George, approved

New – propose regular meeting day of Monday, alternating 11 and 1 start time

- 3. Definitions of GHG emissions reductions and net zero emissions and how they relate to the work of the Land Use group.
 - a. GHG emissions
 - i. As identified in GHG inventory
 - ii. Primarily from burning fossil fuels buildings, electricity, transportation sectors, plus waste and wastewater
 - b. Net zero emissions
 - i. Does not equal zero emissions
 - ii. Requires drawdown of carbon from the atmosphere to offset continued emissions
 - iii. Natural climate solutions carbon sequestration above and below ground, in plants, roots and soil
 - iv. Why 2050 and how do we measure this? Some experts say that with 45-60% emissions reduction, carbon sequestration can bring carbon levels to net zero
 - c. Drawdown by Paul Hawken, per Bruce
 - d. Other measures beyond the iclei REPORT, such as reducing food miles
 - e. ICLEI report is now on video per Erick; keep in mind the sequestration; massive reforestation and such suggested by Drawdown; land use planning such as transit oriented development should also be looked at; Dave suggests looking outside the county for trees but we need to be limited here

Tree Canopy -

Branch Out Milwaukee Plan (Milwaukee Water Commons)

Janet, new director of programs at Mil Water Commons; asked everyone to read the plan; Water Centric City theme was being developed; esp. historically underserved communities; urban tree canopy was a focus due to co-benefits like better air, asthma reduction, heat island impacts, energy costs, emphasizes co-benefits of addressing urban tree canopy; workforce issues and maintenance; recruit for maintenance Enrique – private vs. public property tree location

26% tree canopy in Milwaukee, per Janet; Refresh 40% goal; must be distributed equitably;

Ben points to SEWRPC info on parks, open space, etc. and could compile this if desired

George – tree canopy plus urban forest plus urban agriculture; weave it all together Bruce – we are getting ahead of things by doing detail on project ideas now Enrique, sees 8 street trees; brings up the private land aspect for trees

Vacant Lots -

City's HOME GR/OWN program; Neighborhood Improvement Development Corp; Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan

Dynasty, HOME GR/OWN coordinator; vacant lots, not all within their program; Leasing for Gardens through DCD and community garden permitting process; brownfield assessment; neighborhood input

Farms installed through a business

Partnerships with Walnut Way, Fondy, etc., some parks, orchards

25 private parks or orchards to date

Cream City Farms – needs human power

Pete's Fruit Market partnering for pumpkins; working with neighborhood

Comprehensive Plan is in planning for their portion

Barrier - human power for maintenance is a main one

MKE Black community grocery store in the works for locally grown food, coop model, Richard Diaz

Erick – fresh food access was the genesis of HOME GR/OWN

Groundwork does the most in community gardens

Has become placemaking; pocket parks like Fondy Park; North Avenue beautification Not so much urban agriculture now

Not solving food insecurity

Green Infrastructure Plan, 2019 – this is a sea change for streets, mitigation, parking lots, jobs, schools; award winning Milwaukee.gov/GI

45% of Milwaukee is impervious

DCD Housing affordability report, 2020

DNR Maps of Contaminated Sites; where tree planting is not realistic

Cream City – food production must be bumped up significantly

Comprehensive outdoor recreation plan; our project could be incorporated; state and federal funds can be attracted for projects outlined in those plans

Networks of trails, etc. vs. individual lots

Landscape design guide
Tree line buffer incorporated now

Green corridor, model from Witkowski on south side

Sam, transit-oriented development and grants for beautification projects, Development Corp

Challenges re sustainability

Streetcar line; SEWRPC is looking at transportation, as well as city's Bus Rapid Transit; reduces transportation emissions

Ben, EW Rapid Transit BRT; NS corridor at 27th is under study; can share; George questions what communities and destinations are being connected; Purple line is very busy and would be improve, people of color mostly

Land use and transportation planning go hand in hand per Ben Big project –

Venice – strong agricultural connections; shift language and implementation; socioeconomic layers; barriers to creating farms; regenerative agriculture is key; regenerate soil, air, communities; feeding the population; much land available

Katherine – Wauwatosa; moratorium on clearing any more land was mentioned Janet – tree clearing

Forest/Woodland Preservation and Restoration -

City's landscape zoning code; Municipal Flood Control (MFC) grant program
George – points to upriver impacts and the county partners
Kelly, 16th Street – MMSD partner w/KK River projects; fish habitat; leveraging the
MMSD investment; could be leveraged; MMSD has 5-year maintenance
Katherine, Green Tier Legacy recent meeting; flood resilience score card was
presented; looking for participants; Tosa is considering; 3 lenses for evaluation

Food / Access to Healthy Food / urban agriculture / reducing food miles – City's HOME-GROWN program Healthy Food Access; Cream City Farms brownfield development

Dynasty – from HOME GR/OWN, this was a focus but has now shifted; she has this as a personal goal; COVID impacts; current reliance on food from the outside; Cream City Farms – David Johnson, farmer; has resigned; Venice can speak on successful farming

Bruce – reducing food miles as a measure; also, ICLEI report does not reflect the potential for our group

Tracy – co2 and jobs; criteria to consider

Erick – carbon into the ground; get an expert; apply criteria

George - #1 project idea, March

Project idea, barriers, initiatives to build on; convenor for each one, to happen before next meeting
