\$6.66 million

Total proposed budget for 2020, an increase of 5.5% from the 2019 Budget of \$6.32 million.

54.2%

Increase in withdrawal from RACM General Reserves for 2020 (from \$281,500 in 2019 to \$434,205 in 2020).



Change in grant funding as a RACM revenue source, from 2019 to 2020, an increase of 18.8%.

57.0%

Percentage of RACM's budget to be funded by grant proceeds in 2020, compared to 50.7% in 2019.

Relationship of RACM to City

The Redevelopment Authority of the City of Milwaukee (RACM) is an independent corporation created by State Statue in 1958. Its mission is to:

- Eliminate blighting conditions that inhibit neighborhood reinvestment.
- Foster and promote business expansion and job creation.
- Facilitate new business and housing development.

RACM has an annual cooperation agreement with the City for the City to provide:

- Management of financial affairs.
- Land use planning and urban design guidance.
- Real estate acquisition and disposition.
- Relocation assistance for displaced families and businesses.

Staffing Update

- All RACM positions moved to City (DCD) budget in 2018.
- 11 City positions supported by RACM reimbursement in 2020, one less than in 2019 (one vacant position of Development Projects Coordinator is eliminated).

RACM Board

- 7 Board members.
- All members appointed by the Mayor and approved by the Common Council.
- Board members receive no compensation.
- The Board held 11 regular meetings each in 2016 and 2017 and 10 regular meetings in 2018.
- Board meetings receive City staff support from DCD and the City Attorney's Office.

Staffing Costs

- 2020 salary reimbursement to City will total approximately \$1.0 million.
- 2020 reimbursement is \$161,000 (-13.4%) less than 2019.
- Reduction stems from both a reduction in the fringe benefit calculation rate(from 45% to 40%) and the reduction in the number of City positions supported by RACM reimbursement.

\$200,000

Projected decrease in revenue from dwelling rent (-25.0% from 2019), a reflection of the shrinking inventory of City-owned in rem properties.

-20.0%

Projected decrease in RACM revenue from development fees and property sales, based on an anticipated decline in number of properties available for sale.

\$28,000

CDBG funding remaining, to be expended for environmental purposes.

\$1,000,000

Anticipated WisDOT Transportation Economic Assistance (TEA) grant funding, to be used at Century City for extension of public road and utilities to serve Strauss and other business park companies.

Grant Funds – Major Uses

- 30th Street Industrial Corridor/Century City redevelopment efforts, including extension of public road and utilities.
