Programmatic Summary & Goals

The objectives for this operational plan are to decrease the incidence of fatalities and serious injuries resulting from motor vehicle crashes by enforcing seat belt usage in Milwaukee. Through high visibility enforcement, Milwaukee Police Department — in partnership with the Milwaukee County Sheriff's Department, and the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee Police Department — will enforce all occupant restraint laws to encourage seat belt use. As part of this grant, the Milwaukee Police Department will adopt a zero-tolerance policy towards impaired driving and unrestrained occupants during all motor vehicle stops; MPD will also maintain or exceed historical activity levels (rate of traffic stops during deployments) during grant-funded activity.

Data Summary:

Preliminary 2019 data indicates that 35.6% of persons killed and 20.0% of persons sustaining incapacitating injuries in Wisconsin crashes were NOT wearing seat belts. Many of these people were ejected from their vehicle. Statewide seat belt use was 90.2% in 2019; however, Wisconsin seat belt use still remains about three tenths of one percent lower than the national average. It was been estimated that seat belt use by motor vehicle occupants in Wisconsin prevents more than 293 traffic related fatalities and more than 8,000 serious injuries annually.
