






#### WELL WOMAN CASE MANAGEMENT ENCOUNTERS






Violence Interruptions by 414LIFE



# **2021 PRIORITIES**

- 1. Securing long-term funding to sustain and enhance emergency COVID-19 response through 2021
- 2. Plan/respond to new waves of outbreaks -COVID
- 3. Continual assessment of programs and services within COVID framework
- 4. Implementation and training for increased data capabilities, i.e. surveillance; EHR
- 5. Expanding laboratory's COVID-19 testing capacity and reference testing services
- 6. Scale up the Health Department's domestic violence prevention initiatives.
- 7. Continue staff engagement efforts through flexible scheduling while preventing burnout and supporting mental health
- 8. Continuing to address and respond to childhood lead poisoning through policy change and by leveraging community partners
- 9. \*Expand family planning services at our sexual and reproductive health clinics
