIELINSKI: So there's - - So

THE APPLICANT: And the girls that played volleyball during the Summertime have bikini tops or shorts and things like that.

ALDERMAN ZIELINSKI: So what you're telling me is that - -

THE APPLICANT: And the police - - I'm sorry. I would like to finish my sentence, please. The police officers on duty in our area, first of all, the - - The bike wash had been in the evenings from seven to nine p.m. And it took place on our portion of our poured concrete of - of Jerseys, in front. There's quite a large cement slab that is not a part of the city sidewalk. And that is where it took place, it's up by our deck area. And that is something that, you know, it was discontinued. It was just in the month of July, those hours, and it was in an effort to attract all of the Harley-Davidson riders that were coming into town for all of the promotions that Harley-Davidson was doing during

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the month of July with the anniversaries and the bike weeks and things.

I do have quite an extensive stack of papers here, where there is police - -

ALDERMAN ZIELINSKI: Well, I'm not finished.

THE APPLICANT: I'm addressing their calls on these weeks.

ALDERMAN ZIELINSKI: Okay. But I'm not finished with my questions. Okay. I have the floor. Okay?

The reason why I asked the question about the bikinis is. I was just speaking with Alderman Witkowski who heard noise so loud emanating from the bar over a month ago, and he went in the bar, and he said that he saw two women with bikinis inside the bar. So I just talked with him this morning to confirm this, because he - - he mentioned that to me awhile agd when he first saw it. So - - So, to your knowledge, that's not the case inside the bar. MR. HANEY: No.

THE APPLICANT: No.

ALDERMAN ZIELINSKI: Okay. Let me ask you a question about the ownership. You

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1 the last year. They've tried to make contact. 2 They - - They spoke with this individual, who you 3 no longer have any dealings with in a 4 professional sense. And, you know, what I'm 5 wondering is, what are you going to do 6 differently than what's been going on for the 7 last year? 8

MR. HANEY: Well, the first - - The first thing is, is that Ms. Elliot should be the contact person when these people call. And we have no problem with giving, you know, that information, so they can get a hold of her and her directly.

Frankly, and - - and I make no bones about it. It was a mistake to be using Mr. Lass in the capacity of trying to be a peacekeeper in the neighborhood. That was - - That was flat out a mistake. And I don't think - - I don't think any of these three ladies or Mr. Murphy would disagree with that in - - in any - - by any stretch of the imagination. That was just, you know - - Sometimes you, you know, Mister - - Mr. Lass, as I say, he was there as a cook. He had some - - He was involved with coming up with som of the promotional ideas. And he just seemed to

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mentioned that you own it. I'm on-line here, and it says, Todd Sakolowski owns the - - owns the property. Have you just recently bought it?

THE APPLICANT: I own the business. Not the property.

ALDERMAN ZIELINSKI: Okay. But not the property.

THE APPLICANT: I have a - - a land contract that I'm establishing ownership of the property for, but I purchased the business.

ALDERMAN ZIELINSKI: Okay. Was - - Was there any robberies that occurred at your establishment in the last week or so?

THE APPLICANT: We had an issue with our entertainment machines, that we had a few of the machines that were broken into, but it wasn't a - - a robbery. There has been a few establishments in our area that have had problems with their machines being broken into, but that's it.

ALDERMAN ZIELINSKI: You know, I - - I just have a question here, you know, the - - You know, the attorney mentioned that, you know, you want to work with the neighbors. I've been getting phone calls from the neighbors for like

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be, at the time, kind of a good person, yeah, we'll send him out, that he can explain these things. He did a very poor job, did a very poor job on it, and didn't deal with it. So the answer to your question is what can be different? Is I think if we can establish the kind of direct relationship with Ms. Elliot that would not have any intermediaries getting in between to be able to get some direct communication and direct responsibility and direct accountability, that that - - that hopefully will be able to address it.

Now, as I say, the - - One of the issues that came up is the netting with the volleyball. It's my understanding that the bar recently spent over 2,000 dollars putting in new netting. So, if there is an issue here about, you know, the netting and stuff, I believe that that's been addressed.

I know some of these other issues, as I said, discontinuing the bikini bike wash, you know, that - - and to be honest, in - - in theory something like that - - I live - - I live down on the south side in that area, too. Sometimes there's not always the thought of what is the effect going to be on people that are - - are living in the residential part of the neighborhood. And hopefully, that with improved communication and direct communication, some of these issues can - - can be addressed. If anybody thinks - - Oh, and also, the history about bands. My understanding is in the last year there's been three live bands. Okay. So if - - And again, getting the impression that, as I said, listening to it, I was wondering if this was like some kind of weekly or monthly thing, and it was just on - on three separate occasions where - - where there

THE APPLICANT: No, and Halloween.
MR. HANEY: And apparently, Halloween,
they were shut down. And occasionally, you know
if - - if anybody believes that any tavern is
never going to have any kind of a problem with
its neighbors, I mean, obviously everybody here
realizes that that's not going to happen. And as
we say, we - - we have not in the last year,

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1 premises, they never had any problems with him.

He ran a good upstanding responsible business.The next guy was a step down. There was

4 problems. We had - - We had neighbors down here

last year. And now it's gone completely down.Based on what I'm, you know, based on what I'm

hearing over here, and, you know, the neighbors

have been calling up about the volleyball courts.

9 There's been no satisfaction, whatsoever, with respect to working with the neighbors on the

volleyball courts. You know, and then sending, you know, I mean, there's a lot of questionable

judgment here. I mean, having this individual

going around talking to neighbors, based on what l'm hearing, he doesn't sound like he's the most

diplomatic, you know, guy in the world, based on
 the police report, you know, domestic violence,
 based on, you know, his interaction with people

in the neighborhood, that's the last person you send around to try and mediate problems with the neighbors.

So, you know, this place is just fraught with all sorts of decisions that are lacking in judgment, and that's why I think we've

got problems with - - with the neighbors over

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which has been the first year that the - - that this license holder has been at the bar, made a couple of mistakes. Made some big ones, and we apologize for it. And we believe that we can address these issues, and we ask that we be given the chance to. Certainly, we have noticed in no uncertain terms that there are some issues here that the - - that the neighbors feel need to be addressed. And we do not want to just, you know. say, gee, we're just going to, you know, act, you know, like bad neighbors. Because that's not what it is. What makes a neighborhood a neighborhood is the fact that businesses and the residents should be able to get together and - and work better. We have not done the best job of it, and we're going to see what we can do to -- to strive to be there.

ALDERMAN ZIELINSKI: Well - - Mr. Chairman.

I'll tell you, I have to - - You know,
I sit on this committee, members sit on this
committee. We hear everything. And I'll tell
you, there's plenty of bars where there's no
problems, whatsoever. And these people alluded
to the fact that the first owner of this

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MR. HANEY: And then, specifically addressing some of the - - the points that you raised. The - - When the first owner had it, it was only what is now the 4014 Club, the - - the rest of the bar in the back and stuff did not exist.

THE APPLICANT: No, that's not true. MR. HANEY: If - - You said - -

THE APPLICANT: I said - -

MR. HANEY: It has - - hasn't got - -He owned it originally, and then - - and then built that out. Sold it then to the second neighbor. So it was at that point that the - that, just the size of the operation expanded.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Staying at that point. Alderman Zielinski and everyone else applys, I think we - - I've been very lenient in us talking about establishments from 17 years ago. I mean, it gives us perspective. The neighbors say they didn't have any problems then. I don't want to focus on them. I need to speed this up right now here. I mean - -

MR. HANEY: I feel - -

CHAIRMAN BOHL: If you may. If you

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may, because I hold the gavel, and I'm in charge
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here. Okay. So - -MR. HANEY: That's fine.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: And I don't want to be that way, but you're interrupting here. Okay. I'm reigning in, okay. I've been very, very lenient with allowing everyone with the opportunity to provide full testimony, but we're falling very, very far behind. So I'm going to allow you to summarize what you need to do here. and then we're going to call it a day. I mean, everybody else - - I'm not asking any more questions, because I don't - - I think that - -Yeah, you're going to have the opportunity to provide your closing, but I think that everything that we need to hear has been told. And we'll allow them to make a response and then we're going to render a decision on this. However you wish - - Ma'am, no.

THE WITNESS: May I make just one comment?

CHAIRMAN BOHL: No. I - - I think that I've provided each of you the opportunity to speak at will.

THE WITNESS: There's something that

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would be able to get it taken care of. 1 2 ALDERWOMAN COGGS: Mr. Chairman. 3 CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderwoman Coggs. 4

ALDERWOMAN COGGS: You said that there will be no more bikini car washing upon your

THE APPLICANT: That's not a problem. It was a promotional event that took place. And I would like an opportunity, please, just to have

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Go ahead. Sure. THE APPLICANT: - - my say, because, I'm sorry, but my attorney has not covered a few of the things I feel are very important here.

I, first and foremost, have a wonderful staff at Jerseys. I employ 15 people in the City that have families, as well. I, too, have small children. I, too, am a hardworking person that is trying to provide. I have police reports from our district for the calls that they are speaking off, all with C9 and C10, where there has been, no problem, filed by the police when they had come to our establishment. 28 different pages here with no problems for the times where the police have been called. If at any time I

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needs to be clarified, though, that he said. CHAIRMAN BOHL: I'm not worried about it. Because he may be incorrect. That's testimony, okay. Thank you.

> MR. HANEY: Just - - Just - -CHAIRMAN BOHL: Your closing.

MR. HANEY: The 4014, one of the two establishments there is no longer used regularly as a bar, just for private parties. That will cut down some of the - - some of the traffic areas. We can increase some of the security presence in the lots that are being used from the bank, be able to make sure that there's not the kind of problems that these people have talked about. And the - - As the volleyball season, as it comes up, we'd be more than happy to meet with 16 people and see if maybe there does need to be some kind of adjustment with the hours. If --If from the 9:45, that's a problem, and it used to be nine o'clock, there - - there may be some -- some way we can reach some kind of a comprom ≥21

with all of this. But, ultimately, I don't - - I don't think that - - I don't think there's anything here that we've - - that we've discussed that seems to be insurmountable in the way we

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thought that there was a problem, I would fix it. This is my livelihood. This - - I'm a single mother with three children. I don't want to lose my business, and I most definitely don't want to upset my neighbors.

My intent in purchasing this business was to - - to - - to make it better, because it was decrepit, to say the least, when I took over the business. I have put in literally, 100,000 dollars in improvement in the property alone, to - - to the value of the appearance on the outside, to the inside. I am gearing the clientele more towards a - - a chance of Americana type of atmosphere, whereas before it had more of a - - a corner bar type feel when I took over the business.

I have business owners that, unfortunately, they had to run their businesses this morning, but they did their best and they -- they wrote letters to say that I have done a good job. This Summer, yes, my management staf that was in control with Scott Rick and Georgio, obviously, they did not make some good judgment calls. And that will have to be rectified. It's been rectified, my actually knowing a lot of

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these things. I have a staff that can take messages for me. I've never received one message to return a phone call from not one of these neighbors, and I'm not depleting, we know what they're saying. I'm sure that they obviously feel this way, because they wouldn't be taking time out of their important days. And I appreciate what is being said, but I really wish I would have had the opportunity to speak with them prior to. They all said that they've known of me or knew of my existence, yet, no attempt was made to contact me directly. And I'm very, very, very, very sorry that they feel that they have not been heard. I've heard them loud and clear, and things will change, or I will surrender my license. I don't want problems. I want a good business, and I want a good relationship with my neighbors. That's all I have to sav.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you. Alderman Kovac.

ALDERMAN KOVAC: Just a couple very specific questions. Your lawyer mentioned compromise was possible, and they said previously an hour issue, they said previously volleyball

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reports here where there are times that they were called, and the police officers have in these reports that there wasn't swearing, there was no loud music, lights were off, though the calls were made, lights were off when the police got there and hadn't been on. I - - The proof is right here in these papers, as far as that is concerned. 

ALDERMAN KOVAC: My other specific question is you mentioned, I think you told your lawyer, your lawyer mentioned that on Halloween you closed at - -

THE APPLICANT: The band was done at midnight.

15 ALDERMAN KOVAC: We have specific testimony - -

THE APPLICANT: I gave the band until midnight. No.

ALDERMAN KOVAC: -- that 2:05 there were people on the porch?

THE APPLICANT: No. No. We had security. It was on lock down. I - - Where the porch is, there - - there is a sidewalk directly in front, so I can see how it could be misconstrued or if the voices were heard, because

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closed at nine and now we're at between 9:45. Are you willing to commit to stopping volleyball at nine?

THE APPLICANT: I'm sorry. I really can't, because when you're in the league, you have to abide by what everybody else's hours are. And it's ten p.m. And I'm already shutting it down as early as I can without losing my business. And it's only two nights a week, three tops, if we have the Sunday free - - free league.

MR. HANEY: But as far as that may be the setting what the league rules are. So if we can get - - If we can get some rules, that as a member of the league, we can influence people to get some of those city league rules changed. But that's - -

THE APPLICANT: But a lot of people work, and we can't start a game - - I mean, I'm doing the best I can, and I am open to compromise to try and fix it. I don't know about the hours. I have turned down the lights. I - - I know that - - that more has been done that what has been alluded to by - - by my neighbors. I have invited our Alderman, Mr. Zielinski, to come at any time and do a surprise check. I have police

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that was the time when everybody was dissipating. I - - I won't deny it was a very busy night. It was a busy night for our entire block. Rookies, which is across the street from me, they had Mount Olive as a live band that night, as well. Packy's had their Halloween party that night. The street was full of business that night.

ALDERMAN KOVAC: I mean, I - - If you were a neighbor and, you know, you had several years where the place closed up at nine.

THE APPLICANT: I can appreciate what they say, yes.

ALDERMAN KOVAC: And you have - - You do have small children. I assume you don't - - they don't live next to a volleyball court that goes past bedtime.

THE APPLICANT: No.

ALDERMAN KOVAC: So you say you understand where they're coming from. You hear them loud and clear, and yet on their specific - - When it gets to specifics, I don't feel like you are. That's a comment on the question.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: All right. With that, we're in committee.

ALDERMAN ZIELINSKI: Mr. Chairman.

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CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Zielinski.
ALDERMAN ZIELINSKI: Yeah, well, they
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just got done saying, you know, that they can't close down early. Well, they can't close the - the volleyball courts early. Well, according to the records that our license division has, the previous owner agreed, and it's in the records here, to close down the volleyball courts at 8:30. That's someone that's willing to compromise and work with the neighborhood here I really don't sense that there's any sincerity to really - - I think there's a lot of denial

going on here. You know, Todd was - - had some issues. He came down here. He agreed to compromise, close at eight - - 8:30, but he

didn't have all this other stuff that people are referring to with, you know, seeing bongs outside, you know - - you know, stuff like that

going on. You know, I - - I - - Mr. Chairman, based on the police report, based on the

neighborhood testimony, I would move approval of the renewal of the license with a 45 day

suspension and non-renewal of the - - of any liquor to be consumed outside the premises.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. The - -

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certain - - I'm guessing he is correct. We do have the ability to amend the application that would include the floor plan, if you will, to - to deny the extension of premises to exclude the exterior of the property outside of the building?

MR. SCHRIMPF: What's going on here is that there is - - I would assume there is a permanent extension of the Class "B" for the volleyball court, and what's going on, the way I understand Alderman Zielinski's motion, would be to deny renewal of the permanent extension of the Class "B" to the volleyball court and to renew the Class "B" of the entire facility with a 45 day suspension.

ALDERMAN ZIELINSKI: Exactly, because the - - And - - And that includes the patio, because of the ongoing problems out there.

MR. SCHRIMPF: And just so that everyone is clear, that doesn't necessarily stop volleyball. It just means you can't serve alcohol and you can't carry alcohol out onto the vollevball court.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Ms. Grill, was there anything that you needed to add to that? MS. GRILL: I was just going to add

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ALDERMAN ZIELINSKI: And my - - My intention is to send a very strong message with a 45 day suspension, that next time, if we have the same people here next year, and we've got the same issues next year, we're going - - we're going to go for something, you know, stronger. But I think a message needs to be sent that, you know, denial is not acceptable, you know, and, you know, this gives them a chance with a 45 day suspension, gives them a chance to straighten things out, to - - to work with the neighborhood, and don't send anybody else and then, you know, blame it on someone else dealing with the neighbors instead of you directly. You could have went, you know, to the neighbors directly yourself. But I've been getting phone calls from, you know, from the neighbors all throughout the year. We've been keeping records and tabs, and this is definitely worse than - - than what Todd had. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Thank you. That has to deal with the extension of premises, Alderman Zielinski?

ALDERMAN ZIELINSKI: Yes.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Mr. Schrimpf, I'm

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about the patio, that is also a permanent extension.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman, did you want to include both of those?

ALDERMAN ZIELINSKI: Yes.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okav. The motion by Alderman Zielinski is to recommend approval of the renewal of the licenses with the issuance of a 45 day suspension, and also, to - - to also deny the sale and consumption of alcohol as part of any previous permanent outdoor extension to the property, to include the volleyball area and the deck. Is there discussion on the motion?

ALDERWOMAN COGGS: Umm - -

CHAIRMAN BOHL: On the motion, Alderman

- - Alderwoman Coggs.

ALDERWOMAN COGGS: I won't be supporting the motion. But I - - I will say this. I just want - - this illustrates to people at home watching other licensees how critically important it is for you, as the licensee, to talk to your neighbors. Because there are so many issues that could be worked out before you get before us, before you take up hours of our time and yours, and before you have to face strict

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penalties, potentially. But I - - I won't be supporting the motion.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: And I think the same applies to my discussion with one of the - - the gentleman that was from a previous license here. And that is, when you are an owner and operator, don't believe that the onus is on the neighbors to come in and complain to you, or that you have to hear secondhand. I'd be over at their house frequently, you know, just knocking on the door. Hey, are there any issues? I mean, that was what we heard from you with the - - with the owner, two - - two ago or two removed, where he said that you didn't have those issues. I mean, if you, early on, you kind of go in and say, hey, are you having any other problems, please let me know. I just wanted to - - to hear from you. The best way to deal with a potential problem is to try to address it in advance and be proactive to try to prevent it, and not just wait for them to come.

ALDERMAN ZIELINSKI: One - - One more comment on my motion.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. I just wanted to finish. And I will - - I will just say, Alderman

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CHAIRMAN BOHL: No, no. We're in committee. No, no, no. Mr. Haney - - Mr. Haney - - Mr. Haney, just - - I didn't allow her, and I'm not going to allow you.

MR. HANEY: No.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: And, Mr. Haney, please, okay. And - - And, again, if it happens again, I will ask that you be removed from the - - the room. We're in committee. That means this side only. On the - - On the motion, is there any other discussion?

ALDERMAN HAMILTON: Mr. Chairman. CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman Hamilton. ALDERMAN HAMILTON: I - - I agree with you. I'm going to not support the motion, as well. I think there is a - - a way of forcing that conversation in compromise when it comes to the extension of the premises and imposing a - - a suspension on that, as well, as, you know, and - - and forcing that conversation with the - - with the neighbors. But I - - I think it's a little too - - too strict. So I'm going to object, too.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Alderman, I'm doing the math, and you got three objections.

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Zielinski, I'm also not going to support the motion. I will support a stiff penalty. I think that that's a little too stringent. And what I will say is given the fact that we had a couple of neighbors, I think, testified a couple times ago who got a warning letter, I - - I - - What I look at, a comparison, I think that this - - I would - - I was the one who voted against that, because I believed in there being a suspension there. I think that this one is just a little too stringent. But I do think a severe penalty does need to take place here. But on the motion, Alderman Zielinski.

ALDERMAN ZIELINSKI: I'll tell you, the reason why I made the motion, one of the reasons why is - - is when we talked about some sort of compromise with the volleyball court, she said, oh, no, we definitely can't do anything with that, when the previous owner and our licensing division manager referenced the fact that he agreed to close the volleyball court at 8:30. But, no, when they know that this is a serious situation, they're refusing to even acknowledge any compromise on that.

MR. HANEY: I would just - -

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ALDERMAN ZIELINSKI: I'll - - I'll make a new motion then.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. You'll withdraw the original motion then.

ALDERMAN ZIELINSKI: I'll withdraw the original one, but I - - It makes no sense to have a suspension on the extension of premises permit, because there's not going to be any drinking outside in the Wintertime, anyway.

ALDERMAN HAMILTON: You can't - - Could you - -

CHAIRMAN BOHL: You can't - - You can't throw it six months down the line here.

ALDERMAN ZIELINSKI: Yeah. So that's - What I'll have to do then is - - Because I know
that the neighbors are going to be fighting the,
you know, the volleyball court in the, you know,
in BOZA. So I'll just withdraw the extension of
premises non-renewal and - - and stick with a 45
day suspension.

CHAIRMAN BOHL: Okay. All right. Motion by Alderman Zielinski is to recommend approval of the renewal of the license with the issuance of a 45 day suspension. Any discussion on that motion? Are there objections to that
