

Overdose Deaths

2019 City of Milwaukee Overdoses



- The graph depicts the numbers for heroin related overdoses within the City of Milwaukee.
- Between 1/1/2019 to 9/8/2019 there were 188 confirmed overdose deaths in Milwaukee by the Medical Examiner's Office (141 heroin related overdose deaths). There are 85 overdoses pending toxicology to 10/3/2019.
- Between 1/1/2018 to 9/8/2018 there were 192 overdose deaths (145 heroin related overdose deaths).
- Full year 2018 there were 275
 confirmed overdose deaths in
 Milwaukee by the Medical Examiner's
 Office (200 heroin related overdose deaths).

High Frequency Neighborhoods

- In 2018, 5 of Milwaukee's 190 neighborhoods accounted for 32% of homicides and 12 neighborhoods accounted for 46% of non-fatal shootings.
 - Through September 2019, homicides were down 28% and nonfatal shootings were down 30% (from 2018) in those neighborhoods.

 - Improve High Frequency Neighborhoods




Prioritizing Community Engagement


- Chief personally visited High Frequency Neighborhoods

 - Faith-based community partnerships (D7)




Focus on Transparency

- Community Briefings
 - Provide body-camera, squad video and other evidence within 45 days of an officer-involved shooting
 - Released 6 since August 2018
- OMAP daily reports
 - Provided to alders weekly
 - Now includes calls for service
- Outward facing data
 - Provides sortable crime data in realtime to the public
 - Released on October 8, 2019
- Monthly Crime & Safety Meetings

Impact of Proposed Budget

- Reduces sworn strength by <u>60</u>:
 - Reduction to 1,804 would be the lowest in 20+ years
- Compliance with ACLU
- Longer response time for:
 - Calls for service citywide
 - Open records requests
 - Data requests
- Reduction in services:
 - Community relations (e.g., OCOE, CPU, etc.)
 - Investigations
 - Mounted Horse Patrol
 - Special events
 - 2018: \$700,000+ unreimbursed (not including Summerfest)
- Increased overtime
