# \$7.05 million

Total proposed budget for 2022, A decrease of 1.6% from the 2021 Budget of \$7.16 million.

-2.2%

Decrease in withdrawal from RACM General Reserves for 2022 (from \$487,318 in 2021 to \$476,709 in 2022).

-\$100,000

Projected change in revenue from Dwelling Rent, 2021 to 2022, a decrease of 20.0%, a reflection of the shrinking inventory of in rem homes.

61.7%

Percentage of RACM's budget to be funded by grant proceeds in 2022, compared to 60.7% in 2021.

### **Relationship of RACM to City**

The Redevelopment Authority of the City of Milwaukee (RACM) is an independent corporation created by State Statue in 1958. Its mission is to:

- Eliminate blighting conditions that inhibit neighborhood reinvestment.
- Foster and promote business expansion and job creation.
- Facilitate new business and housing development.

RACM has an annual cooperation agreement with the City for the City to provide:

- Management of financial affairs.
- Land use planning and urban design guidance.
- Real estate acquisition and disposition.
- Relocation assistance for displaced families and businesses.

### **Staffing Update**

- All RACM positions moved to City (DCD) budget in 2018.
- 12 City positions supported by RACM reimbursement in 2022, the same number as in 2021.

### **RACM Board**

- 7 Board members.
- All members appointed by the Mayor and approved by the Common Council.
- Board members receive no compensation.
- The Board held 11 regular meetings in 2017,
   10 in 2018, 12 in 2019 and 10 in 2020.
- Board meetings receive City staff support from DCD and the City Attorney's Office.

### **Staffing Costs**

- 2022 salary reimbursement to City will total approximately \$1.3 million.
- 2022 reimbursement is essentially unchanged from 2021.
- Fringe benefit calculation rate remains at 46%.
