About DPW

Department of Public Works provides garbage and recycling collection for all 1-4 unit households in the City of Milwaukee (181k+ residences).

Operates two solid waste transfer stations, two drop off centers, and a materials recovery facility (MRF).

The MRF is jointly-owned through an intergovernmental agreement with Waukesha County, operated under a third party contract.

Utilized an existing City site for the 2015 retrofit to single stream recycling

Responsible Unit

WI state law requires every municipality in the state to operate a recycling program to manage materials banned from landfill.

The City of Milwaukee Dept. of Public Works is the "responsible unit" or "RU" for the City of Milwaukee, responsible for planning, operating, and funding a recycling program.

As RU for the City of Milwaukee, DPW is responsible for enforcing recycling programs to ensure that residents, businesses, and special event managers comply with state and local recycling requirements.

DPW Services and Climate Impact

- Yard debris and food waste diversion from landfill and emissions reduction
- Recyclables recovery reducing need for raw materials extraction and processing
