Energy Reduction Team creating comprehensive energy plan. Outcomes include:

- <u>Minimum Energy Efficiency Guide:</u> creates and identifies minimum energy efficiency standards for building mechanicals/equipment purchases (HVAC, Lighting, Etc.)
- <u>Fleet Audit:</u> Evaluates fleet fuel consumption in conjunction with DPW, Police, Fire, and Parking Fleet staff to identify opportunities for alternative fuel use.
 - Includes hybrid/electric vehicles when applicable.
 - Ex: Hybrid Police Interceptors

Encourage your guests to bring reusable




water bottles. We all know how hot events can get in the summertime. Providing refillable water stations can save you money while encouraging your guests to stay healthy and hydrated.



REDUCE

aving fun can be The best way to keep waste out of our waterways and streets is to use less. This can be as easy as offering individual utensils instead of plastic bags with a fork, knife, and spoon that won't all be used, for example. Do your guests really need plastic bags? Take a moment before you buy to consider what your event actually needs to be successful.



COMPOST

Employing a compost system at your event can reduce your container waste but also give your food scraps a second life. Organizations like Compost Crusader and Kompost Kids can help facilitate the system and educate your guests!

Terms to look for: compostable, marine biodegradable, PLA.

Local company, Auburn Supply Group, provides compostable materials with an easy-to-use order system that helps you find exactly what you're looking for.



LANDFILL

We know it's impossible to completely prevent sending waste to the landfill. Be sure to always have adequate trash receptacles to prevent contamination of your recycling and compost bins.

Aim for the trifecta: compost, recycling, and landfill in a row with clear and consistent labeling.



REUSE

Switching to reusable containers at your event is easier than ever! Wisconsin State Health Code allows drinkware to be refilled again and again as long as the cup doesn't touch the pour spout (just like using your own travel mug at your favorite coffee shop). You can order commemorative cups, like the HaloVino wine cups pictured at left, to use throughout the event. Companies like r.Cup will even come and facilitate a deposit system, allowing event guests to keep their cup or return it at the end-- and they do all the dishes!





RECYCLE

Recycling is the law in the State of Wisconsin. The City of Milwaukee recycles paper, cardboard, metal cans, and plastics #1, 2, & 5. Prevent confusion and contamination by avoiding containers that can't be recycled all together

Styrofoam (Plastic #6 or polystyrene) is not recyclable in Milwaukee and never breaks down in the landfill--a styrofoam free event is an easy first sustainable step!

Consider submitting a requisition for a vendor contract for repetitive purchases in excess of \$15,000 annually.

ten easy tips to be more sustainable in the office

Skip the plastic water bottles. Milwaukee is nationally recognized for high-quality, safe drinking water. Invest in a reusable water bottle and save money by getting your water straight from the bubbler or the tap.

- 2 Think before you print. Printing only when necessary can save paper and help de-clutter your desk. When you do need to print, choose double-sided, black and white, and/or draft mode to save money and energy.
- Create a zero-waste kit to leave at your desk. Leave a mug, water bottle, silverware, straw, and/or cloth bag at your desk so you're always ready to skip the plastic when you grab coffee or lunch.
- Hop on the streetcar or a bike. Taking a bike or public transportation to work or to your next meeting saves energy and prevents traffic.
- Shut down when you leave. Turning your computer and lights off before leaving in the evenings and especially over the weekend can be an easy step towards huge energy savings.
- Check out our sustainable purchasing tips. Next time you're ordering office supplies, try opting for a compostable, recyclable, or post-consumer recycled alternative! You can find examples of these products on the Mint page.
- To End the wish-cycling. Milwaukee recycles cans, cardboard, paper, and plastics #1, 2, and 5. Remember to rinse out your containers and to not crush cans before tossing them in the bin. But you don't have to remove staples before recycling paper!
- Switch your computer to "Power Saver." Go to Control Panel > Power Options and choose "Power Saver." You may also need to adjust your brightness settings.
- Set goals for a Green Event. The City of Milwaukee Green Events Guide can help your office throw more sustainable public events. This will help showcase Milwaukee's leadership in reducing our use of single-use plastics! Find the guide on Mint.
- **Take the stairs when possible**. Opting for the stairs when possible can save energy while helping you get your steps in for the City's Healthy Rewards program.
