Whereas, Under the terms of CFDA #16.710, the City of Milwaukee appears to be eligible for grant funds from the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Community Oriented Policing Services; and

Whereas, The operation of this grant from 07/01/20 to 06/30/23 would cost \$9,712,096, of which 100% would be provided by the grantor; and

Whereas, The Milwaukee Police Department will hire 30 new officers; and

Whereas, Some members of the Common Council have expressed a desire for the Milwaukee Police Department to adopt a number of measurable goals and strategies as a condition of accepting the COPS grant; and

Whereas, On January 12, 2021, the executive command staff of the Milwaukee Police Department issued a signed statement, included in the record of this file, acknowledging the Common Council's priorities and indicating that the Police Department would work to achieve the following goals and strategies:

1. Incorporating a performance-based approach for producing measurements for police staffing and allocations guided by the framework and recommendations included in the Office of Community Oriented Policing Services - University of Michigan report, "A Performance-Based Approach to Police Staffing and Allocations".

2. Improving police response times, particularly responses to lower priority calls, compared to average response times at 2020 year-end.

3. Working cooperatively with the Department of Administration, who will conduct a civilian-sworn patrol resource analysis of the Police Department, similar in nature to the 2007 Patrol Resource Analysis conducted by Matrix Consulting Group.

4. Expediting implementation of previously-authorized technology integration

systems, and in particular implementing Project Greenlight, as a means of leveraging technology resources to reduce strain on sworn and civilian personnel from budget constraints.

5. Participating and deploying in Milwaukee Promise Zones as a form of community engagement and crime prevention.

6. In collaboration with the Community Collaborative Commission, developing a Community Oriented Policing Standard Operating Procedure. The intention is to demonstrate a commitment to building and maintaining relationships with community members and groups, and to collaborate with the community to address public safety issues and identify solutions to neighborhood problems.

7. Prioritizing traffic enforcement and working with the community and system partners to augment and improvement reckless driving enforcement.

Whereas, The executive command staff further agreed to report measurable progress in preparing and implementing the aforementioned plans and strategies to the Common Council within 90 days of adoption of this resolution, and every 4 months thereafter for the term of the 2020 COPS CHP grant, or as otherwise deemed necessary by the Common Council; now, therefore, be it

<u>201212</u> A substitute ordinance relating to licensing parking lots or places.

The Mayor and Common Council of the City of Milwaukee do ordain as follows:

Part 1. Section 84-20-1-a of the code is repealed.

Part 2. Section 84-20-1-b of the code is amended to read:

84-20. Parking Lots or Places.1. DEFINITIONS.

b. "Event parking place" means a [[downtown]] parking place operating principally to provide temporary parking for events and festivals.

Part 3. Section 84-20-1.5 of the code is amended to read:

1.5. FINDINGS. The common council finds that [[downtown]] parking places are inherently [[more prone than other parking places]]>>prone<<to crimes against parking patrons, vandalism of vehicles, theft of vehicles or property inside vehicles, and other threats to the security of parking patrons and property [[due to population density in the area, ease of access to the area and other factors]]>>because the area is often deserted, easily accessed, poorly lighted and for other reasons<<. The common council further finds that greater oversight of the issuance of new licenses and the renewal of existing licenses for [[downtown]] parking places is likely to ameliorate the greater threat to the health, safety and security of parking patrons posed by [[downtown]] parking places.

Part 4. Section 84-20-4.5-0 to c-0 of the code is amended to read:

# 4.5. [[DOWNTOWN PARKING PLACES]]>>PARKING PLACE SECURITY<<.

a. Police Review. Following submission of a new license application by a
[[downtown]] parking place, but prior to the scheduling of a licenses committee
hearing, the applicant shall meet in person with a police department community liaison
officer, or other designee of the chief of police, to review the plan of operation, and to
conduct a crime prevention through environmental design (CPTED) survey.
b. Grounds for Non-renewal, Suspension or Revocation. In addition to the evidence
provided in s. 85-4-4, probative evidence concerning whether or not a license granted
to a [[downtown]] parking place should be subject to non-renewal, suspension or
revocation shall include the suitability of the security plan for the premises and how the
security plan compares to the review conducted by the police department under pars.
a and b.

c. Additional Security Measures. If 2 or more security incidents occur on the premises within a month, a [[downtown]] parking place licensed under this section shall implement additional security measures, as determined by the police department, to protect the health, safety and welfare of parking patrons and the security of property. The [[downtown]] parking place shall maintain these measures during the remaining term of the license. These measures may include, but shall not be limited to:

Sewerage District, and the State of Wisconsin, Department of Natural Resources.
Whereas, The Department of City Development, Redevelopment Authority of the City
of Milwaukee, Port of Milwaukee, and other City agencies (collectively known as "the
City") have been coordinating with the US Environmental Protection Agency
("USEPA"), the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources ("DNR"), Milwaukee
County, We Energies, and Milwaukee Metropolitan Sewerage District ("MMSD") to
develop plans to remove the Milwaukee Estuary as an Area of Concern ("AOC");

Whereas, The Milwaukee Estuary includes the nearshore waters of Lake Michigan, portions of the Milwaukee, Menomonee, and Kinnickinnic Rivers, and a segment of Lincoln Creek and was designated an AOC in 1987 by the International Joint Commission because of historical modifications and pollutant loads that contributed toxic contamination to the AOC and Lake Michigan; and

Whereas, In October 2019, the Common Council of the City of Milwaukee ("Common Council") adopted File No. 190877 authorizing the appropriate City representatives to execute a Great Lake Legacy Act ("GLLA") Project Agreement with the USEPA, DNR, Milwaukee County, We Energies, and MMSD; and

Whereas, The purpose of the project agreement was to improve the conditions in the AOC to protect human health and the aquatic environment as well as support the eventual delisting process; and

Whereas, The Parties now wish to enter into a Contribution Agreement for the purpose of defining contributions, roles, and responsibilities for the Non-Federal Sponsor ("NFS") portion of the GLLA Project Agreement for Focused Feasibility Study ("FFS"), Pre-Design Investigation ("PDI"), and Remedial Design ("RD") of Impacted Sediments, the RD of the proposed Milwaukee Estuary Dredge Material Management Facility (MKE-DMMF, "DMMF" for short) and the removal of polychlorinated biphenyl ("PCB") contaminant Source Material in the Milwaukee Estuary AOC; and

Whereas, Under this agreement, the City is providing \$400,000 of the non-federal cost share requirements through in-kind contributions such as-built evaluation, utility locate, Grand Trunk sewer assessment; and

5. The Bonds shall be executed in accordance with the provisions of this resolution. An Authorized Officer is hereby authorized to execute and deliver, in the name and on behalf of the City, any and all documents and instruments, with such technical changes as may be recommended by the City Attorney, and to do and cause to be done any and all acts and things, said Authorized Officer deems necessary or advisable in connection with the offering, sale and issuance of the Bonds and to carry out the transactions contemplated by this resolution. In furtherance of the foregoing, the City shall comply with the provisions of the Tax Certificate executed by an Authorized Officer in connection with the Bonds; the obligation of the City to comply with the provisions herein with respect to the rebate to the Department of the Treasury of the United States of America relating to the Bonds shall remain in full force and effect so long as the City shall be required by the Code to rebate such earnings on the gross proceeds of the Bonds notwithstanding that the Bonds are no longer outstanding.

Whereas, Amendment 26 to the 2021 Budget placed a footnote in the Budget stating, "The Health Department shall collaborate with the Department of Administration on developing a voluntary Lead Safe Registry initiative for city property owners"; and

Whereas, On July 7, 2020, the Common Council passed File Number 200321, which directs the Department of Administration - Intergovernmental Relations Division to seek introduction and passage of legislation that would permit the City of Milwaukee to create a program certifying that properties are lead-safe before they are rented to the public; and

Whereas, Many properties rented for residential use in Milwaukee are believed to have significant lead-poisoning hazards which can be contained or abated by regular and conscientious maintenance; and

Whereas, The regular and conscientious property maintenance needed to contain or abate lead-poisoning hazards ensures the value of these properties and surrounding neighborhoods, improving the quality of life for residents; and

Whereas, Lead-poisoning hazards can pose a serious risk to the health and safety of persons living in rental housing which is often not realized by the residents; and

Whereas, A person renting and living in a residential property has a right to presume the property being rented is a healthy and safe environment, free from risk of sickness or injury; and

Whereas, It is in the public health interest of the City to protect the health and safety of residents renting and living in residential rental properties by creating a Lead-Safe Registry that provides prospective renters and homebuyers with details related to a property's lead situation; and

Whereas, Participation in Lead-Safe Registry would be voluntary, rather than compulsory; and
