Alderwoman Johnson Odom met with us as we discussed our concerns and actions which were needed to solve many of our neighborhood issues. Alderwoman Johnson Odom became a strong advocate and supporter of our group.

When issues came up in reference to the tot lot, an outside group had other plans for the tot lot. It was Alderwoman Marlene Johnson Odom who saved the tot lot for the children.

## Marlene E. Johnson Odom

This document is submitted by the Historic 1<sup>st</sup> Street Ad Hoc Committee in support of the effort to name the tot lot located at West Wright Street and North 1<sup>st</sup> Street in honor of Alderwoman Marlene E. Johnson Odom. Following her election in 1980, Alderwoman Marlene E. Johnson Odom completed twenty four years of consecutive Aldermanic service to the 6<sup>th</sup> Aldermanic District of the City of Milwaukee. Among her many achievements, Alderwoman Johnson Odom promoted and assisted in securing the continuation of the city tot lot. This accomplishment is evidence of the multiple ways this native born Milwaukee resident sought to improve and enhance her city.

Alderwoman Johnson Odom was born in Milwaukee, Wisconsin on July 1, 1936. She was the daughter of Bessie and Edward Jay Davis. It may be said that Alderwoman Johnson Odom's commitment to contributing to welfare of her birth city was influenced by the education she received in her city. A member of the National Honor Society, she graduated from North Division High School in 1955. She graduated from the Milwaukee Area Technical College and later became a member of the Board of Directors. In 1979, Alderwoman Johnson graduated with a bachelor degree from the University of Wisconsin – Milwaukee.

Prior to her election to the Milwaukee Common Council, Marlene Johnson Odom was engaged in raising four children while participating in civic and media activities. In addition to serving on many boards of directors, she supported the American Heart Association, ASHS Family Services Center, The House of Peace, and the St. Jude Children's Hospital. Her media work gave her a distinct position in American television history. In 1961, she hosted the live television production, "Music With Marlene" on Milwaukee Channel 18. It is generally thought that she was the first African American woman to host a television show.

Marlene Johnson Odom was elected Alderman of the 6<sup>th</sup> District in 1980 and served in that position for twenty four years. During her term, Alderwoman Johnson Odom was respected as an outstanding public official who worked tirelessly with honesty and integrity for her constituents. A strong advocate for fair employment, economic development, and civil rights, Alderwoman Johnson Odom, led the Milwaukee Common Council to name North 3<sup>rd</sup> Street Dr. Martin Luther King Drive.

Alderwoman Johnson Odom is responsible for the current existence of the West Wright Street and North 1st Street tot lot. The lot has provided a safe play area and a designated recreation site for the surrounding residents. Students from the Clara Mohammed School, Inc. frequently visit the site. Stephen A. Sayles, former President of the Clara Mohammed School, Inc. Board of Directors, stated that, the tot lot is a special site for area residents. He noted that as a resident for over 40 years in the Historic 1st Street District he has often seen frequent little visitors at the lot. Mr. Sayles lives a block west of the tot lot and said, "It is indeed a treasure." as well as many other residents in the area who see and hear the children's laughter and enjoyment while playing in this much used city tot lot which was saved by Alderwoman Marlene Johnson Odom.
