Ald. Joe Davis Re-appointed To National League Of Cities Finance Committee

Milwaukee Common Council member Joe Davis, Sr., an appointed member of the 40 member Board of Directors of the National League of Cities, has been chosen to serve on the board's finance committee.

Ald. Davis, who is the chair of the Common Council's Community and Economic Development Committee, has served in multiple positions with the National League of Cities and was one of only 12 members selected to oversee the national organization's financial direction. "The future of policy and progress in our country is in cities. Milwaukee is poised to be an example for the rest of the nation and I'm dedicated to using my roles within the NLC to advance the issues most pertinent to our city," Ald. Davis said.

The finance committee helps the board determine how to spend its funding and how to represent the more than 218 million constituents and 19,000 cities involved in the NLC.
