

This occurred while the bartender was reloading a gun kept behind the bar. The incident was reviewed by the Milwaukee District Attorney's office and no charges were issued. Item three, on 3/13/2010 at 2:03 a.m.

Lamp Inn's Frenchies tavern, 8340 West Lisbon

Milwaukee Police responded to a shooting at North 84th Street and West Lisbon Avenue. Investigation revealed that three people, Vincent G., Megan P. and Benjamin C. were walking past Frenchies tavern, 8340 West Lisbon Avenue. These people became involved in an argument with four people standing in the parking lot outside the business. The argument escalated to a fight. One of the four people standing in the parking lot retrieved a handgun from an auto parked in - - parked in the lot of the bar and shot Vincent G. Milwaukee Police report 100720018 was filed. Item four, on 4/17/2010 at 9:10 p.m. a 20 year old police aide, working in conjunction with Milwaukee Police was able to purchase five bottles of Miller Lite brand beer from the bartender, Thomas M. Angelo at 8340 West Lisbon

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Avenue, Old Lamp Inn Frenchies tayern. Thomas M. Angelo was cited for sale to underage prohibited. The charge sale of underage prohibited, initial court appearance of 6/10/2010, 1:30 p.m. in

Municipal Court and the case number has not been entered into Muni Court site yet as of the

generation of this document.

Item five, on 5/7/2010 at ten p.m. a Milwaukee Police aide who had not yet attained the age of 21, working in conjunction with the Milwaukee Police was able to purchase three bottles of Miller 64 brand beer from the applicant at Old Lamp Frenchies tavern, 8340 West Lisbon Avenue. The applicant was cited for sale to alcohol to underage person prohibited and presence of underage person in places of sale. 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ALDERMAN BOHL: As part of the - - the summary that was completed, this particular text goes into there being a number of individuals that are interviewed. Is that something that is routinely done by the police department? Is that done by regular officers or is that done by detectives?

SERGEANT MACGILLIS: It's done by both. ALDERMAN BOHL: Okay. This particular summary lists a number of minors that were interviewed. Are you familiar with that, Sergeant?

SERGEANT MACGILLIS: Somewhat, yes. ALDERMAN BOHL: Sergeant, is it, based on the investigation that was done here, do we have a number of minors, including these individuals who were shot, that indicated that they have been customers in this particular bar?

SERGEANT MACGILLIS: Yes, there is. ALDERMAN BOHL: And in that effort there was or was there not, questioning of individuals, including a number of additional minors, who have indicated that this particular location has been a hangout? Would that be a fair summary, for underage drinking?

SERGEANT MACGILLIS: Yes, that's correct. Specifically, on page two about the fifth paragraph down there's a - - a interview of a minor, whose name I'll leave out, but this minor clearly indicates that the owner allowed drinking in the tavern and deleted minor's name stated that it's common knowledge that her friends from a certain jurisdiction know that they can go there and drink underage, and that it's especially busy to this incident, and on weekends, and so that - - that's contained in this document, page two, paragraph - - ALDERMAN BOHL: Those items were not

ALDERMAN BOHL: Those items were not included in the summary, but were part of the report that was filed relating to a number of shooting instances. Is that correct?

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However, I can caution the committee, and in all due respect to the Alderman here, that underage drinking is something which is very carefully regulated in Chapter 125 and its use in a renewal

6 7 hearing. And the rule is you need two 8 convictions of underage drinking, underage

service within a year of the first in order to use it for any purpose imposing punishment on a licensee. The same rule does not apply if the citation is for presence of underage. If it's presence of underage, one is enough. But if it's

underage drinking - -

CHAIRWOMAN COGGS: One conviction? MR. SCHRIMPF: No, you just need - -

Actually, you don't even need a conviction.

CHAIRWOMAN COGGS: One charge, okay.

MR. SCHRIMPF: But the point of the matter is if you're dealing with underage service of alcohol, underage drinking, you need two within a year of the - - of the date of violation of the first, and both - - both must result in convictions. So, a caution to the committee on that.

And none of that was found. So just if the committee members will note that and - -

CHAIRWOMAN COGGS: Thank you. This item was cited for neighborhood objections. Are there any witnesses present wishing to testify either in favor or in opposition to the license? Please raise your hands. Raise your right hand, please. We have to swear you all in.

(Whereupon those witnesses present were sworn.

CHAIRWOMAN COGGS: Who is here in opposition? Please raise your hand. Those in opposition? All right. In opposition? Okay. The code establishes that we hear from objectors to the license first. CHAIRWOMAN COGGS: Right. Attorney Schrimpf, what's your recommendation?

They play all in the neighborhood, and I don't want to - -There's been a bar there for nine years since we've lived there. We've never been - - had problems, big problems that we've known of. But anyway, just we are very concerned about a bar that caters to young kids, and - - and other, you know, dangerous occurrences that have been happening there with our young kids in the neighborhood. There are lost of people in the neighborhood that care about it. Thank you.

MR. PEDERSON: Madame Chair, I believe

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Alderman Bohl has a lot to say, and I'll defer much of my time to him. I would just like to indicate that - - and underscore that the police department has specifically chosen to object, and for the Commander to show up. And I know that's been happening on a greater frequency. But I think that's something that the Council to take into consideration. We appreciate the fact that the committee and the Council has a greater - - a more complex and numerous considerations than the police. It's easy for them to show up and say, this is a bad place. However, the mission of the - - of the police department, as the Chief likes to say, is to suppress fear, crime and disorder. And the police department believes that that will be accomplished if this bar is not allowed to operate anymore. So we respectfully request the

CHAIRWOMAN COGGS: Alderman Bohl. ALDERMAN BOHL: Thank you, Madame Chair. Madame Chair, this was a bar that a year ago I had strong reservations about. I had expressed it to the owner/operators when they attempted to apply. Told them that I would give them a fair shake, but let them know my

because they are not forthright. I have had - -When I've raised the issue of a - - a November 11th fight that was called to me by neighbors, I 5 6 7 8 was told by - - by Jake Lepold, the owner, that he was aware the incident was not related to the bar. Lo' and behold it turned out that that very instance - - that very instance, he said that it was somebody who lived upstairs. It was a domestic altercation, and the problem was gone. It was resolved, because those people were out. Well, the person that was involved in the fight was the gentleman next to me, Tom Angelo, involved with an argument with his girlfriend. Now, the allegation in the CAD report that I have, would be happy to enter it into the record, indicates one thing. Something that wasn't stated to the police when they responded.

Last year we were promised that there would be cameras. We were promised that if there's a situation in the parking lot and we feel we need to get a doorman to check the parking lot, we'll definitely do that. They had instances of a fight on New Year's Eve. There was no doorman that came after that. There weren't working cameras. We were promised

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expectations. We had a neighborhood meeting, and in that neighborhood meeting these individuals indicated that they were going to operate a neighborhood bar. That this was going to be a quiet place. That this was going to be the type of place that would not have violence. There were many, many promises that were made to neighbors, to myself. I had reservations because it was another location that had a liquor license in that very same building. But they said all the right things.

Unfortunately, the problems are very evident. When we look at these young - - young women and men that were sitting in the front row that looked like babes, the underage problem is very, very evident. The fact that - - that the police reports the shooting, this is a place that had violence. The very violence that was perpetrated in the shooting was very evident even on New Year's Eve. There was another incident besides that where there was another fight that involved one of the operators with the allegation that he was beating up his girlfriend, that's in the police report.

I've had problems with these operators

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cameras. We really respect our neighborhood. We have a very tight plan. We want a comfortable peaceful quiet gathering place for drinks for people in the neighborhood. There are security cameras. We have 24/7 coverage. Just a place for the neighbors to come in and enjoy. We want to be a low key small operation.

Well, the fact of the matter is, is the problem with violence here is systemic. It is the operators. It is individuals who are in denial, who I have been unable to deal with because, unfortunately, the very same response of not showing up to the police department meeting with - - with the police officer. If you actually read the PA-33, it talks about how in - - in the applicants they are very defensive, confrontational. Using expletives with the police department.

This is not the type of operators here that are able to realistically deal with the situation. We've had a tremendous amount of violence there. Look at what the reaction is. I had a number of meetings with these gentlemen, called and talked to them on the phone, met with them. Brought up the issue and the concerns of

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00133 underage. One of the gentlemen here was very confrontational at the neighborhood meeting saying that that's just bologna. That doesn't happen. What's happened? A couple of additional citations for underage.

> The problem is more than just the underage. It is individuals who are willing to say anything to get a license and ultimately the fact and reality is, is there's a huge neglect of the law. There's a huge neglect for authority. there's a huge neglect for responsibility. The very acts of violence here are - - are something that just doesn't happen. It is something that is responsible and has come because these gentlemen here are too young and too immature to adequately handle a license.

I'm sorry that what has happened. I'm thankful that the individual here who was shot didn't lose his life. I'm actually thankful that Mr. Lepold wasn't shot and killed. But it is grave irresponsibility on the part of these operators that led to situations like that. There's just great neglect.

I ask the committee here to not renew, because I don't want to deal with continued

tavern, but that was after hours, and there were no customers in there.

The shooting that happened outside, you know, you've got this police report. I've objected to it. You had an Officer Trunkel máking accusations against my clients that they were going to be criminally prosecuted, perhaps. I, of course, had to say, don't make any more statements to her. If she had not said that, they would have been able to be free to go ahead and discuss the things that the Captain wanted to discuss with them. But since she's making allegations and threats that they may be criminally prosecuted, I have to work myself and tell them to shut up.

The - - They've taken great strides to go ahead and take advantage of remedial measures. They've got their cameras working. As Mr. Angelo testified, he thought they were working until they had an incident where they had to go back and review the tape, and found out, hey, they're not working. It's on some crazy Korean time. We have to have our guy come in here, fix this. It's too much for us.

They're on a learning curve, as some of

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problems here. The very - - The very responsibilities that these gentlemen promised a year ago were ignored. And we see the results.

CHAIRWOMAN COGGS: Thank you. ALDERMAN BOHL: Thank you. MR. MURRELL: Thank you, Madame Chair.

CHAIRWOMAN COGGS: Closing for the applicant.

MR. MURRELL: To revoke this license as Alderman Bohl wishes this committee to do would be far overstretching, overreaching and a severe sanction I've seen in 15 years of appearing before this committee for these licenses. To say that Mr. Josef Lepold is an Afghan War Veteran with half a decade of honorable military service for our country is too young and inexperienced to hold a license like this is disingenuous.

This establishment has been around since about 1948 - '49, as you've heard testimony. It's been around a long time with zero record of incidents up until now, unfortunately. The shooting that happened inside with Mr. Jake Lepold, yeah, that was an accident. Any shooting is a very serious matter in any

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the other witnesses have testified. The - - You know, I - - I hate to say this, but I have seen this. The usual and ordinary way I've seen little tavern owners operate is they will only card people who come up and order. And I've talked with them since this has happened, since the ticket's been issued. Said you've got to have someone stationed there at the door. You've got to be checking constantly. So they've gone ahead and instituted that. Now, they have someone sitting at the door. They've got their carding machine, which verifies that the IDs that are shown are - - are real. If there is a problem with underage presence, I think it's kind of murky. You can hear it from the tavern regulars that they didn't see any people in there they normally would suspect to be underage. I think that that should be taken at face value and that some - - some credit - - or some weight should be given to that. And as far as the owners go, and them being able direct to underagers, if we had time for their testimony, they would tell you they don't recognize the young girls who came up. They've never seen them there. And that - - that might be indicative of

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another problem, just not paying attention. But as far they're concerned, they've never seen them on those premises before.

Keep in mind that the second shooting happened outside. We have Mr. Gerke saying he's seen the shooter before inside, but he did not see him inside that night. This is a matter, another case, yet another case, where you have a shooting outside one of these establishments where the whole neighborhood automatically makes a connection. That there may be some truth to that, but then again, it may be wholly unrelated to what was going on in that place that night.

The New Year's Eve situation where the neighbor was escorted back to his house. Again, if we had more time, you would heard that there was no indication he was intoxicated upon entering the bar, and I think Mr. Angelo took the responsible course by escorting him home, when it became obvious that that was a problem.

My biggest concern here is - - is with Alderman Bohl. I don't like - - I don't like the testimony I heard from Mr. Lepold. I don't like the fact that I just heard, and this is not the first time that I've heard it, and I've heard

surveillance video. I was concealing evidence because my girlfriend who I lived with is Asian. I am the owner of an Asian gang bar. At the time of the shooting there were 80 people at the bar. She personally was going to harass us every chance she gets. And she said she had spoke with Alderman Jim Bohl, and they were trying to shut down the bar.

ALDERMAN KOVAC: I just want to - - I mean, if you really are the subject of a criminal investigation, obviously, your lawyer should tell you to remain silent. But potentially, if you had been involved in the shooting, why would you want to volunteer information that could lead to your prosecution over the shooting? On the other hand, it sounds like police are trying to solve a shooting where someone almost died. And it's pretty common police tactic to say, hey, look at these details that we could nail you on. If you'd cooperate and help us solve the shooting, maybe we could overlook them. I'm not sure if that was exactly your tone. I'm just speculating.

My question is, assuming that the only violations you had were potentially, you know,

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that Alderman Bohl at his neighborhood - - neighborhood meeting with Mr. Angelo and Mr. Lepold and Joe Lepold was confronted about his opinions regarding Asians. And at that meeting someone asked him about the Asian crowd. He's told both of my clients, Mr. Joe Lepold and Tom Angelo that he thinks all Asian males are gang related and violent. That makes me sick. And I would ask this committee to give the appropriate weight and credit to his opinions that they deserve.

CHAIRWOMAN COGGS: Thank you. This matter is in committee.

ALDERMAN KOVAC: Madame Chair.
CHAIRWOMAN COGGS: Alderman Kovac.
ALDERMAN KOVAC: I just have a couple questions for the applicant. You mentioned that the police officer had threatened criminal prosecution of your clients. What did - - What did they threaten that they were going to prosecute them with?

THE APPLICANT: One second, sir. ALDERMAN KOVAC: Go ahead.

THE APPLICANT: She - - She stated that I didn't have a bartender license. I erased the

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lack of a license display, assuming that you lived with your girlfriend and don't commit criminal acts, why wouldn't you cooperate with the police in order to solve a shooting, and especially when that shooting jeopardizes your livelihood and because of the action this committee may take?

THE APPLICANT: I'm glad you asked that. I was working with Joseph Mclin. He was the detective there on the scene that night, along with Walter Kapeli. We were cooperating with them. They were coming back every other day, trying to get more information. I was cooperating with them. Joseph Mclin requested the name of the girl that was having the birthday party. I retrieved that for him. I gave him her name and her number. And just recently I followed up with her to see if they had any luck, any headway, as far as finding the - - you know, the people involved in the shooting. And she says she was never even contacted. So it's my opinion that this isn't about finding the people involved in the shooting. It's about something more than that.

ALDERMAN KOVAC: So you're saying that

THE APPLICANT: She's a key - - She was a key witness. She was the one that had the birthday party. I gave her information. She was never contacted.

ALDERMAN KOVAC: Have you talked to your girlfriend, to your regulars that you know, about this and asked them to cooperate with the police?

THE APPLICANT: Absolutely. And we were cooperating up until the point that Officer Darcy Trunkel came to my residence and started making these accusations that I was involved in the shooting. At that point we contacted our lawyer, and got him involved, and he suggested that we shouldn't make any more statements, based upon these serious accusations that are being made against us.

ALDERMAN KOVAC: So, yeah, I mean, if you really think you're a suspect in the shooting, then you shouldn't cooperate.

THE APPLICANT: Because I'm told I'm being a suspect.

ALDERMAN KOVAC: Because, you know,

leave. She's Asian. She's Hmong. The things that she was hearing about how Alderman Bohl had told these two gentlemen not to let the Asians into this place anymore, how they were not going to follow that order for all kinds of reasons, one, it's just immoral, and two, it's illegal.

CHAIRWOMAN COGGS: There is a question asked, and I'm not sure what you're saying is answering the question.

MR. MURRELL: They just gave him - Because of the uneasy connection between Alderman
Bohl's position and the fact that he has an Asian
girlfriend, this made him feel very
uncomfortable, and his conclusion was, I am just
out of here.

ALDERMAN KOVAC: Whatever him and his girlfriend think of Alderman Bohl, this is the previous lawyer saying - -

MR. MURRELL: Scott Winkler.

ALDERMAN KOVAC: Yeah, saying that the whole problem with the bar was his bravado, not whether his opinion of Bohl and how he felt uncomfortable about - -

MR. MURRELL: Okay.

ALDERMAN KOVAC: I'm talking about - -

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1 frankly I'd be more concerned about criminal
2 prosecution than I would about the fate of this
3 license. But if you're concerned about the fate
4 of this license, I - - I would have cooperated.

of this license, I - - I would have cooperated. One other quick question. The letter - - I know you - - you're saying the letter that you said was disavowed from the previous lawyer, Mr. Winkler. So, I mean, you - - you completely disavow this. There's a particular sentence in it that I was curious about, and now Tom is at the table, and you say that he's involved until the license expires, not after. Not that it's all Tom's fault, but you and your committee ought to know that not throw the book at the Lepolds just yet. With Tom gone, it's a whole new ball game, and he poisoned this friendly speakeasy atmosphere with his bravado. So when I received this letter last week, the effects, I'm thinking, okay, they're throwing an X employee under the bus here. THE APPLICANT: Like my attorney said, I can't be a part of a business in a district where the Alderman's a bigot.

ALDERMAN KOVAC: One last question. Can you describe what happened the night of the shooting, when Mr. Lepold was shot?

THE APPLICANT: We were closing up the bar. It was me, Jack and a mutual friend of ours. I was - - We - - I had put my money bag on the end of the bar. I put my firearm on the end of the bar. It had nothing in the chamber. The safety was on. I went to go turn off the lights. Our mutual friend asked Jack if he could look at it. Jack said that he may. After looking at it he had put one in the chamber, and it was locked and open. When he handed it to me, I did not look at it, but the thought that he would be handing me a locked and loaded firearm didn't cross my mind. It was my gun. It's my responsibility, and it's my fault. I take full responsibility for what happened. He handed it to me, and it just went off in my hand. And it went through a wall into the bathroom, and it's something that happened, that it makes me sick to my stomach every time I think about it. I

consider Jack and Joe my family. They're the

close - - They're the closest people I have in my

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of everything. I mean, even to the point where people - - When your attorney said, well, you can't even prove that those young people were even in there. Why would they even be here? They wouldn't even be here. And then, to propose to this committee that it's possible, by the preponderance of the evidence, that they might not even be there. We don't even have any hard evidence to prove that they were actually in the establishment. Come on. You have to accept some responsibility for - - for the license that you came to this committee and said that you were responsible enough to operate in the City. That's ridiculous. For one.

Two. I have some life experience. I have been the - - on the receiving end of bigotry. I've - - I've been on the receiving end of - - of ignorance. And it's very difficult to fight that battle in our community when we accuse people who actually have a partner in fighting big - - bigotry in our community. And this - -He's been a partner in that. And so it's very difficult for me to accept the fact that he is this horrible person who is prejudging everyone in the Asian community because of this one

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incident. This - - This has been a partner in - - in fighting that, and - - while I've been in this seat. So, it's - - it's hard for me to - - to accept that as - - as a blanket statement. So for someone to say something that's ignorant at some point, for someone to say something that's misconstrued, people do that all the time. Maybe they - - they say something that's not exactly - - It comes across the wrong way. It's confusing or whatever the case may be. But to then stamp that person across the forehead and define them as - - as - - as just as ignorant, all right. So those two things really made me uncomfortable. So I wanted to - - wanted to say that.

But to - - to get to the matter at hand when it comes to this license. It is - - It is clear to me that the presence of underage at this establishment has been proven, that there has been an ongoing problem with the presence of underage at this location. Having said that, there is also a level of - - a level of violence that's been occurring at this location that's been affecting the neighbors that live around in the area. And I think you should - - If when you came here a year ago, and from reading the

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as contentious. I don't - - I don't even understand if - - I don't even understand why it would degenerate to that - - to that level. Why would you have a contentious relationship with the police department when they are trying to help solve a crime that occurred at your establishment that you - - you want to keep those types of things from happening and it's your relationship with them that's going to help solve those things and to keep those things from happening at your establishment in the future. So it's almost as if, you know, you want to - you want to nip that in the bud and make sure that you have open lines of communication with the police department as you move - - as you move - - move forward. So I have - - I have some issues with the commitment to keeping those types of things out of this establishment, the violence and - - and the presence of the underage. I'm not even going to bring up the drinking. The presence is - - is a problem, because they go to the - - It goes to the heart of the two main things that the responsibility of having this license go to, you know, the drinking age and

maintaining a - - an establishment that's as free

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transcript that's in the record, you made it seem as if this was going to be a local place where you were going to reach out to people in the neighborhood. You were going to be receptive to what they complained about. And if they complained to you, then you were going to change those things, and you were going to - - I mean, this - - I think the words in the transcript were some of the same things that were said during the testimony. This - - This was going to be a Cheers atmosphere, you know, where everybody knows your name, and, you know, everybody comes in and it's, you know, how you doing, Bob? How you doing, Jim? How you doing, Susan? And that's not what it developed into.

One of the other frustrating things.
You had communications with the - - with the police department, about some of when these problems occurred with the neighbors and you had community meetings and you were aware of the problems that existed at the location, then you walked away from the meeting, and the problems continued. And to the point where your relationship with the police department degenerated to a point where - - It was described

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of - - of problems that's affecting the neighborhood.

So I just think that this is - -Because this license only existed for a year, because the incidents that occurred were numerous enough where there had to be a number of community meetings to address the issue, and by and large because your ineffective in addressing those issues to date, that I think the responsible thing for this committee to do would - - would be to grant a non-renewal of that license. And I don't think that this is a question of - - of whether or not a - - a liquor establishment, a liquor license should be at this location. I think that - - I mean, I agree. I don't - - I don't know if - - if the operators are - - are capable of addressing community issues, dealing with police departments, dealing with the community, so that the issues that you have when they do come up, that you can address them, that you can solve them, and that you can continue to operate an establishment without those - - without those issues. I mean, that's one of the responsibilities of having the license is being able to when an issue occurs, it's - -

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it's not as if this committee expects for there to be no issues. The committee expects for --when there are issues, for you to solve them, to work with the entities that are in place to help you solve them, and then, for you to act responsibly in that process. And I - - From the -- the testimony here today I just -- I have no confidence that -- that you would be able to go through that process and -- and maintain a respectable establishment.

So the motion that I have, Madame Chair, is -- is for non-renewal.

CHAIRWOMAN COGGS: The motion by Alderman Hamilton is to recommend denial of the license based upon - - or non-renewal of the license based upon the police report and neighborhood testimony.

ALDERMAN ZIELINSKI: Madame Chairperson.

CHAIRWOMAN COGGS: Is there discussion on the motion? Alderman Zielinski.
